

## City Commission Lauds Legislators With Resolution

A resolution commending the work of Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells and Rep. Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge during the 59th Texas Legislature was unanimously adopted by members of the Ranger City Commission during the body's regular meeting Thursday night at City Hall.

In another action during the meeting, the commissioners raised the city's arson reward to \$250. The reward, according to the ordinance, would be paid out of the general fund of the City of Ranger.

The commission authorized Mayor Morris Newnam to execute a commission for John D. Clements Jr., as a

new patrolman in the Ranger Police Department. Clements fills a vacancy created by the resignation of Bill Bollinger, now working with the Ranger post office.

During the evening, members of the commission also approved payment of routine bills.

## College Gets \$27,600 For Student Aid

The U. S. Office of Education has approved an allocation totaling \$27,600 for Ranger Junior College, Congressman Omar Burleson announced today in funding D. C.

The money is going to the college to be used in unding loans to students under the National Defense Education Act.

Under the act, passed in 1958, students may borrow money and pay it back over a 10-year period after graduation. The government puts up nine-tenths and the school one-tenth of the loan. Maximum loan to a student is \$1,000 although the average is around \$400.

Two other area colleges also received similar student loan allocations — Tarleton State College, Stephenville, \$63,504, and Cisco Junior College, \$16,789.

## Ranger's 'Candy Strippers' Valued Community Service Organization

One of the newest organizations in Ranger High School is the Future Nurses Club, which was organized in 1963. Future Nurses Clubs date back as far as the early 1920's, but the largest number of clubs have been organized since 1950. Now there are active clubs in all of the fifty states, in Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

The Ranger Chapter of the Future Nurses Club is at the present time a local organization, but in the near future may be a part of the state and national association. An advisory committee helps to plan the work for the year.

This committee is composed of Mrs. Mary Jacobs and Mrs. Francis Cox of Ranger General Hospital; Mrs. Ruby Hulbert of Ranger High School, and Mrs. D. E. Puller and Mrs. Dortha Harris.

Officers of the club for the year are Carol Drennan, president; Dixie Hodges, vice president; Cecelia Camacho, second vice president; Janey Johnson, secretary-treasurer;

Janice Black, reporter, and Sherry Sullivan, historian.

These girls range from seniors to freshmen. They each have devoted three or more hours a week to work as volunteer Candy Strippers in the Ranger General Hospital and the Western Manor Nursing Home and have worked during the summers and holidays for three years.

## Dallas Woman Freed From Jail and Charges Dropped, JP Reports

A 46-year-old Dallas woman, jailed on a charge of threatening to kill her ex-husband, was released late Wednesday to the custody of West Virginia relatives.

Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood of Ranger told this newspaper Thursday that the complaint against the woman had been dropped. She was being held in the Eastland County jail. Her bond had been set at \$1,000 by Justice Underwood.

He said that the woman, who was arrested here last weekend with a .22 caliber revolver in her possession, had to be released due to her poor physical condition.

A physician, the JP said, recommended that she be released into "responsible custody." Underwood said the doctor had warned that the woman "might die" if she remained in confinement.

The woman's former husband is employed near Ranger on a pipeline construction project. He resides in a motel on U. S. Highway 80 east.

The Dallasite's arrest here last weekend was her second visit to Ranger for the avowed purpose of killing her ex-spouse. During her first brief stay here a week earlier, she was armed with a knife. Officers, notified of her verbal threats in public places, took her into custody and sent her back to Dallas on an eastbound bus.

"I don't believe the woman will be coming back to Ranger," JP Underwood said Thursday. "Those few days in jail Wednesday in Washington an important lesson."

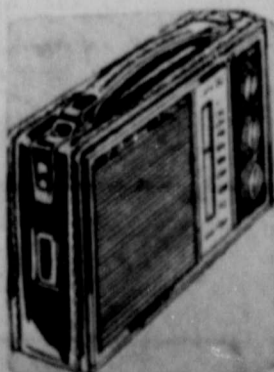

**Ranger Resident Is Oldest Social Security Beneficiary in Area -- Is 1 of Only 2 Originals**

Philip H. S. Williams, 92-year-old Ranger resident, is the only person in Eastland County who received a social security check for January 1940 — the first month that monthly benefits were payable — according to H. L. Weatherly, Social Security field representative for Eastland County.

Only two such persons still survive in the 14-county Abilene District in this "Club of Original Beneficiaries". And nation-wide, there are only 1,961 of these charter members.

Except for about 7 months during World War II when he returned to work, Williams has received a check for every month since January, 1940.

Williams' first check, January 1940, was for \$26.46 per month; his current rate is \$65.00 per month. Now another raise has been made in social security by the 1965 amendments, and Williams' \$65.00 will be increased by 7% to \$69.60 effective Jan., 1965.

Williams will get the regular check of \$65.00 on Sept. 3. On about September 20, he will receive a check for \$36.90 the increase for the months, January 1965 thru August 1965. Then on October 3, 1965, the new rate of \$69.60. No action by Williams is necessary. This will automatically be sent to him.

However, he will have to take specific action on the medical insurance part of the health benefits as provided in the 1965 amendments. He, as well as all other social security and railroad retirement beneficiaries are automatically covered by the hospital part, but he must make a voluntary choice as to the medical portion. He and the other 15 million age 65 beneficiaries will get full and complete information by mail before the end of the year.

Williams now resides at Western Manor Nursing Home in Ranger. A native of Kentucky, he came to Ranger in 1920 and was employed by the Stanolind Pipe Line Co. as a telegraph operator. Williams lived at Grafard and Mineral Wells prior to moving back to Ranger in December, 1960. Until recently he had made his home with his son, T. F. Williams of
