

Schools Open Monday; Enrollment Decreases

Enrollment in the Ranger Public Schools totaled 569 the first day of school, Supt. James R. Clark reports. On September 8 last year the total enrollment was 617 he said, which is a decrease of 48 students. The total enrollment last May was 609.

Enrollment is expected to reach 575 Clark said before it begins to decrease later this year due to people moving.

The enrollment by grades 63 in the first, 48 in the second, and 50 in the third for a total of 161 in Hodges Oak Park Primary School under Principal Larry Hunt.

Principal Boone Yarbrough of Young Elementary reports 52 the first day in the fourth, 53 in the fifth and 45 in the sixth for a total enrollment of 150.

In Ranger Junior - Senior High School Principal James W. Childress reports he enrolled 298 the first day. He had 62 in the seventh, 60 in the eighth, 44 in the ninth, 49 in the tenth, 38 in the eleventh, and 45 seniors.

Clark said he expects the total enrollment to be about 25 under last September when all are enrolled.

Three teachers were lost to the system this year due to decrease in enrollment he said. One was lost to Hodges and one to the High School. The other loss will be absorbed by local taxes and the teacher paid from local tax funds.

It is expected that the State will drop another teacher from their aid next school year Clark said unless our attendance and enrollment both pick up this year. The number of teacher units paid for by the State depends on your Average Daily Attendance.

Tuesday 214 meals were served at Hodges Cafeteria and 140 at Young. The Junior and Senior High School eats at Hodges after the Primary has eaten. Total meals served Tuesday was 354 including the adults.

Last year on this day 191 ate at Hodges and 142 at Young. This is 333 compared with 354 this year.

Ranger's starting offensive unit will average 176 pounds.

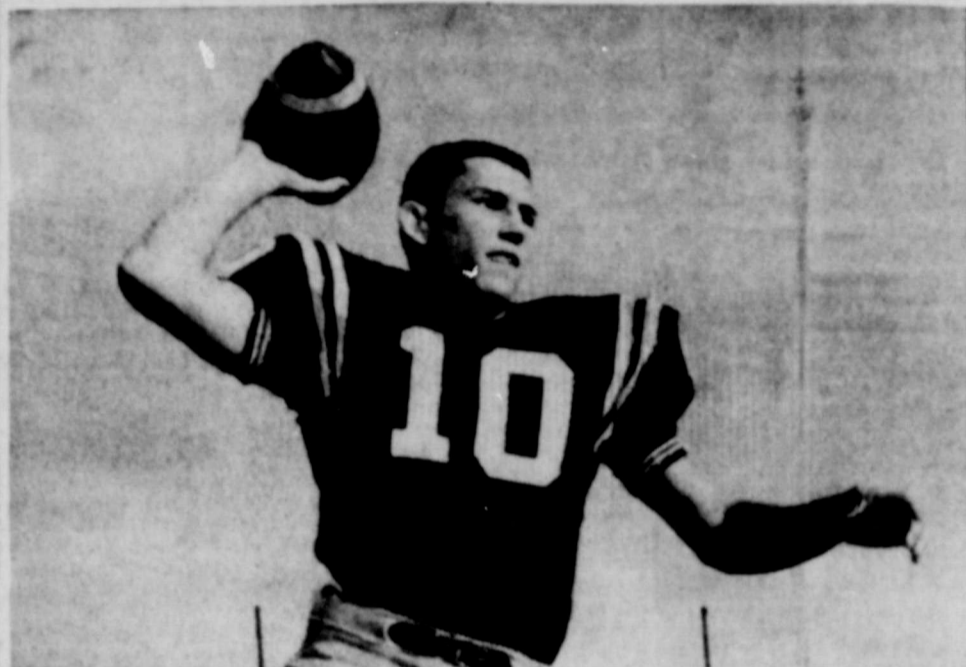
The backs average 167 and the forward wall, 180 pounds.

Linal Niske won first in the goat scramble, Calvert was

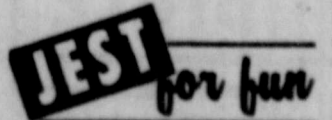
second, and Vicki Duvall was third.

Most People 65 To Be Eligible For Medicare

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series for our readers prepared by R. E. Tuley, Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration at Abilene.)

The health insurance benefits in the 1965 amendments, popularly called "Medicare," set to go into effect as Hospital Insurance Benefits and as Medical Insurance Benefits, will become available to almost everyone who will reach age 65 before 1968.

Hospitalization provisions will mean that after the patient pays a \$40 deductible, the rest of his hospital costs during the first 90 days of that spell of sickness will be paid for him if he is in a participating hospital and the bill is based on reasonable costs. For the next 90 days he must pay or arrange for \$10 per day of the costs himself. After 90 days of hospitalization during one spell of sickness, no further such costs are payable for him. However, after at least 60 days of not being hospitalized or in an extended care facility, he is again eligible for such benefits after again paying the \$40 deductible.

Medical provisions will mean that, if he has properly signed up for this and is paying, or having paid for him, the \$3 per month charge, 80 per cent of charges from a physician for his services at office, home, clinic or hospital can be paid each year, following his payment of the first \$50 of such costs.

These two programs go into effect July 1, 1966. All beneficiaries of social security or railroad retirement are automatically insured for the hospitalization and will receive a special mailing of information on both coverages in late September or early October. All others over age 65 should get in touch with a social security office (or state welfare office if receiving old-age assistance only) soon after September 1.

The medical benefits must be applied for between September 1, 1965 and March 31, 1966 if age 65 is reached before January 1, 1966. As persons reach age 65 in the future, they must apply within 3 months before or after their 65th birthday. Leaflets giving more details are now available from your social security office.

Parks, Wildlife Dept. Sets Sept. 13 Hearing

Hunters, fishermen, landowners and other citizens of Eastland County have been assured an opportunity to participate in a modern, scientific program of fish and wildlife management by recent Acts of the 59th Legislature.

The 59th Legislature included this county in the Regulatory Responsibility Program of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, the laws becoming effective on August 30, 1965. This legislation has re-approval.

The new laws specifically charge the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission with the responsibility of conducting scientific research on game and fish problems, setting of open seasons, bag limits, and methods of taking wildlife resources in the county or counties involved.

A principal objective of the regulatory responsibility program incorporates adaptability and flexibility to meet emergencies such as drought, flood, fire or other causes which may endanger one or more species of wildlife by waste or depletion. The Commission can act in the interest of ranchmen, landowners and the hunting and fishing public to conserve the threatened wildlife species without waiting for normal Legislative procedure.

The Commission can act also to provide a more lenient cropping of the wildlife resources when research findings indicate an increased harvest is justified and in the interest of proper management.

Residents of Eastland County will be informed of the findings from research conducted by game and fish technicians, game wardens and other resource specialists of the Commission. Before the Parks and Wildlife Commission issues the required proclamations containing open seasons, bag limits, and other rules and regulations for harvesting the county's wildlife resources, a public hearing will be held in Eastland County Monday, Sept. 13, at the courthouse.

At the public hearing, the proposed regulations will be read and explained to those present by Parks and Wildlife Department personnel. Pertinent questions the public may have will be answered. The full proceedings will be recorded and presented to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission when that body meets to prepare regulations for taking game and fish in the affected county.

Although the statutes grant the Commission and Department at least 90 days after the acts become effective in which to "conclude its investigations, hold its hear-

throughout the county as a tool to lure prospective industry to the county.

And citizens are reminded once again that the questionnaires are not applications for jobs — but inquiries as to who is available for work, and what skills and talents are possessed by countians who want to go to work, so that an accurate, up-to-date report can be made and used to attract industry here.

Forms were mailed to all postal, utility and other patrons in the county, and forms have been repeatedly printed in county newspapers to facilitate availability. Postage-paid, addressed envelopes were included with the prepared mailed-out questionnaires, and persons who use the newspaper-printed forms may address them to the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, post office box number 146, Eastland.

All towns in the county are assisting with the survey, with officials urging residents in each to participate in the survey. The Ranger, Cisco and Eastland chambers of commerce are sharing the cost expected to be some \$700 or \$800, it is reported.

In initiating the survey, officials from all the towns met and discussed the program, agreeing that such a survey will help all parties in securing industry, and that any industry locating any where in the county, will benefit the entire county.

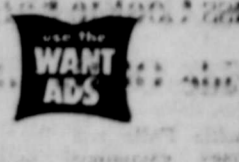

DOVE HUNTING BEGINS FOR REGION ON SEPT. 1

AUSTIN. — The best dressed dove hunters won't have anything to worry about except the hot sun and possibly a marauding rattler or so because reports to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department are that the favorite state game bird is normally abundant for the north zone opener September 1.

As the headquarters troops view the sharpest hunters:

He will have an official "dove" map, indicating the North and South zones and all about daily and possession bag limits (12 and 4) except in the Rio Grande Valley white-winged zone where he may add ten white wings to that bag, all to be harvested afternoons only. These maps are available at license dealers or from Department field personnel or local offices.

He certainly will have permission of the land owner to hunt and, very wisely, will have the bigness of heart to leave a mess of doves for host, picked and dressed if possible.

He will know about leaving one feathered wing on each dove, under Federal regulation bag limits (12 and 4) existing on his own land or in the county of residence, or unless he is over 65 or under 17 years of age.

He will know about the rules of safety and take along a canteen of water (only) which even though warm can work wonders when dabbed on a sweating brow.

And he will know that the wear and tear may be curbed by concentrating on the late evening and very definitely in the area of food or water, or both.

Above all he will possess the will power to cease firing

Area Lions Project Helps Chile's Needy

In August 1964, a project in international relations was established by the more than 2,700 Lions of District 2-E-1, Lions International, under the leadership of the immediate past District Governor James McCracken, Cisco, and Dr. D. L. Ligon, Counselor and Director of international relations for the district, Wichita Falls. Every Lion in the District was given an opportunity to contribute \$1 to the project.

The project was a cooperative venture with the Lions International CARE Committee and CARE, Inc., and it was entitled "Lions of District 2-E-1 - DO CARE." An early decision was made to send as many CARE food packages as possible to an area in Chile.

Late in the year it was learned that certain areas of that great country were in need of many materials and equipment that would be of assistance in a longer range self-sustaining program which included medical supplies for school children and adults, sewing machines, hearing aids for the Santiago Lions Hearing Clinic, etc. Acting upon

the advice of the Chilean director of CARE and others these supplies assisted in the Andino Plan department of Arica, Tarajaca Province.

Eventually the sum of \$1,733.15 was contributed voluntarily by Lions in 37 clubs, and the materials were sent by CARE to the Lions Club for Arica for distribution.

Present at the ceremony to receive the CARE packages on July 3, 1965, were Lions District Governor Carlos Villadosola, Ram Copaja, local club president; Dr. Jaime Ve-

Plan Andino of Arica; Miguel Bandilla, director of the Angel Gardillo, representative of UNESCO, and advisor for rural education; members of the local Lions Clubs and various other high government officials.

Lions Clubs in District 2-E-1 participating in this international relations project included: Burkburnett, Chillicothe, Electra, Vernon, Rowie, Iowa Park Noon, Iowa Park Evening, Nocona, Wichita Falls, Evening, Wichita Falls Downtown, Wichita Falls Southwest, Abilene Westgate, Abilene Elmwood West, Abilene Evening, South Taylor, Albany, Anson, Breckenridge, Hamlin, Lueders, Rule, Stamford, Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Strawn, Archer City, Bryson, Graham, Holliday, John Olney, Throckmorton, Knox City, Munday, etc.

Dr. Ligon, of University, left the district again in this capacity. He reports that members of the district have approved participation in a similar project for 1965-66, and the memory of past Governor Hamlin, Texas. "This project relations could be so successful a cooperative effort. They made it a task. It has tremendous experience who participated."

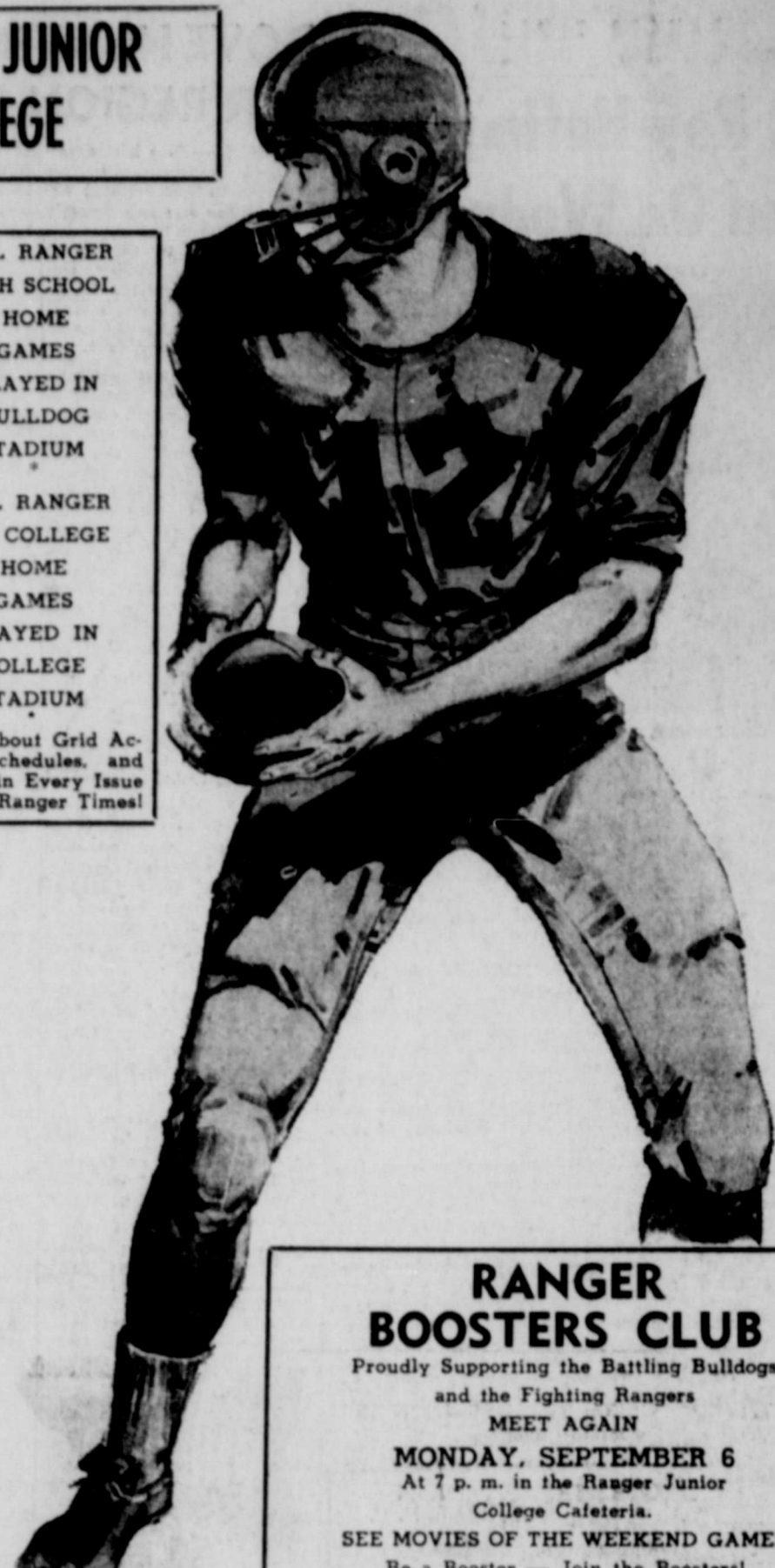
