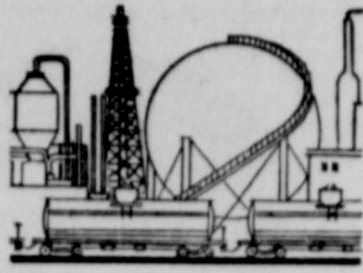

Ranger Junior College Opens, Begins New Year Of Growth and Progress

Ranger Junior College this year winds up four decades of growth, progress and expansion.

As the educational institution moves into its 39th year of operation, facilities, administrative and faculty personnel and student enrollment are at record highs.

RJC is governed by a nine-member Board of Regents headed by Roscoe Hopper, currently serving as president of the college group during one of its momentous years.

Lee Russell is vice president and John Wylie is secretary-treasurer.

Other members of the Board of Regents include James A. Ratliff, Jack Umberson, Joe Scott, Frank Brooks, Dr. John Foster and Dick Henderson.

RJC was organized as a junior college back on September 1, 1926, with classes held on the top floor of the Ranger High School building.

The college was first governed by the Board of Trustees of the Ranger Independent School District and functioned in conjunction with the RISD until August, 1948, when the Board voted to make the college a separate unit. The college then was moved from the high school building to its present location.

F. F. Holloway, W. T. Walton, and G. C. Boswell served as presidents of the college during the joint operation.

In December, 1951, voters of the Ranger Junior College District, upon request of the Board of Trustees, elected a Board of Regents to govern the college.

The first nine members of the Board of Regents were F. P. Brasher, Jr., Lloyd Bruce, A. E. Crawley, H. C. Henderson, Morris Newnam, J. M. Nuesse, Carl Page, A. W. Warford, and Alvin Wood.

In July, 1938, a tax levy of 20 cents was voted by the qualified voters of the district, and this levy was increased to fifty cents in June, 1953.

In July, 1953, Price R. Ash-ton was elected president of

Ranger Junior College, serving until his resignation in 1959.

In March, 1962 the voters of the college district agreed to a tax levy of fifty cents for General Obligation Bonds to be used for the construction of additional buildings.

The opening of school September 13 marked the beginning of the seventh year of Dr. Theodore Nicksick, Jr., as president of Ranger Junior College.

Dr. Nicksick came to Ranger in June, 1959 from Austin College, Sherman, where he served as Associate Dean of Students and Director of Guidance.

He holds the Bachelor of Science, the Master of Science, and the Doctor of Edu-

cation degrees from North Texas University, Denton.

Dr. Nicksick had a vision of growth and development for Ranger Junior College, which has been realized with completion of the first extensive plans for building and expansion, which included the construction of a 104 bed dormitory for boys; a 48 bed dormitory for girls; and an administration classroom complex composed of an administration building with a seating capacity of 1400; a stadium seating 2500 people and a track field; and improvement, expansion, redecoration and refurbishing of W. P. Newell Hall for boys, the college cafeteria, and the library.

204 Freshmen Report For '65 Orientation

A total of 204 students reported for freshman orientation September 8 at Ranger Junior College.

The group met in assembly at 8 a.m. in the Athletic Building of the college, where they were greeted by Miss Sanya Sullivan, Director of Guidance and Counseling.

Dean E. W. Mince gave the invocation.

Miss Sullivan introduced Dr. Theodore Nicksick, Jr., Dean Mince, and Dean Ernen Haby, who welcomed students and made necessary announcements.

She explained the testing schedule and announced special activities for the remainder of the week.

Social activities included a "Howdy" Party Wednesday evening in the Athletic Building, an informal get-together Thursday evening in the Student Union Building, a pep rally Friday evening, and the football game Saturday night between Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges.

Mince, newly appointed Dean of the College, assumed his duties as administrator August 15. He holds the Bachelor of Business Administration degree from Southern Methodist University and the Master of Science from East Texas State College. He has completed course work for the Doctor of Philosophy degree at the University of Texas and expects to attain the degree in another year.

10,000 Volumes Is Goal For College Library Project

The goal of 10,000 books for Cooper Library, Ranger Junior College, has been announced by the librarian, Dorothy Linn. The Ranger Junior College library needs larger resources to meet the needs of the expanding student enrollment.

A campaign to raise funds for books and donations of books suitable for college level is being spearheaded by several local organizations. At present the college library has an excellent nucleus, but expanded enrollment necessitates added expansion to the book collection especially in the fields of fiction and good non-fiction. Book club selections, such as Book-of-the-Month, Literary Guild, Classics, Civil War etc. are in great demand by the students.

The library budget concentrates on collateral reading for subject courses periodicals, subscriptions reference books, and binding.

A donor plate with the name of the donor will be placed on the inside cover of each book donated or of each book bought with money donated.

Either books or cash donations are acceptable, and the amount of either can be counted as a deduction on one's income tax return.

All money donated to Cooper Library will be used in purchasing books to meet the needs of the expanding enrollment of the college.

New Hurricane Season Is Here For Fall Months

COLLEGE STATION—Hurricane season is here again. Most hurricanes that seriously affect Texas are born during the months of August, September, and October. Nearly 60 percent of these form during August and the first of September, according to Tommy Hollmig, Extension rural civil defense specialist, at Texas A&M University.

The three alerts everyone should be familiar with are "Hurricane Watch," "Hurricane Warning," and "Gale Warning."

When a hurricane reaches a position that offers a threat to an appreciable area, that area is put on hurricane watch. This means there is no immediate danger, but that the hurricane is close enough for everyone in the watch area to listen for further advisories and be ready to take precautionary action in case warnings are issued.

As soon as it is expected that an area will feel the full effects of the hurricane, such as high winds, dangerously high water, and very rough seas, a hurricane warning is issued for that area. This means all precautions should be taken immediately against the full force of the storm. It should be remembered it is not the hurricane's eye or center which causes damage and casualties, but rather the high tides, strong winds, and heavy rains which proceed and surround the center.

When a "gale warning" is issued in connection with a hurricane, it means the hurricane is close enough to produce winds of more than 33 miles per hour, but of less than hurricane force, or a combination of wind and/or waves and tides which will be dangerous. Gale warnings may precede or accompany a "hurricane watch" and may be used as a warning for coastal sections adjacent to an area which is under a hurricane warning.

Hurricane names for 1965, according to Hollmig, will be Anna; Betsy; Carol; Debbie; Elena; Frances; Gerad; Holly; Inga; Jenny; Karo; Laurie; Martha; Netty; Orva; Peggy; Rhoda; Sadie; Tanya; Virgy; Wenda.

SEABERRY SPEAKS AT DAR CONSTITUTION OBSERVANCE

"What the Constitution of the United States was intended to do is no longer relevant, but the opinions of five out of nine men are changing your lives and mine, and the lives of our children and grandchildren," said Virgil Seaberry, Eastland attorney at law, as he addresses the Daughters of the American Revolution, at a Constitution Day program Monday at the Victor Hotel in Cisco.

People may place the blame in various places, but "ultimately we have to blame ourselves," Mr. Seaberry said "for allowing people to go to Washington who will stand for the continual decay of our constitutional form of government."

"If the founding fathers of this nation had foreseen the day when a man could not plant grain on his own land to feed his own stock without permission from the federal government, I do not believe there would ever have been a United States," the speaker stated.

Citing the Farm Program, TVA, social security, REA, the wage law and other examples as flagrant blunts of the intent of the Constitution, Mr. Seaberry said that man has never created a more noble instrument than the Constitution upon which our nation was founded, but under the politicians' guise of giving everybody something for nothing, the Constitution is being torn down.

"I would see that the Constitution was so interpreted that it would become meaningless," he added, "and I would see that the Supreme Court was composed of cast-off politicians instead of lawyers and judges."

Mr. Seaberry warned that paying mere "lip service" to the Constitution during Constitution Week, Sept. 17-23, will be of no benefit if that is all that people do.

The speaker was introduced by Mrs. W. D. R. Owen of Eastland, program chairman. Mrs. Joe Clements, Regent, introduced Mrs. Gena Cotton, Cisco High School choir leader, who accompanied Miss Cindy Broyles, choir member, on the piano as she sang "America" and "America, The Beautiful."

Members introduced their guests, and it was announced that the next meeting will be in the home of Mrs. Owen in Eastland on the fourth Monday in October. Some 31 persons attended the luncheon meeting.

Cost Share Applications Being Taken

Eastland County Agriculture and Stabilization Conservation office is taking applications for cost shares under the winter legume and rye cover crop practices, according to Jesse Meredith, county office manager.

Practice D-1, establishing of the annual winter legumes in the fall of 1965 for protection from erosion, is limited to cropland which needs sufficient cover to protect from wind and water erosion during the winter months. The cover must be left on the ground until April 1, 1966, then turned under.

Practice F-1-A, seeding rye to establish a cover for the control of wind erosion, is limited to land currently seeded to peanuts. This practice may be applied after peanuts are harvested to protect the land from wind and water erosion.

On either practice, applications must be filled before starting the practice in order to be eligible for cost-sharing, Meredith said.

New Hurricane Season Is Here For Fall Months

COLLEGE STATION—Hurricane season is here again. Most hurricanes that seriously affect Texas are born during the months of August, September, and October. Nearly 60 percent of these form during August and the first of September, according to Tommy Hollis, Extension rural civil defense specialist, at Texas A&M University.

The three alerts everyone should be familiar with are "Hurricane Watch," "Hurricane Warning," and "Gale Warning."

When a hurricane reaches a position that offers a threat to an appreciable area, that area is put on hurricane watch. This means there is no immediate danger, but that the hurricane is close enough for everyone in the watch area to listen for further advisories and be ready to take precautionary action in case warnings are issued.

As soon as it is expected that an area will feel the full effects of the hurricane, such as high winds, dangerously high water, and very rough seas, a hurricane warning is issued for that area. This means all precautions should be taken immediately against the full force of the storm. It should be remembered it is not the hurricane's eye or center which causes damage and casualties, but rather the high tides, strong winds, and heavy rains which proceed and surround the center.

When a "gale warning" is issued in connection with a hurricane, it means the hurricane is close enough to produce winds of more than 33 miles per hour, but of less

than hurricane force, or a combination of wind and/or waves and tides which will be dangerous. Gale warnings may precede or accompany a "hurricane watch" and may be used as a warning for coastal sections adjacent to an area which is under a hurricane warning.

Hurricane names for 1965, according to Hollis, will be: Anna; Betty; Carol; Debbie; Elena; Frances; Gerad; Holly; Inga; Jenny; Kara; Laurie; Martha; Netty; Orva; Peggy; Rhoda; Sadie; Tanya; Virgy; Wenda.
