## Applications Begin Taken for Winter Cover

Applications are now being accepted for federal cost-share on practice D-1 winter legumes and practice F-1-A rye cover. It has been announced by Jesse Meredith, county ASCS office manager.

The purpose of the cover-crop practice is to establish a winter cover in the fall to protect the land from wind and water erosion during winter months, Meredith said. Grazing consistent with good management is permitted but harvesting in any manner is not permitted.

In order to be eligible for cost-share, you must file a written request before starting the practice. You should also file your request before purchase of seed or fertilizer so that you may be sure to purchase the correct requirements.

Peanut marketing cards for 1965 have been prepared and are ready for issuance, stated Meredith. Cards may be obtained at the ASCS office or will be mailed to those requesting them. The card must be returned to the office after marketing is completed in order to avoid reduction in future allotments.

Farms with excess peanuts may receive a quota card after proper disposition of excess or after filing form MQ-92, agreeing to leave excess in the ground or hog off the excess acreage.

Farms with excess acreage should pay particular attention to the regulations governing disposition of excess acreage and contact the ASCS office if questions arise.

Eastland County law enforcement officers, justices of the peace, prosecutors, judges of courts of criminal jurisdiction, and news media have been invited to attend a seminar on the new Texas Code of Criminal Procedure to be held in San Angelo on Oct. 4.

Purpose of the seminar is to better acquaint law enforcement officers with the new Texas Code and with recent United States Supreme Court decisions.

The 59th Legislature, in passing Senate Bill 107, made more than 200 changes in the trial procedures of criminal cases in Texas. The changes will become effective on Jan. 1, 1966.

Total through September of this year is 20.99 inches, which falls a bit short of the 25.16 average, due undoubtedly to the "0" rainfall in July this year.

Average rain for September is 5.79 inches. Total through September last year was 15.22 inches.

Official Weather Observer James Smith of Eastland reports .85 of an inch on the first day of September; .09 on the 4th; .08 on the 18th; .12 on the 19th; .17 on the 20th; .30 on the 21st and 2.95 on the 22nd.

High temperature for the month was 103 degrees on the 16th and low was 49 on Tuesday, the 28th.
