their private vehicles in traveling in their districts to perform the duties of their office or attending the county seat that they may at their discretion vote themselves the expense allowance provided in Article 2350e.

"According to the position of the Attorney General's office, as it is my opinion that the order entered on the 11th day of January should be amended stating that the Commissioners elect to use their own private vehicles for the transportation on their official duties within the district and in the county instead of pickups that have been provided by the county. As the Commissioners themselves know the facts, any action they take will be as to their discretion.

"If the Commissioners revise said order of January 11 as herein suggested, and submit a copy of said revised order to you and to the other officials involved, according to the policy of the Attorney General, you would be authorized to issue and approve their vouchers for said expense allowance.

Text of a letter, which was accompanied by copies of earlier opinions regarding commissioners' expenses, received by Mr. Brown from the Attorney General's Office, is as follows:

"Dear Mr. Brown:
"This will acknowledge your letter of March 10th concerning traveling expenses for the County Judge and County Commissioners in Eastland County while traveling on official business inside the county. You further state that Eastland County owns a number of pickups that are assigned to the Commissioners' precincts, and that you are desirous of knowing whether the members of the Commissioners Court are authorized to allow themselves \$75.00 per month for traveling expenses

in the county pursuant to the provisions of Article 2350e of Vernon's Civil Statutes.

"This letter is not to be construed as an official opinion of the Attorney General's office, but in an effort to be of assistance to you I am enclosing copies of Attorney General's Opinions WW-513 (1958) and C-299 (1964).

From reading these opinions you will observe that the question of whether the Commissioners are actually using the county pickups as a means of conveyance while traveling on official business within the county is a factual determination and, as you further know, this office is prohibited from passing on factual questions and can only pass on legal matters.

"I invite your particular attention to Opinion WW-513 wherein it holds that if the Commissioners are using the county vehicles as their method of transportation while traveling inside the county, they may not be allowed expenses for operating their pri-

Meetings will be held this week in Rising Star and Gorman for the purpose of discussing results of several nematode control demonstrations, according to J. M. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent.

Nematodes, which are small, microscopic eel-like worms, do many thousands of dollars worth of damage to peanut crops each year. Mr. Cooper stated. In cooperation with representatives of a large chemical firm, he has had several control demonstrations the past two years by fumigating the soil before planting with a chemical. Increased yield of both nuts as well as hay have been starting in many instances, Mr. Cooper reported.

The first meeting this week will be held in the agriculture building across the street from the high school in Rising Star Thursday night, March 25. The second will be in the high school auditorium at Gorman Friday night.

Both meetings will begin at 7:30 p.m., and all interested persons are invited.

Also I believe that Opinion C-299 fully explains the allowance of traveling expenses to the County Judge while traveling on official business within his home county.

"I trust that the foregoing explanation will assist in the solution of your problem, and as above stated, this letter is not to be construed as an official opinion of the Attorney General's office.

Miss Tubbs, who is one of the top girl singers with western bands, and her orchestra recently played at the Golden Nugget in Las Vegas, Nevada, and at Caravan East in Albuquerque, N. M.

Mr. Johnson reported that Newman, who is well known in television and radio circles, will do a "single" performance with three shows nightly Friday and Saturday nights. The Patsy Tubbs band will be here for three weeks — through April 17.

The Corral Club will have other headliners, including Larry Kelly, king of the pantomime, on April 2 and 3; Bob Wills, noted western band, April 16, and others booked for the next few weeks.

The club will have a cover charge of \$1.25 per person for the Monday through Thursday night shows and a \$2 cover charge on Fridays and Saturdays when top performers will be on the program. The club will serve meals until 10 p. m. each night. Some 300 persons will be able to have seats.

The new club area is completely air conditioned and is carpeted except for the dance area. Walls are finished with drapes and acoustical materials. Governor for Day ...

Senator Creighton Due Honors On April 20th

A statewide celebration honoring Texas Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells is expected to be one of the outstanding public events of the year, when the newly elected senate president pro tempore becomes "Governor-for-a-Day" on April 20 in Austin.

Sen. Creighton, who has represented the 22nd senatorial district since 1960, will on that date assume the duties of chief executive, by virtue of his election on January 12 to the post which made him third in line of succession to the governorship. It is the highest position that may be held by a member of the state legislature.

Second in line to Texas Governor John Connally is Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith. However, both officials will be out of the state, thus creating the vacancy in the top executive office.

In assuming the responsibilities of the governor's chair, Senator Creighton will carry on all routine duties for the day. Following a brief ceremony in which he will take the oath of office, a reception is to be held for friends and guests during the morning at the governor's offices in the capitol building. A press conference is scheduled with the capitol press corps, and for some 50 visiting newsmen, television and radio representatives who are expected for the event from all major areas of the state.

At the noon-hour, Governor Creighton will join his family for luncheon at the executive

Later, he will resume his official activities in the capitol offices, where a number of conferences and meetings with constituents and other state and district leaders will be held as a part of the day's official program.

A dinner honoring Governor and Mrs. Creighton will be held at the Commodore Perry Hotel in Austin.

A steering and coordinating group has been named for organizing and assisting the committees which will be in charge of the Governor-for-a-Day program. Heading the arrangements groups are Chairman C. G. Lee, D. E. Clemens, state Democratic executive committeeman, representing the 10-county 22nd senatorial district; Perry Horton, J. F. Bailey, Marshall Hamilton, Sam Hawes, Dr. H. A. Zappe, and Grady Elder. O. B. Lance has been named chairman of public relations for the state-wide event.

Clemens, who is heading the Governor-for-a-Day ticket committee, has emphasized that this is a public event and that dinner tickets are available to anyone at \$5 per person.

Indications are that the day's various functions will involve a number of prominent officials from industry, as well as political and judicial posts, at both the state and national levels, and that most of these personages will be present for the evening festivities and banquet program.

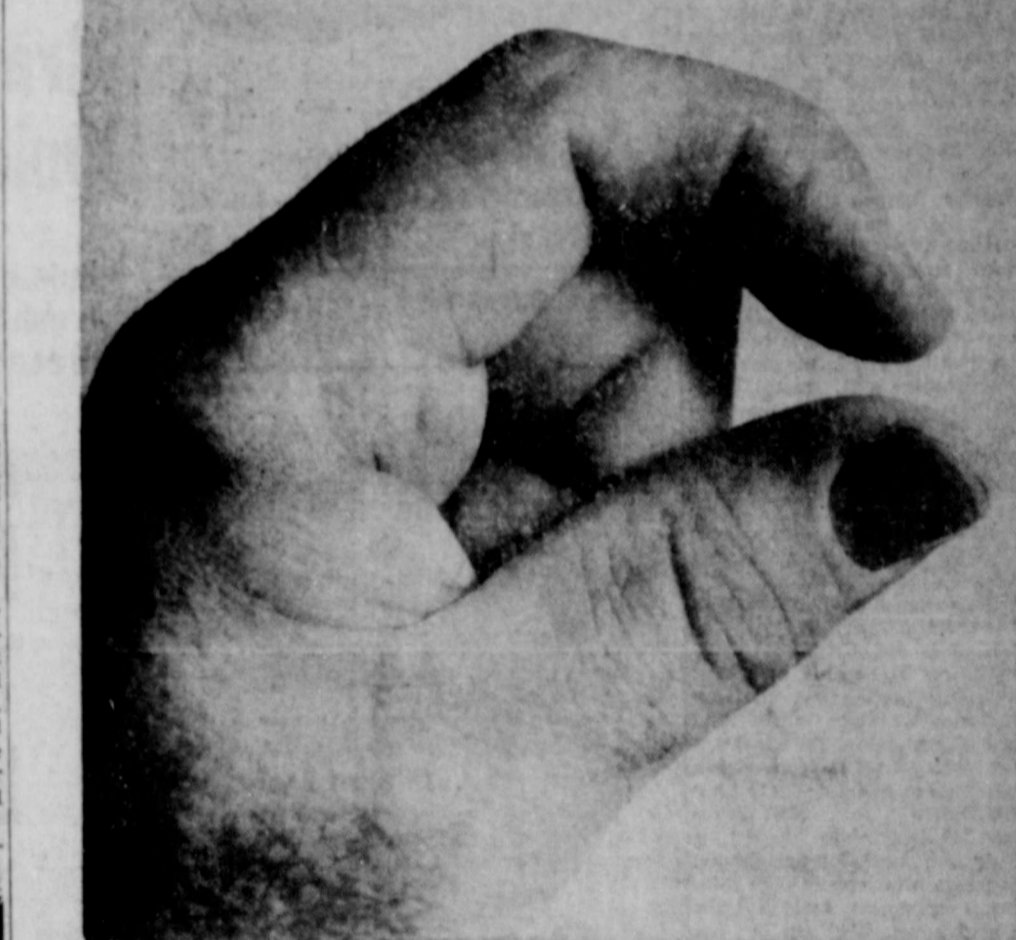
