Sunrise Easter Rites Set For Sunday at 6:30 a. m. In New College Stadium

Rangerites will solemnize a traditional date Sunday — Easter — when they gather at dawn for sunrise services in the new Ranger Junior College stadium, U. S. Highway 80 west.

ture and the hymn, "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today" will be sung. Rev. Hobbs will bring the morning worship, followed by the hymn, "The Day of Resurrection." The benediction will be by Rev. Jearl Hayes, pastor of Eastside Baptist Church.

The public is cordially invited to attend this special Sunrise service, leaders of the Ranger Ministerial Alliance said.

Regular church services will be held at the local churches Sunday with special emphasis on Easter theme.

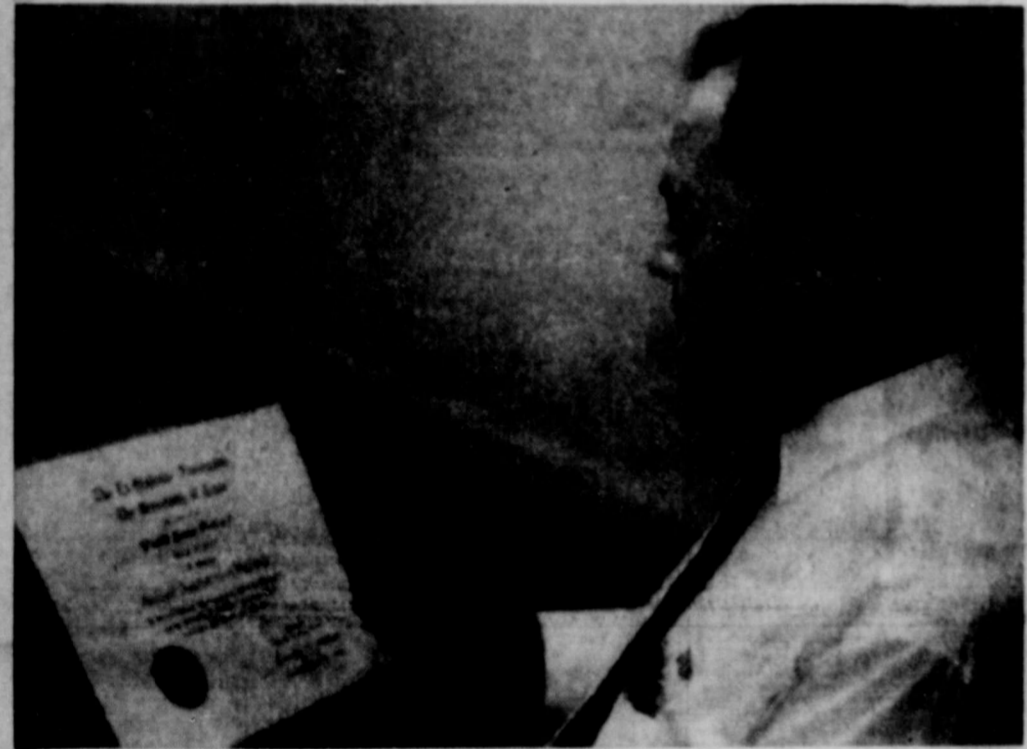

David D. Pickrell Is Presented 50th Anniversary Exes' Diploma

David D. Pickrell recently was the recipient of a coveted award — a beautiful honorary Golden Anniversary diploma presented by the Ex-Students Association of the University of Texas, Austin.

Pickrell, Ranger attorney and insurance agency owner, and Mrs. Pickrell attended the April 3 reunion of U-T exes in the capital city and participated in the dedication of the new Ex-Students' Association building on the expanding campus of the state's largest educational institution.

The Rangerite, a native of Austin, recalls that his old Class of 1915 was the last group of graduates to use the original main building. He said when he was a student there, the campus was comprised of 40 acres with six

buildings and a power plant. Today the university's facilities sprawl over a 126-acre area.

One of Pickrell's classmates was Lonnie Flewellen, attorney and former Ranger resident who lives in Austin.

Pickrell's photo appeared in a souvenir 50th anniversary yearbook which was published in conjunction with the April 3 event and which is highly-prized by the Texas ex-student who holds an LL. B. degree.

Along with Pickrell's picture, the souvenir annual also contained the following caption:

"Dave wears three hats on his competent head: lawyer, insurance agency owner and rancher. Wife Mildred is a close runner-up: director of music at the Ranger Methodist Church and violinist in the Eastland County String Quartet. Cattle raising is a natural hobby of a ranch operator."

Funeral For Jack G. Rapp Held Monday

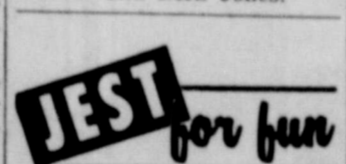

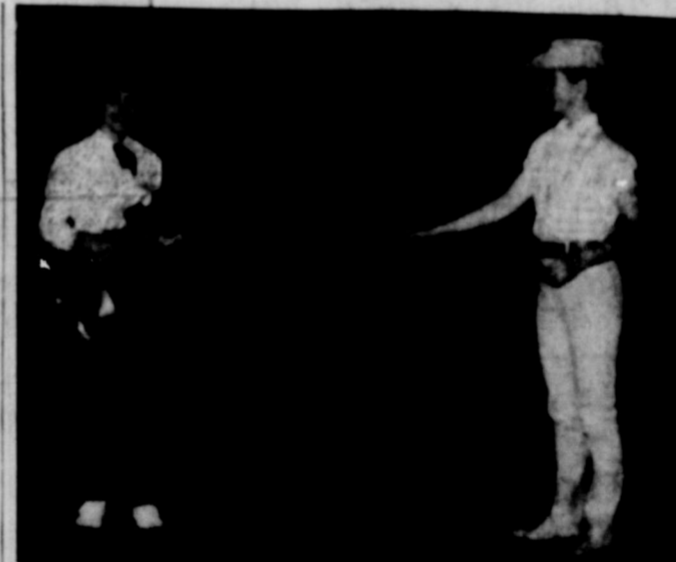

125 ATTEND ANNUAL PECAN BUDDING SCHOOL IN COUNTY

A total of 125 people from 25 counties took part Tuesday in the annual Eastland County Pecan Budding School held in Cisco under the sponsorship of the county pecan growers association, the county agent, the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and Cisco Junior College.

County Agent J. M. Cooper conducted a three-hour lecture and study session at Cisco Junior College's cafeteria Tuesday morning. Some 80 people from out-of-county

were present, including 29 from Abilene.

Mr. Cooper, who has conducted similar schools for some 10 years, discussed the proper procedure in using budwood, storing it, and the techniques in budding trees. He had a good supply of budwood on hand for the use of those present.

After lunch in the cafeteria, the session reconvened at the Kent Word pecan orchard along the Leon River, four miles from Cisco.

After long planning the American Cancer Society starts its month-long educational and fund-raising Crusade against Cancer with confidence.

"We have never been better prepared," Mrs. Harris and Glynn Gilliam, business chairman, said Wednesday afternoon. "Volunteers have responded with enthusiasm, eager to establish a new record. I am confident they will. All know the success of their assignment will help save lives from cancer through research, education and service. It is a serious job and they know it."

Mrs. Harris listed the primary objectives of the Crusade as: making sure that all the people in Ranger know and understand the life-saving facts about cancer, how essential early detection and prompt treatment are in dealing with cancer, the value of an annual physical checkup as an instrument of early detection, and the importance of more research in solving the cancer problem.

The 1,300,000 Americans now alive, saved from cancer, emphasize the effectiveness of educational, research and service programs. Education leading to early detection and prompt treatment alone could save half of those who develop cancer. Only one out of three is now saved. More research — for which greater funds are needed — is the only hope for complete control of cancer.

"Knowing the needs," Mrs. Harris said, "I am confident the people will respond. It is not only a duty but a privilege. There is no greater privilege than helping to save lives."

College Seniors Invited To Join U. S. Coast Guard

WASHINGTON, D. C.—College seniors or graduate students can fulfill their military obligation as officers in the U. S. Coast Guard, the active peacetime Service. Qualified applicants will be notified of selection for Officer Candidate School before they enlist. The classes convene in September and February at the Coast Guard Reserve Training Center in historic Yorktown, Va.

The carefully selected college graduates receive 17 weeks of intensive, highly specialized training. Successful applicants are commissioned as ensigns and serve on active duty for three years.

Coast Guard officers receive the same pay and benefits as officers of other Armed Forces. These include 30 days of annual leave as well as free medical and dental care. They also have an opportunity to qualify for flight training.

Peacetime duties of the Coast Guard include law enforcement, search and rescue, oceanographic research, ocean station patrols, and the maintenance of aids to navigation.

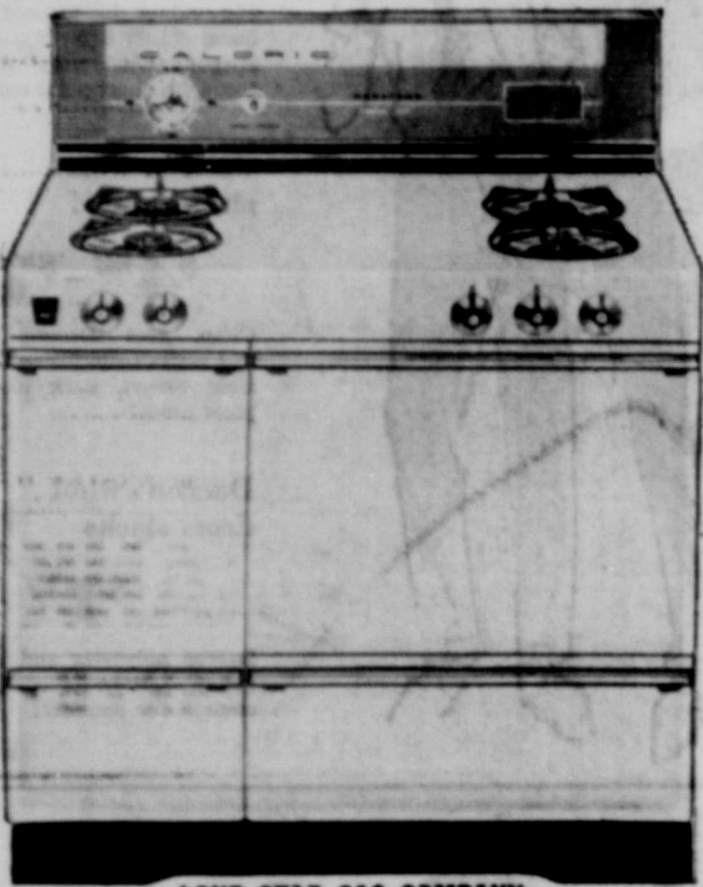

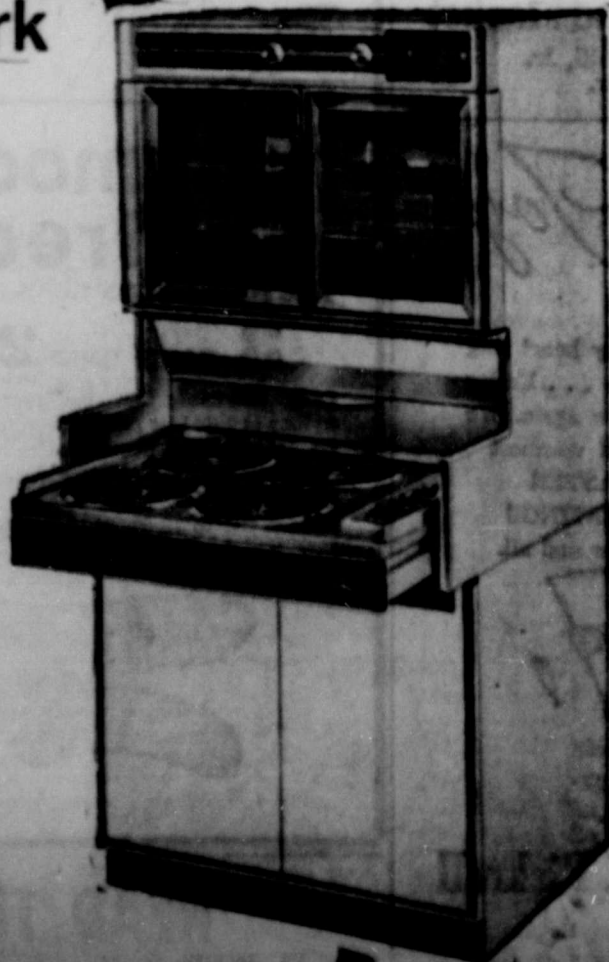

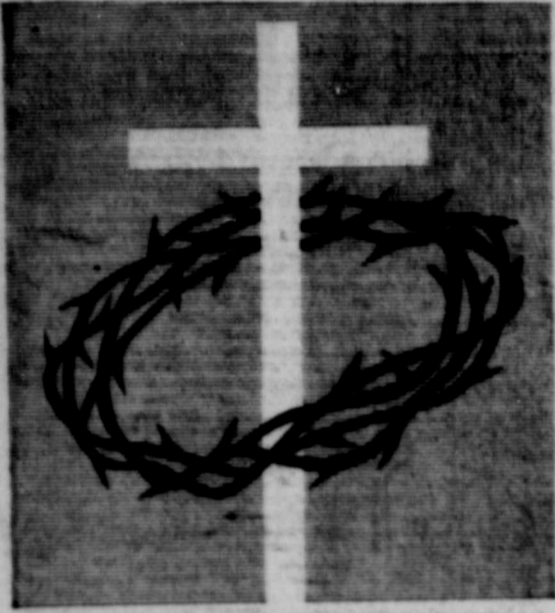
