

## Audit Report Shows City Financial Condition Stable

An audit of The City of Ranger, as of April 30 and recently completed by Condley, Morphew & Co., Abilene certified public accountants, shows combined assets of the general fund, interest and redemption fund, water department, general fixed properties and general bonded indebtedness at \$1,517,242.34.

Liabilities, including interest

payable in future years on the city's bonded indebtedness, total \$638,239.24.

Reserves, including uncollected taxes, uncollected accounts and notes receivable were \$94,601.53 on April 30.

Fund balances totaled \$764,401.37 — general fund \$20,323.61; water department fund \$68,384.60, and general fixed properties \$695,693.36.

The audit also shows that on April 30 that the city's general bonded debt totals \$526,940. Interest payable until the date of maturity — 1970 — is \$89,579.80. However, the city has been retiring bonds at discount rates for several years.

During the 1964-65 year \$10,400 worth of bonds were retired at a discount of \$3,402.90. The city also paid interest

totaling \$16,035.33 on bonds outstanding and on bonds purchased.

The city's financial condition and current operating procedures appears stable.

An analysis of revenue shows the comparative figure for the latest audited fiscal year (1964-65) compared with the previous fiscal year (1963-64) noted:

Administrative department 1964-65, \$7,995.20, 1963-64, \$8,365.12, a decrease of \$369.92.

Tax department, \$62,977.43, 1964-65, an increase of \$3,670.38.

Police department, \$3,248.70, 1964-65, a decrease of \$377.57.

Sewer department, \$13,832.35,

1963-64, a decrease of \$121.85.

Garage and shop, \$1,984.23, 1964-65, a gain of \$6.25.

Sanitary department, \$15,865.90, 1964-65, an increase of \$4.90.

Cemetery department, \$1,547.50, 1964-65, a decrease of \$2,165.00.

Other revenue (rural fire aid,

swimming pool, public welfare, sale of fixed property, sundry income), \$2,378.35, \$2,325.35, an increase of \$53.00.

Transfers from Water department, \$20,797.18, \$6,180.17, a gain of \$14,617.01.

The City of Ranger's total revenue for 1964-65 was \$130,628.84 — an increase of \$15,321.20 over the \$115,307.64 (Continued on page 2)

## Ranger Group Appears Before Texas Highway Commission Thursday

A delegation of Ranger citizens, headed by Mayor Morris Newnam, will appear before the Texas Highway Commission in Austin Thursday in a public hearing relative to "Geographies of Interstate 20 around Ranger."

District Highway Dept. Engineer E. M. Pritchard submitted a copy of a resolution of the City of Ranger to D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer in Austin.

The resolution, dated June 17, was acknowledged in a letter dated July 1 from Greer. He informed Mayor Newnam that the Ranger group's hearing probably would be held around 10:30 a. m. The delegation will be No. 8 on the docket, Greer said.

The resolution submitted to the commission was the second passed by the Ranger City Commission. The first was approved by the city governing body on April 15.

**Mrs. Jameson Added To Local Teaching Staff**

James R. Clark, Superintendent of the Ranger Public Schools, this week announced the appointment of Mrs. Kenneth Jameson to the high school faculty roster. She will teach possibly junior and senior English.

A native of Ranger, Mrs. Jameson has taught in the Gordon schools the past five years. She has held teaching positions in Breckenridge, Colony, and Ranger. She taught music, English and reading at Young School in 1935 and 1936.

Mrs. Jameson was graduated from Ranger High School and attended Ranger Junior College. She received her BS degree from Texas Woman's University in 1933. In 1961 she received her Master of Education degree from Hardin - Simmons University in Abilene, where she had a triple major in Education, English, and Guidance. She studied library science at TWU in 1962 and 1963.

Well-known and active in community affairs, Mrs. Jameson served as Executive secretary of the American National Red Cross, Eastland County chapter, for eight years. She is a case worker for the State Department of Public Welfare.

Members of the Ranger High School Band will begin four weeks of pre-school training and practice next Monday, Aug. 1, at 8:30 a. m. in the Band Hall, Sam Burnes, newly appointed director, said Wednesday.

All students, Burnes added, should bring their instruments and be prepared to stay until 11 a. m.

"The school," the new director explained, "will emphasize marching and music preparation for the football season. There will be some concert music worked on as well as some sight-reading."

Band officers and student drill instructors are also to be elected during the initial Monday session. Formation of a color guard also will be discussed.

Uniforms will be issued during the school, Burnes said. At the end of the four-week basic training period a squad will be chosen by the band director and the drill instructors of the top squad will be honored.

Burnes, a graduate of McMurry College, Abilene, formerly was a member of that college's band and prior to that time he was a member of the Abilene High School Band. He also served as a student band instructor at Cooper High School, Abilene.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. V. R. Burnes of Abilene and a 1960 graduate of Abilene High School. He attended Texas Tech, Lubbock, for one year prior to entering McMurry where he received a degree as a music major.

Burnes plays the saxophone, clarinet, string base, percussion and oboe.

He is married and he and his wife celebrated their first wedding anniversary Monday, July 26. Mrs. Burnes is the former Miss Janice Day, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Day of Gorman.

The Ranger group is petitioning the commission to grant two additional access interchanges on proposed Interstate 20 south of Ranger.

Members of the commission who will hear the plea of the local delegation include Herbert C. Petry Jr., chairman, Hal Woodward and J. H. Kuitgen.

Prefacing an appearance before the state group, Mayor Newnam called a meeting of landowners Monday night at City Hall to discuss details of the request for the additional interchanges.

Whereas, the city of Ranger, Eastland County, Texas recognizes the critical need for interchanges and service roads on and along Interstate Highway 20 around the south side of the city, and

Whereas, the elimination of service roads and interchanges will perpetrate extreme hardship and loss of needed revenue to the city of Ranger, and

Whereas, preliminary Master Plan studies of the thoroughfare system in and around Ranger indicate a need for interchanges and service roads, and

RANGER'S DELEGATION down at the public hearing before the Texas Highway Commission Thursday morning will present some enlightening and startling facts to the body. There are 41 businesses located on the stretch of U. S. Highway 89 from Ranger Hill out to the point. Twenty-nine of these firms are highway service type. Highway business is handled by 61 employees who draw a total of \$164,700 annually. Their unemployment will affect the jobs of 35 other workers employed in Ranger.

Tax revenue from the firms on U. S. Highway 89 is approximately 10 per cent of the total tax revenue of the City of Ranger. The loss to Ranger Independent School district will be nearly as severe. As a matter of fact these Highway 89 business firm taxes mean about \$12,000 per year to the city and to the school district.

Street department, \$31,531.24, \$23,878.13, a gain of \$7,653.11. Sewer department, \$1,465.98, \$1,418.39, an increase of \$47.59. Cemetery department, \$3,691.28, \$4,328.17, a decrease of \$636.89. Sanitary department, \$6,530.37, \$6,653.00, a decrease of \$122.63. Tax department, \$5,680.05, \$4,827.05, an increase of \$853.00. Municipal swimming pool,

\$3,077.11, \$3,358.28, a decrease of \$281.17. Library and community club, \$1,103.40, \$896.73, a gain of \$206.67. The city's total 1964-65 revenue totaled \$130,826.84. Expenditures were \$109,345.65, leaving excess revenue over expenditures the sum of \$30,281.19.



## Browsing With Bev

Nonfat dry milk and skim milk are among the many dairy foods in abundance now as the nation observes June Dairy Month.

These forms of milk actually are whole milk with most of the fat removed.

Skim milk is sold in containers, house-to-house or at nearly all dairy counters, just as other fluid milks. It needs to be refrigerated to stay at its fresh best. Skim milk may be used just as whole milk, as a beverage or in cooking. You may choose this form of milk to reduce calories or cost of the finished dish.

Nonfat dry milk is the powdered form of skim milk. It is convenient to store on the pantry shelf, safe to tote on warm weather outings, easy to use at a moment's notice, and usually is a "best buy" for the economy-minded shopper.

When reconstituted with water, it too can be used in place of whole milk. Or, add the powder to a recipe, along with other dry ingredients, and add water with other liquids. Try instant nonfat dry milk in your own Pancake Mix.

This is a dry mix that you can prepare ahead of time and keep in a tightly covered container until used. For mix that will make 10 to 12 pancakes, you'll need 1½ cups flour, 3 tablespoons sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1

teaspoon salt and ½ cup instant nonfat dry milk. Sift together the flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Then mix in the dry milk and put in tight container until you want to use it.

To make the pancakes, add 1½ cups water, 2 eggs and 3 tablespoons melted butter.

Combine the water, eggs and butter, add mix and blend well. Pour about one-third cup batter for each pancake onto hot buttered griddle. When bubbles appear, turn and bake other side. Serve with butter, syrup, apple sauce, cottage cheese or other toppings.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, that Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and except in the first election following each re-apportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for which he was elected has less than one year remaining.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. In the event the Constitutional Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 are included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall be and remain in full force and effect and shall be proclaimed and submitted to the electorates in November, 1966, as provided in said House Joint Resolution No. 1.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 81 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 51-a and Section 51-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least 25 years, needy persons under the age of sixty-five (65) who are totally and permanently disabled and who are citizens of the United States, and needy blind persons over the age of eighteen (18) who are citizens of the United States, and needy children under the age of twenty-one (21) years who are citizens of the United States and to the caretakers of such children; providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

"(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may define the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount of State funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of State funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of the Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care for the: (1) needy aged; (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind; and (4) needy children and the caretakers of such children; authorizing the Legislature to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of such needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes; provided that the amounts expended out of State funds to and/or on behalf of individuals shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of Federal funds; providing that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of State funds shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and providing further that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of State funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000). Providing that nothing in the Amendment shall be construed to amend, modify, or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of the Constitution."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.
