City Commission Lauds Legislators With Resolution

A resolution commending the work of Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells and Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge during the 59th Texas Legislature was unanimously adopted by members of the Ranger City Commission during the body's regular meeting Thursday night at City Hall.

In another action during the meeting, the commissioners raised the city's arson reward to \$250. The reward, according to the ordinance, would be paid out of the general fund of the City of Ranger.





RESCUE RACE—This contest involves one person on horseback "rescuing" another on foot. The contestant on horseback races from the starting line, circles the barrel, helps pull the other member of the two-person team up on the horse behind the saddle, then races for the finish line. Both must cross the finish line on horseback.

GOAT SACKING—A team of

two must catch a goat in the arena, put it in a sack, and deliver it to the Judge. The best time wins.

POLE BENDING—Several poles are set up in a straight line. The contestant gets a running start and weaves the horse through the lines of poles to the last one, through the poles to the finish line.

WILD COW MILKING—

There will be four girls to each cow. Each cow will be turned out of the chute at the same time with a rope around her head. After the cows cross the starting line, the three girls hold the cow any way they please while the fourth girl milks the cow in a bottle and ten takes the bottle to the judge in the middle of the ring.



Ranger Resident Is Oldest Social Security Beneficiary in Area--Is 1 of Only 2 Originals

Phillip H. S. Williams, 92-year-old Ranger resident, is the only person in Eastland County who received a social security check for January 1940 — the first month that monthly benefits were payable — according to H. L. Weatherly, Social Security field representative for Eastland County.

Only two such persons still survive in the 14-county Abilene District in this "Club of Original Beneficiaries". And now, there are only 1,961 of these charter members.

Except for about 7 months during World War II when he returned to work, Williams has received a check for ev-

ery month since January, 1940. Williams' first check, January 1940, was for \$26.46 per month; his current rate is \$65.00 per month. Now another raise has been made in social security by the 1965 amendments, and Williams' \$65.00 will be increased by 7% to \$69.60 effective Jan., 1965.

Williams will get the regular check of \$65.00 on Sept. 3. On about September 20, he will receive a check for \$36.90, the increase for the months, January 1965 thru August 1965. Then on October 3, 1965, the new rate of \$69.60. No action by Williams is necessary. This will automatically be sent.

However, he will have to take specific action on the medical insurance part of the health benefits as provided in the 1965 amendments. He, as well as all other social security and railroad retirement beneficiaries are automatically covered by the hospital part, but he must make a voluntary choice as to the medical portion. He and the other 15 million age 65 beneficiaries will get full and complete information by mail before the end of the year.

Williams now resides at Western Manor Nursing Home in Ranger. A native of Kentucky, he came to Ranger in 1920 and was employed by the Stanolind Pipe Line Co. as a telegraph operator. Williams lived at Graford and Mineral Wells prior to moving back to Ranger in December, 1960. Until recently he had made his home with his son, T. F. Williams of

Ranger. He enjoys his pipe, loafing, watching TV, and reading history books.

Social security records are confidential, but in order to acquaint others with the provisions of the 1965 amendments, Williams gave permission to present this information for the benefit of the public.
