"If you had told me about this three weeks ago, I would have said you were dreaming," Division Chief Raymond Hill told the City Council's Police, Fire and Civil Defense Committee Wednesday.

Hill said the greatest fire loss and danger to firemen occurred Friday, Aug. 13, when 45 task forces were battling blazes that broke out like firecrackers.

During the rioting, 112 firemen were casualties, including one who was killed by a falling wall. Firemen were

attacked by snipers and rock throwers.

About 1,000 buildings were destroyed or damaged during the riot. The Bel Air Fire loss was fixed at about \$23 million by insurance companies. The Watts fire damage was placed at about \$26 million.

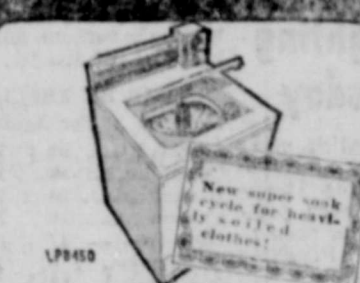

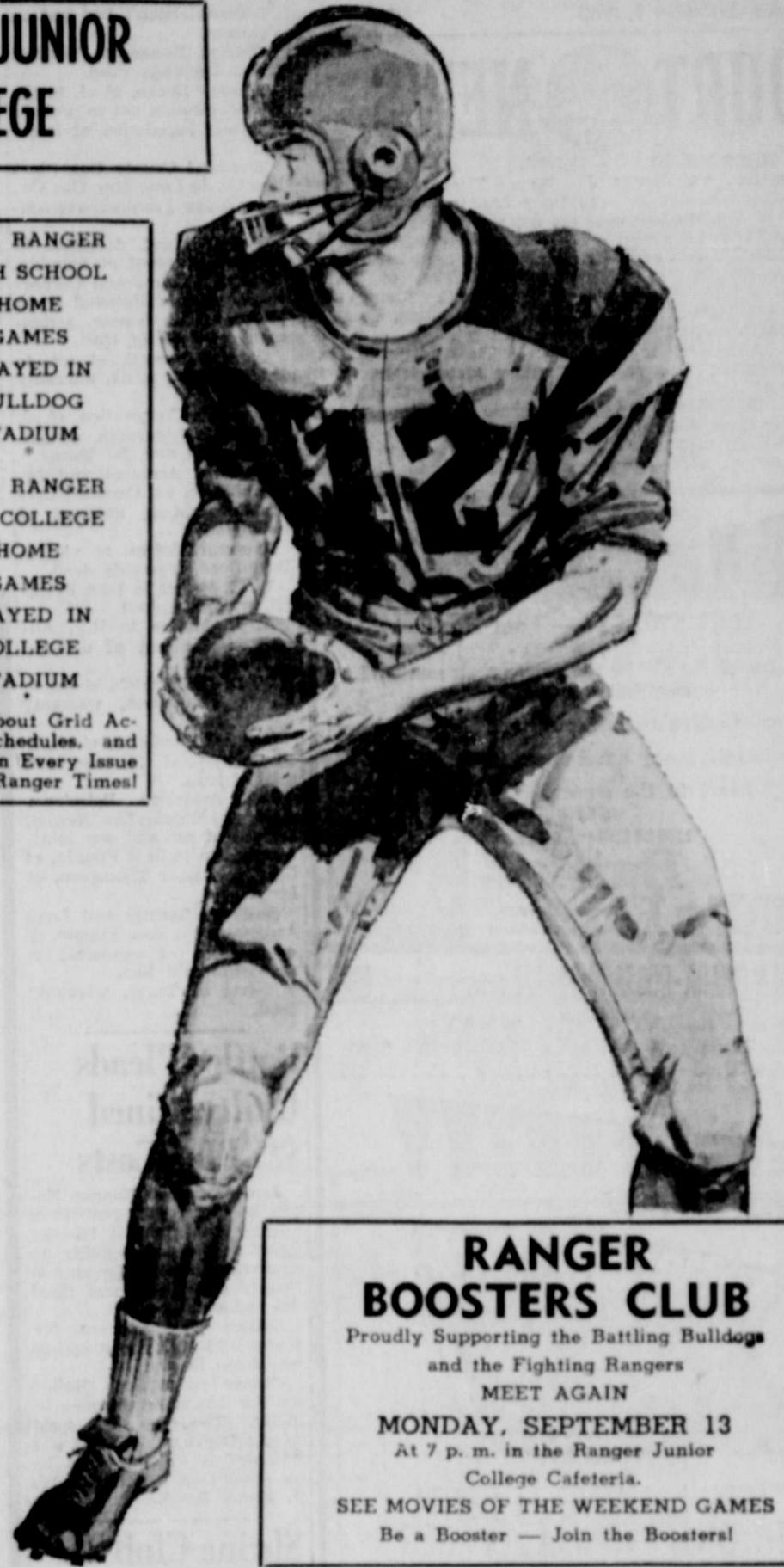

2 p. m. The fire fighters kept the inferno under control to protect residences and other structures in the area.
The building, formerly the office of the National Youth Administration here following its construction in 1940, was owned by the City of Ranger and for a number of years had been under lease to the local American Legion organization.
The structure was insured but it was believed that the loss was not fully covered.
A spokesman for the American Legion said that there was no insurance on the contents. He added that records, souvenirs and other items were "priceless" in value to the veterans' organization.
Included also in the loss were a piano, numerous items of furniture, kitchen stove, refrigerator, dishes, silverware 100 folding chairs, etc.
Among the souvenir items destroyed by the fire were rifles machine guns, grenades, German trophies, old field radios, a coin collection and other mementos of World War I.
The heat of the fire exploded the shells and grenades and a full round of machine gun bullets. The native stone walls of the structure, however, contained the flying bullets.

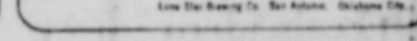

Mrs. Ottilie Kernell of Eastland will be initiated as a social member. All are asked to please wear formal.

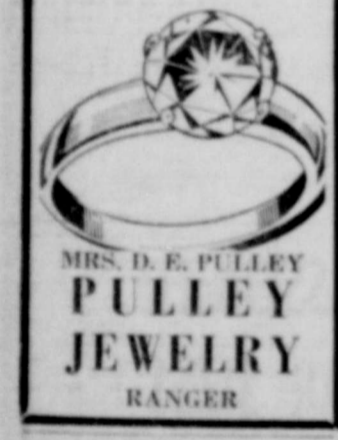
