New Hurricane Season Is Here For Fall Months

COLLEGE STATION- Hur-Most hurricanes that seriously affect Texas are born ing the months of August, Sepember, and October. Nearly 60 percent of these form dur-August and the first of September, accord ng to Tommy Hollmig, Excivil defense specialist, at Texas A&M Un-

The three alerts everyon should be familiar with are 'Hurricane Watch," "Hurricane Warning," and "Gale

Warning." When a hurricane reache a position that offers a threat an appreciable arae, that area is put on hurricane watch. This means there is no immediate danger, but that the hurricane is close enough for everyone in the watch ar ea to listen for further advis ories and be ready to take precautionary action in case warnings are issued.

As soon as it is expected that an area will feel the full effects of the hurricane, such as high winds, dangerously high water, and very rough seas, a hurricane warning issued for that area. means all precautions should be taken immediately against the full force of the storm is not the hurricane's eye or center which causes damage and casualties, but rather the high tides, strong winds, and heavy rains which proceed and surround the center.

When a "gale warning hurricane, it means the hurri cane is close enough to pro duce winds of more than 38 miles per hour, but of less hurricane force, or combination of wind and/or waves and tides which will be dangerous. Gale warnings may precede or accompany a "hurricane watch" and may be used as a warning for coastal sections adjacent to an area which is under a

by paying his own way. The Scout unit (Pack, Troop or Post) spends money for camping expedition, "Good Turns" projects, badges, books craft supplies, etc. Its sour ces of income for these expenses are the boys' dues plus approved money-earning projects such as paper or scrap

drives, etc.
The local community institution (church, service club, etc.) which is chartered by the national organization annually to use the Scouting program gives help in developing money-earning projects.

Tre sponsoring group that regularly pays the bills of its Scout units defeats a basic purpose of Scout training. The sponsoring institution does have the obligation of providing a meeting place with light and heat for their Pack, Troop or Post (which costs become a part of the sponsor's regular budget), and it agrees to provide competent, devoted, volunteer leadership who pay their own expenses.

Then the local Scout coun cil, such as our Comanche Trail Council, has expenses which must be met. This council, which is a group of volunteers who have organized to meet the Scouting needs for a given area, provides training courses, an equipped and staffed camp, intertroop camporees and other events organization of new Scout un its, accurate records of membership and advancement, and source of Scouting supplies including badges and litera-

This local Scout council elects officers, appoints operating committees, sets up a council service center office, employs an executive staff as coaches, and elects annually an Executive Board, made up of outstanding leaders from every part of the council, who determine how much money it will take to do this job for a year. This becomes the council budget which must be raised in all of the communities in the area served by

Money for the council's budget comes entirely from do-nated funds which are secured in three major ways: Sustaining Memberships par-ticipation in United Funds and Community Chests, and Boy Scout budget campaigns. The Boy Scouts of America receives no tax support from any agency of government at

any level. Finally, the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America, the fifth member of the team, coordinates and stimulates Scouting on a nation-wide basis. It produces the literature, including books for boys and for leaders, training course materials, and mater ials on program suggestions. Men on the National Council staff, and in regional offices over the country form a great service network to work with local council leaders. The money to pay for this nation-wide service come nainly from the registration fees that boys and adults pay and from profits from the National Supply Service which are plowed right back into promoting Scouting for more boys in every community in America. Only about 1 percent of the local Comanche Trail Council budget is paid to the National ogranization
