Group Maps Plans For Sheep & Goat Field Day

The fourth annual Sheep & Goat Field Day, sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with County Agent J. M. Cooper and the Texas Extension Service, will be held in late July or August.

Preliminary plans for the event were discussed during a meeting of the agriculture committee of the chamber held Tuesday night in the office of W. T. Eaton, manager of the Lone Star Gas Co.

County Agent Cooper was present to counsel with the committee regarding possible dates, program details, etc. "I'd like to commend your organization," the county agent said, "for working as you are for the betterment of the sheep and goat industry. The quality of our goats is improving and your annual field day adds impetus to raising better goats in Eastland County."

County Agent Cooper said the Angora goat population of the area is increasing at a fantastic rate. In 1930, he told the CofC committee, there were only 5,000 goats in the county. In 1960 there were 50,000. And now there probably are 60,000 head.

College May Get More \$

Ranger Junior College will receive a biennium appropriation of \$212,400 in state aid if the appropriations bill — now pending in Austin — is passed without change by the Texas legislature.

Ranger Junior College had requested aid in amount of \$191,700 for 1966 and \$211,900 for 1967 — a total of \$403,600 for the biennium.

The appropriations figure for Ranger Junior College — as suggested in the new bill — are well above the 1965 state aid budget for the local educational institution. The 1965 allocation to RJC was \$74,625.

Cisco Junior College was given \$132,105 for 1965, asked for a biennium grant of \$587,600 and the pending appropriations bill allows CJC \$383,880.

The figures represent a part of an appropriation of \$26.9 million over the state for state aid during the next two years to junior colleges, an amount about \$10 million higher than the 1964-65 period.

A 28-year-old Eastland police character was arrested in Eastland Monday evening and is a prime suspect in the weekend abduction of a 12-year-old Dallas girl.

The girl was taken from Dallas and abandoned near Anson in Jones County Saturday after having been raped and attacked and left in a critical condition. She is in an Anson hospital where she is being treated for severe injuries.

She reportedly gave Jones County Sheriff Dave Reeves the name of the Eastland County man, and he in turn notified County Sheriff L. E. Sublett, who made the arrest here. Sheriff Reeves took the local man to Anson Monday night and his 1961 Pontiac convertible was taken back to Dallas.

He faces assault with intent to murder charges. The girl first gave her age as 20, but later changed it after her mother arrived in Anson.

The 28-year-old man, who avowed his innocence, claims that he has witnesses who will swear that he was in this county all weekend. He is a native of Carbon.

 Also over the weekend, Ranger police arrested a 20-year-old Ranger man on a charge of stealing hubcaps off a car belonging to L. D. Summers who resides on U. S. Highway 80 east.

Spray Time Near, Pecan Men Told At Field Day

Pecan orchard owners should spray for the first hatch of case bearers, worms that attack the tiny nuts, about May 25th, according to authorities in Cisco Monday for a field day of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.
 Some 100 persons from throughout this region took part in the field day, which was featured by a program concerning orchard insect control and fertilization. Oscar Schaefer of Cook, the association president, presided.
 Speakers suggested that a hydraulic spray with a new chemical, Sevin, was best for case bearers. They urged that the tiny nuts now on the trees be watched for pin-point size white eggs. Any time these eggs are present, it is time to spray.
 Tom Denman, superintendent of the U. S. Pecan Experiment Station at Brownwood, discussed the new systemic insecticide — Di-Syston. This spray is for the prevention of aphids and honey dew on trees. This spray has not been approved for use in Texas at this time but experiments indicate that it will be very successful, Mr. Denman said.
 Mr. Denman also discussed the experiments now underway with liquid fertilizers applied 12 inches under ground along with use of standard fertilizers applied at the rate of 150 pounds and 300 pounds per acre. The liquid under-ground idea was borrowed from California, Mr. Denman said, and he thinks that good results may be obtained.
 Orchards need fertilizer because most of them produce two crops — grass for grazing and nuts from the trees. Mr. Denman said it was difficult to advise against grazing orchards in view of the value of the grass crop plus the need for land cover.
 B. G. Hancock, Texas A&M University Extension Service specialist, discussed research underway to control pecan weevils and the hickory shuck worm.
 The shuck worm has become a real pest instead of a nuisance insect, Mr. Hancock said. It causes more damage to pecans than either the case bearer or the weevil, he added. The worm bores into the hull around the maturing nuts causing them to fall off trees. They are active for much of the growing season.
 "The hickory shuck worm is now a full time entomologist project at A&M University," Mr. Hancock said. "This worm is the number one thing in our research program for the benefit of pecan orchards. We hope to report some success next year."
 Mr. Hancock told about success in experiments in fighting weevils. Traps are used under trees to determine when the weevils hatch in the

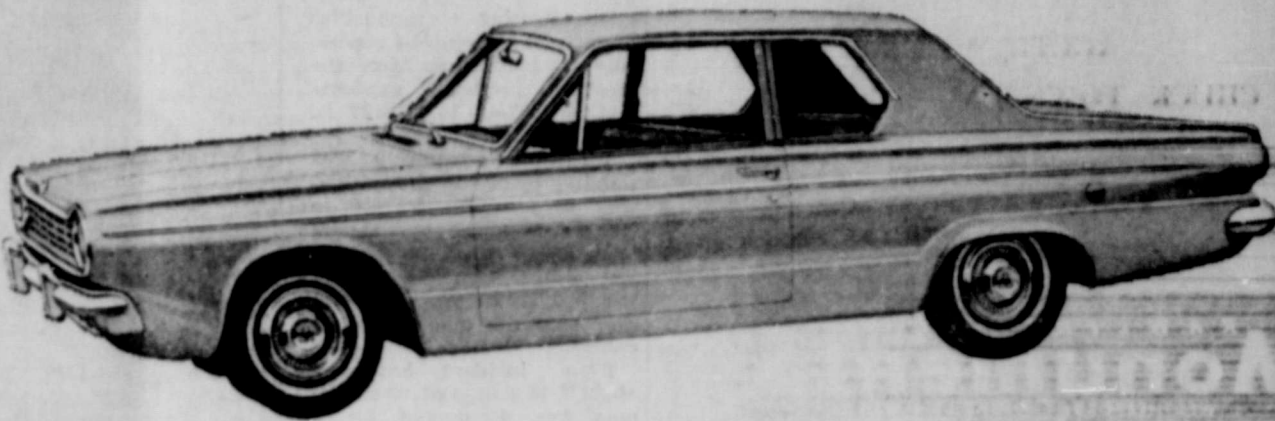

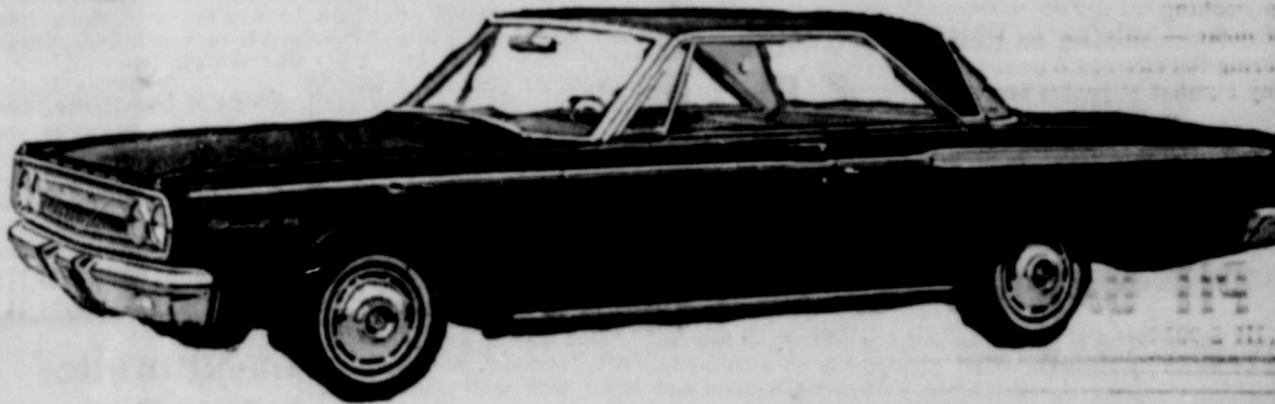
