## Peanut Farmers Urged To Attend Association Meet

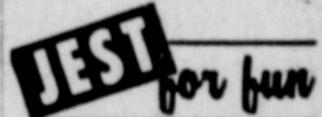

# Woman, Slain and Scalped By Indians, Is Buried at Alameda in 1860

One of the oldest graves of early pioneers is located in Eastland County's Alameda Cemetery, located in the Eastern part of the county.

The year was 1860 — back more than a century ago.

This section of then-frontier Texas was teeming with unbranded Longhorns and the meager remnants of a fast-diminishing buffalo population. Human inhabitants included a sparse number of hardy pioneers and more than a few savage Comanche Indians whose bloody raids, looting and pillaging kept the white settlers in constant peril.

One of the frontier homes—a log cabin — was located near the Leon River below the site of the present Lake Leon Dam on land of W. H. Mansker one of the earliest settlers in this area.

Its occupants were Mrs. Martha Coffee, her husband and their eight-month-old baby — one of those typical pioneer families who braved the dangers of the wilderness to

establish a home and to toil in the soil.

The Coffees' modest cabin — ironically — was built on acreage which earlier had been the site of a Comanche camp before the thinning buffalo population and the invading white settlers forced most of the red men to migrate to hunting and camping grounds elsewhere.

Late one afternoon in 1860, according to Mrs. Ethel Brooks Gilmore of Ranger, Eastland County historian, Mrs. Coffee left the cabin to go down into a nearby draw where her beautiful filly was pastured. She planned to bring the horse up to the cabin.

But she never made it. Nor did the filly.

From ambush a band of Comanche renegades stealthily watched the attractive young farm woman approach.

And they saw another fine prize — the beautiful filly tethered only a few yards from their lair.

Her long skirt swishing as she walked, Mrs. Coffee entered the draw unaware of her impending doom. Suddenly,

the whooping savages, in war paint and wielding deadly tomahawks, sprang out of the brush and grabbed her roughly. She screamed in terror, but a red hand quickly moved to her face, clamped tightly over her mouth.

For a few seconds she kicked, squirmed, scratched desperately at her tormentors, then several tomahawks tore into the woman's body and she crumpled to the ground, bleeding heavily as she breathed her last. Moments later she was scalped, and the Comanches took the filly and galloped away on their spotted ponies.

While this bloody tragedy was unfolding, her husband lay helpless — seriously ill — in the nearby cabin with the couple's infant child.

A short time later when neighbors brought food to the cabin — as they had been do-

ing during Mr. Coffee's illness — they found him in bed with a burning fever and in a semi-conscious state. The baby was crawling around on the floor and crying lustily.

Concerned with the absence of Mrs. Coffee, the neighbors began a search of the area around the couple's rustic dwelling.

It was only a few minutes before they ventured down toward the Leon River and made the shocking discovery. Her battered body and the hoof prints of Comanche ponies told the stark, tragic story.

Mrs. Coffee was buried on a gravel knoll on land which was later to become the present Alameda Cemetery, and a large slab of sandstone was placed over the grave. In later years — no one knows when — the slab cracked, almost in the middle. An acorn apparently was blown into the

crevice in the sandstone and from this grew an oak tree — now of tremendous size.

Forty-two years later, sometime in 1902, Mrs. Gilmore re-
