Cisco Named As Site For All-Star Tourney

Rylee Field in Cisco has been selected as the site for the Little League District All-Star tournament which will be held July 29-31, according to Vandell Weathers, president of the local organization.

The district tournament will follow the area tournament which will be in Breckenridge July 21-23. Towns represented in the Breckenridge tourney comprise four areas — Breckenridge, Albany, Eastland, and Cisco; Weatherford and Ranger; Brownwood (three teams) and Coleman and Cross Plains and Clyde.

The winner from each area will be here for district play.

The Cisco team is scheduled to play Breckenridge in the first game at 7:45 p.m. Wednesday, July 21, in the area tourney. They will play again Friday at eight p.m. or 8 p.m., depending upon the outcome of Thursday night's game.

All Stars began regular practice sessions Monday afternoon under direction of Manager Tom Autrey and his assistant, Bill Wells.

Work on Rylee Field was also begun Monday, and Mr. Weathers has urged all those who can to turn out late each afternoon and help clean and mow the field to get it in good shape for the tournament.

Plans call for about three portable bleachers to be moved in, and these should seat from 200 to 300 more spectators, Mr. Weathers said.

A large crowd is expected during the three-night tourney here.

Her mother recalled the painful incident:

"I wasn't there at the time, but her sister, Debra Jean, who was 7½ then, and her father were. They had just given Cindy a bath and put her on the bed. Debby, who was with her in the bedroom suddenly ran into another room."

Six new arena champions were announced following the Saturday night action in the Ranger Jaycees' 3rd annual Rodeo.

Tops in the bareback bronc riding event during the three-night competition — Thursday through Saturday — was Lewis Davenport of George West.

Leading bull rider was John Fry of Abilene.

Winning calf roper was Morris Walker of Cotulla.

Ed Workman of Grapevine wound up with the bull dogging title, and Joe Hall and J. L. Keeney of Crane were tops in the head and heel roping.

The annual consolation award to the "Hardluck Cowboy" of the 1965 show — presented annually by Mrs. D. E. Pulley in honor of her late husband who was an avid rodeo fan — went to Andy Lindsey of Ranger.

In the girls' barrel racing division, one of the top events of the night performance, Marilyn Burleson of Sweetwater wound up with the 1965 championship.

The attendance at this year's rodeo exceeded that of the 1963 and 1964 shows. A total of over 10,000 persons witnessed the three performances.

Tentative dates for the 1966 show have been set for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 7-9. A stock contractor will be named in the near future. The three-year contract with Lloyd Woodley,

Lampson, producer of the Jaycees' initial three rodeos — 1963 through 1965 — has expired. It is possible, however, that it may be renewed.

Over 200 Workers Are Moving To This Area For Pipe Line Project

A crew of more than 200 construction workers began moving into this area Thursday as McVean and Barlow, Inc., Odessa pipe line contractors, prepared to re-condition and build a products line for Gulf Oil Corporation. A call went out from the Chamber of Commerce offices for listings of vacant apartments, rooms and houses.

The construction force will be in this area from 60 to 90 days, it was reported. Some labor will be hired locally, it was said.

The McVean and Barlow company has rented the large quonset building owned by the Cisco Livestock Show Association on the Lake Road just north of Cisco as a headquarters during their work in this area. K. E. Wagner is one of the company's officials for the project.

It was understood that the work would begin at the Eastland Gulf Terminal, which is located just off the highway at the "Y" some 10 miles north of Cisco and Eastland.

on the Breckenridge road, Gulf has a products terminal there where products are pumped from the Port Arthur refinery.

Plans call for taking up a 10-inch line for repairs and for a new line from the Eastland terminal to Midland, according to reports here. A booster pumping station will be added to the terminal setup, the report said, to send products on toward Midland.

The contract will be handled out of Gulf's Houston headquarters, it was understood. Five to seven Gulf men will be here during the same time to serve as inspectors and to represent the company. The Cisco offices will be maintained until work progresses to Abilene, reports said.

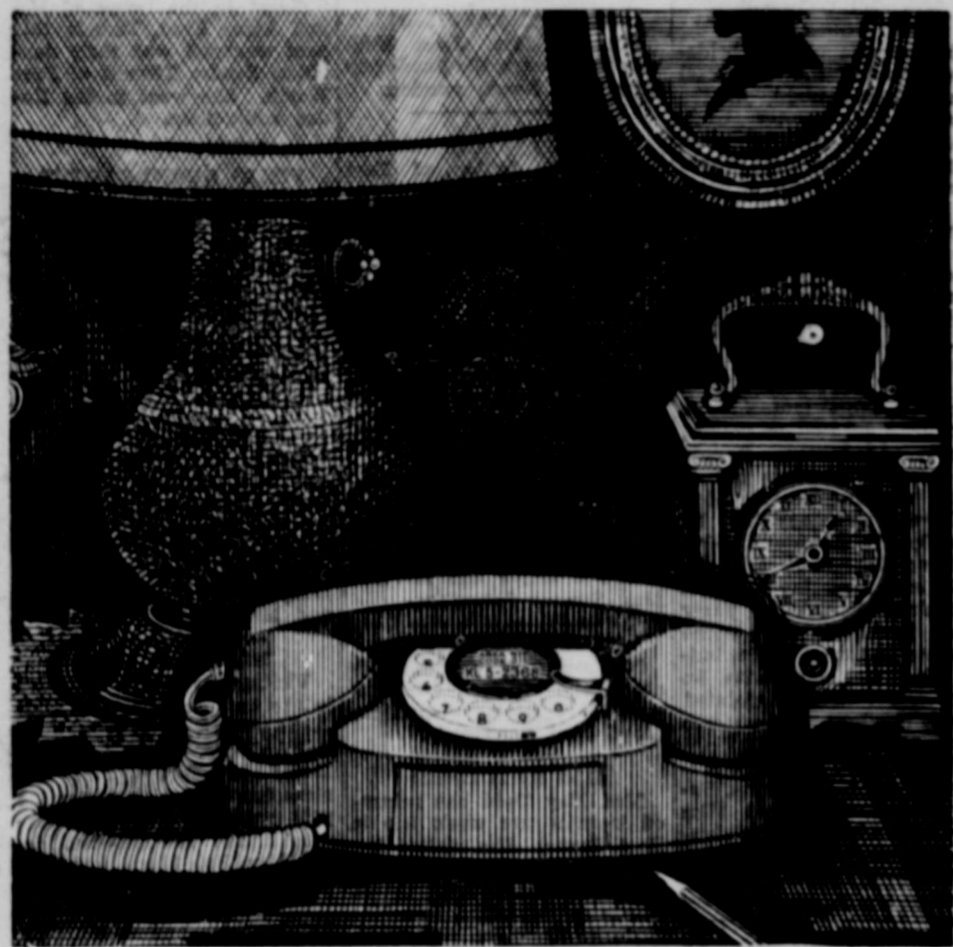

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Importance of Area-Wide Labor, Skills Survey Studied, Considered

Need for an up-to-date, accurate manpower survey of Eastland County was vividly illustrated this past week during a regular meeting of Eastland chamber of commerce board of directors.

The Eastland directors indicated that they are ready to begin such a survey and are negotiating with chambers in Cisco and Ranger relative to a joint effort, from which all can benefit.

It is generally assumed by most in the country that a surplus of available labor exists, but prospective industries cannot accept "assumptions," Oscar Castillon, Industrial Development Director for Texas Electric Service Co., told the Eastland Countsians. "These people have to know for a certainty before they can risk the location of a plant," he said.

Joining Castillon in explain-

ing the need and the mechanics of a manpower survey was George Maddox, another TESCO industrial executive who has assisted many cities in West Texas conduct successful surveys.

It was the feeling of directors that a joint, county-wide survey would be most beneficial, with all towns participating and sharing the benefit of the compiled information. Details of such a survey would be worked out, but generally it would be a direct-mail approach, with confidential questionnaires being mailed to the some 7,000 families in the county, asking of members' availability for employment, education and skill backgrounds, and other pertinent information needed by potential employers.

C-C President Don Viegiver, local manager of Hollywood-Vassarette, largest local employer, presided.

Maddox has directed survey in Sweetwater, San Angelo, Midland, Odessa and other towns.

Such a survey is a tool, a vital one, he said, in inducing industry. "It isn't a guarantee of any kind, but it certainly gives your people specifics with which they can negotiate."

If such a survey proves nothing more than that your area needs more technical training for the people, then it certainly would be worthwhile, Castillon said.

W. W. (Bill) Paschall, 80 Years Old Friday, Came to Ranger in '19

W. W. (Bill) Paschall celebrated his 80th birthday Friday and looked back nostalgically and contentedly over four score years.

Fire Plug Break, Causes Damage At Victor Hotel Sunday Night

Service Back To Normal Monday

A broken fire plug at the alley beside the Victor Hotel on Avenue D caused several thousand dollars in damages and required a crew of some 12 city employees to work for 15 hours Sunday night and Monday.

The fire plug, which was mounted on a 10-inch water main, apparently was broken by a car backing or running into it, knocking a bolt loose on one side, city officials said. This caused water to start streaming out and the high pressure soon tore the plug off and broke a sewer line that lays next to the water main in the ditch.

Water flooded under the concrete and went to the Corral Room of the Victor Hotel, completely covering an expensive nylon carpet and an oak dance floor. The water covered most of the coffee shop area, and went into the front hall and the newstand. The elevator pits also caught water.

City workers, who were supervised by Odell Ruins, Mayor Pro Tem W. W. Sawyers and Water Commissioner Frank Coats, installed pumps in the elevator pits. The elevators were inoperative during the night, forcing guests to use the stairs.

At midnight, the city water system was shut off to allow workers more freedom in their efforts to install a new fire plug. This necessitated bleeding all fire plugs over town. By 7 a.m., the work was finished and water was back in the main lines.

A city fire truck and pump was on stand-by duty all night under the supervision of Fire Chief H. L. Ferguson. President G. C. Hogue and a crew of Cisco Junior College maintenance personnel also helped with the work. The college owns the hotel building.

Monday, the carpet was taken up and the padding was moved out to dry. The oak floor was buckling in places. Mr. Hogue estimated that damages would amount to about \$3,000. The loss, he added, was not covered by insurance since policies often do not pay flood damage.

City police were seeking the identity of the vehicle that struck the fire plug, causing all of the damage and trouble. They suggested that the vehicle owner might have liability insurance that would cover the loss.

air conditioning of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals on the top floor of the courthouse is in Phase One according to County Judge Scott Bailey. A preliminary plan has been submitted by Architect Raymond Thomas of Sherman (and formerly of Cisco), showing how the court's library space can be doubled, the entire area cooled and other improvements made within the allotted \$40,000 set aside by the commissioners court. The plan calls for adding a "sixth floor" within the confines of the Fifth Floor Court area by building up into the high ceiling, another level which would provide library space and storage. A circular stairwell would be added

to facilitate the up and down, and ceilings throughout would be lowered, and offices of the judges enlarged to make a more attractive and comfortable home for the court. Heating too will be necessary because the present system doesn't do a very good job of putting steam up onto the fifth floor on really cold days. 'Course at this time of year, cooling is the concern, but looks as though no relief will be forthcoming this summer. A more elaborate proposal by the architect which would have moved the court's hearing room up into the "sixth" and other "ideal innovations" has been rejected as being too elaborate.

ONLY ONE category was down in Eastland County vehicle registration for 1964, which ended March 31, 1965—and that truck tractors. Only 75 are registered, compared with 84 in 1962. Passenger cars, commercial trucks and farm trucks lead the totals in this county by a large margin. Passenger registration is up 198 from 8,688 to 8,886; commercial trucks up to 2,189 from 2,061; farm trucks, up to 1,326 from 1,274; house trailers, up to 46 from 42; motorcycles, up to 60, from 49; and farm trailers, up to 21, from 15. The DPS reports that there are in excess of 5,891,346 registered vehicles in the state. Of these, 4,197,178 are passenger cars, 805,324 are commercial trucks; 20,604 are farm trucks; 51,622 are truck tractors; 13,173 are house trailers; 1,262 are city buses (none in Eastland County); 50,508 are motorcycles; and 121,659 are farm trailers.

Olden-Eastland Water Contract Is Specific And Protects Both Parties

The mechanics and hardware of the Olden Water Supply Corporation are presently in the engineering stages and the system will probably be "turned on" soon after the first of the year in January or February, sources report.

The City of Eastland, from whom the newly-organized water supply system has been contracted to buy water at cost plus ten per cent, will have passed another fiscal year (Sept. 31) by then and will be able to pin down exactly what the rate for the new system will be.

In calculating the city's cost, officials have included the actual cost per thousand (seven cents) charged by the Eastland County Water Supply District; the flat fee assessed by the ECWSD on Eastland and Ranger for bond retirement; and the ECWSD tax of some \$12,000 a year. All tallied and divided by the number of thousand gallons purchased, makes for a rate presently somewhere in the neighborhood of 32 cents per thousand. However, City Manager Lewis Tiner reports that heavy sales this fiscal year to the Great Western Drilling Co. for water-flooding purposes at Lake Eastland, might bring the over-all total cost down, resulting in a possible 30-cent-per-thousand rate when calculations are made after the fiscal year ends.

Final contract between the Olden group and Eastland was inked June 24 and calls for the new system to buy some 24,000,000 gallons per year and install no more than 174 miles within the spec-

ified boundary — west to the Dixie Drive Inn; east to the Dixie Drive Inn; south to the Dixie Drive Inn; north to Norwood Lane in Olden; and south to one-half mile south of Interstate Highway 20.

The folks in Olden will be subject to water rationing the same as Eastland in the event of water shortages during the 30-year contract. Contract also allows for the corporation to provide the proper type of measuring device (meter) to measure the water bought from the city.

The City will bill the corporation monthly and promptly after the close of each fiscal year, the city will determine its cost for water and that cost will be the bases for the price charged the corporation during the succeeding year. No water customers will be served outside the prescribed boundaries without the permission of the

City of Eastland, the contract specifies.

The contract, to run for 30 years from the date of the first delivery of water, may be changed or modified only with the consent of the city, corporation and the Farmers Home Administration (guarantees of the loan).

The contract was signed by Mayor W. F. (Frank) Deaton and Manager Legis Tiner for Eastland and Gilbert Copeland, secretary, and Charles Pat Moseley, president, for the corporation.

She works a maximum of 20 hours a week and is paid \$1.10. The county pays 10 per cent and the Federal Government pays 90 per cent. Also working at the courthouse is Susette Hagan from Ranger. She is employed in the ASCS office. The Commissioners Court of Eastland also uses one male student in each precinct. They work a maximum 20-hour week and help with the precinct crews over the various county roads. The City of Eastland has employed two boys with a contract from Ranger Junior College. They are Bennie Rodgers and Ronald Patton, both from Olden. They work with the maintenance department for the city. Across the country the College Work-Study program is helping more than 45,000 students stay in college and earn an average of \$275 a semester. Some \$11.9 million in Federal funds and matching college contributions of \$1.3 million supported the spring semester programs. The bal-

Lower Calorie Peanuts Ready For Consumers

COLLEGE STATION — Peanut fanciers with weight problems got good news recently from Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman. He announced that U. S. Department of Agriculture researchers have developed a process which puts peanuts in a much lower calorie group. The process, developed at the Southern Utilization Research Laboratory, New Orleans, makes possible the removal of 80 per cent of the oil and three-fourths of the calories but leaves intact the peanut's original good flavor and high protein content. When the new product goes into commercial production, the Secretary said, it should open up new markets for peanut growers, whose production has been increasing faster than consumption. The procedure is simple. Shelled nuts are brought to a proper moisture content and pressed in a hydraulic press to remove most of the oil, which constitutes about 50 per cent of the peanut's weight. The pressed kernels are flat and misshapen, but they return to their original shape and size when soaked in water. Salt, sugar, spices or other flavorings can be added.

Desdemona Gets Two Historical Marker Signs

Two Scotchlight "Historical Markers in City" signs will be placed on the city limit sign posts of Desdemona by the State of Texas. Sponsored by the Confederate marking program of the State, these signs are being placed, two to a city, to alert tourists to the Civil War history recorded and contained there. RAMP, the Texas State Historical Survey Committee program to Record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve and Survey Texas history, has as one of its objectives, the stimulation of tourist interest in the towns, cities and regions through which travelers pass. Desdemona is one of 193 such cities over the state awarded these highway signs. They are contracted by the State Building Commission and erected by the Texas Highway Department. The Texas State Historical Survey Committee is, by law, authorized to name the towns eligible for the signs. Survey Committee president John Ben Sheppard of Odessa said at the time of this announcement, "Tourists, as a whole, are curious, and if they are aware they are missing something by overlooking a town, the chances are they will take the time to see what it is. Making this initial contact which, day and night, attracts attention to the markers in this city as well as the 3,000 other Official Texas Historical Markers over the state."

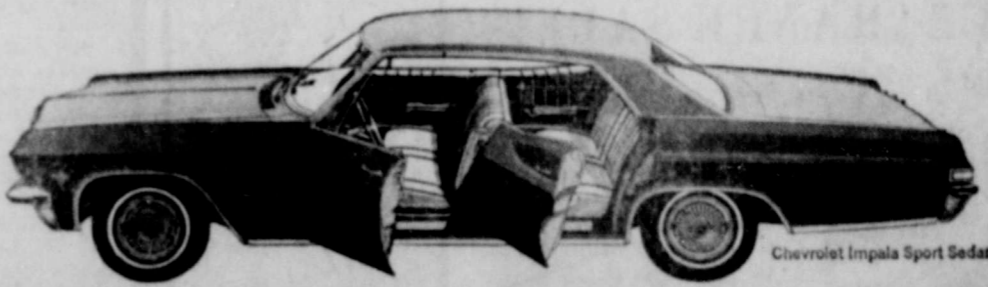

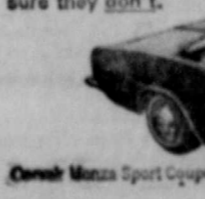
