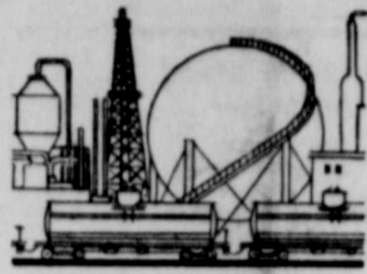

Bob Hart, well known auditor in this area, is associated with the Abilene firm. In other business of the evening, members of the commission voted to approve conduct of a study of insurance coverage of city-owned vehicles and all municipal property. Some coverage is too large, others inadequate. The study, conducted by Doyle Gentry, finance commissioner, will seek to point out the inequities and needs for revision.

## Entire County To Benefit From Results Forthcoming Employment Survey Here

The entire Eastland County area will benefit from an employment survey which is being launched to accurately measure the amount and the type of labor available in the area. Statistical data from the survey will, in the words of Mr. Howard Maddox, Texas Electric Service Co. area development specialist, "Be another tool to lure industry to this area." Prospects want to know, not hear guesses, about how many employes are available, he explained during a planning session in Eastland Tuesday evening. Representatives from Ranger, Cisco, Eastland and Gorman were present to help map

out details for the survey which will be begun very soon. Jack Arrington of Eastland was named by the group to coordinate the details of the survey. The formal name selected is Eastland County Employment Survey.

Final arrangements for various details of staging the fourth annual Eastland County Sheep & Goat Field Day were completed during a meeting held Monday night in the offices of Lone Star Gas Co. in Ranger. Dr. John Foster, co-chairman of the committee in charge of the event, is expected to be present for the 1965 event. The annual Eastland County

Sheep & Goat Field Day is co-sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and J. M. Cooper, Eastland County agricultural agent, Texas Extension Service. The 1965 event offers a new attraction — an Angora goat show and a goat judging contest under the direction of Beverly S. Dudley, Jr., Ranger, vocational agricultural agent of Eastland County Agricultural Agent will judge the animals. Other items on the agenda for the all-day program include status of the screw-worm control program; toxic weeds and plant to sheep and price outlook for wool, mohair and lambs; Government support prices as well as activities of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. There are now over 50,000 of Angora goats in the county. The animals form an important part of the agricultural economy of the area. There were less than 5,000 head in 1930, says County Agent Cooper. 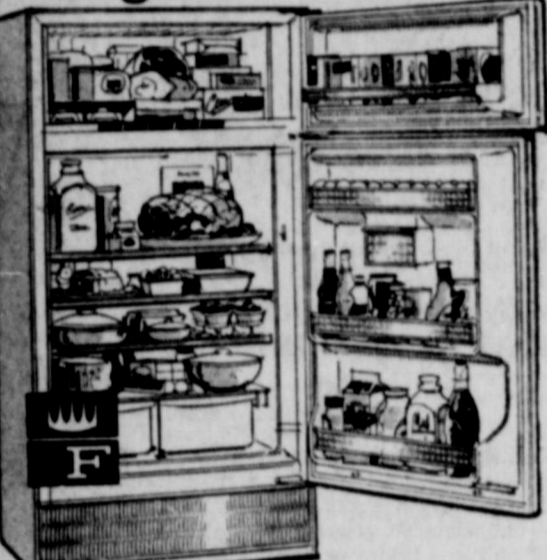

"Fasten your seat belts, please," is a customary warning for airline passengers. But, it's an admonition for motorists, too. Your chances of being killed in an accident increase five times if you are thrown from the vehicle. Using your seat belt can keep you safe. Accident studies show that use of seat belts can eliminate at least one-third of all automobile injuries.

Seat belts are the best low-cost safety feature available for a car, yet many people fail to install and use them. One person may use "claustrophobia" as an excuse for not using seat belts. He may tell you, "If the car should catch fire or submerge, I wouldn't want to be trapped inside."

What this person doesn't realize is that less than one percent of all injury-producing accidents involve fire or submersion. By helping you remain conscious for quick escape, seat belts improve your chances of surviving. They can be unfastened instantly with one hand. And anyone thinking seat belts are strictly for the

## Browsing With Bev

BY Mrs. Beverly Nicholson

Many people think the wattage on an incandescent light bulb indicates the amount of light the bulb will produce. This is not so. Consumer specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Electrification Administration say wattage indicates only the amount of electrical energy the bulb uses.

Although a 100-watt bulb gives more light than a 50-watt, it may not necessarily give twice as much. In fact, a 100-watt usually throws out much more than twice the amount of light of a 50-watt bulb.

So, if you want to get the most light, use one bulb of large wattage rather than two smaller ones that add up to that wattage - providing, of course, distribution of light is not a problem.

The piquant flavor of sour cream gives a magic lift to a variety of foods.

The name sour cream is almost a misnomer, for the commercially prepared sour cream available on today's market is not "sour," but is "cultured." Lactic acid is the "magic" ingredient for making sour cream. It is added to pasteurized and homogenized light sweet cream, and results in a specially controlled, really tasty sour cream.

An excellent way to use sour cream is on a salad of new-crop vegetables. Dairy sour cream may be made a bit smoother and stiffer by whipping slightly. Don't over whip or you may make butter. You may want to stir sour cream into sauces and gravies at the end of cooking, adding only a tablespoon at a time. Heat sour cream gently, but do not boil. Cook sour cream hollandaise-type mixtures over warm, not boiling water, rather than direct heat. These mixtures are good as sauces with cooked vegetables such as broccoli and asparagus, and for garnishing fruit or vegetable salads.

# Desdemona Gets Two Historical Marker Signs

"Two Scotchlight 'Historical Markers in City' signs will be placed on the city limit sign posts of Desdemona by the State of Texas.

Sponsored by the Confederate marking program of the State, these signs are being placed, two to a city, to alert tourists to the Civil War history recorded and contained therein.

RAMP, the Texas State Historical Survey Committee program to Record, Appreciate, Mark, Preserve and Survey Texas history, has as one of its objectives, the stimulation of tourist interest in the towns, cities and regions through which travelers pass.

Desdemona is one of 193 such cities over the state awarded these highway signs. They are contracted by the State Building Commission and erected by the Texas Highway Department. The Texas State Historical Survey Committee is, by law, authorized to name the towns eligible for the signs.

Survey Committee president John Ben Sheppard of Odessa said at the time of this announcement, "Tourists, as a whole, are curious, and if they are aware they are missing something by overlooking a town, the chances are they will take the time to see what it is."

"Making this initial contact which, day and night, attracts attention to the markers in this city as well as the 3,000 other Official Texas Historical Markers over the state."

In the county to determine the number of patrons, both in towns and on rural routes, to find out how many forms are going to be needed. Printing will begin immediately and everyone is being urged to "watch for" the Employment Survey Envelope and be ready to fill it out and return it.

Maddox has assisted in five previous such surveys, Sweetwater, Snyder, Midland, Odessa and Colorado City. He called the industry-seeking business the most competitive in the world. There are some 15,000 organizations actively luring industry, and we need every tool we can get to increase our chances, he said.

"Fortunately," he said, "the trend seems to be toward the smaller towns. I don't know how long this will be true, but things look better for the smaller areas now than ever before."

Preliminary estimates are that some 10,000 questionnaires will be needed. The survey will be handled by mail, with each "package" containing the

question sheet, a cover letter explaining the purpose of the survey, and a postage-paid return envelope.

The mechanics of the survey will include having all the envelopes returned to a post-office box number, from which they will be distributed to the Eastland, Ranger and Cisco chamber offices for tabulation. Final data will be reproduced and made available to each town in the county. The questionnaires will be kept under lock and key, protecting the confidential information given by individuals.

Once begun and after the questionnaires have been dropped into the mail, it's estimated that it will take probably two to three weeks to complete.
