## Record Attendance Due For 1965 Ranger Rodeo

The third annual action-packed Ranger Rodeo will be unreeled in the Jaycees' arena, U. S. Highway 80 west, Ranger, next Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Arrangements for the stellar three-day event have been completed, Kenneth Pendleton, president of the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce, said Saturday. Advance ticket sales, he said, indicate that attendance is likely to top the record-setting 1964 rodeo, the second staged here 1955.

An open amateur show, the competition opens with a gala parade in downtown Ranger Thursday afternoon, July 8, at 5 o'clock. Hundreds of visitors are expected to swarm into the city to watch the procession which will feature several sheriffs' posses, riding club groups, and commercial floats and displays.

Also in the opening parade will be the current Ranger Rodeo Queen, Miss Jane Ann Bradford, and a bevy of other beautiful cowgirls who'll be contestants to succeed her. She has reigned since the 1964 show.

One of the most sensational special acts in today's increasingly popular rodeo sport will be one of the highlights of the three nightly performances beginning at 8 p. m. It'll be Bo Bland and his terrific Model T, Mrs. Bland, a trick rider, and Dan Coats.

Area events in which contestants will vie for prizes include calf roping, steer wrestling, bronc riding, bull riding, team roping and cowgirls' barrel races. And, of course, there'll be added hilarity and excitement from the antics of rodeo clowns. A boy's calf scramble is another popular feature of the 1965 show.

Mrs. Strickler was a member of the Cheaney Church of Christ.

Survivors include two sons, Oscar D. Strickler of Fort Worth and Earl V. Strickler of Breckenridge; two daughters, Mrs. Pearl Snell of Carbon and Mrs. Elmer E. Blackwell of Ranger; one sister, Mrs. Emily Strickler of Prairie Grove, Ark.; 19 grandchildren and 29 great-grandchildren.

## BROWSING with BEV.....

Several of you have recently requested information on methods of freezing potatoes.

**PREPARATION OF NEW POTATOES FOR FREEZING**  
Select potatoes the size of minis. Scrub well in cold water to remove skins, or wash and scrape. Pre-heat boiling water 5 to 8 minutes, depending on size. Cooling: Cool in cold running water 5 to 8 minutes. Pack: Pack dry without water.

**PREPARATION OF FRENCH FRIED POTATOES FOR FREEZING**

Use mature potatoes suitable for French frying. Wash, peel and cut into sticks 1/2 inch square. Pre-heat sticks in boiling water for 2 minutes.

Cooling: Cool in cold running water 3 minutes. Pack: Pack dry, without water.

OR,  
Select potatoes suitable for french frying.

Preparation: Fry in deep fat to light golden brown. Drain thoroughly on absorbent paper. Cool to room temperature.  
Packaging: Pack in moisture-vapor-proof frozen food containers.

Thawing and heating: Remove from package, place on baking sheet, re-heat in hot oven (400 F.) for 5 minutes.

**SWEET POTATOES**

Preparation: Use medium large mature potatoes that have been cured. Wash and scrub until almost tender in pressure cooker or steamer. Cool. Peel, cut in slices, slice or mash. To prevent whole sweet potatoes from darkening, dip in 1/2 cup lemon juice to quart of water. To keep mashed sweet potatoes from darkening, mix 2 tablespoons orange or lemon juice with 1/4 quart of mashed potatoes. Package and freeze immediately.

Although wool is not a new fabric, a new treatment is being used on wool that is being used on the market in ready-made garments and in fabrics. This treatment is referred to as the Wurlan treatment. Wurlanized wool is a scientific development in the shrinkproofing of wool which is really gaining in popularity.

This treatment is technically known as an interfacial polymerization treatment of wool — which probably doesn't mean too much to you.

In this chemical finishing process, an extremely thin film of polymer forms on the surface of the wool fibers. Wurlan differs from most previously used chemical treatments in that it does not weaken the wool. Instead, it appears to strengthen the fibers and should provide better wearing qualities and increased durability.

Total usefulness of any treatment of process to manufacture shrinkproof wool fabric also depends on other properties of the treated and laundered fabric. Adding shrinkproofness and laundering capability must not create other undesirable fabric properties for the wearer.

These properties of wurlan-treated fabrics have been determined by observations of many different weights, weaves, and colors of fabrics that have been treated under both laboratory and mill operating conditions:

1. Hand — the hand (feel) of fabric treated in this manner is considered good to excellent.
2. Shrinkage — yard goods have shown less than 5 percent of directional shrink after continuous machine washing in 140-degree water 5 hours.
3. Permanence — indications are that the treatment will last the life of the garment.
4. Colors and shades — a slight change in the dye-bath was necessary to compensate for the darkening effected by the wurlan treatment.
5. Permanent pleat — no problem to apply these to wurlanized fabrics.
6. Strength — treated fabrics are from 5 to 10 percent stronger.
7. Wearability — laboratory tests indicate a significant improvement over untreated goods in abrasion resistance.
8. Drying — there is no essential change in the drying rate after treatment.
9. Air permeability — is slightly decreased.
10. Moisture-absorption — remains unchanged.

## June Belongs to Brides in Eastland County

You're right if you think June is the Bride's Month in Eastland County. Just like everywhere else, June is the month when more marriage licenses are issued. Which month would you guess to be lightest for the issuance of wedding certificates? It's October.

There were 24 licenses issued in June, 1964, and roughly the early part of this year, 16 had been officially recorded. Chances are that there will be quite a few more before the month is out. According to Court House records, the score of marriage licenses issued last year month by month, is as follows:

In 1964 — January, 11; February, 13; March, 9; April, 7; May, 14; June, 12; July, 16; August, 12; September, 10; October, 5 (the lowest number for one month); November, 13; and December, 23, making a total of 169. Marriage license issued the last part of this year are as follows: January, 9; February, 6; March, 16; April 13; May 15, which brings total this year to 75.

# IN MEMORY OF WILL ROGERS

Whenever and wherever cowboys gather, the conversation is sure to drift around to the memories of the greatest of all cowboys — Will Rogers — whose kindly philosophy and wit and humor made the world laugh, cry and understand more than a quarter of a century. One of Will Rogers' greatest forces was his ability to utilize the might of simple words.

He was asked by the late Charles Russell, Montana cowboy and artist, to write the forward in Russell's book, "Trail Plowed Under."

Mr. Russell died shortly after making the request to Mr. Rogers. Thus the article was written after his death, but before the publication of the book. Written in the form of a letter to his deceased friend, Rogers, in characteristic style, captured the full force of the simplicity that etched his personality and kindly philosophy on the hearts of all Americans. It reads:

"There ain't much news here to tell you. You know the Big Boss sent a hand over here and got you so quick, Charlie. But I guess He needed a good man pretty bad. I hear they have been working shorthanded over there pretty much of the time. I guess it's hard for Him to get hold of good men. They're jest scarce everywhere.

"I bet you hadn't been up there three days until you had your old pencil and was drawing something funny about some of the old punchers.

"I'll bet Mark Twain and Bill Nye and Whitcomb Riley and a whole bunch of those old joshers was jest waitin' for you to pop in with all the latest ones.

"What kind of a bird is Washington, and Jefferson? I bet they are regular fellows when you meet 'em, ain't they? Most big men are. I would like to see the bunch that is gathered around you the first time you tell the one about putting the limburger cheese in the old nester's whiskers.

"Don't tell that one, Charlie, until you get Lincoln around you. He would love that one I bet, you and him kinda throw in together when you get well acquainted.

"When I get to thinkin' about all them top hands up there, if could jest hold a horse wringlin' job with them I wouldn't mind following the wagon myself.

"You'll run into my old dad up there, Charlie, for he was a real cowhand. And I bet he is running a wagon. And you will pop into some well kept ranch house over under some cool, shady trees and you'll be asked to have dinner and it will be the best life.

"Well, I can't write any more, Charlie, the darn paper is all wet. It must be raining in the old bunk house. Of course, we are just a-hanging on here as long as we can; I don't know why we hate to go — it's better there. Maybe it's because we haven't done anything that will live after we've gone.

"Your old friend, WILL."

## Rough, Tough Stock Now Hard To Find Provides Rodeo Thrills

No rodeo is better than its stock — and for that reason a hunt for outlaw horses and bulls with special talent for unseating a cowboy goes on year-long throughout the season.

Lloyd Woodley of Lampasas, producer of the 1965 Ranger Rodeo here Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 8-9-10, is one of the men who make a business of providing such spirited animals for arena competition.

Woodley has been providing action and thrills for avid rodeo fans for 15 years and the secret of his success is his string of stock. And he has a woefully small surplus from which to draw. But, backed by experience and real savvy, he keeps his rodeo arsenal loaded with real dynamite.

In the past twenty years ranches which raised horses in vast numbers gradually have disappeared from the scene. These herds, from which rodeo drew many of its

bucking prospects, have been supplanted in great part by the pickup truck and jeep.

Where once bucking horse prospects were purchased in car-load lots, now the stock contractor finds an individual animal. The shortage has made the search a day-to-day, overlook — nothing enterprise, fiercely competitive.

Oldtimers freely admit the present day bucking horse is ranker and harder to ride than when horses were plentiful. They have to be, for the current crop of riders have perfected the art of staying aboard.

With quality higher and quantity lower, the old rule of supply and demand has reached the rodeo arena. Value of a top bucking horse today can run into five figures, astronomical, when little over a decade ago a thousand dollars was top price for such an animal.

So far, the hump-shouldered brahma bulls used in rodeo

contests present no such problem. A part of the nation's cattle industry, they can be found in almost every sector of the country. Once purchased, the best are screened for the arena, the remainder resold.

Rodeo bucking stock lead a good life. Their actual working hours are capsule into a few minutes each year. Well-fed and cared for, as a category, the horse especially, out-last other types by years.

Cowboys themselves have great respect for the honest bucking animal. This accounts for their decision some years ago to acknowledge the horse hardest to ride each season with the "bucking horse of the year" award. The selection is made from the collective stock contracting strings in the United States and Canada.

### Geologic Atlas Project Making Good Progress

AUSTIN — The University of Texas Bureau of Economic Geology has plans for the river that flows through your city and the cluster of hills just south of town.

The UT geologists literally want to put every Texas town on the map as part of the Texas Geologic Atlas Project. The maroon job of providing the state with a new geologic atlas was begun in 1961 and will continue for several more years.

Dr. Peter T. Flawn, director of the Bureau, describes the geologic atlas project in an article, "Texas Rocks on Paper," in a new issue of the Texas Quarterly, published by the University.

Dr. Flawn points out that the most recent geologic map of the state was published by the U. S. Geological Survey nearly three decades ago — in 1937. The map is now out-of-print as well as outdated.

"It is a paradox that Texas, a state vitally concerned with oil, gas and other minerals, as well as agriculture and industrialization — a state where the annual value of mineral products exceeds four and one-half billion dollars — does not have a modern geologic map," Dr. Flawn writes.

He notes that "in Texas the only agency with a program of systematic geologic mapping is the Bureau of Economic Geology, established in 1909 as a research bureau of the University to function as a geological survey for Texas."

Since compilation of the 1937 geologic map, the Bureau of Economic Geology has mapped about 18,000 square miles of Texas, Dr. Flawn reports. The Bureau also has enlisted the aid of the state's many oil companies, which have contributed a vast amount of data in the form of private maps.

The new atlas is being published in the form of 37 sheets representing areas of the state one degree of latitude by two degrees of longitude. The first sheet — of the Tyler area — was published in March and called the John T. Lonsdale Memorial Edition in honor of the Bureau's former director. Maps of the Texarkana, Sherman, Palestine and Van Horn regions are nearing completion, Dr. Flawn says.

This makes a 190 per cent growth in the past 4 1/2 years. The new plateau of financial strength and size will enable the company to be of even more service to Texas Farm Bureau members in the future.

Rainfall totals 15.60 inches through June, and average for the period is 13.85 inches. This year's total is considerably above last year's 9.26 inches for the first six months.

Three days of rain in June amounted to 1.22 of moisture, Official Weather Observer James Smith reports. Rain fell on the fifth, (.90); the 12th, (.18); and on the 22nd, (.14).

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# Here's A Review Of Colorful Cowboy Talk Heard In Rodeo Arena

When you are out there in the stands at the rodeo and watching the events, you are apt to hear a language quite foreign to your usual conversational English.

Some of the cowboys are apt to be confusing in some of their terms, therefore, take heed. A few terms which you ought to know.

**BICYCLING** — The art of scratching the horse with one foot and then the other in the manner of riding a bicycle.

**BITING THE DUST** — Thrown from a horse or steer.

**BLOWING A STIRRUP** — Losing a stirrup while riding.

**BRONCO** — A wild, untamed bit of horseflesh.

**BOGGING TIME** — When a rider fails to scratch his mount. Scratching-with-spurs is required in rodeo bucking events.

**BROOMTAIL** — Wild mares.

**BUCKAROO** — A bronc buster or cowboy.

**BULLDOGGER** — Steer wrestler.

**CANTLE BOARDING** — When a rider scratches back and braces his knees under the front part of the saddle, or cantle.

**CAVY** — A type of horse used in the round-up.

**CHUCK WAGON** — Range-hand cafeteria and grocery store.

**COMMUNITY LOOP** — Slang expression to convey the idea that a roper threw an extra large loop in an attempt to rope an animal —

shunned by better rodeo performers.

**CRITTER** — Man or beast.

**CROW HOPS** — Contemptuous term for mild bucking horse's movement.

**CUT OUT** — Putting a steer down with his feet under him. The throw in bulldogging is not complete until the steer is flat on its side with four feet out.

**FOREFOOTING** — Roping an animal by the front feet.

**GYPING** — Deceiving or fooling.

**GRABBING THE APPLE** — When a bronc rider grabs the saddle horn to keep from being thrown.

**HAZER** — Bulldogger's assistant. After the bulldogger has leaped from pony to steer, the hazer, mounted, picks up the foreman's horse and also protects him from being attacked by the steer when the animal is released.

**HIGH ROLLER** — A horse that seems to roll in the air when bucking.

**HOBBLED STIRRUPS** — Stirrups that are tied down under the horse's belly — it is almost the same as being tied in the saddle.

**MAN-KILLER** — A vicious horse ready to strike, kick, or bite at any man.

**MAVERICK** — Unbranded stray.

**OUTFIT** — Term applied to the equipment — or to the place for which a cowhand works.

**OUTLAW** — When the steer

## First Public Rodeo Staged Back In 1888

The popular rodeo sport is 76 years old this year. The history of arena action dates back to 1888 when the first public rodeo was staged in Prescott, Ariz. Since that first competition, cowboy contests have grown in popularity until they now are attended by millions of ardent fans. Rodeo is a word of Spanish origin signifying the roundup of cattle on the open range. Rodeo comes from the wide open range of the cattle country in frontier times. In those days ranches were few and far between. Cowboys would often spend months out of sight of their own ranch house, their only companion being some of their fellow hands, their horses and their herds of longhorn steers.

Their one yearly gathering was the roundup. Here their natural exuberance was given full sway, friends would vie with one another in feats of horsemanship and the handling of cattle — the thing that was their daily life. Pride in the home ranch led to challenges of one outfit against another and soon the contests were extended to neighboring ranches and then into other states. As the competition grew the rodeo ceased to be confined to the time and place of the cattle roundup. Today they are being successfully staged from Canada to California, with livestock specially selected to tax men's skill so that now rodeo is far more thrilling than it was in the early times. A rodeo is first, last and all the time of contest of superiority, where cowboys and cowgirls assemble at their own expense, pay an entrance fee in each and all the events and ride and rope according to rigid rules.

Faster than a calf, smarter than a steer, and as elusive as a greased pig. That is a fitting description of a goat. Because of those qualities the sport of goat-roping is finding many followers.

Many communities have organized goat-roping clubs, and every Sunday the boys get together, put up a jackpot, get a couple of timers, and go after the goats. The procedure is about the same as calf-roping with the same rules applying, but the times are slower.

The goats have a peculiar nature. Often when a rider gets within looping distance, and as a result it takes

a good cow pony habit of changing their course and a rider who is able to stand the turns of a polo game to get the job done. And even after the loop is fastened over the goat, he most likely will take a notion to back track, which often causes roper, rider and horse and goat to end in trouble — and if the horse is on the excitable side, there is every chance the rider may find himself in a heap.

Goat clubs have been formed over the state and have been exceptionally successful everywhere. "Goat roping is just like trying to rope a jackrabbit," one of the ropers said but did not explain why jackrabbit roping had not been tried.

**Highway Patrol Has 70 Vacant Jobs for Texans**

Major Leo E. Gossett, commander of the 49 county West Texas Region of the Department of Public Safety, announced today there are 70 vacancies in the uniformed patrol services with increased salaries going into effect September 1 with an additional raise one year later. "The vacancies exist in all parts of the State, and will be filled by competitive examination. Salaries will range from \$453 up to \$484 per month, depending on the branch of service," Gossett pointed out. "This is an opportunity for qualified young men to become dedicated career officers in a proud organization whose purpose is to serve and protect the people of Texas," he stated. "It is also an opportunity for men to further their education while in training." Student patrolmen receive

some 900 hours of study in 95 subjects, such as highway law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms and many other courses. While in training at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, trainees receive \$375 per month and after 18 weeks they become commissioned officers.

Applications and other information can be obtained by contacting any DPS Patrolman or the nearest DPS office. July 6 is the deadline for filing applications for the next examination on July 14 and 15 for the training school beginning August 31.

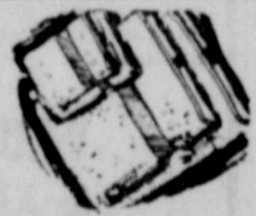

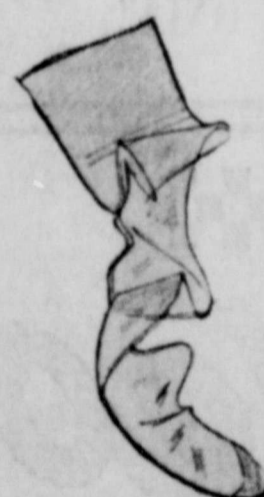

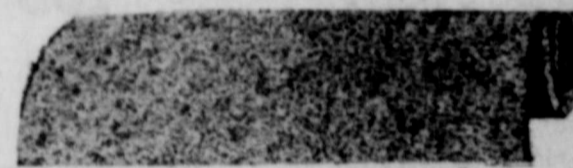
