RHS ELEVEN UPSETS CISCO LOBOES, 15-13 IN SEASON OPENER

The statistics and the scoreboard didn't jibe Friday night at Bulldog Stadium when the final gun ceased action in a non-conference grid clash between the Ranger High Bulldogs and the Cisco High Lobos.

The underdog single A Maroon & White squad of new Coach Gerald Cumpton, doped to lose their debut tilt to the double A Ciscoans, cashed breaks and showed defensive might in strategic clutches to edge their longtime rivals, 15-13.

But the stats were lopsided in the losers favor. The Ciscoans amassed 236 offensive yards and 15 first downs while Ranger was credited with six firsts and only 101 yards on their ground and air assaults.

The difference came in the misc department. Ranger intercepted two Lobo passes — one of them good for a TD — and recovered a pair of Cisco fumbles. In addition, while Cisco was able to connect on only one of seven aerial tries, Ranger fared better, completing four of eleven.

A poor punting average and seven penalties for 62 minus yards also handicapped the game Bulldogs who apparently weren't concerned with the statistics.

The Bulldogs, trailing 7-0 midway in the second period, capped a drive launched from the Cisco 44 with a 17-yard screen pass from Quarterback Johnny McGee to Halfback Larry Blackwell for Ranger's first TD. End Jerry Watson split the uprights.

Halfback Larry Hargrave crashed over center for two and a first down on the 30. Anderson blitzed over right tackle for nine. Operating from their own 39, Hargrave was spilled for a 5-yard loss, then on next play Ranger's alert Brown intercepted a Cisco pass and scampered 20 yards to score.

Brown, on the conversion, scooted over for the two extra points.

WILD LIFE HEARING IS SEPT. 13th

A public hearing will be held Monday, Sept. 13, at the courthouse, concerning the Acts of the 59th Legislature in regards to fish and wild-life management.

This Legislature included Eastland County in the Regulatory Responsibility Program of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, laws becoming effective on Aug. 30, 1965.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has the responsibility of conducting scientific research on game and fish problems, setting of open seasons and bag limits.

Important questions asked by the public at this hearing will be answered and Eastland Counties will be informed of the findings from research conducted by game and fish technicians, game wardens and other resource specialists of the Commission.

94 GRIDMEN REPORT FOR FIRST FOOTBALL ACTION OUT AT RJC

The 1965 football season got underway September 1 at Ranger Junior College with 94 youths reporting for the initial workout, according to Jack Duvall, head football coach.

The squad has a nucleus of twelve lettermen from the 1964 crew — Joe Fitzgerald, Big Sandy, quarterback; Dale Fruge, Eunice, Louisiana, tackle; Tony Jackson Sabine, tackle (All Conference Center 1964); Bob Taylor Houston, guard; Calvin Bolton, Longview, fullback; Johnny Sarabia, Fort Stockton running back; Johnny DeMaria, McCamey, fullback; Johnny Camacho, Ranger, guard; Doug Browning, Ranger, tackle; Earl Ray Reynolds, Brownwood, halfback; Don Carter, Sweeny, end; and Terry Barrett, Orange, halfback.

Coach Duvall and his staff are directing three workouts a day: 7 and 11:30 a.m. and 3 p. m. Then at 7 p. m. skull sessions are held. Spirit is good, and both coaches and players are working hard in anticipation of the first game of the season, the non-conference opener against Cisco Junior College on September 11 in the Ranger Junior College Stadium.

Assistant coaches are Ron Butler, O. C. (Stubby) Warden, and Jack Allen.

The Ranger Junior College football team opens its 1965 season Saturday, September 11, in a pre-season, non-conference game against Cisco Junior College. The game is set for 8 p. m. in the Ranger Junior College stadium.

The tilt is a "money-making" game for the benefit of the athletic scholarship fund in both Ranger and Cisco Junior Colleges. Everybody will pay admission. No complimentary tickets will be given, and no student activity cards recognized.

This pre-season game is to be an annual affair and will be played in Cisco next year. It will give football fans an opportunity to preview the two teams.

VOTERS WILL BALLOT ON RE-DISTRICTING NEXT TUESDAY, SEPT. 7

Ranger voters will go to the polls Tuesday, Sept. 7, to accept or reject the amendment Senate Joint Resolution No. 44 which proposes to increase the number of state senators from 31 to 39.

Voters will cast ballots at the Recreation Bldg. in downtown Ranger. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m.

Calvin Brown and Ross Hodges will be election judges.

This proposed amendment affects Senate 2 and 25, Article III of the Constitution and actually has two major purposes (1) to remove from the Constitution the restriction that "no single county shall be entitled to more than one Senator..." and (2) to increase the size of the Texas Senate from 31 to 39 members. A third change included in the amendment makes population the basis for division of the state into senatorial districts rather than "number of qualified electors" as presently provided.

Ranger votes will go to the

polls again on Tuesday, Nov. 2, to vote on 10 proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas as submitted by the Texas Legislature.

The number of ballots to be cast in the Tuesday, Sept. 7, election is expected to be small according to Johnson Smith, county clerk.

Balloting will begin at the City Hall in Cisco between the hours of 8 a. m. and 7 p. m. Election judges will be Mrs. J. M. Flournoy, Mrs. W. W. Smith, Ernest Reich, Leo Phagan, Mrs. J. C. Fletcher, Mrs. B. F. Thomas and Mrs. Ralph Berry. Chairman J. Heyser expected between 400 and 500 voters to turn out.

Voting will begin at 8 a.m., for the purpose of deciding whether or not the number of state senators should be raised from 31 to 39, according to Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey.

A portion of the Amendment to be voted on is the following: "to fix membership of House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population, and to delete limitation on that no single county is entitled to more than one senator."

Ten more amendments will be voted on in November, Judge Bailey said. County voting precincts and judges are as follows: Gorman, Precinct Four — W. G. Baker; (Continued on page 2)

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RJC FACULTY MEET IS HELD THURSDAY

The 1965-66 Ranger Junior College faculty met at 9 a.m. Thursday, September 2, in the reading room of Cooper Library.

Rev. Avery Sullivan, part-time instructor of Bible and social science, opened the meeting by giving the invocation.

Dr. Theodore Nicksick, Jr., president, welcomed teachers and gave a report on the 1965-1966 enrollment, tentative legislation concerning junior colleges, and other matters pertaining to the college and introduced new faculty members, who include E. W. Mince, Dean of the College, Alton Roan, band director, and Jack Duvall athletic director and head football coach.

Dean Mince made committee assignments and outlined academic plans for the college year, which will be centered on accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges, according to Dean Mince, who was associated with both Henderson County and Cisco Junior Colleges when they gained admission to the Southern Association, the college will work this year towards application for

admission into the Association, and towards that end the faculty will meet at least once a month to study the standards as required by the Association. If plans materialize application will be made by Ranger Junior College in the spring of 1967.

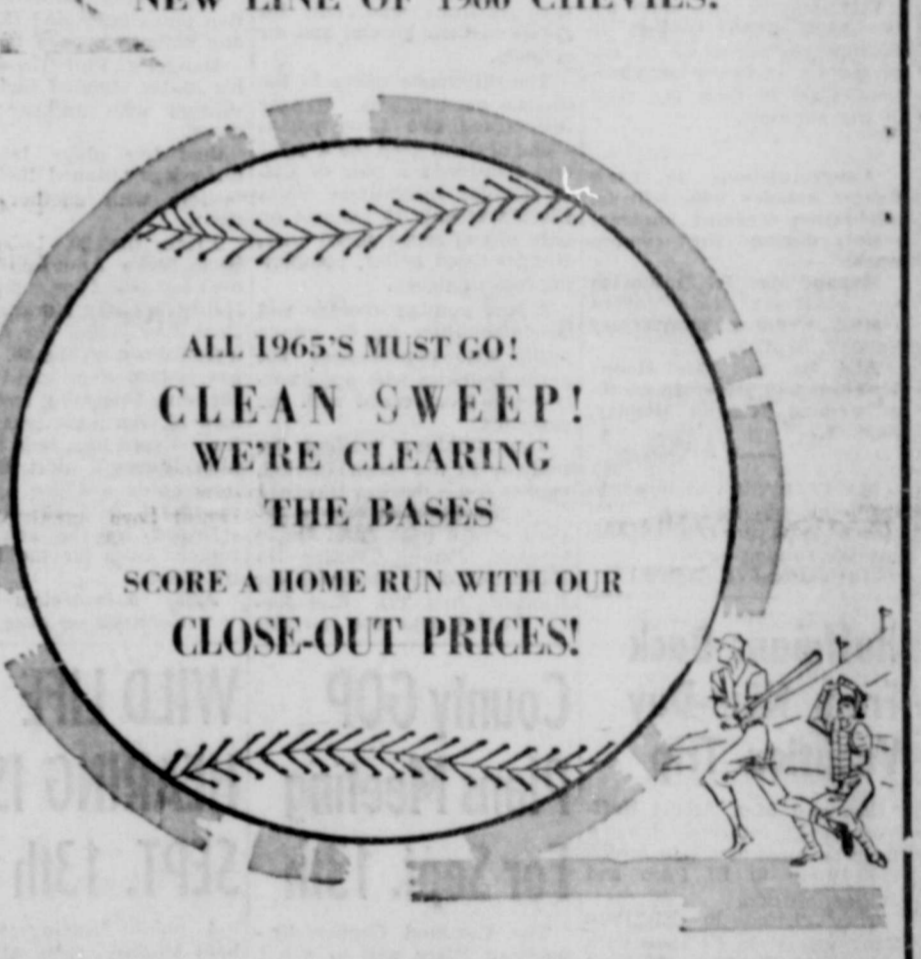

Highway Patrol Urges Caution For Labor Day

"Operation Motorcade will be conducted as a special emphasis program to combat carelessness and willful traffic law violations during the Labor Day Weekend from 12:01 a.m., September 4th, through 11:59 p.m., September 6th. The DPS will use every means at its disposal to reduce traffic accidents," said Major Leo E. Gossett, commander of the 49 county Midland Region of the Department of Public Safety.

May we urge you to be a careful, alert defensive driver and not become involved in an accident. A defensive driver does not commit these violations, neither does he become involved in an accident when other drivers commit them," Gossett reminded.

The bride is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Jones of 301 E. Main Street, Ranger.

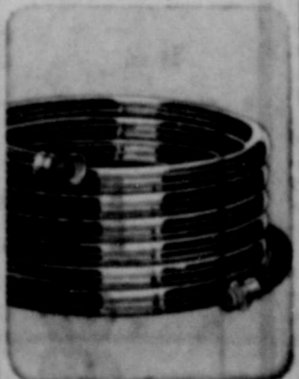

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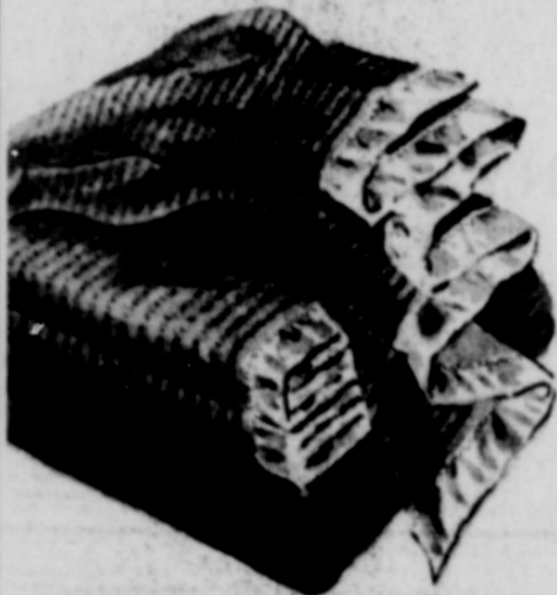
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
