Ranger College Okayed for New \$18,211. Grant

A number of students at Ranger Junior College next fall will benefit from a federal grant under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, it was announced Wednesday.

The Times received a telegram Wednesday from Cong. Omar Burleson who advised: "Pleased to advise Office of Education announces grant of \$18,211.00 to Ranger Junior College for participation in the fall college work-study program under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

Fifty-one other Texas schools also received similar grants.

Among them were Cisco Junior College, \$13,390 and Tarleton State College, Stephenville, \$9,180.

The plan provides part-time employment for students from low-income families who need money to pursue their education. Participating educational institutions provide the students with approved jobs on or off campus.

The total income of a family must be less than \$3,000 a year for the student to qualify for such job assistance.

First Federal Distributes Top Dividends

First Federal Savings & Loan Assn. of Ranger distributed record dividends totaling \$61,262.98 to savers in this area on June 30.

This was the largest amount ever distributed by the association for semi-annual dividends, according to Lester Crossley, secretary-treasurer. He added that at the rate the organization is growing the dividend distribution total at the end of December, 1965, will be even larger.

The association now has total assets of \$3,323,730.22, as shown in the financial statement appearing elsewhere in the issue of this newspaper. That figure represents a substantial increase of \$166,782.40 since Dec. 31, 1964.

Since November, 1959, when First Federal moved its office from an insurance agency to its own separate location, the association has grown from \$905,000 in assets with two part-time employees to its present capacity — almost \$3 1/2 million in assets with four full time employees and a building custodian.

In the last few years, according to Secretary-Treasurer Crossley, the annual dividend distribution has been over \$100,000 annually paid — or added to accounts — of savers, most of whom are people in this area. This, he added, contributes substantially to the economy of this community and the surrounding area.

Crossley said that officers, directors and employees of First Federal Savings and Loan Assn. are very proud of the consistent, sound progress the institution is making — thanks to the confidence and patronage of a growing number of patrons.

John Waugh, 87, Interred After Friday Service

Funeral services for John Waugh, 87-year-old prominent Strawn resident, were held Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Strawn Church of Christ.

Leo McDaniel of Abilene Christian College officiated during the rites, assisted by Raymond Boyd, minister of the church.

Interment was in Mount Marion Cemetery with Edwards Funeral Home, Strawn in charge of arrangements.

Strawn Masonic Lodge AF&AM 906 conducted graveside services. W. B. Sinclair, past master of the lodge, officiated during the pre-interment rites.

Mr. Waugh, who had been in failing health for several years, died Wednesday at noon in Strawn Hospital.

He was the last surviving charter member of the Strawn Masonic Lodge. He served as worshipful master of the Strawn unit in 1909 and again in 1959 — spanning half a century. Honoring this unique and unusual service, Waugh's portrait hangs in Waco Hall in tribute to him as the first known Mason to hold the office of worshipful master 50 years apart.

Mr. Waugh was born Jan. 20, 1878, in Belchavie, near Glasgow, Scotland. In early manhood he migrated to the United States with his parents and the family arrived at Thurber, then a booming coal mining metropolis, in 1898.

Survivors include his widow, Elizabeth, of Strawn; three daughters, Mrs. John Barton of Bastrop, Mrs. Earl Hallstead and Mrs. John Feldon of San Francisco, Calif.; two sons, Calvin Waugh of Cleveland, Ohio, and Gordon Waugh of San Francisco; one brother, Archie Waugh of Seattle, Wash.; six grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Museum Progress Rated 'Highly Encouraging,' In Report to Chamber Board

A&M Specialist Speaker For Sheep, Goat Event

One of the outstanding agricultural economists of the state, John G. McHaney, Extension Service, Texas A&M University, will discuss future price outlook for wool, mohair and mutton at the annual Eastland County Sheep and Goat Field Day at Ranger July 30, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper.

McHaney has been on the program several times in the past, according to Dr. John Foster, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, co-sponsors of the event with the county agent.

With 50,000 head of Angora goats and 15,000 sheep in Eastland County, wool, mohair and lamb sales are an important segment of the general economy of the entire county, Foster pointed out.

Three field days have been held with attendance growing each year. The event draws sheep and goat ranchers from several nearby counties.

One of the features will be an Angora goat show and judging contest under the leadership of B. S. Dudley Jr., agricultural teacher of Ranger High School.

Screwworm control program, toxic weeds and shrubs, government support prices on wool and mohair and activities of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association are other items on the agenda.

The program is scheduled to get under way at 9:30 a. m. at the old Tiffin gas plant building, three miles northeast of Ranger on the Haganman Ranch road. It will last until midafternoon with time out at noon for lunch.

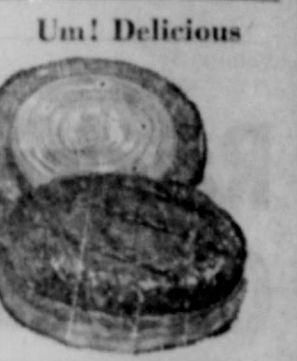

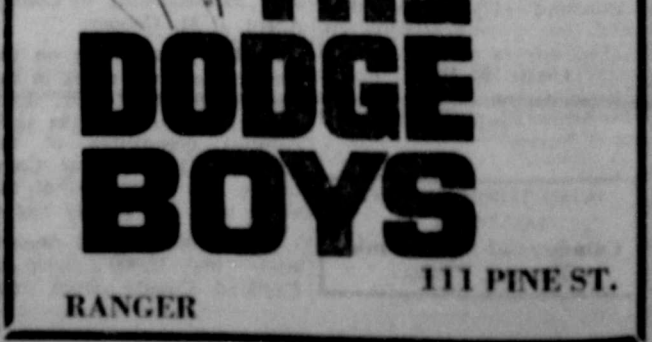

24 Accidents Injure, Damage But Kill None

The June traffic accident summary for Eastland County has been reported as follows: No fatal accidents, three personal injuries and 21 accidents resulting in property damage, making a total of 24 accidents.

There were no deaths, five persons injured and property damage estimated at \$14,950.

A comparison of traffic accidents in Eastland County, reported by the Texas Department of Public Safety for the first six months of 1965 with the same periods of 1964 is reported as follows:

During 1965 — fatal accidents, 2; personal injury accidents, 23; property damage accidents, 69; total accidents, 93; deaths, 3; injuries, 38; and property damage, \$63,500.

During 1964 — fatal accidents, 5; personal injury accidents, 32; property damage accidents, 64; total accidents, 101; deaths, 5; injured, 45; and property damage \$81,434.

Lower Calorie Peanuts Ready For Consumers

COLLEGE STATION — Peanut fanciers with weight problems got good news recently from Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman. He announced that U. S. Department of Agriculture researchers have developed a process which puts peanuts in a much lower calorie group.

The process, developed at the Southern Utilization Research Laboratory, New Orleans, makes possible the removal of 30 percent of the oil and three-fourths of the calories but leaves intact the peanut's original good flavor and high protein content.

When the new product goes into commercial production, the Secretary said, it should open up new markets for peanut growers; whose production has been increasing faster than consumption.

The procedure is simple. Shelled nuts are brought to a proper moisture content and pressed in a hydraulic press to remove most of the oil, which constitutes about 50 percent of the peanut's weight. The pressed kernels are flat and misshapen, but they return to their original shape and size when soaked in water. Salt, sugar, spices or other flavorings can be added during this reconstitution period.

After the low-calorie nuts are dried, they are ready for eating as is, for roasting or for use in candies and other foods.

Exploratory studies at New Orleans, the Secretary added, have shown that the same process might be used to produce low-calorie pecans, walnuts, almonds, Brazil nuts, chestnuts, cashew and other nut meats. Secretary Freeman added that the research which developed the new process is part of the Department's continuing program to develop new and expanded uses for farm products.
