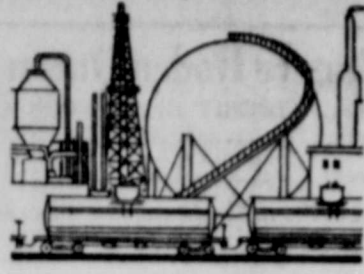

In order to keep the huge plane from crashing into the thousands of people who were at the international air show, Colonel Tubbs stayed with his plane and was killed instantly.

His squadron from the Little Rock, Ark. Air Force Base, where he was stationed, and his chaplain attended his funeral. Colonel Tubbs, 37, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Huffman of Cisco.

A career Air Force Pilot, Colonel Tubbs finished high school at Kermit and was a graduate of Sul Ross College. His wife is a native of Junction.

The colorful procession will wind through downtown Ranger Thursday afternoon, July 8, beginning at 3 p. m. The first performance of the 3rd annual presentation will follow three hours later at the arena on old U. S. Highway 80 west. Eastland, Olden Agreed on Details Water-Sale Deal

Representatives of the Olden Water System and the Eastland City Commission hammered out terms of a contract to be entered into by the two parties, adding several additional restrictions, during a special called meeting of the Commission Thursday. The contract is being drawn and is expected to be formally inked soon. Specific new restrictions include a reduction by a million gallons a month to be supplied by Eastland. Olden had originally asked three million gallons a month, but it was agreed at the meeting that only two million would be supplied. Restriction on the number of customers to be served by the proposed Olden system was set at 175, with approval by Eastland on more than that number. The proposed water system will be Farm Home Administration financed. Bill Hunter is chairman of the system's board of directors.

65-Year Olds Urged To Apply For SS Benefits

Eastland County residents 65 or over who have not yet applied for social security benefits were advised this week to file a claim now even if they are not planning to retire right away.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene, explained that it is to the benefit of an applicant to file when reaching age 65 to protect his social security rights.

"A sizeable number of county people in our district who applied late last year found that they had lost some benefits by not applying earlier," he said. "We have found that the best way for a person to protect his social security benefit rights is to file his claim at 65 whether or not he intends to go on working. Even if no benefits are payable right away, there's an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually retire, for all then needed is to say 'Start my checks.'"

Some 18.5 per cent of the travelers said they would visit the New York World's Fair during the Summer and Fall of 1965. Eighty-one per cent of those who said they would attend the fair pointed out that the trip would not come as part of their regular vacation.

Michigan drew 4.2 per cent, while Texas, California and Minnesota were a shade behind.

On a regional basis, the Midwest will lure the biggest flow of traffic, 18.4 per cent of the vacationers. Second will be the East, including the New England states, with 17 per cent. The South will draw 13.1 per cent, while 11 per cent said they would vacation in the Far West. Ten per cent of the respondents said they still had not made a vacation choice.

Eight per cent of the group indicated they would travel out of the country. Largest group, 4.2 per cent of those surveyed, picked Canada, while 2.5 per cent chose Mexico and one per cent said they would go to Europe.

The Goodyear survey developed that the average family will spend approximately \$460 this year, about the same as the amount expended in 1964.

July again will be the most popular vacation month, with 34.5 per cent of the families traveling during the 31-day period. Second most popular month is August, with 26 per cent, while June is third with 14 per cent.

About 35 per cent of the vacation parties this year will have two persons. Four-person parties will comprise 30

# Peanut Insects Devour Crops, Even 'Saltless'

The peanut is a legume — a pea belonging to the same group of plants as a garden bean or pea — the chief difference being that its fruit matures under the soil's surface.  
No stranger to Eastland County, the peanut is a Number One crop in the farm economy.  
Peanuts are also known as goobers, earth nuts, ground nuts and pinders, and are thought to have grown in Central and South American Countries as early as 1555. Its greatest spread throughout a number of southern states occurred after the Civil War.  
People like to eat peanuts and peanut products as snacks, at parties and at ball-games, but "insects" love to chew on the plants too, and they really don't care that they are not salted.  
Although people really like to eat the so-called "goobers," it sometimes can be a difficult task to raise a crop

of peanuts. In Eastland County there are several diseases and bug that make their living on the peanut plant.  
A Southern blight, caused by the fungus, *Sclerotium rolfsii*, is typically a warm weather disease. According to Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper, the disease is one of the more destructive in Eastland County.  
Also in Eastland County there is the Coroospora Leaf Spot. There are two Coroospora leaf spots that can defoliate peanuts. The destruction of this disease starts with brownish to black spots developing first on the leaves and then if the weather is humid, complete defoliation may result, according to Cooper.  
The number one bug that destroys the peanut crop in Eastland County is the Lesser Cornstalk Borer. It too, has been proven to be the most destructive insect pest of the Texas Peanut Industry. The insect is the most severe on peanuts grown under dryland

conditions or during drought years.  
Leafhoppers suck plant juices from stems and leaves, resulting in yellowing of leaves and unhealthy appearance. This wedgeshape insect, pale greenish yellow, about 1/8 inch long, is very active when distributive.  
Another Eastland County insect problem is the Thrips. They are tiny dark brown to black insects that cause widespread disease like injury that resembles leaf burn, delaying growth of seedlings.  
Fall armyworms, corn earworms and a mixed population of other caterpillars also love to chew on peanut plants, but farmers do not stand by and watch their peanut profits being eaten up by the ravaging pests.  
Experience has taught modern growers that it pays in many ways to control insects with applications of safe, effective insecticides.  
Whatever team you prefer to root for, quality peanuts will still flow through the stands at the ballpark as top-notch growers continue to produce superior nuts with the aid of proper insect control.

# Special Tourist Course Is Planned June 29-30

A course on "Selling and Serving Tourists" for all interested residents of Eastland County will be conducted in the Corral Room at the Victor Hotel in Cisco next Tuesday and Wednesday, June 29 and 30.  
Sponsored by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, the five-hour course will be conducted in two, two and one-half hour sessions, scheduled for the convenience of persons working either the morning or evening shift. To receive the entire course, it is necessary to attend one session on each of the two days. It will be taught by George Jordan of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.  
Mr. Jordan, a veteran civic worker, formerly was manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Breckenridge and Brownwood. He served for several years as manager of the Holiday Inn in Brownwood, and joined West Texas C of C staff two years ago.  
The first session, "What It's All About," is devoted to a study of tourism; a review of the facts and figures on the industry, both national and state, the vanishing frontier; population forecasts and trends; a study of what tourists expect from people with whom they deal; and a review of Texas, West Texas and local tourist attractions.  
The second session, "What Can We Do About It," deals with the promotional aspects of serving tourists, especially courtesy. Some topics to be covered include promoting tourism through local news media; self-improvement programs; customer relations; services of restaurants; service stations, hotels and motels, and retail stores; what man-made attractions, and special events; and a study of tourist promotions by other cities and organizations.

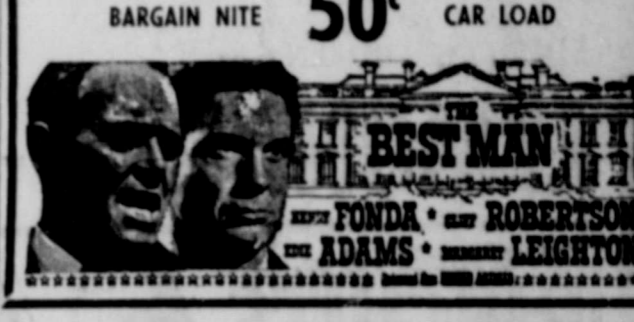

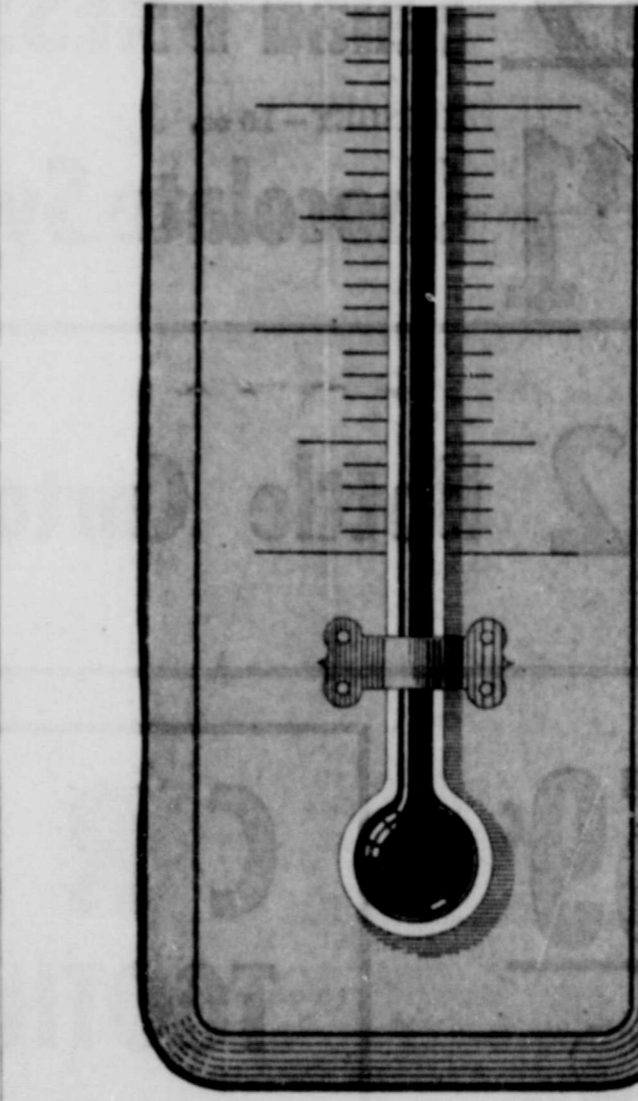

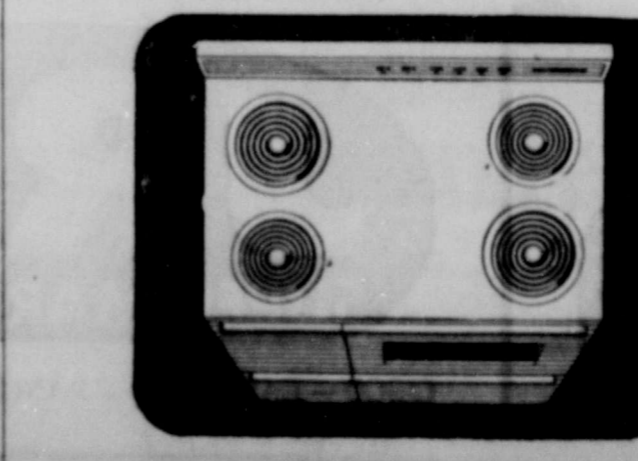

The boys will be housed in the camp's attractive brick and redwood cabins. Meals, prepared by expert chefs and designed to meet the physical needs of healthy growing youngsters, will be served in the camp's own dining room.

Camp Hobbitzelle was made possible through the generous gifts of more than one hundred men and women of Texas. Their gifts provided money for the purchase of the land, buildings and other improvements made there. The camp is operated by the Salvation Army for the benefit of boys who, without their help, would not have the opportunity to enjoy the wholesome atmosphere of camp life.

In Ranger, The Salvation Army is supported by Ranger United Fund.
