Oscar C. Parr, 62-year-old son of Mrs. Minnie Ganou of Ranger, was buried in Eastland Cemetery Thursday afternoon following 4 p.m. funeral services held in Arrington-Hammer Funeral Home Chapel in Eastland.

Mr. Parr died Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock in Ranger General Hospital following an illness of four months.

Rev. Robert Bowden, Church of God minister of Abilene, officiated during the Thursday afternoon funeral rites. Born Dec. 24, 1902, in Gonzales, Tex., he came to Eastland in 1940. He was a retired welder and carpenter and was a member of the Church of God.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Ganou of Ranger, a brother, Thurston of Bowie; an uncle, J. Roberts of Pauls Valley, Okla.; three nieces and two nephews.

## Annual County Cancer Meeting Follows The 'Best-Ever' Crusade

For the second year, Ranger topped all cities and communities in the area during the "Cancer Crusade" fund-raising effort staged here recently.

Mrs. Dortha Harris, chairman of the campaign, said early Saturday that all donations haven't yet been turned in, and added that 1965's total will likely surpass that of a year ago.

"We want to thank the good citizens of Ranger for their splendid support of this most worthy cause," Mrs. Harris said. "And especially, we'd like to extend our deep appreciation to Mrs. Verga Higdon, chairman of the residential drive, and Mr. Glyn Gilliam, who contacted businesses."

"The key to the treatment of cancer is early diagnosis," Dr. Eugene Johnston, Abilene oral surgeon, told the annual meeting of the Eastland County Unit of the American Cancer Society in Eastland Thursday evening.

Dr. Johnston pinpointed the "face of the enemy" with visual slides and details of the ravages of the savage disease and emphasized the importance of early diagnosis through regular checkups and examinations.

In what obviously will be the most successful Cancer Crusade this county has ever seen, reports show that almost \$5,000 has been collected.

Approximately 50 people from throughout the county attended the meeting in the Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church, presided over by County Chairman Sam Kimmel of Cisco. The Rev. Lester Davenport, host pastor, gave the invocation.

During the report session, Mrs. R. E. Grantham of Cisco, reporting for Public Education Chairman Mrs. Austin Flint, told that cancer films have been shown to over 1,473 people in schools, civic clubs and other groups.

Crusade Chairman Mrs. Ann Justice of Eastland reported on the recent crusade, explaining that with the control of cancer, the Cancer Society can close its doors forever. Actual county total to date, she said, is \$4,807.55, which in-

**Sputter-flutter:** Turn Vertical-hold knob until trouble is corrected or becomes a squiggle. (See: Squiggle.)

**Double image:** You've had enough.

For some repairs it's necessary to remove the back of the set and if you intend to perform such repairs, you should keep a few things in mind:

# Valley View Estates, 45-Lot Sub-Division, Get Commission OK

A new housing sub-division to be located in southwest Eastland and to be known as the Valley View Estates was given tentative approval by the Eastland City Commission Monday evening, with "gratitude and regards."

The subdivision will open 45 new home building sites on property owned by Mrs. Bertie Reid near the New Eastland Elementary School. The 13-acre tract is located immediately south of Sadosa St. and extends southward to Conner St. It is bisected by Ammerman and Dixie Streets, which will be extended into the development.

Developer of the site is J. R. Jones, Brownwood contractor who reportedly already has commitments for several homes in the division, and plans extensive development including curbing and guttering, paving and installation of utilities including sewerage.

Mayor Frank Deaton expressed the commission's appreciation to Mrs. Reid for her participation in this project to help Eastland grow. He was especially grateful, he said, that arrangements had been made for the developer to handle the basic site improvements.

The site is located generally behind where Dr. Ferhman

Lund's new home on Sadosa St., and is due east of the new school. Considerable leveling and grade work will be necessary, it is reported.

Surveyor Tommy Magness appeared before the Commission with the preliminary plat of the division, asking approval of the name "Valley View" and tentative approval of the site. He will return, he said, later with complete plans and field notes. Minimum lot sizes will be 70 by 150 feet with an average of approximately 10,000 square feet, Magness said.

The site is bounded on three sides by other developable land.

Dr. Lund appeared with Magness asking the commission's feeling on the expansion of Sadosa St. to a 40-foot street. It is presently a 30-foot street and is heavily traveled now, due to the new school.

The Commission agreed to a general plan of widening the street, and gave preliminary thought to the construction of a side walk along one side to provide safe passage for school youngsters.

Dr. Lund said that he will build his own curb and gutter back an additional five feet and Magness indicated that his future plans with the development would provide this extra space for the wider street and walkway.

Valley View estates will be designed to G.I. and FHA specifications, Magness said.

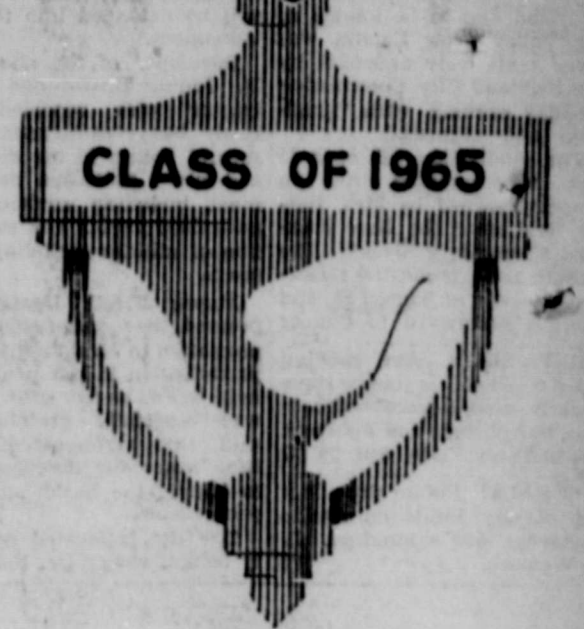

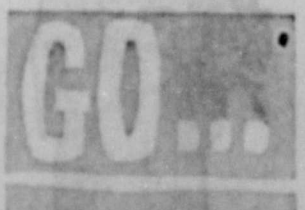

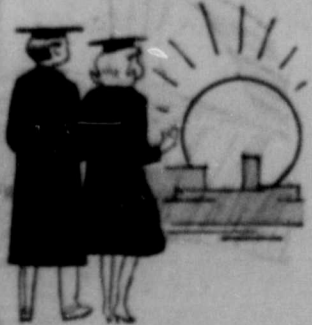

Lembo: "I probably will if I have the time and money."
