2 Horticulturists To Attend Annual Pecan Field Day

Two of the top horticulturists of Texas are scheduled to be on the program at the annual spring field day of the Growers Association on May 17 in Cisco, according to Oscar Schaefer, president of the group.

Tom Denman, Stephenville agricultural experiment station horticulturist, and B. G. Hancock, horticulturist of the Extension Service of A&M University have accepted invitations to attend and appear on the program, Schaefer said.

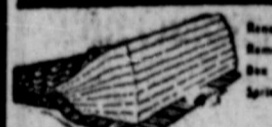
The morning session, beginning in the conference room of the First National Bank at 10 a.m. in Cisco, will feature discussions by both men on Di-Syston as a systemic insecticide for aphids that cause honeydew, shuckworm and pecan weevil research findings, use of thuricide as well as results of various fertilizer analysis tests.

After a Dutch Treat lunch at noon in Cisco, the group will go to the Jim Jennings pecan orchard a mile east of Scranton to check on the stage in the life cycle of the pecan nut case bearer, most destructive insect of the pecan in the state.

Women as well as men are cordially invited. Out of the county pecan growers are also invited, according to Schaefer, who is looking for a large group to attend the annual affair.

Besides the spring field day, the association also sponsors a fall tour, the county pecan show and the midwinter meeting. It was organized in 1956 by County Agent J. M. Cooper to help in the development of the pecan industry in the county.

What interests the readers of local newspapers? The Suburban Press Foundation conducted a survey to find the answer to that question, and Editor & Publisher has printed the results. They cast a revealing light on the wants of the millions of people who live in the small towns and the countryside.

As one would expect, local news led the field in readership, with 92.9 per cent of those polled saying they always read it; 6.5 per cent saying they read it sometimes; and only 0.6 per cent confessing they never read it.

Next — and close behind — came editorials and local columns. A mere 0.7 per cent said they never read these.

Third in reader interest was advertising. Only 2.7 per cent said they never read it. All the rest said they always or sometimes read it.

Actually, the whole local paper is very thoroughly read. Even the poorest read classification — sports news — drew a combined "always" and "sometimes" readership of 89.1 per cent.

The local paper is one of the most welcome of visitors to rural homes. It stays for seven days, not just one. And the whole family has a lasting and hearty appetite for just about everything in its columns.

The Christian armor, Ephesians 6:10-20 says that the Christian's warfare is against more than the natural temptation of his flesh. There are powers in the unseen world against which we are powerless except through the aid of Christ. Prayer is the weapon that wards off the darts of the unseen enemy. Dr. Harris Isbell Is Addiction Authority

Many people have had the honor of receiving an award from a famed person such as the President of the United States, vice-president or attorney general. Few of these persons, however, are from the surrounding area of Eastland.

One of the few is Dr. Harris Isbell, son of Mrs. F. T. Isbell of Eastland. In September of 1962, Dr. Isbell was awarded the PHS Commissioned Corps Meritorious Service Award emblem at ceremonies in the State Department auditorium. Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy made the presentation, given to Dr. Isbell to recognize his outstanding work in drug addiction research. Occasion of the ceremony was a White House Conference on Narcotics and Drug Abuse, of which Dr. Isbell is one of the world's outstanding authorities.

A 1927 graduate of Eastland High School, Dr. Isbell was for 17 years Director of the Center at the Public Health Service Hospital in Lexington, Ky. The Center gained world-wide recognition under his leadership. He is currently head of the Section of Clinical Pharmacology at the University of Kentucky, where he organizes and conducts a course in Therapeutics, including mechanism, application, evaluation, side effects and effectiveness of drugs.

Graduating from the Tulane University of Medical School of New Orleans in 1934, Dr. Isbell designed a test for the purpose of detecting narcotic addiction called the "Nalline Test," among other developments of great importance.

Dr. Isbell has lectured in health organizations in numerous foreign countries and was extensively quoted in the recent article, "Sleeping Pills and Pep Pills - Handle with Extreme Caution!" appearing in The Readers Digest.

Some years ago his late father, Dr. F. T. Isbell, practiced medicine in Eastland. His sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Vaught, is a schoolteacher in Carbon and his brother, James B. Isbell, Ph. D., teaches at St. Christopher School for Boys in Richmond, Va. James Isbell taught in Eastland schools in the 1930s.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. _____
AN ORDINANCE WHEREBY THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS, AND THE TEXAS ELECTRIC SERVICE COMPANY AGREE THAT THE TEXAS ELECTRIC SERVICE COMPANY SHALL CONTINUE TO ERRECT AND MAINTAIN ITS ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER LINES WITH ALL NECESSARY OR DESIRABLE APPURTENANCES (INCLUDING UNDERGROUND CONDUITS, POLES, TOWERS, WIRES AND TRANSMISSION LINES) AND THE CITY GRANTS ITS CONSENT FOR THE USE OF ITS PRESENT AND FUTURE STREETS, ALLEYS, HIGHWAYS, AND PUBLIC GROUNDS IN SAID CITY, UNDER REGULATIONS AND RESTRICTIONS AS STATED THEREIN AND THAT THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS SHALL RECEIVE AN ANNUAL PAYMENT FOR SAME, ALL AS THEREIN PROVIDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS: Section 1. That the City of Ranger, Texas, herein called "City" hereby grants its consent to the use of its present and future streets, alleys, highways, and public grounds by Texas Electric Service Company, its successors and assigns, herein called "Company" for the purposes of constructing, maintaining and operating in, along, under and across Ranger, Texas, and its successors, electric light and power lines, with all necessary or desirable appurtenances (including underground conduits, poles, towers, wires and transmission lines, and telegraph and telephone lines for its own use) for the purpose of supplying electricity to the said

City, the inhabitants thereof and persons and corporations beyond the limits thereof, for light, heat, power and other purposes; said consent being granted for a term of thirty (30) years from the date this Ordinance is adopted and approved.

Section 2. Poles or towers shall be so erected as not to unreasonably interfere with traffic over streets and alleys.

Section 3. Company's property and operations in the City shall be subject to such regulation by the City as may be reasonably necessary for the protection of the general public.

Section 4. Company shall hold the City harmless from all expense or liability for any act or neglect of the Company hereunder.

Section 5. In consideration of the grant of said privilege and franchise by the City and as full payment for the privilege of using and occupying the streets, alleys, highways, easements, parks and other public places within the City, and in lieu of any and all occupation taxes, easements, and plying electricity to the said franchise taxes (whether levied as an ad valorem, special or other character of tax), and in lieu of license and inspection fees or charges, street taxes, street or alley rentals and of all other taxes, charges, levies, fees and rentals of whatsoever kind and character which the City may impose or hereafter

be authorized or empowered by law to levy and collect, excepting only the usual general or special ad valorem taxes which the City is authorized to levy and impose upon real and personal property, the Company (Texas Electric Service Company and its assigns) shall pay to the City of Ranger, Texas, annually and on or before March 15 of each year during the term hereof beginning March 15, 1965, an amount equivalent to three (3) per cent of the gross revenues received by the Company, its successors and assigns during the preceding year from sales of electricity within the corporate limits of said City. On or before the 15th day of March of each year a report shall be filed with the City by the Company showing its gross revenues as aforesaid for the preceding calendar year, and the payment made hereunder shall be based upon said report.

Section 6. Nothing herein contained shall ever be held or construed to confer upon the Company exclusive rights or privileges of any nature whatsoever.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall be cumulative and in addition to the other permits

and franchises granted and ordinances owned, held or claimed by the Company provided, however, that all ordinances or parts of ordinances that conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall not become effective un-

til the Company has accepted the same in writing. Said acceptance shall be given to the City by the Company within 30 days after final passage hereof.

ADOPTED AND APPROVED this 15 day of April, A. D. 1965.

Slang, as you can see, is very descriptive and often colorful to the extreme. The business world, however, demands intelligence instead of color, and the good business prospect will have and use his formal English vocabulary. Practice makes perfect, and few persons have a perfect vocabulary.
"Wise up, man," and quit "beating your gums" with all that slang. Slang might be "tough" to your friends, but people in the business world might think of you as being "tough" like that steak, and you can't "cut" it.

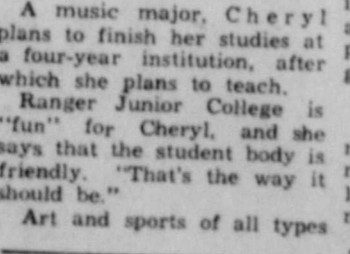
