Gain in Pool Patronage Would Cut Operating Loss, Declares Mayor

Citizens of Ranger and surrounding area should support the municipally-owned Willow Park swimming pool, Mayor Morris Newnam said Friday morning. "We're losing between \$2,000 and \$2,500 every summer on our swimming pool," Mayor Newnam said, "and if more people don't use this recreational facility the time may come when we will no longer be able to keep it in operation." During a Thursday night meeting members of the City Commission okayed the following admission prices for the pool: Baby pool, 10 cents. Children up to 13, 20 cents; ages 15 to 21, 30 cents, and adults, 40 cents. Season passes may be bought for only \$6.00.

In other business during the evening the group okayed the appointment of J. A. Bates and Beauford Anderson to the board of Ranger General Hospital. The new appointees succeed Dr. W. P. Watkins and J. Floyd Killingsworth. Ranger has four members on the county-wide group. The other two local board members are Mrs. Voncell Hopper and Mrs. D. E. Pulley. Other members of the board are Dr. Charles H. Bailew of Cisco, president, Gene Ferguson of Rising Star and Don Parker of Gorman. In other action during the Thursday night session the Ranger city commissioners okayed payment of routine bills, heard a report on Community Public Library, and decided to take action on the weed situation. The rapid growth of unsightly weeds has been accelerated by the extremely heavy moisture in recent weeks.

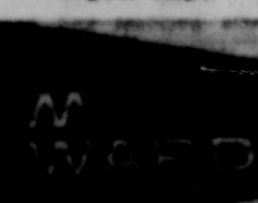

and Aggregate Plant, near Olden, this week as the native, crushed stone was transported out in freight-cars. Through Tuesday evening, 15 cars had been loaded and shipped from the plants, which is one of the county's newest industries. Office Manager A. A. King reports that in all, some 50 to 60 cars will be shipped. And that's in addition to the plant's regular chore of filling and keeping 15 trucks going six days a week to the Zachry Asphalt Plant near Abilene. The rail cars are going to Higgins, Tex., (that's way up in Woodruff) for a Cooper and Woodruff highway job.

Bob Batte is manager of the plant that's been a county operation for about 2 1/2 years. Some 2,000 cars were sent out last summer. With a 25-man work force, the average weekly payroll is about \$3,000, King says. The firm operates six days a week, (around the clock at times) and is located on three tracts of land — the crusher is on Texas Electric Service Co. land; the pit is on the Collins ranch; and the road right-of-way is on the Massingill Ranch.

That crusher by the way is capable of turning out an average of 150 yards of crushed rock an hour. "Our job is making little rocks," King laughs, and judging from the capacity of that crusher, we'd say they do a good job.

The Zachry name has long been well-known in Texas construction and this plant is an asset to our area. We're glad to have them.

# County Labor Survey Would Ask Questions; Evaluate Work Force

The area-wide employment survey being considered for Eastland County could be an important tool for use in negotiating with industrial prospects considering location here, experts in the field report.

Such a survey, while not an actual application form for a job, would tell the industrial people exactly how much and how good the available labor force is in the area. Labor appears to be among the top deciding factors in the selecting of plant sites, reports go. If a firm elects to locate or re-locate one of its plants, it naturally wants to be assured, in advance, that there will be enough of the type of employes it needs available.

The survey is being consid-

ered by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, executives of which are negotiating with counterparts in Cisco and Ranger, in an effort to conduct a joint, area-wide survey, with all parties sharing in the costs, and benefiting from the compiled information. A direct-mail approach is being considered, with questionnaires, explanatory letters and return envelopes included, to be sent to every household in the county.

The returned questionnaires would be carefully checked and the information tabulated for use by officials in each town in talking with industrial prospects. Then when Mr. Industrial Prospect asked "How many men between the ages of 18 and 25, who have high school educations,

and who are available to go to work?" or some such question, a concrete answer could be given.

Such a survey was conducted recently in Midland, with 21,000 forms mailed out, and 2,539 returned, showing that 998 of these were employed and 1,541 were not.

Officials, who will want to make sure that everyone completely understands the purpose of the survey, will probably include paragraphs in the accompanying letter to this effect:

"Your assistance and cooperation in completing the enclosed form is urgently needed — THIS IS NOT A JOB APPLICATION — but a confidential survey questionnaire for information only.

"Your help in completing and returning the enclosed survey — AT ONCE — is very important in helping to determine the information which

is necessary to interest future industrial prospects in locating their plant in Eastland County."

As soon as arrangements have been worked out between the various participating towns, forms printed, the questionnaires should be going into the mail.

**FORMS MIGHT ASK**

Included in the forms will be such questions as: Name; Age; phone number; address; male; female; how far do you live from the county seat; how long have you lived in this area; married; single; engaged; widow(er); divorced; separated;

how tall are you; weight; right-handed; left-handed; how many children do you have at home; their ages; how many people are depending on you for their living; partially; totally; is your wife (or husband) working now; where; what kind of work; how long; approximate salary;

schooling completed; any special training; have you ever worked in a factory or plant; what kind; what was your job and what kind of machines did you operate; would you rather work full time or part time; could you work night shifts from 4 p.m. to 12:30 a. m.;

do you own your home; rent; other; do you wear glasses; do you have physical handicap; what is the nature of your handicap; are you presently employed; list different types of work you have done.

From this, as can be seen, accurate records can be compiled of the county's work force.

## Interest Seen In Deep Oil Test Near Cisco

An oil test of considerable interest in this region was underway this week seven miles north of Cisco as the W. M. Jarrell-Reynolds Drilling Co. No. 1 T. E. Davis.

The project was to test a granite wash formation at about 5,700 feet in a hole that was started three years ago. The original hole went to 5,432 feet in 1962. Last year, Jarrell of Houston and Reynolds of Cisco re-entered the hole and deepened it to 5,465 feet.

The new project will utilize new drilling bits that will cut the granite wash. Tools were rigged up early in the week, and operations were shut down Wednesday and Thursday due to trouble in the hole.

Charles Clark, vice president of the Reynolds company, said the Davis hole is near a cable well that went to 5,600 feet with a good show in 1929. Completion methods at that time were not good enough to make a producer.

Location was 2,250 feet from the north and 910 feet from the east lines of Section 54, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Elsewhere, a completion report had been filed for a new wildcat producer — the Lovens Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 James Beard et al, three miles south of Eastland. Daily production was 45 barrels on pump from 3,060-3,100 feet in sand.
