A. L. Yeager of Cisco was tried before a jury in 91st District Court last Thursday, Sept. 2, and found not guilty of charges of theft over \$50.

Another case on Yeager is pending in 91st District Court on a similar charge.

Yeager was to be transferred to Stephens County and tried there for felony check swindling, according to Deputy Sheriff Loy Williams.

The man had spent 114 days in jail in this county, awaiting trial.

Arrested May 12, 1965, he was indicted by a grand jury on June 10, 1965. The charge grew out of a check reportedly given to a Cisco jeweler.





