

RANGER '65 UNITED FUND GOAL \$5,500; DRIVE SET OCT. 4

Ranger's quota in the 1965 United Fund drive will be \$5,500, and the campaign will be launched on Monday, Oct. 4, officers and directors of the Ranger U.F. organization decided during a meeting held at the chamber of commerce offices Tuesday afternoon.

In other action, the local U.F. leaders made allocations to eight agencies — one more than last year. They voted to add the USO to the list of organizations and charities benefiting from the annual fund-raising campaign.

Recent step-up in combat in Viet Nam, it was explained, was basically responsible for the directorate's decision to add the USO which provides

entertainment for American servicemen overseas.

In the absence of Glyn Gilliam, Ranger U.F. organization president, Fred Bennett, chairman of the screening committee, presided during the 45-minute session which was convened at 1 p.m.

The screening committee's recommendations as on the agencies' applications and the amount earmarked for each out of receipts of the coming drive were unanimously approved by the U.F. directors who voted to meet again next Tuesday, Sept. 21, at 1 p.m. for further campaign planning.

The three-member committee — Fred Bennett, chairman, Felton P. Brashier Sr., and Gaston Dixon — met earlier at Commercial State Bank Tuesday morning to hear requests and accept applications from representatives of the various agencies participating in division of 1965 United Fund proceeds.

Dr. Luther Gholke, U.F. vice president, was elected to serve as chairman of the 1965 drive and Dr. John Foster was okayed to serve as co-chairman of the effort.

The 1965 quota is considerably below that of 1964 when it was \$6,856. Last year's drive was under-subscribed with total funds raised totaling \$5,484.

Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood says his office has "about 15" of the checks.

"They're drawn on the First National Bank, Sonora, Tex., and are signed 'I. D. Thorpe.' In the lower left-hand corner is written 'Labor' or 'For Labor'."

The checks have been written for amounts ranging from \$10 to \$30.

BULLDOGS IN GOOD SHAPE FOR FRIDAY'S DUEL WITH GORMAN

The Ranger High Bulldogs will be pounding to crash back into the win column Friday night when they go against the Gorman High Panthers in a non-conference clash at Bulldog Stadium. Kickoff is set for 8 p.m.

The Maroon and White record is 500 with one win and one loss.

True, the Bulldogs do hold an edge in weight and experience, but anything can happen when two Eastland County rivals battle. A victory over Ranger would please Gorman mightily.

Coach Gerald Cumpton's charges outweigh the Panthers 19 lbs. per man in the secondary and 20 lbs. in the forward wall. Overall, RHS holds a weight advantage of 17 lbs. per man.

Seeming fairly pleased with the 'Dogs stout defense, Coach Cumpton seems to be working to improve his offensive tricks in preparation for the Gorman contest.

Friday night's battle will be the last non-conference duel before the RHSers move into district competition. The Bulldogs will take a rest next week on their open date — Sept. 24 — before they open their 10-A campaign a week later.

Starting at the quarterback spot for the Bulldogs against Gorman Friday night will again be Johnny McGee, 190 pound senior. Toiling with him up in the secondary will be Larry Blackwell, 170-pound junior, Phil Brown, another junior weighing 145, and 169 pound senior Mike Landtroop.

Clearing running room for the Ranger offensive backs will be guards Al Garcia, a 171-pound senior, and junior David Speed at 187 on the scales. In the tackle positions will be 190-pound junior, Bill Robinson and big Jack Watson, a senior weighing 207. Out on the ends will be Randal Mahaffey, a 160-pound sophomore or another sophomore, Rudy Mendosa, weighing 140. Senior David Mahaffey will be over the ball at center.

ENROLLMENT SOARING AT COLLEGE; HOUSING SHORTAGE IS ACUTE

Preliminary fall registration figures at Ranger Junior College, according to Registrar Ernen Haby, point to a record enrollment with approximately 310 students already registered and with more coming in.

So many more students reported for registration that the college was expecting that additional sections had to be opened for many courses, and additional teaching personnel will have to be added at once to take care of the overflow.

Lack of housing space continues to be a serious problem.

Most of Gorman's hopes will be riding on their sensational triple-threat quarterback Daryl Hirst, 164-pound sophomore. The other three in the Gorman backfield will be 125-pound James Jay; Mack Sutton, 160-pound half-back; and alternating at half-back and fullback will be Robert Reeves.

Police Probe RJC Burglary; Loot Is Cash

City police and members of the Eastland County Sheriff's department were conducting an extensive investigation Wednesday following the burglary of the business office of Ranger Junior College.

Startime between closing time Tuesday afternoon and the pre-dawn hours Wednesday morning, a person or persons unknown broke into the office and gained entry to the vault in which check and an undetermined amount of cash had been placed.

The break-in was discovered when the office was opened Wednesday morning by Mrs. Dalton Covington, assistant to Jack Allen, business manager of the college.

Entry was gained through a window. Police Chief Bill Ogden was called to the scene about 8:30 a.m. and then summoned Deputy Sheriff Loy Williams of Eastland. Sheriff Lefty Sublett was absent from the office on a trip to Huntsville.

The two officers continued an extensive investigation of the burglary until noon.

Early Wednesday afternoon Chief Ogden said that the pair had picked up several clues.

"We also picked up several sets of good fingerprints at the scene," the RPD head said, "we expect to be able to make an arrest within a few days."

Only cash was missing. A number of checks and other papers were littered about the room in which the vault is located.

struck again with a 62-yard march in nine plays. The score was an 8-yard pass, Lewis to Smith. Lewis then passed to Murphy for two points.

their 17. Lewis then circled right end for a touchdown, and Phipps drove over center for two more points.
The sixth Cisco score was set up by Linebacker Larry Skapsen who recovered a fumble on the Ranger 30. On the second play, Tolston broke loose and circled right end for a touchdown.
The seventh time Cisco got the ball produced another score. The Wranglers covered 43 yards in six plays with Danny Potts of Breckenridge, sophomore end, catching a pass for 25 yards from George Migyanka, the No. 2 quarterback from Pennsylvania. Phipps ran over the extra points for the scoreboard to read 48-0 at halftime.
Cisco's final score was on a third quarter pass play, Lewis to Murphy, that covered some 20 yards.
The final quarter was a defensive battle with both teams having drives stopped inside their 20-yard line. Tolston was Cisco's top runner with 103 yards in 11 efforts. Danny Prater led Ranger runners with 62 yards in 10 carries.

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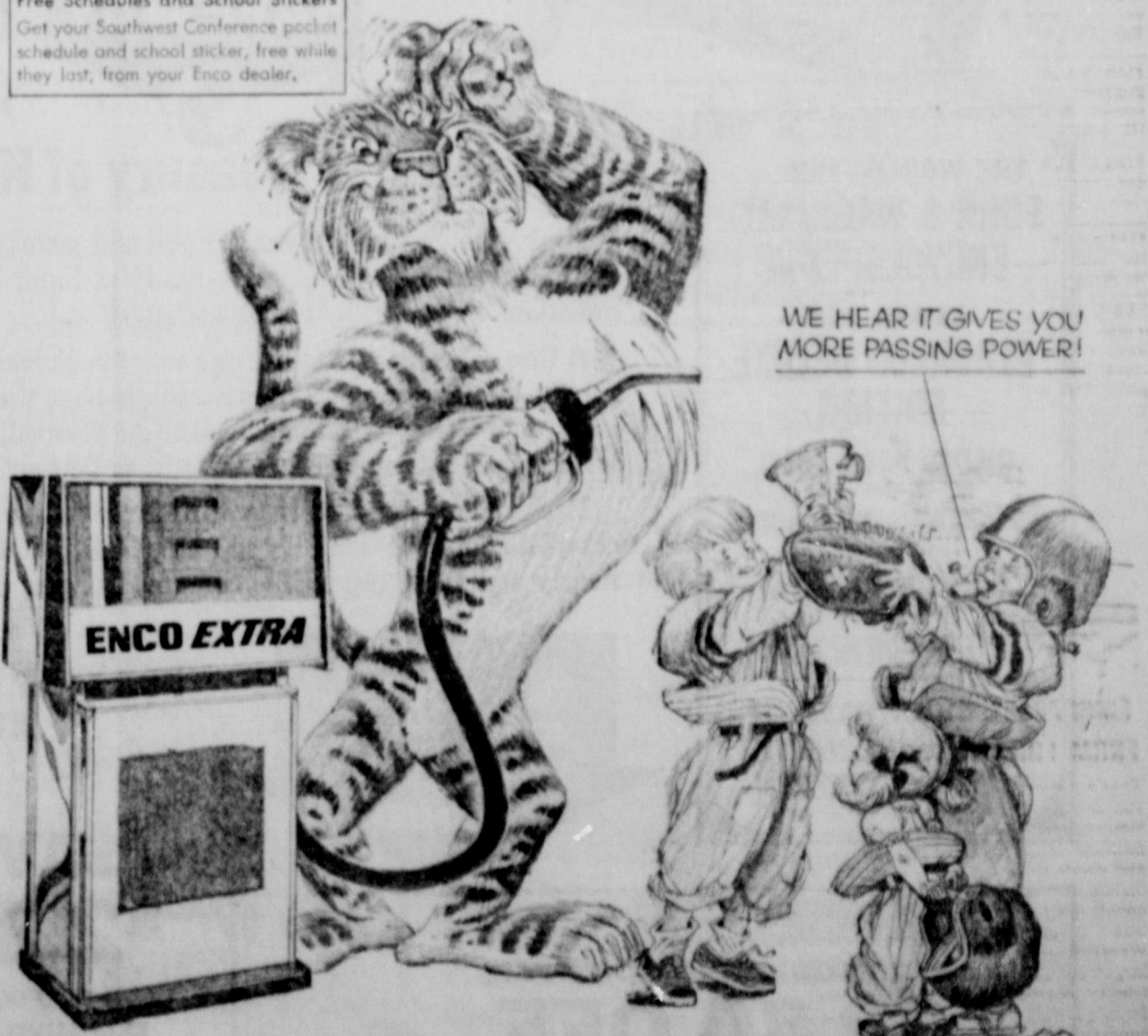

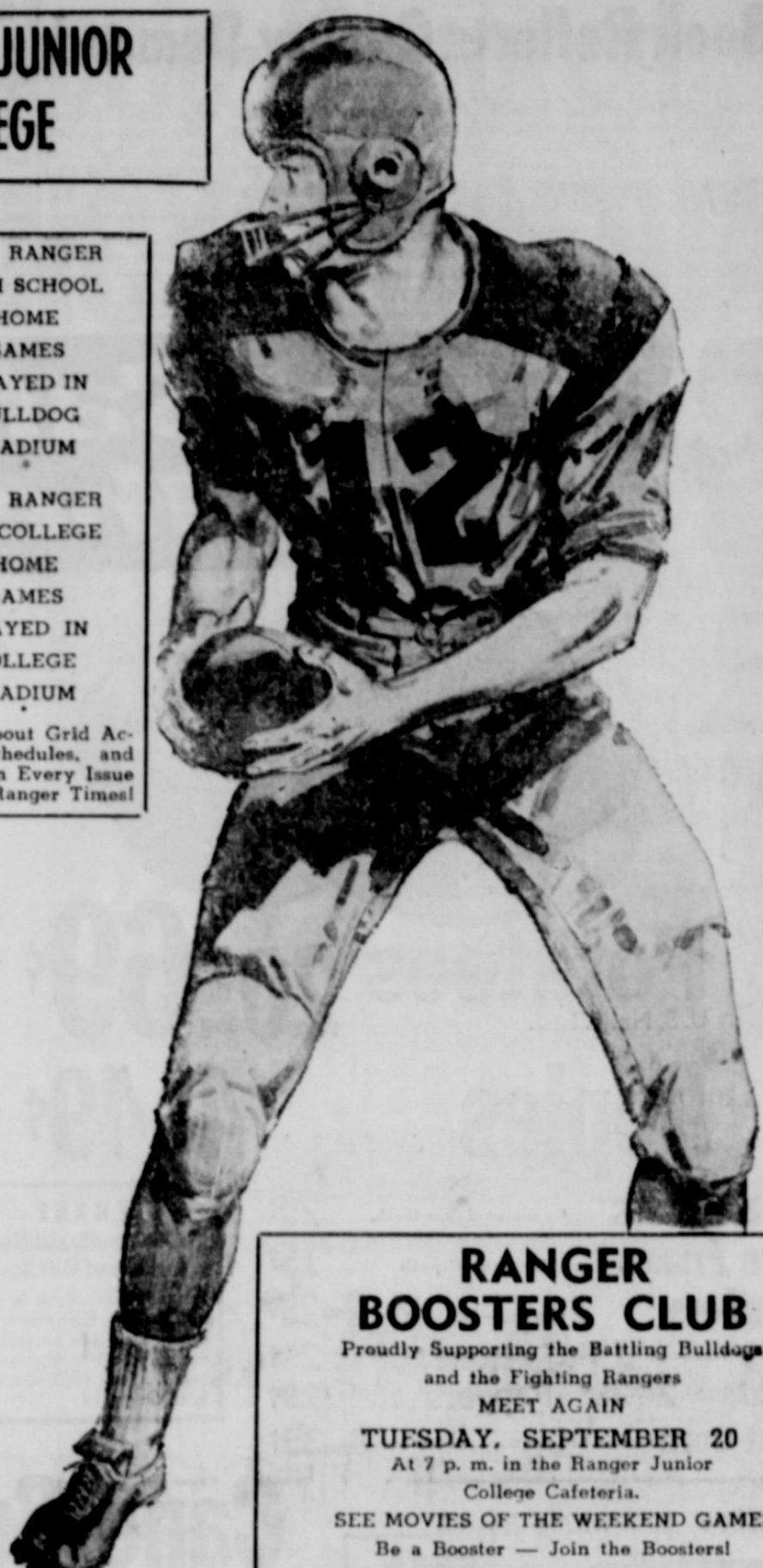
