## WOW! WHAT A SALE!

By the time the smoke cleared Saturday evening, buyers had spent \$179,877.09 at the 31st Annual Castro County Junior Livestock Show, a new record by over \$24,000.

The previous record was \$154,900, set in 1976.

Buyers paid out \$171,617.91 for the 125 barrows, 126 lambs and 24 steers, then contributed \$6,028.22 to help pay off the Dimmitt FFA animal facility north of the city, \$2,150 to the Nazareth FFA, \$961.89 to the Nazareth Young Farmers, \$340 to Friends of Vocational Agriculture, \$247.93 to Girlstown and \$4,301.95 in separate donations that helped to make ends meet for youngsters that didn't make the sale, or came up short in the sale ring.

Floor prices, auctioned off at the onset of the sale, were 66.75 cents a pound for steers, paid by Bud Hill Feed Lot; 47.35 cents per pound for barrows, paid by Hereford

Livestock Co.; and 64.50 cents per pound for lambs, paid by Estacado Industries of Sunnyside.

Mark Kleman, of the Nazareth FFA, drove his 1,270-lb. large frame crossbred steer to the grand championship, besting 29 other competitors. A combination of three cooperatives, Dimmitt Agri Industries, Castro Co-op Gin and Dimmitt Consumers paid \$2.10 per pound for the champion.

Frankie Huseman, also of the Nazareth FFA, showed the reserve grand champion, 1,305-lb. medium-large frame steer. The Nazareth Buyers Club provided a guaranteed bid of \$1.50 per pound for the steer, which will be shown by Huseman at next month's Houston Livestock Show.

Anessa Scott's 227-lb. mediumweight Duroc was the grand champion of the hog show, beating out 189 other competitors. Dwight Gleghorn of K-Bobs Steak House paid a

## Profit, not credit, needed

# Budget committee hears King

Area agriculture leader Carl King told a US House Budget Committee field hearing last Wednesday that a profit is needed in agriculture, and that more credit is not necessary in trying to turn around the plight of farmers nationwide.

"We don't need any credit," King told the committee in Irving last week. "We just need to reconstruct the loans we've already got. We need a profit in agriculture."

King was the only farmer who testified before the committee, which is chaired by House Majority Leader Jim Wright of Fort Worth. He was part of a four-person panel.

King told the committee the high interest rates many producers are paying for money, and the strong dollar, which is hurting US exports, are hurting farmers profit potentials.

"I also told them that I think the President has gone overboard with the military budget," King said. "It's the first time I've ever said this because I believe in a strong military."

"The farmers have already taken our lumps by producing cheap food and going broke doing it," King said.

King told the committee, "We must reamortize and reconstruct the farm loan system — the Farmers Home Administration, farm loan banks and everything else — so these guys can stay in business. Second, the most important in the long run, is to adopt a supply management program over the coming years."

King outlined the three-point program being promoted by Texas Corn Growers Association and many other ag-related groups, including a supply management program, a two price loan system, and mandatory acreage reduction that would eventually cut out all payments to farmers.

King said the two price loan system — one for export commodities and one for domestic consumption — that would provide the farmer a profit would

solve the problems of the American farmer.

"Every American should be interested in reducing the deficit, but this Administration is doing it the wrong way," King said. "Our (supply management and two price loan system) plan would reduce

the federal deficit by \$15 to \$20 billion in feed grain programs alone.

"That reduction would come in the form of reduced interest rates and reduced freight to the government," King explained. "Also, the government would save by having no payments to

the farmer — target prices, deficiency payments or any other payments. We're advocating just cutting out all payments to the farmer, period."

"I made it real clear that we don't want to give up anything we've got right now," King

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## Hearing to cover abatement ordinance

At the next meeting of the Dimmitt Aldermen, a public hearing will be held on a proposed ordinance for the abatement of dangerous buildings in the city.

"We want to be fair and equitable and not put an undue burden on any property owners," said Mayor Wayne Collins. "We need to know how the public feels about this problem."

City Manager Paul Catoe presented pictures of numerous structures in the city that are abandoned or unlivable. Some have been damaged by fires or are structurally unsound.

Members of the Mayor's Council on Beautification told the aldermen that they would like to see such eyesores

eliminated.

Economic Development Commission director Gerald Hanners said that removal of unsightly structures would boost the town's image in attracting prospects.

The proposed ordinance would call for property owners to bring structures up to current building standards or remove the structures. If an owner fails to improve his property, the city may have the structure torn down and bill the owner for the expense.

The aldermen called for a city election April 6 to fill the offices of mayor, two aldermen and municipal court judge. Mayor Collins and Judge Ferne Jones have already filed for reelection. The term of alderman

Although we in no wise presume to be able to produce a newspaper of outstanding merit, even under the most favorable conditions, we do, however, believe that with the 18 years experience we have had in the various departments of weekly papers we are qualified, in a measure, to give Dimmitt and Castro County the type of newspaper to which it is entitled. If your local paper appears to have more than its share of shortcomings during the next few weeks, we

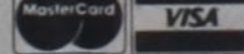

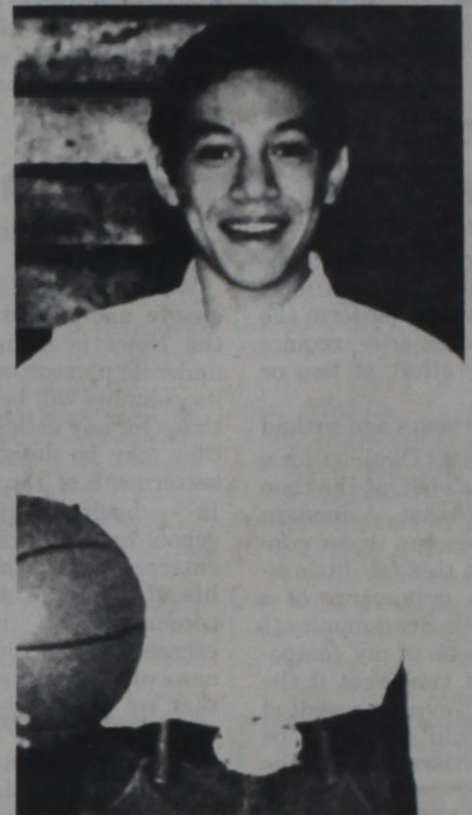

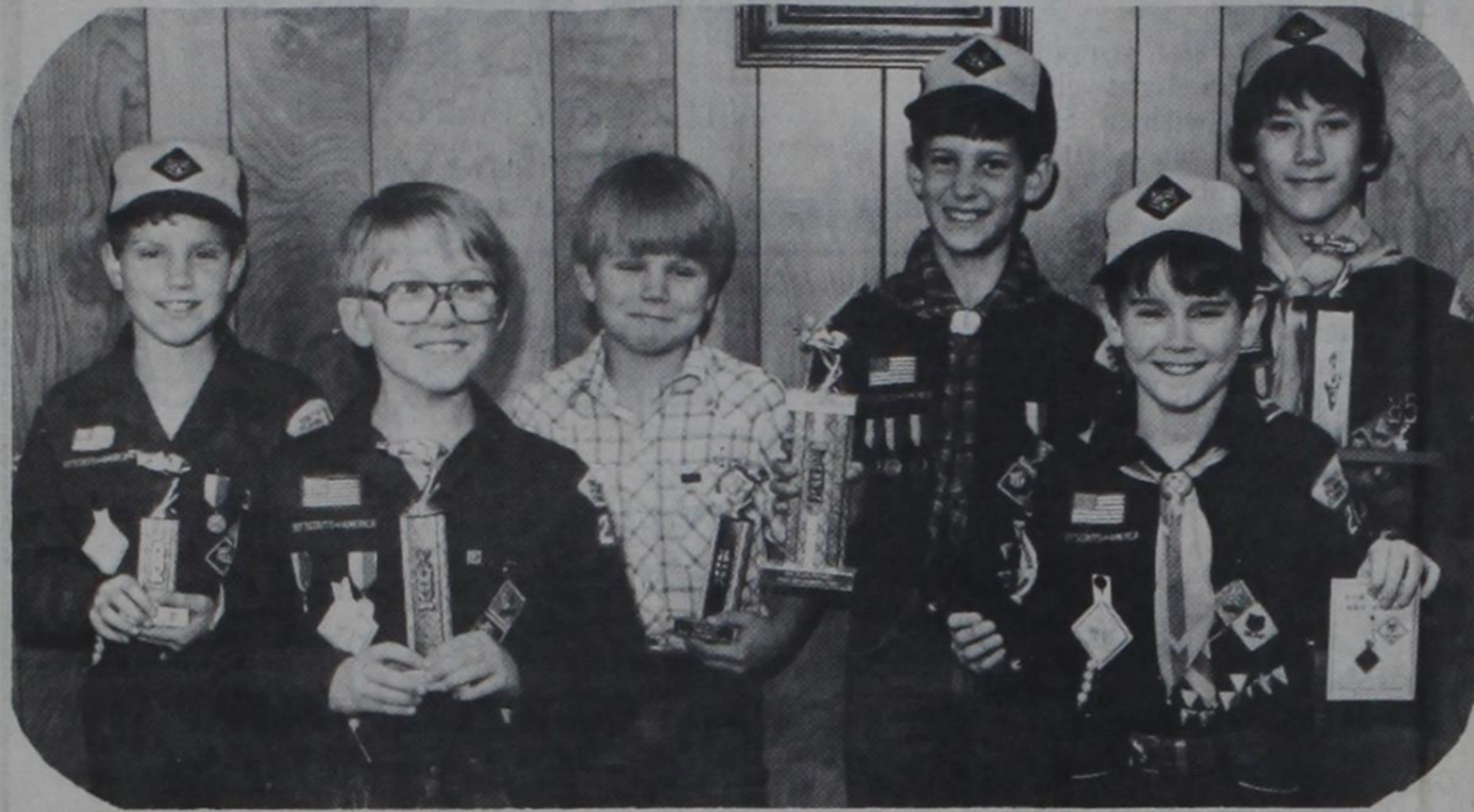

## Davis testifies before Senate ag subcommittee

Texas Corn Producers Board chairman Weldon Davis of Hart testified Thursday before the Senate Agriculture Subcommittee in Austin as part of the subcommittee's ongoing Agriculture Awareness Program.

Davis discussed farm conditions in the Panhandle, and outlined efforts of the TCPB and Texas Corn Growers Association to help ease the current economic crisis in agriculture.

State Sen. Bill Sarpalus, subcommittee chairman, characterized Davis' presentation as "extremely informative." The Legislature needs to hear more from Davis if they are to fully appreciate the current plight of Texas farmers.

"There are too many urban lawmakers down here (Austin) who have no idea what's going on in the farm community,"

Sarpalus said. "It's people like Weldon Davis who can tell the story. We're extremely pleased to have Weldon, who's such a fine farmer and agribusinessman, take part in our Agriculture Awareness Program."

The Agriculture Awareness Program is sponsored by the subcommittee in order to make senators more aware of the problems and needs of Texas' agriculture community. Sarpalus said other farm and ranch leaders from across the state would appear before the subcommittee during the current legislative session as a part of AAP.

Davis, who farms some 5,200 acres in the Panhandle, has been president of the High Plains Farm Bargaining Association and Texas Producers Marketing Association, and is a member of the Texas Agricultural Energy Users Association and a director of the US Feed Grain Council.

In its regular meeting this week, the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen discussed two important economic development issues.

First, the Aldermen agreed to set a public hearing to consider an ordinance for the abatement of dangerous buildings. City officials estimate that there are at least 30 abandoned houses in Dimmitt that are not habitable. Some of these structures have been gutted by fires. Others are simply old, deteriorated, and falling down. These structures need to be eliminated to improve the appearance of the residential community and to make room for new homes.

Second, the Board considered an aggressive street paving program that is desperately needed to give Dimmitt a modern, clean appearance.

Why do we consider these to be economic development issues? The Board of Aldermen recognizes that before we can attract industry to Dimmitt, we must first be a community that attracts people. We must be a community where people want to live and our appearance is a key factor in our growth.

The Economic Development Commission joined the Chamber of Commerce and the Mayor's Beautification Committee in urging the Board to consider these issues.

While the Board is aware of the need for these improvements, it is also interested in being fair to property owners and carrying out the will of the people. Unless there is broad community support for these actions, little is likely to be done.

This week, the EDC is encouraging you to contact your City officials and let them know that you support these vital improvements.

We can be a community that grows or we can be a community that simply grows old. Our future depends on making wise choices now.



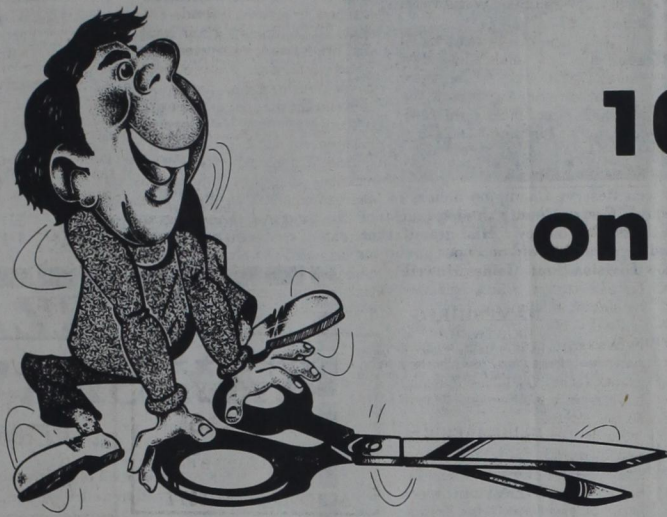

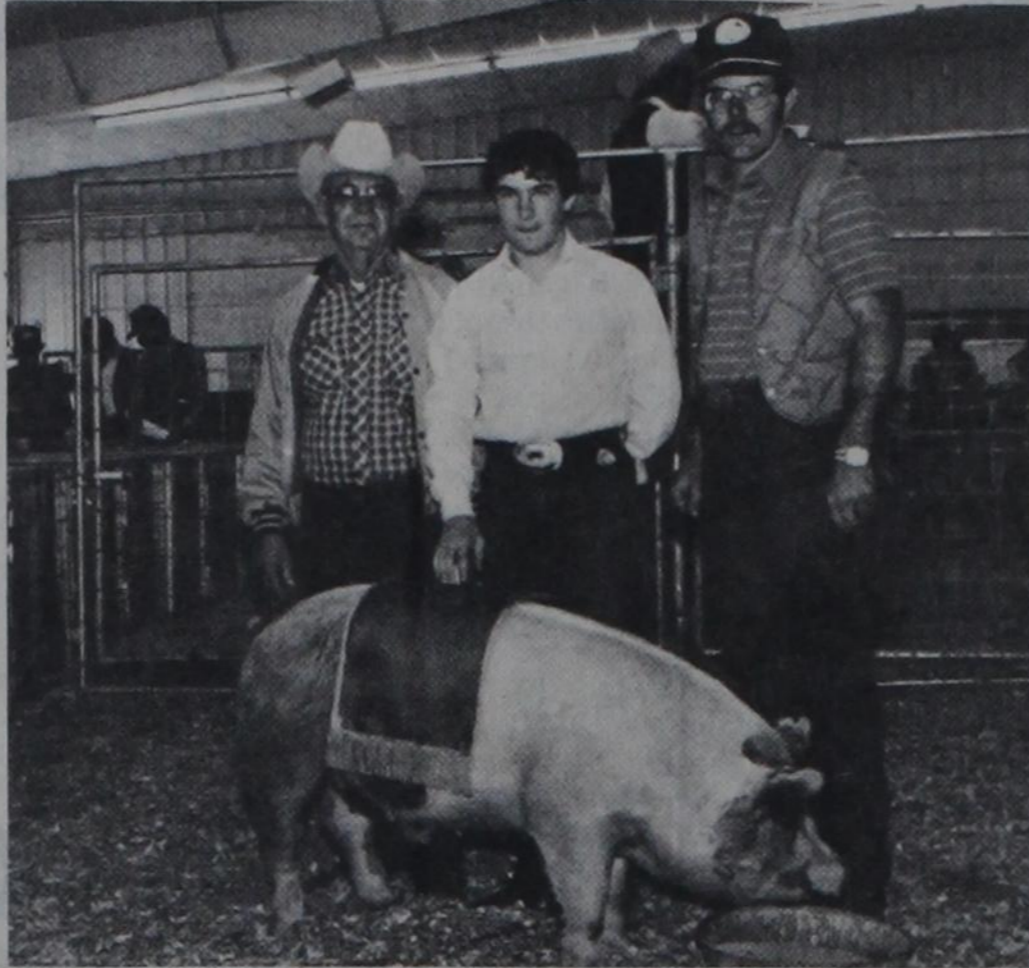

Deadlines are quickly approaching for summer and fall financial aid, according to The Scholarship Bank.

For example, students with an interest in business, law, and accounting can receive a stipend from the Exceptional Student Fellowship Fund, and apply to the parent corporation for full time work following graduation.

The Scholarship Bank is the largest private scholarship bank in the country for undergraduate and for graduate grants and loans. The computer can help you find sources designed just for you, based on your major, occupa-

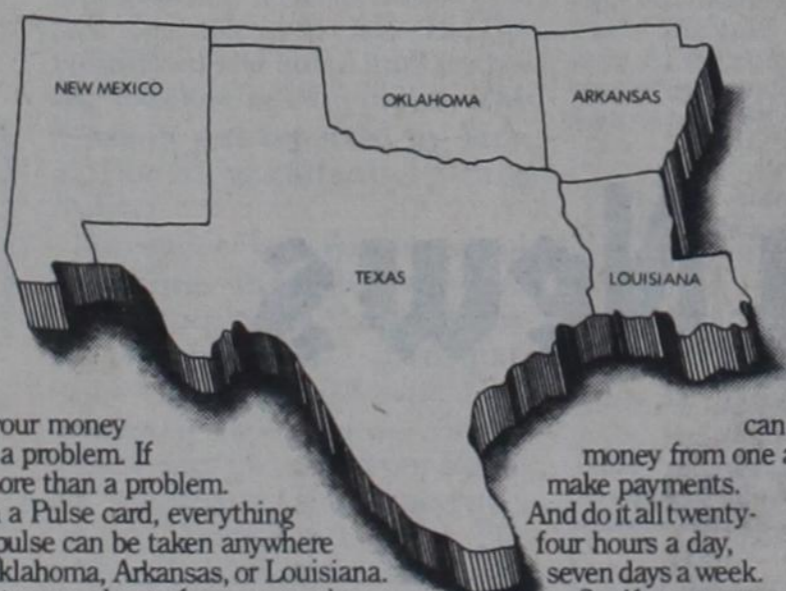
tional goal, geographic desires, type of aid requested (scholarships, loans, summer work), and special skills and hobbies.

According to the director, the computer guarantees each student at least fifty sources of aid. It has been estimated that each package of aid represents approximately \$20,000 in potential money for college. Private aid comes from America's largest foundations, corporations, unions, and private donors and totals approximately 500 million dollars, or one fourth of all available aid. Thus, it is an extremely valuable addition to the private and state moneys available.

As an example of the depth of the search, the bank reports one student found 36 sources for the most unusual major of "deep sea diver."
