





# 24 Accidents Injure, Damage **But Kill None**

The June traffic accident summary for Eastland County has been reported as follows: No fatal accidents, three personal injuries and 21 accidents resuiting in property damage, making a total of 24 accidents.

There were no deaths, five persons injured and property damage estimated at \$14,950.

A comparison of traffic ac-cidents in Eastland County, reported by the Texas De-partment of Public Safety for the first six months of 1963

with the same periods of 1964 is reported as follows: During 1965 — fatal acci-dents, 2; personal injury ac-cidents, 23; property dam-age accidents, 68; total acci-dents, 93; deaths, 3; injuries, 38; and property damage, 163,500. \$63.500.

During 1964 - fatal accidents, 5; personal injury accidents, 32; property damage accidents 64; total accidents 101; deaths 5; injured 45; and property damage \$11434.




