WHY SHOULD an oil museum be established and why in Texas? A Times staffer, during a bit of research this week, answers the question with these four paragraphs: America's peace-time standard of living and its security in times of war, or threat of war, are directly dependent upon adequate supplies of petroleum. Oil and natural gas currently supply more than two-thirds of the total energy requirements of the nation at prices which enable Americans to maintain the highest standard of living in the world.

Reserve petroleum productive capacity in the United States, available on short notice, was vital in the victories won by the U. S. and her allies in two World Wars and has been instrumental on several occasions since World War II in preventing war in other parts of the world. Texas, the nation's leading oil and gas state, has produced (up until January 1, 1964) 29,510,648,000 barrels of crude oil (37 per cent of the U. S. total) and 94,766,796 million cubic feet of natural gas (42 per cent of the nation's total). More than half a million oil and gas wells have been drilled in Texas, and the value of the state's petroleum production in 1963 was over four billion dollars.

Oil and gas is produced in 212 of the state's 254 counties and 37 per cent of Texas total acreage is under lease for oil and gas. Nearly 30 per cent of Texas total tax revenues are derived from fuel and motor vehicle taxes, and employed in oil exploration, drilling, production, refining, transportation and sales and service.

Two-Year Grant To RJC \$75,232

The Ranger Junior College application for Federal funds to participate in the College Work-Study Program under Act of 1964 has been reviewed and approved in terms of the statute and applicable regulations.

The grant request for the summer of 1965 and the 1965-1966 college year has been approved at a level of \$75,232.00. This includes a firm allotment of \$27,653.00 for the

1965 summer program, a firm allotment of \$23,774 for the fall semester of 1965, and the balance of \$23,773.00 for the spring semester, tentatively committed at this time.

This money allotted for the Work-Study Program will enable the college to employ many students as student aids on the campus and to place others in the employ of various non-profit organizations in Ranger.

County-Wide Labor Survey Gets Preliminary 3-Town Nod

Representatives of Ranger, Cisco and Eastland chambers of commerce gave tentative approval Friday to the proposed county-wide labor survey in which all three would participate and benefit.

Meeting at the Eastland chamber of commerce, the representatives discussed the proposed survey, evaluating the costs and procedures for conducting such a valuable industry-luring survey. It was agreed that information obtained from a comprehensive survey would be a vital tool in negotiating with potential industries considering a new plant in the county. It was further agreed that all would share the results of the survey, because the representatives said, "An industry locating at any point in the county will help all other communities in the county."

A further survey conducted in the high schools of the county was suggested, particularly in the graduating classes, to obtain information about work skills, talents and plans of these young people. "These are the people we want to help stay in our area, without having to move to some other area in order to work. This would strengthen the population and the economic index of every community in the county and benefit everyone, it was agreed."

Museum Plans Moving Forward, CofC Directors Are Told Thursday Night

The Texas Oil Museum, Inc., is presently contacting the oil and gas industry for financial assistance in establishing and maintaining such a memorial to the past and to a great industry, directors of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce were told during a meeting Thursday night. Preceding the chamber

session, the officers and directors of Texas Oil Museum, Inc., met and approved plans for an extensive fund-raising drive. A nationwide publicity campaign was launched last week and oil editors of leading newspapers and oil and gas publications from coast-to-coast are receiving information relative to the museum.

During the Thursday evening meeting the directors of Texas Oil Museum, Inc., approved publication of a brochure to be used to inform prospective donors of details of the project.

Presently, the only museum dedicated to the great oil and gas industry is located at Titusville, Pennsylvania, site of the initial discovery — The famed Drake — back in 1852. This repository is, of course, limited in size and scope.

Establishment of an oil museum in Texas long has been much-discussed by members of the petroleum fraternity and civic and business leaders aware of the importance of oil and gas industry—past, present and future.

Inspired by the suggestion of Ed Syers, syndicated columnist and author of "Off the Beaten Trail" several Ranger citizens who had long dreamed of an oil museum, began activity to make such a project a reality. In the spring of 1964, Syers wrote, "One day, I believe, a retrospective and wise oil industry will really memorialize itself in its rip-roaring boom town of oil. This has to be a neat community, smaller than it looks and deceptively quiet today, 90 miles west of Fort Worth."

And he added: "Ask the oil industry to start you modestly toward a real life-sized historic museum, telling the John Bunyan story of an industry learning how. Not quite a piece of Disneyland, but nearly. It could teach and show what an industry needs tough and shown."

"For not too much money you could put something in Ranger we'd all buy gasoline to come see. . . . And, "he concluded, "where to better show the old days than where they were?"

The Texas Oil Museum, Inc. received Charter No. 297946 from the Secretary of State, Austin, on November 13, 1964, under provisions of the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act. "The purpose for which the corporation is formed," says the charter, "is to organize, establish and maintain a museum in Ranger, Texas for the oil industry for educational purposes."

Initial board of directors securing the charter was comprised of six Ranger civic and business leaders: W. T. Easton, manager, Lone Star Gas Co., president; Billy Bourdeau, building contractor, vice-president; Dewey C. Cox, Jr., attorney, secretary-treasurer; Morris L. Newham, mayor; GUY GIBLIN, president, Commercial State Bank, Ranger; and Theodore Nickick, Jr., president, Ranger Junior College.

Charles L. Fox, oil industry veteran of Fort Worth, is executive director of the project. The corporation has completed preliminary plans for a Texas Oil Museum, secured (Continued on page 2)

Rodeo Action Unfolds in July

The third annual action-packed Ranger Rodeo will be unveiled in the Jaycees' arena, U. S. Highway 80 west, Ranger, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 8, 9 and 10.

Arrangements for the stellar three-day event have been completed, Kenneth Pendleton, president of the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce, has announced. Advance ticket sales, he said, indicate that attendance is likely to top the record-setting 1964 rodeo, the second staged here since 1955.

An open amateur show, the competition opens with a gala parade in downtown Ranger Thursday afternoon, July 8, at 5 o'clock. Hundreds of visitors are expected to swarm into the city to watch the procession which will feature several sheriffs' posse, riding club groups, and commercial floats and displays.

Also in the opening parade will be the current Ranger Rodeo Queen, Miss Jane Ann Bradford, and a bevy of other beautiful cowgirls who'll be contestants to succeed her. She has reigned since the 1964 show.

One of the most sensational special acts in today's increasingly popular rodeo sport will be one of the highlights of the three nights performances beginning at 8 p. m. It'll be Bo Bland and his terrific Model T. Mrs. Bland, a trick rider, and Dan Coats. Area events in which contestants will vie for prizes include calf roping, steer wrestling, bronc riding, bull riding, team roping and cowgirls' barrel races. And, of course, there'll be added hilarity and excitement from the antics of rodeo clowns. A boy's calf scramble is another popular

feature of the 1965 show. Some of the toughest, wildest rodeo stock in the Southwest will challenge the talent and skills of the cowpoke contestants, and the Jaycee arena spectators will see plenty of dust as the turf gets scarred by flashing hooves. Owner of the string is Lloyd Woodley, producer, who has been providing action and thrills for avid rodeo fans for 15 years.

(Continued from page 1) a 25-acre tract as the possible site, and engaged the services of Earl E. Koeppe of Fort Worth as project architect.

The initial incorporators of Texas Oil Museum, Inc., plan to enlarge the directorship of the independent, non-profit corporation to include leaders of the oil and gas industry.

Tentative plans are for construction of a structure estimated to cost a minimum of \$250,000. As soon as the initial construction funds have been subscribed by private donors, collection of artifacts, items and relics for the museum, will be accelerated through widespread publicity and contacts.

The preliminary plans also include a library and exhibit of art, photos, documents, etc., pertaining to the petroleum industry, and erection of a block of buildings as were common in a typical boom town of the old roaring oil boom era.

Ranger is located in the geographic center of the mid-continent oil area. Executive Director Fox reported that he is presently contacting the oil and gas industry for financial assistance in establishing and maintaining such a memorial to the past and living monument to a great industry and the men who have made it so.

Directors emphasize the non-profit status of Texas Oil Museum, Inc. Not only is it a non-profit organization under the laws of the State of Texas, but the Internal Revenue Service has ruled that all donations to the museum are deductible from the donor's income tax.

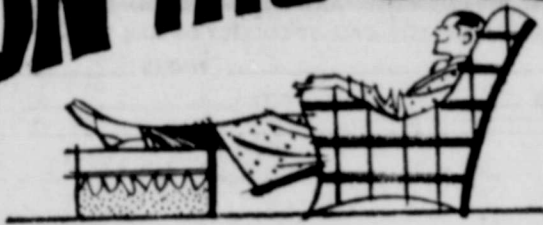

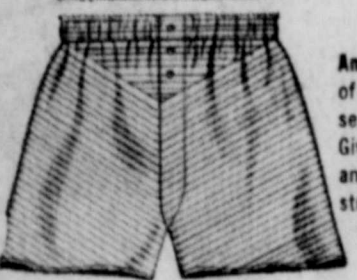

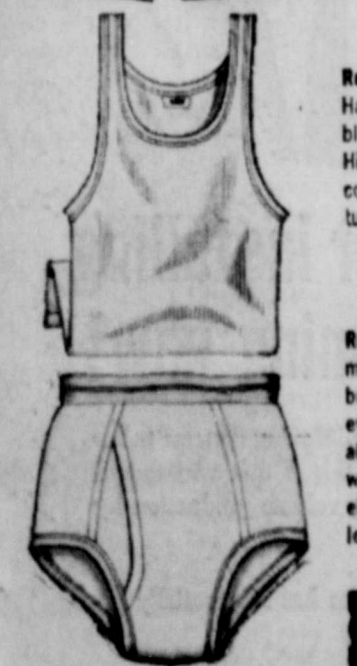

COUNTY SCREW WORM FOUND EXCEEDS ASSIGNED QUOTA

Mission County raised its share of the voluntary phase of the screw worm eradication program with contributions in excess of askings, according to Oscar Schaefer, county chairman of the program.

A tabulation released by Glyn Gilliam, Ranger banker and secretary of the program in the county, showed total contributions of \$4,041.50. The county had been asked to contribute \$3,000.00 to keep the program under way until the governments of the United States and Mexico take over the eradication work in July.

Governments had set contributions with the United States at \$2,000.00 and Mexico at \$1,000.00. Mission County's total contribution of \$4,041.50, according to the tabulation, Community totals are not significant, however, Mr. Schaefer pointed out, some of the smaller contributions had much larger cattle raising areas from which to secure contributions.

His ship was a unit of Navy Task Force 140, the primary recovery organization for the manned four-day, 1.7 million mile space mission.



The Blandy was stationed in the Atlantic along the path of the Gemini spacecraft. A total of 10,300 Navy personnel, 22 Navy ships, and 41 Navy aircraft in both the Atlantic and Pacific were joined by units of the Army, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard to provide a worldwide location and recovery capability at sea.

Normally operating as part of an Atlantic operational fleet organization, his ship was earmarked for Task Force 140 several weeks in advance of the mission. Since its assignment, her crew trained extensively in recovery technique and communications procedure necessary for smooth task force coordination.

1 Killed, 5 Hurt In May Traffic

During the month of May, the Texas Department of Public Safety reported one fatal accident in Eastland County, five personal injury accidents, and five accidents resulting in property damage, making a total of 11 accidents. There was one death, ten persons injured and a property damage total of \$16,770.

The following was reported by the Dept. in comparing traffic accidents in the Eastland area for the first five months of 1965 with the same period in 1964.

In 1965 there were two fatal accidents, in 1964, three; personal injury accidents in 1965, 20—in '64, 25; and property damage accidents, 47 in 1965 and 54 in '64, which brought the total to 69 in 1965 and 32 in '64. There were three deaths in 1965 and three in '64; injured persons, 33 in 1965 and 38 in '64; and property damage, in 1965—\$48,550 and in '64—\$41,444.

A REPORT ON WEATHER CONDITIONS AFFECTING TV RECEPTION IN EASTLAND COUNTY

Your recent correspondence indicates that you are having trouble receiving KRLD-TV, Channel 4, Dallas, Texas. Most seriously affected are viewers who are 50 to 60 miles or further in distance from our Channel 4 transmitting plant at Cedar Hill, Texas.

We should like to point out that the interference you are experiencing is primarily caused by Mother Nature and is not the fault of Channel 4 transmitting station, and in nearly every case, is also not the fault of your TV receiver.

Along about this time each Spring or Summer there are disturbances in the upper atmosphere caused by natural phenomena, which usually affect normal television reception to some extent. Occasionally, however, these natural disturbances become much more aggravated and pronounced than usual — and this year is just such a year.

These turbulences of nature cause bad picture disturbances and at times cause TV stations from quite some distances to be received by your TV set, blotting out partially or completely your regular favorite TV channels.

In this case, such unwanted signals can take the form of mixing with your Channel 4 picture or sound and further causing fadeouts, buzzing, venetian blind effects and other weird occurrences. Also it is possible for adjacent channel TV stations to spill over into the Channel 4 picture and mix with the Channel 4 sound uninvited.

We would recommend that you have a competent TV service technician look over your set if you suspect definite set trouble. However, these aggravated natural conditions will subside after a few days, or at most a few weeks, and your reception should return to normal.
