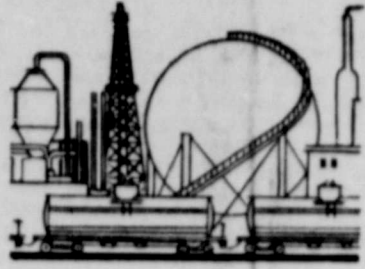

32,000 Acres Planted in Peanuts In This County, ASCS Chief Reports

Eastland County has a potential of \$2,220,000 income from its peanut crop this year — "if we get a good rain soon" — Gilbert Meredith, local manager for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

His office reports that 32,035.5 acres are planted this year, he said, and with an average yield of 21 bushels (last year's yield) and an average price of \$3.30 (some higher, some lower), the net income should exceed \$2 million, he said.

Number of acres planted is up considerably from last year, he pointed out, and if rains come, the crops should be very good.

Outlining the roles of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Meredith said that four agencies: his office, the Extension Service, the Farmers

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS GET WARNING ON VIOLATING PRIZE RESTRICTIONS OF UNIVERSITY INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE

Ranger High School students were warned in assembly Thursday by Supt. James R. Clark about accepting prizes worth money in rodeos and golf tournaments in the summer months.

"A student that accepts a

prize that is usable, sellable or that can be traded or exchanged for something of value becomes a professional in the eyes of the University Interscholastic League," he told the assembly.

A trophy or a plaque can

be awarded with out danger because it is of no value to anyone but the receiver and is for display purposes only.

Prizes like a belt buckle, hat, boots, golf balls, golf bag, books, merchandise coupons and anything that can be used sold, or exchanged for valuable consideration will render the student ineligible for one calendar year.

Neither can the student accept valuable consideration for teaching, coaching or officiating at an event as this makes him a professional.

A school is not permitted to hold a prize until the student can graduate and take the award nor can a relative or friend accept it for him.

Schools cannot buy contact lens for a player although a school can buy protective frames for his glasses. Schools can buy aspirin and salt tablets but cannot pay for vitamin tablets and flu shots. Schools cannot buy or pay for anything that a parent should provide.

Clark urges all civic organizations to contact him before permitting high school students to enter rodeos, swimming meets, summer softball games, golfing contests, and any other event where a prize is given.

Even though the student might not accept his prize if the team he is on wins and accepts valuable consideration, then the student is ineligible.

Ranger Eds and Coeds Head For Campuses of Colleges, Universities

Many Ranger College students have returned to their respective campus homes over the state and the rest will be leaving during the week.

Ranger is well represented with students attending nearly all major universities in the state.

The University of Texas at Austin and North Texas State

Tuesday's Vote Cost \$875.84

There is hope that all the action of the state senate is not as expensive as last Tuesday's constitutional amendment election.

If you were among the few in Eastland County who voted, your ballot cost the county about \$1.40, according to figures tabulated at weeks end.

Had more people voted the per vote average would have been less, of course.

In all, the election cost the county \$875.84 and there were only 608 votes cast. The total cost includes \$706.50 for election clerks, \$92 for printing of ballots and \$77.34 for election supplies, bought from an Austin firm.

Box by box, here's the clerk cost: Eastland, \$78; Olden, \$55 (includes \$5 for rent of a voting site); Ranger, \$101; Carbon, \$32; Goram, \$57; Deadhorse, \$6.50; Kokomo, \$35; Pioneer, \$79; Rising Star, \$46; Cisco, \$128; Scranton, \$35; and Nimrod, \$24.

According to a report, the 59th session of the State Senate passed 796 bills and resolutions of 1,906 considered. It also presented 27 constitutional amendments for citizens to consider at special elections. The first was Tuesday; nine will be decided early in November and the other 17 will come up for vote in 1966.

Dublin Tops RHS, 14-0

Heid scoreless by Ranger's stubborn defense during the first half, the highly touted Dublin Lions came back in the third and fourth quarters to rack up two touchdowns and a 14-0 triumph over the Ranger High Bulldogs at Dublin Friday night.

Dublin has been ranked the No. 1 team in the District 7-AA circuit and eighth in the state. The Friday night battle, a non-conference clash, was 19-A Ranger's first setback of the new season. The Maroon & White charges of Coach Gerald Crompton edged by 7-AA Cisco, 13-13, in their opener the previous week.

Johnny Holtzinger, 150-pound senior halfback, streaked 49 yards for Dublin's first touchdown in the third quarter. The payout drive was launched from the Lions' 22-yard stripe after an offensive drive by Ranger was chilled at that point.

Larry Sullivan, junior; Denry Ewing, junior, and Jan Watkins, freshman, all attend Baylor University at Waco.

Dublin Fullback Jackie James blasted over for a 10-yard gain, Holtzinger shot through the right side for seven, and James drove for 14 yards to roll the Lions down to the Ranger 49.

Holtzinger took a pitchout from Quarterback Jody Thiebaud, turned the corner around left end and raced 42 yards to score.

An attempt to annex two points on a ground play was thwarted by Ranger's Guard Andy Hamilton.

Dublin's End Bill Alexander pulled down a long Building pass in the fourth quarter and raced 40 yards before he was hauled down on the Ranger 8-yard stripe with just five minutes left on the clock.

Holtzinger blasted across from the eight to cross into the end zone, but there was a penalty on the play and the Lions were backed up to the 13.

From there Holtzinger, on two carries, scored. He hit paydirt on a blast over right tackle. A pass from Quarterback Thiebaud to End Duane Simmons elicited for two conversion points.

Three serious Dublin drives were stopped by Ranger's rugged defense in the opening half.

A costly fumble on the Lions' 15 snatched a possible scoring opportunity from the Bulldogs' grasp after the RHSers had stopped a Dublin drive, throwing them for losses totaling 24 yards on three plays.

Although Ranger's offense fared nonne-too-well against their favored opponents, there were occasions when the Maroon & White ground out hard-earned yardage with Quarterback Johnny McGee, Phil Brown, Larry Blackwell and Mike Landtroop sharing the load.

She was the only defendant to appear in court.

WORTH QUOTING!
The custom of using V for U in inscriptions on public buildings can be traced back to the absence of the letter U from the Latin alphabet. As the U came into common use, the V was often substituted for it in print, and English dictionaries did not include the U in the alphabet until 1800 or thereabouts.

A Des Moines Register writer once parodied the continued use of V for U as follows: "Public buildings as built for the public, not just for the limited number of unvarnished persons who are confused by the custom of substituting the letter V for the round-based letter in the inscriptions sculptured above entrances."

Most of us, if we would but admit the truth, are puzzled at our first casual glance, to understand them. We must scrutinize them carefully to be sure whether a structure is a museum or whether we have unwittingly started through the door of a customs house.

Perhaps it's easier to cut the straight lines of a V than to carve the curves of the less civilized letter, but we could endure it, or in future constructions of churches, universities, stadiums, court houses and other public buildings, the United States authorities and those of states, countries and municipalities would return to the use of the letter pronounced "Vov."
