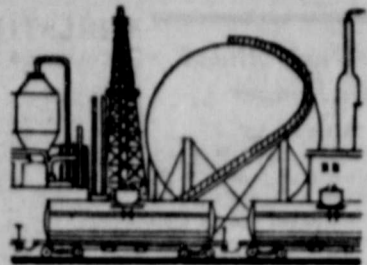

Go Forth Safely On The Fourth, To Return on the 5th, Experts Urge

Picnics, family reunions and vacations will see people of Eastland County, as elsewhere, celebrating the July 4th holiday this weekend.

With all the follies of the holiday coming up there will also be some disappointing moments in some families' life on Independence Day caused by someone's carelessness.

The carelessness that most people think about is the carelessness of an automobile driver. On the county scene Sgt. Roger W. Sosebee, with his crew of 14 patrolmen, will patrol the area highways with much supervision. They will join what is called OPERATION MOTORCIDE which will be in effect beginning at 12:01 a.m. Friday, July 2, and ending at 11:59 p.m. Sunday, July 4, 1965. The patrol has been instructed to report all deaths resulting from traffic accidents occurring in Texas.

According to Sgt. Sosebee, the last fourth of July saw 46 persons meeting tragic death on the Texas streets and highways. The causative factors of the highway accidents are as follows: 1. 0 wrong for conditions, D. W. L. front side of the road, right of way violations, improper passing, disregarding warning or stop signs, improper parking, and following too closely to another car.

To compare traffic accidents with 1964, there is not a great deal of difference in Eastland County. Over a three month period of 1964 (which includes the months of January, February, and March) there were 51 accidents. Over the same period in 1965 there have been 44 accidents reported in the home county.

In 1964 there were two fatal accidents with two people killed. In 1965 there have already been two fatal accidents with three people losing their lives.

In 1964, 18 persons were injured in the three month period, while in 1965 there have already been 21 persons injured.

Property damage for the three month period in 1964 amounted to \$23,489.00, while in 1965 there has been \$27,315.00 worth of damage recorded.

The patrolmen here in Eastland area have been instructed to keep a closer than usual watchout over the highways. They will enforce radar at all times and use other safety measures which will insure the driver and the occupants of a car with a safe journey to his destination.

Some very important safety hints could save everyone a lot of trouble, he said, if they would only obey the rules: be slow, be careful, be courteous, and be alive.

1965 ASC Program Is Underway In County

The 1965 Agricultural Conservation Program is now well under way, according to E. E. Blackwell, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation, Eastland County Committee.

The chairman explained that the ACP for each county is formulated by local people to deal scientifically with local as well as national conservation problems. Needed conservation measures are recommended by local farm leaders and technicians of several agencies and organizations, cost-sharing assistance under the program amount to about half the cost of the approved conservation practices.

Among 1965 ACP practices approved for application in Eastland County, Mr. Blackwell listed the following: The establishment or improvement of vegetative cover, to increase water penetration, lessen runoff, reduce erosion and siltation, and keep water clean.

Terracing and land leveling to increase water infiltration and reduce damaging and wasteful runoff.

Constructing water storage reservoirs, to permit or encourage animal agriculture and the growth of protective vegetative cover, and to accumulate beneficial and widely dispersed water supplies on the land.

Requests for conservation assistance outstrip the available program funds, Mr. Blackwell pointed out, and priority is given to work that is needed most. Farmers were encouraged to discuss their conservation problems with the people at the ASCS County Office, for frequently a practice can be adapted to a particular need or a group of farmers may join their program and other resources in reaching a solution to a mutual problem.

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History Group Hears Report On Cemeteries

Members of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee met Monday noon at the White Elephant in Eastland and discussed functions and future plans of the committee, according to Mike Collins, chairman.

Each chairman of each town in the county reported on the cemeteries located in their town and where they are located so that they may be placed on the county cemetery map which is being processed.

The map, a very elaborate fixture approximately three feet square in size, will be placed permanently in the columns of the courthouse, Collins said.

It is not certain where the next meeting will be held.

Chicken Fight Trials Set July 13 in District Court

District Judge J. Frank Sparks has set the trial date for five persons charged with "being concerned with chicken fighting" Tuesday, July 13, in 91st District Court.

The five charged with the fight are: Hillard William Night of 2933 Old Anson Road; Ronnie Joe Maxwell, 3867 Clinton; Jack Odem Roberts Jr., 2133 Merchant; Calvin Jean Maxwell 3834 Grappe; and Raymond T. Simon, Route 6, all of Abilene.

The five pleaded "not guilty" before County Judge Scott Bailey on May 4, 1965, to the January 10, 1965, charge of being concerned

with a chicken fight near Ranger.

After the documents were filed in the 91st District Court, there was some discussion on whether such cases should be tried in county court or district court.

After argument and discussion by attorneys on the jurisdiction of the case, Judge Sparks accepted the appeals and set the official date for the trial and motions to be entered into his court July 13, 1965.

A jury was asked for by the defense attorney and will be called at a later date.

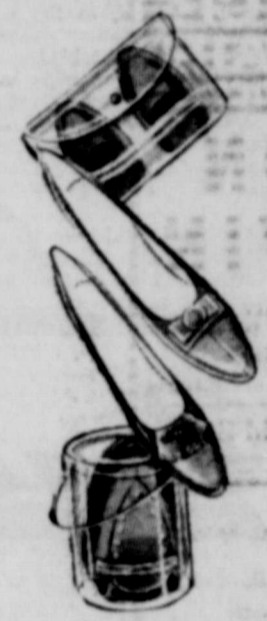

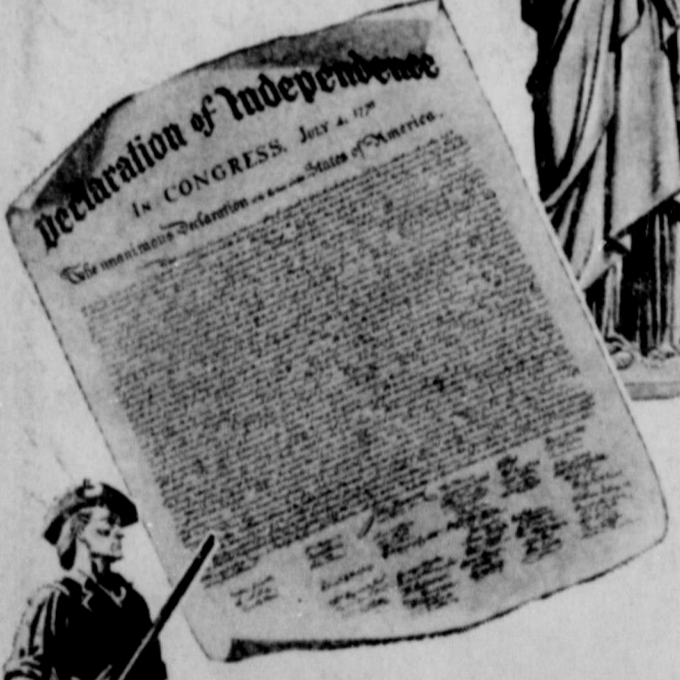

ASC PLANS TO BEGIN CROP MEASUREMENTS WORK SOON

Measurements on peanuts, feed grain, cotton and diverted acreage will begin in the near future, according to Jesse G. Meredith, Eastland County ASCS representative.

Account sales on mohair lambs should be submitted to the county office for the period January 1, 1965, through December 31, 1965 Mr. Meredith said. Current prices received by producers indicate that the prices will be below the 72 cents price support rate.

Measurement service is available to those producers who request it and pay the cost for same through the office.

In response to inquiries regarding 1965 wheat marketing cards, Mr. Meredith said cards are not required. He reminded producers who have entered to participate in the 1965 Feed Grain and Wheat Stabilization program that the area cannot be grazed from May 1 to November 1, 1965. July 1 is the last date that producers may file application for new grower wheat allotments for the 1966 crop year, he added. June 30 is the final date to sprig coastal bermuda under the 1965 ACP program.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced the following 1965 price support rates for Eastland County, Mr. Meredith said:

Wheat, grade No. 1 or better, \$1.26; oats, grade No. 3

Eastland Man Is Speaker For Lions In Cisco

The importance of disposing of assets and leaving instructions regarding property holdings was stressed by Jack Frost, Eastland attorney, in a talk last Wednesday noon at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club at the Victor Hotel dining room.

The program was arranged by Lion W. R. (Bill) Wells, who introduced Mr. Frost.

The history of wills was traced by the speaker, and community property laws were explained as they apply in the event death claims a man or his wife. He noted that a will is not valid after the birth of a child unless provision is made for the child.

The proper will should be well and clearly prepared and properly witnessed if the wishes of the maker are to be carried out fully, Mr. Frost said. It may be prepared by an attorney or self-written, he added. He suggested simplicity in preparation.

Planning by a person prior to death with proper care to details, including a will, often prevents loss by estates through taxes and other costs, Mr. Frost said.

Pointing out that few wives were familiar with their husband's business, Mr. Frost suggested that it would be helpful in the event of death if the man left good records of his holdings with suggestions in their operations and management.

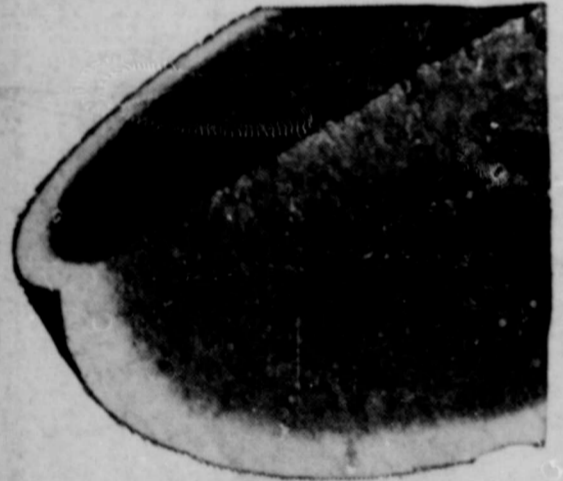

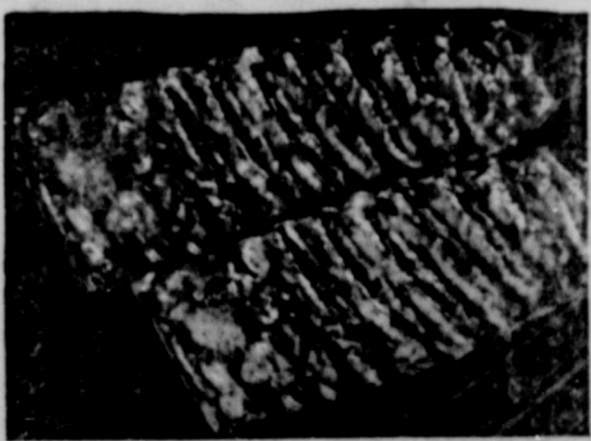
