## Threat to Kill Ex-Husband In Ranger Lands Dallas Woman In County Jail

A tall brunette woman from Dallas, about 40, was arrested and jailed in Ranger late Sunday afternoon on charges of carrying a concealed weapon for the alleged purpose of killing her former husband.

It was the second time the Dallasite had been picked up by local police. A week earlier, armed with a knife, she had been apprehended and sent back to Dallas by bus only a few hours after her arrival in Ranger.

She wasn't that lucky, however, on her avowed homicidal mission.

In a Monday morning hearing before Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood her bond was set at \$1,000 and at mid-morning she was transferred to the Eastland County jail at Eastland in custody of Sheriff Lefty Sublett.

Woman Killed In 2-Car Crash On Highway 80

Mrs. Mildred Ann Hurley, 45-year-old Fort Worth woman, was killed Sunday about 4:45 p. m. in a two-car collision which seriously injured four other persons two miles south of Gordon on U. S. Highway 80 east of Ranger.

Also injured were her husband Frank, 47, and her 10-year-old son Charles. Hurley, a disabled World War II veteran, was in poor condition in the Mineral Wells hospital with head injuries.

The Hurleys were returning to Fort Worth from a New Mexico vacation, relatives said.

Mrs. Hurley, a native of Grandview, worked as an information clerk in the Greyhound Bus Lines in Fort Worth for 20 years.

## Gordon Rancher Heads District Organization Of Sheep, Goat Raisers

Officers of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association met at Mineral Wells Friday for a meeting with North Central Texas goat and sheep raisers, and ranchers. Some thirty were present at the session from Palo Pinto, Eastland and other counties.

Perry Horton, of Mineral Wells, who has been serving as chairman of District 10, was host and presided at the morning session. Lionel Bevan, Jr., of Gordon, was named chairman of the district to succeed Horton.

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association officers speak for some 20,000 sheep and goat people and is the only organization in Texas that represents the industry. Headquarters is in San Angelo.

Gaylord Hankins, of Rock Springs, president, told members at the morning session, that the organization favored the constitutional amendment that allowed 29 state senators and that, if adopted, it would give the rural areas more representation.

He also suggested that it was vital that the sheep and goat raisers promote the use of wool and mohair and that they keep products made from them before the public through advertising. It is very necessary that wool and mohair have the voice of advertising, Hankins said.

He also cited some of the organizations recent work in the field of legislation, both state and at national levels, as he estimated that 80 per cent of the organization's work was to protect the interest of the ranching industry.

The officers were meeting in the North Central area in an effort to increase interest in wool and mohair, and to call attention to the vast growth of the industry in this area the past fifteen years — and the suitability of sheep and goats in this ranching county to improve the range for cattle raising.

## School Tax Rate Unchanged For Upcoming Year

The school tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation for the coming year was re-approved by the trustees of the Ranger Independent School District during a called meeting Tuesday night.

The \$1.50 rate, according to the Ranger public school system, remains unchanged from past years.

The tax assessment is divided with 35 cents earmarked for the interest and sinking fund and \$1.15 for local maintenance. This will bring in less money next school year Clark said since valuations have fallen off about \$20,000.

In other action Tuesday night the board held a budget hearing on the proposed 1965-66 budget but will not take any final action until November.

## Grand Jury Indicts Hall Murder With Malice

A 1st District Court grand jury returned an indictment for murder with malice Monday against Robert Lee Hall, 25-year-old Eastland resident, who is in County Jail, charged with the July 29th slaying of his brother Johnny Hall, 22.

The grand jury went into session Monday morning and District Judge J. Frank Sparks requested the 12 to consider the murder charge first. District Attorney Perry Brown stated that the death

penalty probably will not be sought because of circumstances surrounding the shooting which occurred at an East Main St. moving firm.

The grand jury spent most of Tuesday morning considering the cases of six Ranger youths — ranging in age from 17 to 21 — who have been charged with theft of tires, wheels and automotive parts in Ranger last weekend. The six are each under \$1,000 bond. The loot, recovered by Ranger city and county officers, included seven tires and wheels, one manifold, one generator, one starter and a box of mechanics tools.

Hall is being held in county jail, having been denied bond by Justice of the Peace Wes Dalton. Johnny Hall died from a .38 caliber revolver wound sustained at 3 p.m. Thursday, July 29, at the offices of the moving firm where both he and his brother were employed.

that if a radio station taped any football games for rebroadcast later that beer or alcoholic beverage ads could not be used in conjunction with the broadcast. Interscholastic rules prohibit such ads.

It was also stipulated in the minutes that Ranger Public Schools will participate in National Defense Education Act funds in which the Federal government pays half the cost of math, science and geography supplies and to take part in Title I and II laws.

Clark reported that all buses were insured for fire, theft, and windstorm damage and also for property damage liability and combined additional coverage in the amounts of \$10,000, \$20,000, \$5,000 and \$500 medical.

Purchase orders will be used on all local and out-of-town school purchases beginning September 1, Clark said, and merchants are asked not to charge to any class, club, group or teacher without a signed purchase order. This will not restrict any class or club in spending their funds but will insure that the purchase is authorized and recorded. It also protects the merchant, he said.

## Hunting, Fishing Licenses Due At Dealers Sept. 1

AUSTIN — The annual scramble for hunting and fishing licenses will be eased this fall by earlier shipment of the permits to the approximately 2500 dealers throughout the state.

Bill Marks of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department staff, said arrangements have been advanced to have all licenses in the hands of dealers well before the new state fiscal year begins September 1.

The total consignments will comprise 775,000 fishing licenses and 736,000 hunting licenses of which 175,000 will be exempt hunting licenses.

In the past, efforts to make last-minute delivery to avoid conflict with the old license routine caused some inconvenience among sportsmen and also a sizeable problem for the harassed dealers, said Marks.

"We expect to have the licenses in the mail very shortly," said Marks. "Of course, there will be the usual rare instances of unreceived shipments, unavoidable in handling the great number of parcels, but the extra time will help us adjust these cases."

Marks wanted to make it clear that the new licenses will not be good until September 1 and that the old licenses will be invalid after this date.

Sale of hunting and fishing licenses provides more than half of the revenue needed to finance departmental operations, including costs of the vast experimental projects leading toward better luck for angler and better shooting for the hunter.

The ordinary sports fishing license cost \$2.15 and the resident hunting license \$3.15. There are numerous exemptions, such as for those under 17 and older than 85 years. But in the case of deer hunting, these privileged persons need a special exempt license to provide the proper tags, which may be obtained for an issuance fee of 25 cents per license.
