

Clovis man charged in Ballard murder

A former Flag-area farmworker was arrested on a charge of capital murder Friday in connection with the June 13 murder of Robert Ballard near Sunnyside.

39-year-old Ruben Naranjo Baldivia was picked up Friday at a residence in Clovis. Clovis police reported Baldivia was discovered hiding in a closet.

Baldivia was arraigned Monday, and is being held in Curry Co. Jail in Clovis in lieu of a \$100,000 cash bond. He refused to waive extradition, and will have to wait until papers are served by Gov. Mark White to New Mexico Gov. Tony Anaya.

Baldivia had worked for a Flag area farmer until about a week

before the murder occurred, according to police reports.

The capital murder charge was filed because the murder allegedly took place during the perpetration of a robbery.

Ballard and his wife, Patty, heard noise outside the camper they were living in while waiting for former occupants to clear their belongings from a house 11 miles south and three miles west of Dimmitt.

Ballard went to investigate the cause for the noise, and fired his .38 revolver three times. His wife went to investigate and found her husband dead in front of the

house.

Amarillo pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann determined the cause of death to be a stab wound inflicted by someone wielding a screwdriver or similar instrument.

Castro Co. Sheriff Lonny Rhynes and Deputy Jerry Bailey questioned Baldivia and another man who was in the house when Baldivia was taken into custody Friday, but the other man has not been taken into custody.

"We don't know if or when we will take the other man into custody," Bailey said Monday. "We do feel we have a lot of

evidence to make a case against (Baldivia), but we don't have enough evidence to make a case against anyone else right now."

Bailey refused to divulge what evidence he, Rhynes, Texas Ranger Jim Mull of Plainview and others working on the investigation have, but did say the case "looked pretty good right now."

"Everything came together really well," Bailey said. "We really need to take our hats off to the Clovis police, too. We put out a teletype bulletin as soon as we had the warrants, at about 4 p.m.

Friday. They went to the house and found the suspect and had him in custody by 6:30 p.m.

"We issued the bulletin to all points in Texas, New Mexico and California. We thought he might have taken off for California, but they found him quickly in Clovis. We do anticipate another arrest in the case, but we have to wait for more evidence. (Rhynes) is in Austin right now at the Dept. of Public Safety crime lab looking at some of the evidence we sent down there, and as soon as we get more verification on that we could have another arrest."

Chief files charges against former boss

Dimmitt Chief of Police Don Franklin has filed criminal theft of services charges against Littlefield International Corp. of Brownwood, his employer for eight days in May.

LIC Chief Executive Officer George Littlefield and General Manager Frances Walters were both indicted by a Brown County grand jury on the charges.

Littlefield, at the time the charges were filed, was in New York City. His bond was set at \$100,000, while Walters' bond was set at \$10,000. Littlefield surrendered to authorities in New York and was returned to Brown County. Bond

was then lowered to \$10,000, and Littlefield and Walters are both free on bond.

Franklin charges Littlefield owes him in excess of \$750, and was never paid for his work for LIC as chief of security.

Littlefield told authorities in Brownwood he had met Franklin only once and had never hired Franklin. Franklin, in turn, claims he was hired by Fred Givens, formerly of Lubbock, to be head of security for LIC.

Given was originally named in the charges, but charges against him were dropped when he agreed to testify for the state against

Littlefield.

Littlefield is planning to build a multi-million dollar prefabricated housing manufacturing plant at Lake Brownwood.

Officials with the Brown County District Attorney's office have confiscated all of Littlefield's business records, and have learned Littlefield was found guilty of embezzlement and served time in the early 1970's as part of the Sharpstown banking scandal that rocked Texas government. The charges filed by the District Attorney's office labeled Littlefield's plan as "grandiose."

The Chamber of Commerce board and community volunteers are cooking up a good Independence Day party to be held the evening of July 4 at Bobcat Stadium. It will include music, group singing, a skit or two and a fireworks display.

People take fireworks displays for granted, but they're expensive. A good one costs \$2,000 or more, and the chamber is trying to scrounge the money now to pay for it.

If you can afford to donate to help pay for the fireworks display, drop off a check right away at the chamber office.

We grow too soon old and too late smart.

You've been mowing lawns just about every summer since you were weaned, right? It's an irrational but necessary rite of the season.

Usually you start on one edge of the lawn and mow straight back and forth in a parallel or perpendicular line, then get that little square over by the patio, or cross over and mow that odd rectangle of turf between the porch and the side gate — all the while hacking your way around the trees, the shrubs and the lamp post when you come to them.

Either through inspiration or boredom, our family's teenage Vice-President/Turf has discovered a better way.

If you use a push-type mower, next time you mow, make a round or two around all the edges for a "turnrow," then

start cutting diagonally. You'll be surprised at how those extra corners and odd spots melt away, and how many fewer turns you'll have to make.

You can either start in a corner and work across the entire lawn from there, or cut an angular swath across the middle and work from there toward the corners. Either way works well with a push-type gas mower or an electric mower with a flip-over handle.

(It isn't workable with a riding mower because of the sharp turning angle at one end of the diagonal. The best system with a rider is still the double-O method.)

Somewhere, some expert must have written about the advantages of diagonal cutting, and explained the geometric principles involved. But I don't remember ever reading it.

This diagonal system is so unique that your wife ought to try it, too.

How did those two Lebanese hijackers get aboard TWA Flight 847 with automatic weapons, hand grenades and pistols? And why weren't they stopped as soon as the plane touched down the first time in Beirut or Algiers?

As soon as some of the American passengers were taken off the plane and into the Beirut slums by the hijackers' confederates, it was too late to do anything. Any move toward the plane would have resulted

Former roadhands file suit

Two former Castro County Precinct 1 road hands have filed suit against the county and Pct. 1 Commissioner Curtis Snitker, charging their Dec. 31, 1984 firings violated stated county policy, numerous laws and constitutional protections.

J. R. Russell, Sr., says he was within one day of receiving bonus retirement benefits when he and William L. Ford were fired by the newly-elected

Snitker.

Ford was less than 18 months away from qualifying for the bonus retirement benefits.

The suit, filed in Amarillo US District Court, says the county "vests" employees who have worked 12 years with benefits matching the retirement benefits they have earned on their own during their employment.

The suit claims Snitker deprived the two men of their jobs in violation of the Fifth Amendment because Snitker neglected to follow a standard procedure for dismissing employees.

The County Personnel Policy says "an employee may be dismissed by the responsible elected official for cause" and the county must give the fired employee a "written statement of the dismissal."

The suit claims Russell and Ford "were not notified of the reasons for the termination of their jobs . . ."

The men were also not given a hearing before the county grievance committee, which is also called for in the county policy.

The suit also alleges Snitker violated the two men's First Amendment right to free expression. When Russell and Ford spoke with Snitker on Jan. 2, he reportedly told them they were "Bennett men" and that they "went out with him."

Snitker told the *News* Wednesday "that was six of one and half dozen of the other" and did not deny telling the men their jobs were gone when Ed Bennett, former commissioner, left office.

The suit says that means they were fired on "political patronage grounds."

The suit alleges Snitker violated age discrimination laws which protect employees aged 40 through 69 against firing and promotion denials due to age.

Russell and Ford were replaced "with younger men with less experience," the suit states. Snitker also did not consider either of the men for the position of road foreman, even though, the suit says, they were qualified for the position.

The suit asks the court to award Russell and Ford back pay, since they were fired, and seeks a punitive damage award of an unspecified amount for violating the First and Fifth Amendments, breach of employment contract and age discrimination.

County Judge Polly Simpson, who said she had not yet seen the suit, refused to comment on it, but said the two men had filed an earlier action, seeking unemployment benefits.

Russell was denied any benefits, while Ford received an award since he was forced to move from provided county housing.

A trial date has not been set.

Aldermen okay annexation

For a cost, Dimmitt's City Board of Aldermen Monday night gave the okay to annexation of three tracts of land on South US 385, as well as okaying the addition of an almost-acre tract on South Front

Street.

The State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation, Bob Towler Equipment Co. and Dan and Oma Dee Heard are seeking annexation of about 28 acres of land just south of the current southern city limits along US 385.

City officials have repeatedly stated the biggest problem with annexing the land would be the extension of water and sewer lines to the tracts, where SHDPT and Towler plan new construction.

SDHPT officials had promised to help the city with obtaining materials and installing the line, but Doyle Wassom of the local SDHPT office has told city officials his superiors will not allow him to help the city with the project.

Alderman David Hays moved to annex the tracts, but to provide water and sewer service only if SDHPT and Towler pay the expenses for providing water and/or sewer service.

No service is to be required in the near future for the site owned by the Heards. There is an option for the land held by the Castro County Economic Development Commission.

Also approved on the first reading was the annexation of a tract along South Front petitioned for by Don Cornett.

Cornett wishes to annex .97 acres just south of Jefferson Street on Front. Hays moved to provide water and sewer service to the site, provided Cornett gives the city an easement along the east side of his property for an alley.

The annexation proposals will be heard again at the July 1 meeting of the board.

Curtis Crofford and Doug Conder of Crofford and Co. of Amarillo presented the city's annual audit for the fiscal year ended April 30, 1985, which showed the city to be in "excellent shape," according to Crofford.

"I've done a lot of these audits before," Crofford, a former Amarillo city commissioner, said, "and I've never seen a city in such good financial shape."

Crofford explained the city has such little outstanding long-term debt the city could legally have up to \$11.1 million in additional long-term bonded indebtedness.

The board, for the third time, tabled any action on obtaining a new machine for the city's landfill operation.

Alderman Ann Armstrong moved to table the possible purchase of a new machine until aldermen and city officials have a chance to look into buying an incinerator to be used in conjunction with the landfill.

The city looked at an incinerator in 1976, and passed a bond issue for the construction of an incinerator, but opted, at that time, to instead keep the landfill and use the money for other capital improvements.

The board also accepted the low bid of Stevens Chevrolet-Olds in Hereford for a new Suburban for the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. for \$14,030.72, provided the dealer can find a vehicle to meet city specifications.

Stevens and the only other bidder, Reeve-Fleming Chevrolet of Lamesa, both stated in their bids the cutoff date for ordering the vehicles was June 14, and said there could be problems in finding a vehicle.

The board also approved specifications for a new ambulance for Plains Memorial Hospital.

While the city, county and hospital share in the cost of the ambulances, the city retains ownership of the vehicles.

The Castro County Hospital Board had included in the specifications presented to the aldermen that they keep the ambulance to dispose of at a later date, but the aldermen said they would ask for bids including trade-in prices and without a trade-in.

The board also agreed to share, with the county, the cost of retaining the services of Amarillo forensic pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann for a total cost of \$100 per month plus \$500 per autopsy, and agreed to look into closing an alleyway in the property at the "triangle" intersection of South Broadway and US 385.

Charter, charter, who's got the charter?

The charter for the City of Dimmitt is, uh, missing. "We've looked all around here, called the State Comptroller's office, and the Texas Municipal League is combing Austin for it right now," said Curtis Crofford of Crofford and Co., certified public accountants from Amarillo who prepared the city's audit.

"We needed the charter for dates to fill some spaces in the audit," Crofford told the City Board of Aldermen Monday night, "but we can't find a charter of any sort for Dimmitt."

"Good, maybe that means we can go ahead and sell the thing (city)," joked Alderman David Hays.

"No, you can't!" I shot back. "You can't sell it if you don't have a title for it."

The city was incorporated, according to the Castro County Historical Society's 1981 county history book, on Nov. 20, 1928 on an order signed by County Judge M.R. Avery after an election to incorporate was held the previous day.

The city originally had an aldermanic form of government (just like the present one), but the city changed to a council-mayor government on Dec. 16, 1929.

State officials say there shouldn't be any problems with the lack of a charter, but city officials will try to find the charter, anyway--JFB.

Friends of the students are invited to attend the receptions. The students will be leaving on Thursday, June 27.

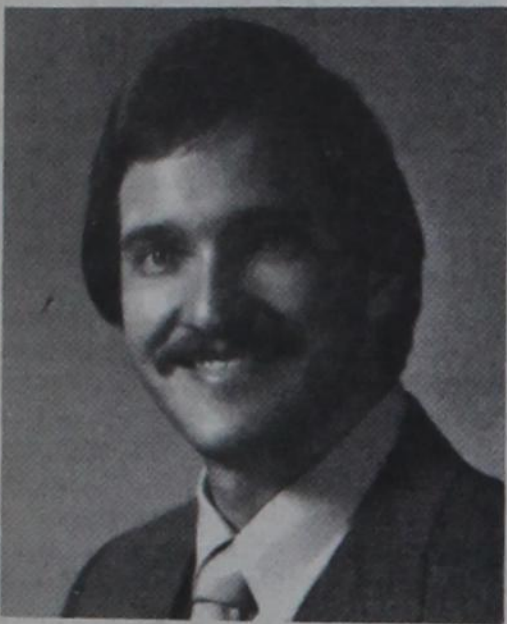

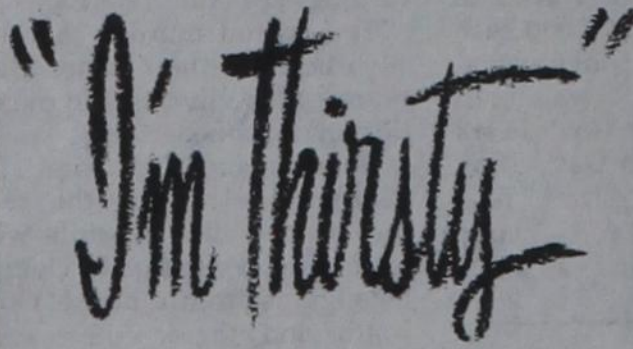

One party in the group had friends in Salida but they didn't give her time to stay and visit.

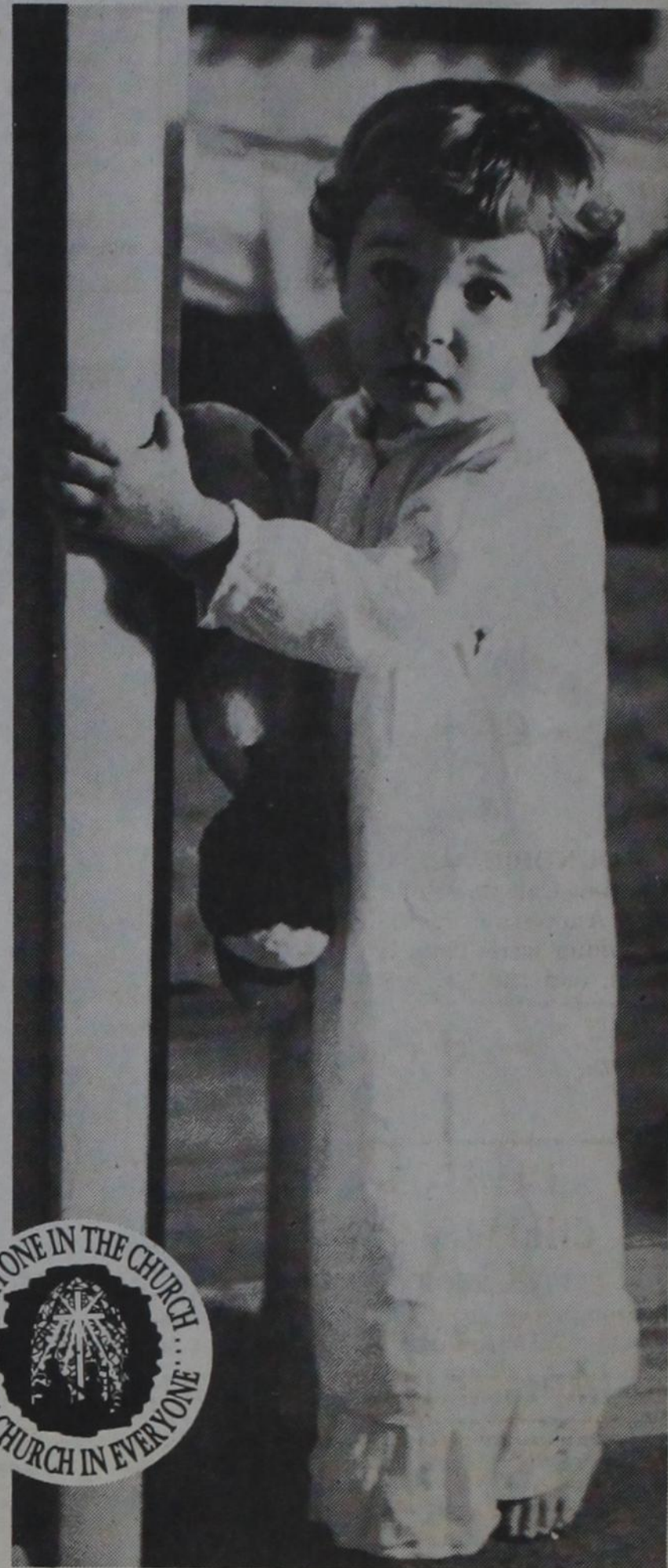

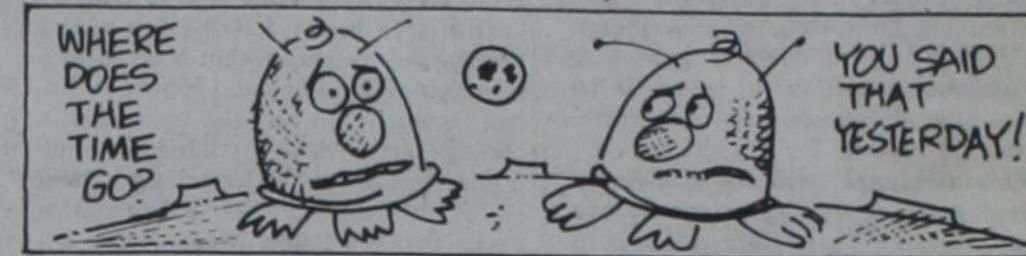

About taxes and babysitters . . . Our office manager, Joy Barker, gave me a little goody sometime back that we got in the mail from our friendliest of government agencies, the Internal Revenue Service, showing the maximum taxable wages and tax rates for FICA contributions from 1969 through the present.

In 1969 and 1970, the most the IRS could tap from our wages the 9.6 percent of \$7,800. By 1976, the amount taxable had almost doubled, to \$15,300, with 11.7 percent pulled out for FICA.

It took another six years for the taxable amount to double again, to \$32,400 in 1982, at 13.4 percent.

Now, the IRS is getting 14.1 percent of up to \$39,600.

The sad part of the deal is we were probably getting more for the money back in the 9.6 percent-\$7,800 days.

The Dimmitt Kids, Inc. babysitting season is almost over.

There are several people who have been very much involved in one way or another with Kid, Inc. baseball and basketball programs during their lives in Dimmitt that are about to call this season their last.

Among the problems:

•Even worse, many parents have not come out to watch their children play ball.

elected treasurer.

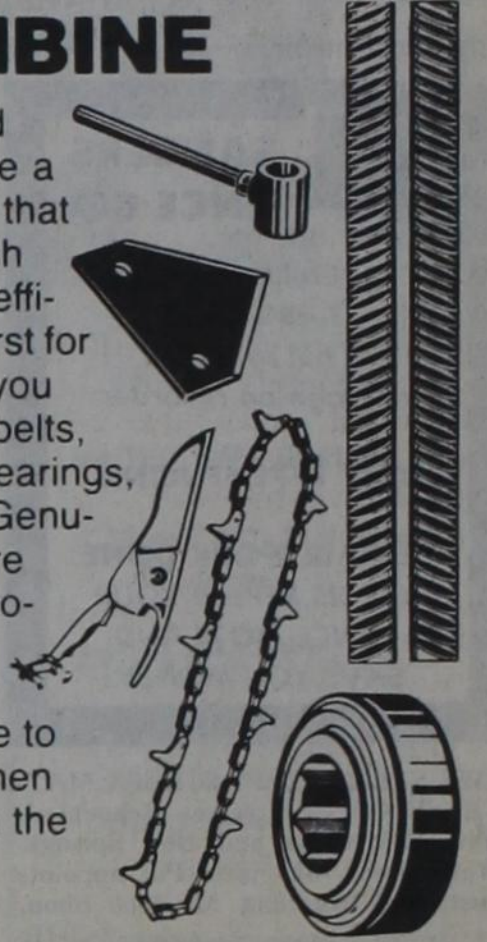
David Rau, the new district 15 representative of the American Cancer Society gave a staff report.

GSPA vote set July 15

A statewide referendum to expand the current 29-county check-off area of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Association to cover the entire state is scheduled to be held beginning July 15.

"The purpose of the referendum is to expand the voluntary check-off area," said Clara Harp of GSPA in Abernathy. "A survey conducted by the Extension Service confirmed that a majority of farmers who responded favored a check-off."

"The 29-county area has carried the load for the program, which includes development and expansion of markets plus research."

While the rest of the state will be voting on whether or not to join the present check-off area which constitutes the Texas Grain Sorghum

Producers Board area, the 29 counties will be voting on whether to raise the assessment which the board may set to a maximum of one cent per hundredweight.

The present limit is 1/4-cent per hundredweight.

The referendum has received

widespread support from around the state, but Harp is worried about a possible lack of information, especially since some producers think the recent wheat referendum "sneaked by."

"We have heard a lot of complaints about the wheat referendum," Harp said. "We don't want

that complaint made in regard to our referendum. We want everyone in the state to know about it."

Ballots will be mailed to more than 50,000 Texas sorghum producers listed by the ASCS. Producers who do not receive a ballot may pick one up at their local ASCS office or from the TGSPB offices at Box R, Abernathy, 79311, beginning August 1.

Streun files suit in husband's death

A suit seeking unspecified damages has been filed in 64th District Court by Louise

Streun in connection with the Feb. 12, 1985 death of her husband, Arnold Leonard "Jack" Streun.

The suit was filed May 29 against Ricky Trevino and his employer, W. J. Schumacher of Hereford.

Trevino, 24, was driving a pickup owned by Schumacher which collided with Streun's 1979 Chevrolet pickup at the intersection of two unmarked county roads three miles southeast of Summerfield at about 1:40 p.m. on Feb. 12, about a mile north of Streun's residence, according to the Feb. 14, 1985 edition of the News.

Louise Streun's suit, filed by attorney James A. Besselman of Underwood, Wilson, Berry, Stein and Johnson of Amarillo, alleges negligence by Trevino, saying "Trevino . . . (failed) to maintain a proper lookout, (failed) to maintain his brakes properly, (and failed) to yield right of way to the vehicle on the right as is required by Texas law . . ."

The suit alleges ". . . each of the acts and omissions constitutes negligence . . ."

The suit seeks damages, "costs of the suit and further relief . . . to which (Louise Streun) may be justly entitled."

No trial date has been set for hearing the suit.

Power lines can be dangerous.

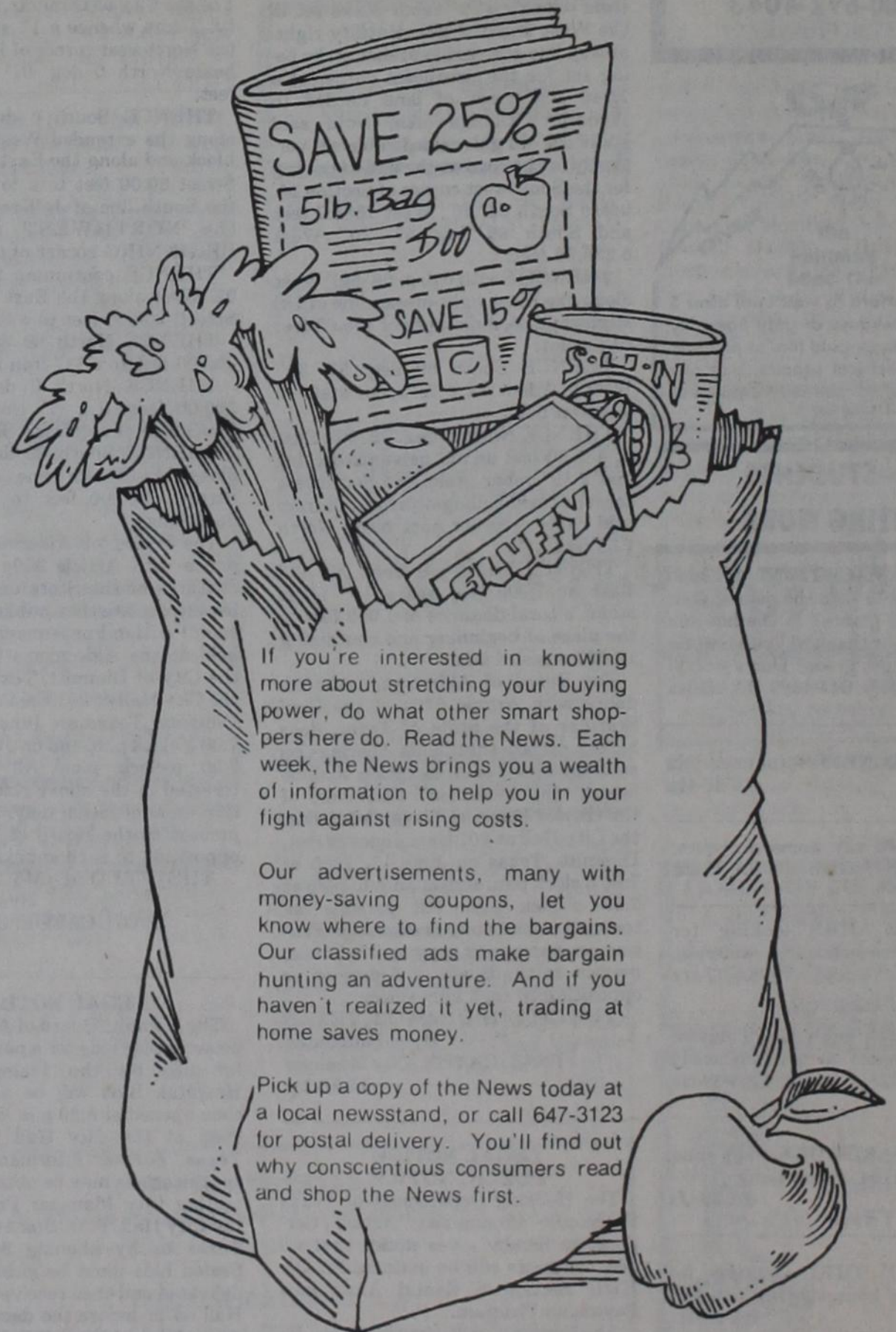
Touching irrigation pipe to a power line can divert the electricity through the pipe . . . and to anyone in contact with it. Lift arms on field equipment, combine auger spouts and even radio antennas can cause serious injury or death if they, and you, make contact with a power line.

Cost of the camp is \$40, which includes insurance, T-shirt "and a week of fun" said Coach Ken Cleveland, who will be camp director.

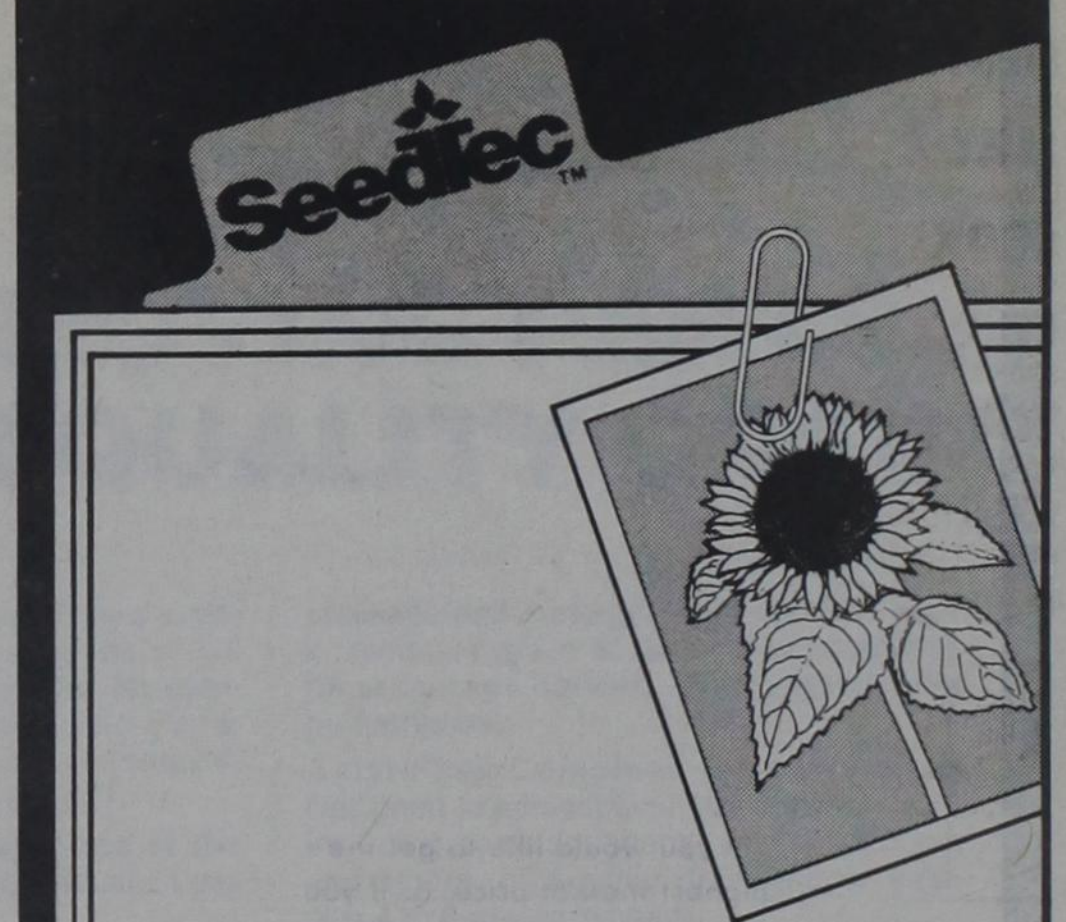
The camp is open to boys nine and above, but anyone who will be on a varsity basketball team next year may not enroll in the camp.

A similar session for girls will be held July 8-12.

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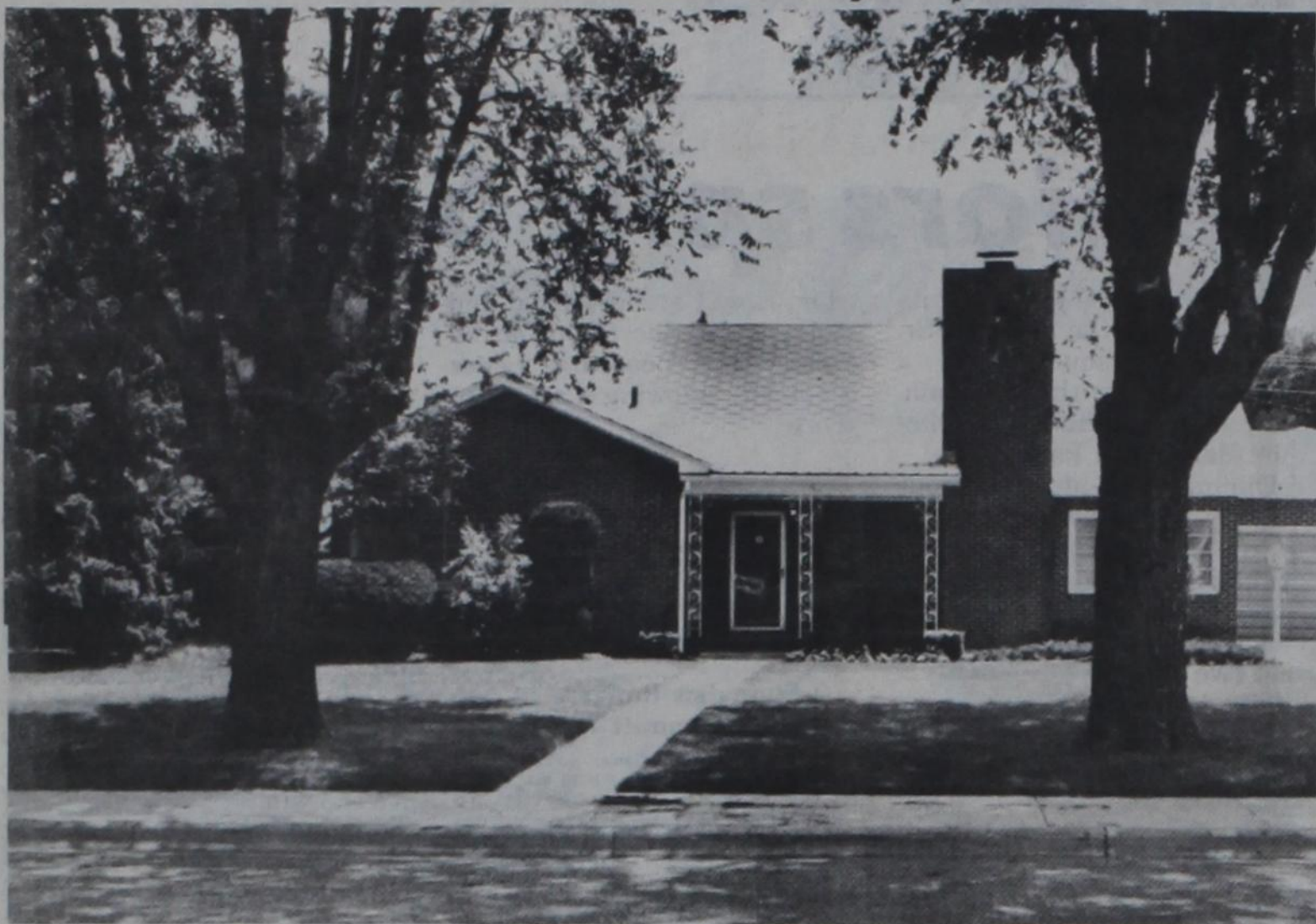

Manage lawn to cut water bill

When the weather turns dry, don't just turn on your lawn sprinkler and then gripe about your high water bill.

By watering, fertilizing and mowing your lawn properly, you can reduce your water bill as much as 40%, says a turfgrass specialist.

"Conservation by the homeowner provides the only solution to high water bills and excessive water demands during our hot and usually dry Texas summers," says Dr. Richard Duble with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In small cities where industrial demand for water is low, lawn watering may account for as much as half of all the water used during the summer months. Even in larger cities, lawns get 30 to 40% of all the water supplied by municipalities.

"Most Texas lawns use about 2 inches of water per week during the summer and most of this usually comes from irrigation," Duble says. "However, as little as 1 inch of water per week can keep lawns alive and green."

Exactly what can a homeowner do to reduce his summer water

bill?

"First, water your lawn only when grass starts to show signs of drought stress," explains Duble. "Look for discoloration and wilting. If leaves roll up in the late afternoon and footprints remain after walking across the lawn, then water within 24 hours.

"Once you've decided that your lawn needs watering, do it right," he emphasizes. "Most homeowners don't water their lawns properly. They either water too often, causing grass to develop shallow roots and making it a prime target for insects, diseases and temperature extremes, or they water too infrequently and apply too much water at one time, resulting in a lot of runoff.

"When watering, soak the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches," recommends the specialist.

"Mowing less often and cutting your grass at taller heights also will help keep your lawn in better shape during hot, dry weather," adds Duble.

DPD will sponsor city Watch programs

Citing a "rise in the crime rate" in Dimmitt, the Crime Prevention Unit of the Dimmitt Police Dept. will be sponsoring Neighborhood Watch meetings for six sections of Dimmitt beginning Monday night.

"The city has experienced a climb in residential burglaries and thefts," said Lt. Bryan Davis, Crime Prevention Coordinator for the DPD. "Citizens have become lax in watching and protecting valuables. The CPU is asking everyone to help in deterring crime before it happens, and that's why we're putting on the seminars.

"We're dividing the city into six sections, with each section meeting on separate nights. Each meeting will begin at 7 p.m., and should be finished by 8 p.m."

The sections, and nights for the meetings, include:

- Section 1, all residents on Maple, Oak and Pine, June 24;
- Section 2, all residents on Cleveland, Lee, Grant and Stinson between Front and Twelfth, June 25;
- Section 3, all residents on

West Bedford, Jones and Belsher between Front and Twelfth, as well as all residents west of Twelfth, and all residents on South US 385, June 28;

•Section 4, all residents who live from Youts to Bedford between NW Sixth and NW Twelfth, July 8;

•Section 5, all residents from NW Fifth to NE Eighth between Bedford and Wheat, July 9.

•Section 6, all residents from SW Sixth to SE Fifth between Bedford and US 385, July 12.

All meetings, which will include a short presentation and a short film, will be held at the City Hall Meeting Room.

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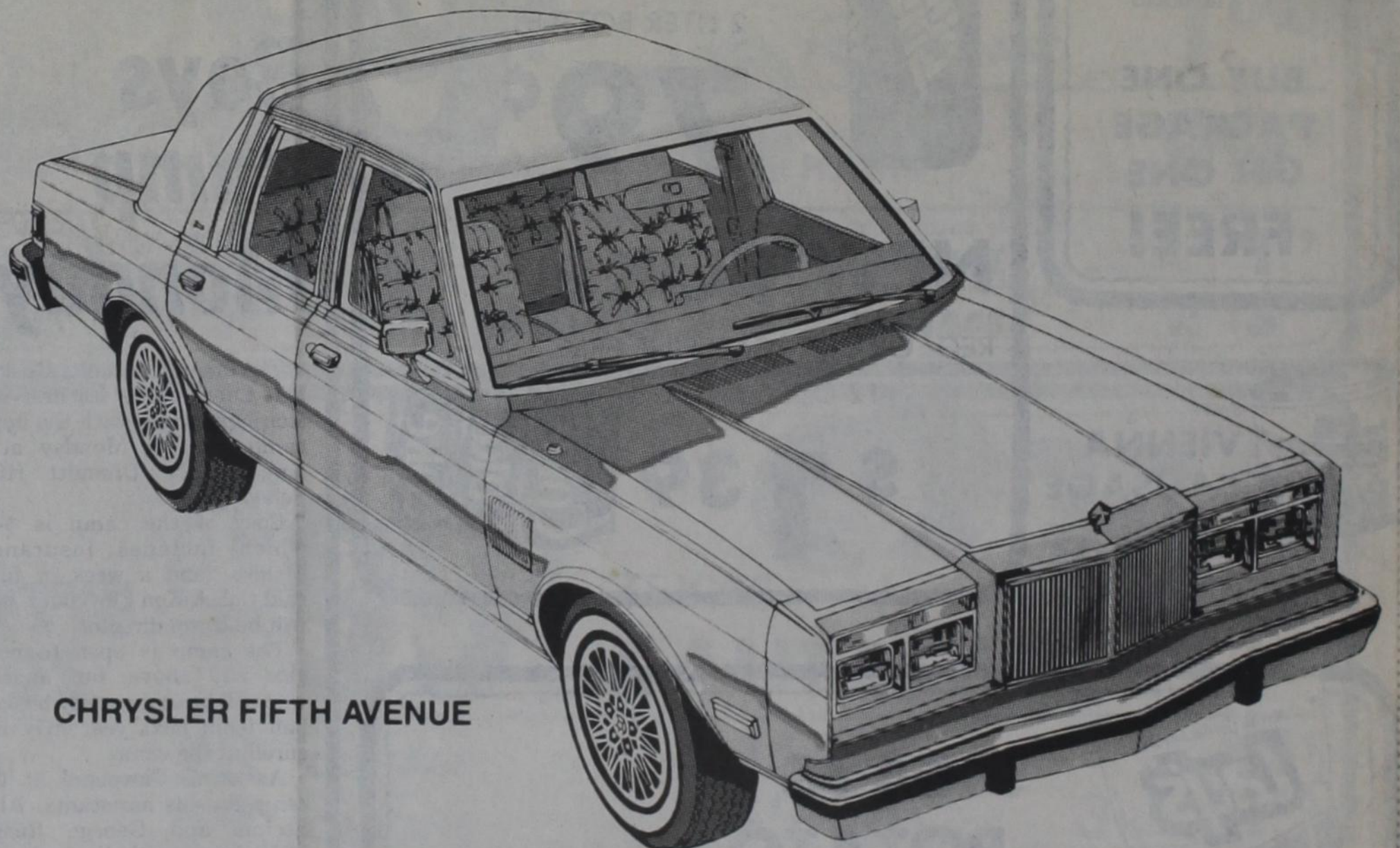

in the deaths of the deboarded hostages.

An international plan of some type has to be worked out. The best defense against hijacking is prevention; the second best is swift action after the hijacked plane has landed. The defensive technology exists, and it must be put to use.

Had there been a specially trained strike team on hand at the Algiers or Beirut airports while the two original hijackers were still in control, exploding bullets could have been fired at safe angles through fuselage and cabin windows, followed immediately by grenades of non-lethal nerve gas that would have immobilized

everyone aboard in seconds.

That would have worked once, at least — until the next hijackers found a way to smuggle gas masks or wet-suits aboard as defense against nerve gas.

But nerve gas is only one way to immobilize a person or a group; there are many other methods and weapons available.

I think we can expect all airlines, or the nations behind them, to ban flights to or from foreign airports that don't have strict security systems, and probably start requiring specially trained anti-hijack personnel to be on board every flight, disguised either as passengers or crew members.

This sort of thing has got to stop.

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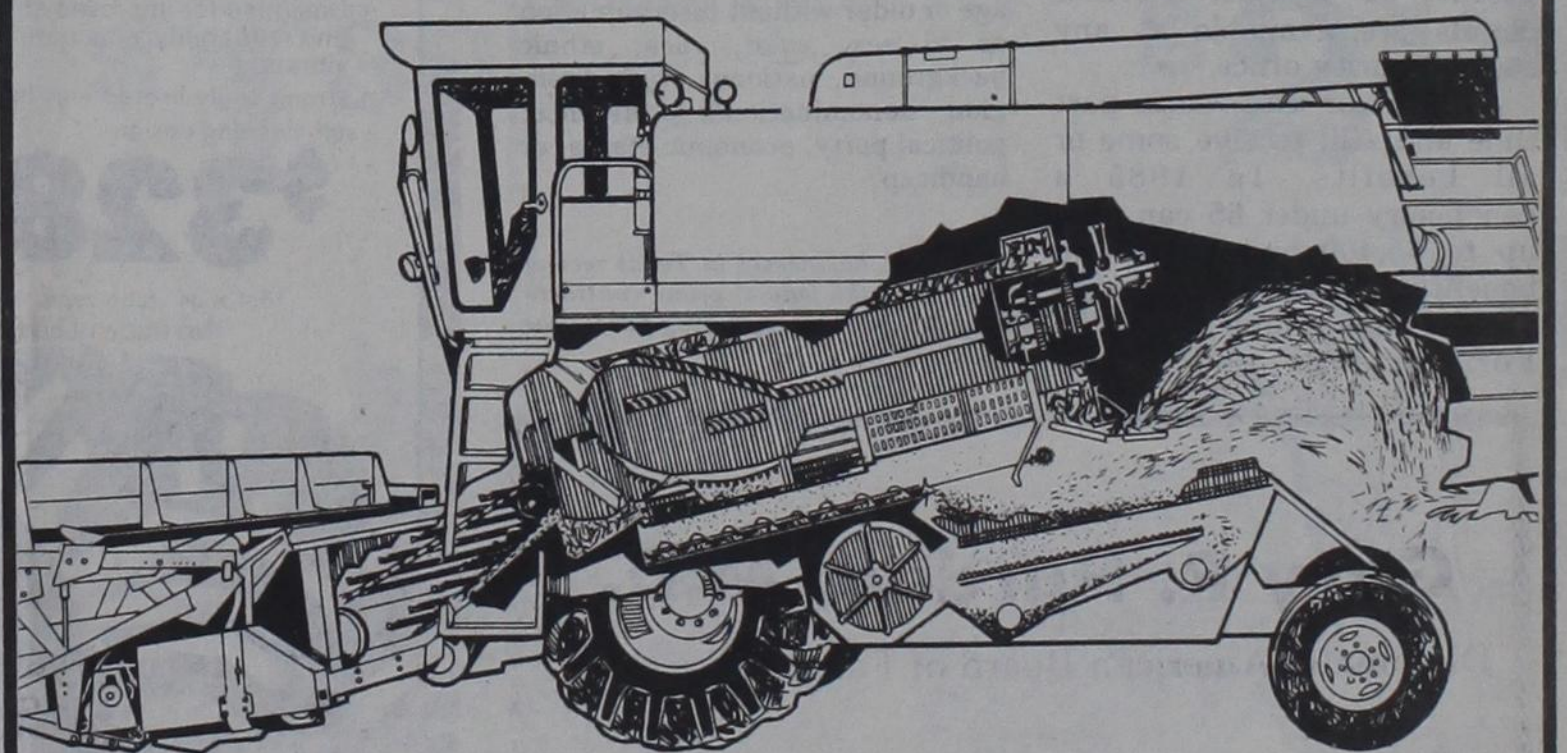
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EDC \$ SIGNS

The closing of the Swift Company meat packing plant in Hereford last week is disappointing news for our area. Swift Company officials estimated that approximately 20 Dimmitt workers are among those who will be affected by the shut down.

While many factors undoubtedly contributed to the decision to close the plant, the action may be seen as part of a broader picture — the rapidly changing nature of the food industry. Similar plants have been closed by Armour and Hormel recently.

At the same time, mergers and acquisitions in recent months have prompted one food industry analyst to predict that there will be record changes in the food industry this year.

Recently, we have seen the Nabisco company purchased by R. J. Reynolds. That follows Reynolds acquisition of the Canada Dry Corporation last year.

Beatrice Foods purchased Esmark which includes Swift and Hunt-Wesson Foods. The Nestle

Company acquired Carnation. Consolidated Foods acquired three firms, including the Jimmy Dean Meat Company. Many other transactions involving companies large and small have taken place in the food industry in recent months as companies endeavor to improve their position in the market place, stay competitive and better satisfy changing consumer needs.

While change is apparent in all segments of the food industry, we can expect to see the beef packing industry remain particularly volatile.

Since 1980 consumers have been spending less on their food budgets for red meat. By 1989, they are expected to spend between 2.2% and 2.5% of their income on red meat, down from 3.1% in 1982. The output of meat packing plants, according to industry sources, has declined approximately 1.5% during the past year.

This supply/demand forecast simply translates into fewer beef packing operations.

FAILED ACRES

Even though we do not have a disaster program for 1985, it is important that you keep us informed in the event of a disaster. An application for disaster (Form ASCS-574) should be filed before you plow or make other use of the disaster affected acres. This will protect the history for the farm as well as 1985 program participation.

AERIAL MEASUREMENT

We are accepting requests for measurement service for row crops. If you are interested in this service, please come on in and file your request.

As in past years, an accurate acreage report is a must for program eligibility.

ACREAGE CONSERVATION RESERVE [ACR]

No grazing is permitted of ACR Acreage during the period June 1 through Oct. 31, unless you first come in to file a request and pay a \$10 fee.

We are checking set-aside acres for weeds, wind and water erosion, etc. Before land is eligible for ACR, it must have been planted to a program crop two out of the past three years.

ACREAGE REPORTS

July 15, 1985 is the final date to certify your spring seeded crops and Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR). Your crops must be measured and certified on a field by field basis and by irrigated or dryland. We will be making spot checks as in past years not only on measurement of acres, but also on the use and care of your Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR).

You are urged to be very careful on your certification so please measure and report accurately. We would like for all who intend to participate to be eligible for All Program Benefits. If we can help in any way, please come by and check with us, and if you have any doubt about your crop acreage we would encourage measurement service.

Social Security

...in Castro County

When Bill died recently, Donna was surprised that she and her two small children could get monthly social security checks. She thought social security was primarily for older people. Also, Bill was only 23 and had worked in jobs covered by social security only a few years.

Today, Donna and her children are among some 7¼ million Americans receiving survivors benefits. The value of just this part of social security is worth nearly as much as the face value of all private life insurance in force.

The average benefit for a widow with two children is \$988 a month in 1985. For an aged widow, the average payment is \$415. Benefit amounts increase automatically each January if living costs have gone up 3% or more.

Most beneficiaries pay no federal income tax on benefits. Only if a person has high outside income in addition to benefits are part of the benefits subject to tax.

Children can get survivors benefits if the deceased parent worked under social security as little as 1½ years in the 3 years before death. Payments generally continue until a child is 18 (or 19 if still in high school). However, benefits can be paid into adulthood if the individual becomes severely disabled before age 22.

A widow or widower caring for children entitled to social security can get benefits until the youngest child is age 16 (or longer if a child is disabled). If there are no entitled children, the widow or widower can start receiving payments at 60 (or as early as 50 if disabled).

In many cases, survivors benefits are payable to divorced spouses and to dependent parents 62 or older. Further details are available at any social security office.

A survivor can work part time and still receive some or all benefits. In 1985 a beneficiary under 65 can earn up to \$5,400 and receive all benefits. For those 65 through 69, the annual limit is \$7,320. For earnings over these

amounts, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 in earnings.

If there is a death in your family, contact the social security office to see about filing a claim. You will need certain documents such as: the social security number for the deceased worker and all family members eligible for benefits; proof of death; proof of the current and any prior marriages; proof of age for each applicant; and the worker's W-2 forms (or tax returns, if self-employed) for the past 2 years. If you call the office before you come, we can tell you what additional proofs may be needed.

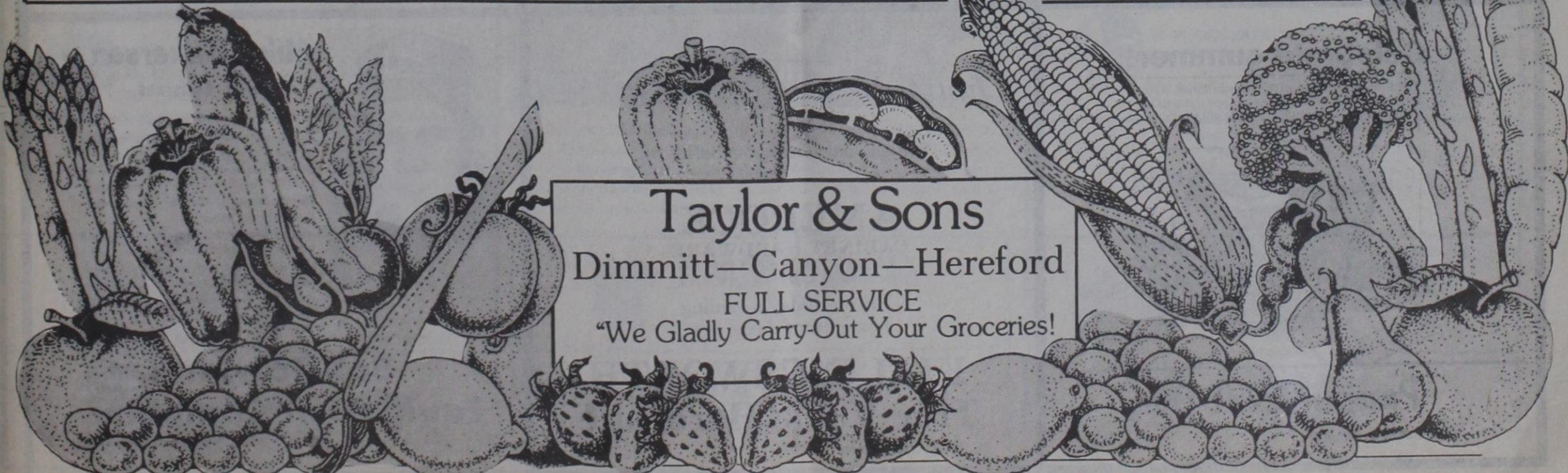

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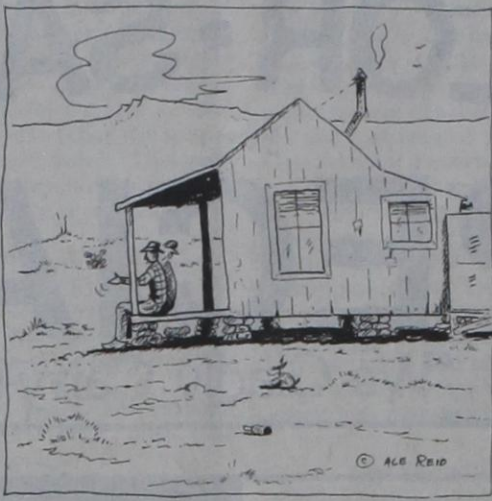

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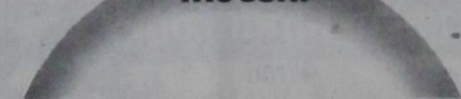

QUARTERLY REPORT 1985



If you are trying to save money and reduce soil erosion, conservation tillage may be your most logical procedure. It can help keep erosion from lowering the yield potential of your soil. It will keep more soil on the farm than conventional tillage can.

If current trends continue, most U.S. farmers, regardless of crops farmed or size of operation, will be using some type of conservation tillage techniques by the end of the century. Almost one-fourth, about 100 million acres of U.S. cropland is currently being farmed by conservation tillage.

Here in Castro county, we are seeing more and more conservation tillage practices. The picture shows wheat planted into cotton stubble by Jackie Clark. At this time, this is the most common conservation tillage in the county.

The cost of switching to conservation tillage



depends on whether you adapt your present equipment to your needs, hire a custom operator, rent equipment, or buy new machinery.

Your primary need is a properly equipped planter. Retail prices vary widely among brands and sizes. No-till planters may cost anywhere from \$200 to \$800 more per row of equipment than conventional planters.

If you can rent or borrow needed equipment, you may wish to do a pilot test before switching from conventional tillage to conservation tillage.

You may make mistakes while learning from experience what kind of conservation tillage works best for your soils or your farm, but you will learn a lot.

Sunnyside

Lyle Louder took in the first load of wheat for Sunnyside Grain and Supply last Monday. It was a partial load from a small dry land patch. It weighed 60 pounds and tested 9 percent moisture.
