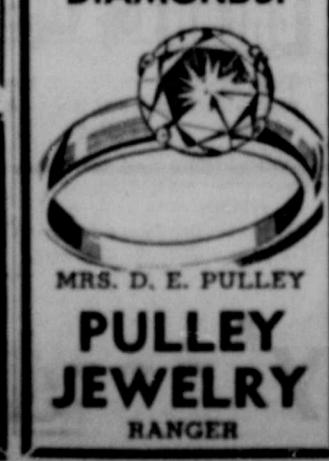

Conservationist S.S. Powers Re-Elected Zone 2 Supervisor

S. S. Powers was unanimously re-elected district supervisor of Zone 2 of the Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District last Saturday night Oct. 9, in an election held at the Desdemona School.

The Desdemona community was well represented by a large crowd of farm families residing in Zone 2. Visiting district boosters as well as the other supervisor from Strawn, Palo Pinto, and Mineral Wells were also in attendance.

J. M. Cooper, Eastland County Agent, served as moderator as is customary in supervisor elections. E. E. McAlister and W. L. Garner of the Soil Conservation Service at Eastland brought a conservation program to the group prior to the election. After the election Mr. Keith McDonald's Future Farmers Chapter served refreshments to the crowd.

Mr. Powers has a 1,285-acre farm two miles north of Desdemona on Highway 16. Mr. "Sam," as he is best known, has done a tremendous job in conservation within the past few years. He is best known as being the first farmer in this vicinity to plant Coastal Bermuda on a commercial scale. In 1952 he sprigged 12 acres to Coastal Bermuda. He now has 340 acres. From the original planting west of his new home has come thousands and thousands of pounds of sprigs which were used by farmers in this vicinity to propagate many acres of Coastal.

Mr. Sam has truly learned the art of managing Coastal Bermuda pasture. His management includes fertilization according to the production level he desires, control of weedy competition, leaving a good stubble height, and rotation of livestock periodically between pastures. Some 50 acres of his Coastal is under irrigation. He uses irrigation primarily as insurance to have an abundant high quality forage available for his livestock during our normal July and August dry weather.

Mr. Powers uses a cow-calf-steer operation in his grassland management. He uses steers to fill in with his basic herd according to the season and available forage in his pastures. He has done an outstanding job of improving his native rangeland through deferred grazing, brush control, range seeding, and just plain proper stocking. He depends entirely upon Coastal Bermuda for forage during the summer growing season and rests his native grass. This permits the native grass to gain size and vigor and produce seed. His native pastures then provide a good winter home for his livestock.

Mr. Sam's operations also include about 150 acres of cropland which is planted to peanuts. For many years it has been his practice to strip his peanuts with two rows sudan and eight rows peanuts. Immediately after peanut harvest he drills a winter cover crop to further control wind erosion and add organic matter to the soil. This cropping system has proven very effective in that over a period of years his peanut yields have averaged about 40 bushels.

Mr. and Mrs. Powers are truly real conservationists. That they love their land is evident by the fine conservation program they have faithfully applied and maintained over a period of many years. The election of Mr. Sam to serve another five years as the supervisor of this zone is an expression of faith and confidence by their many friends and neighbors.

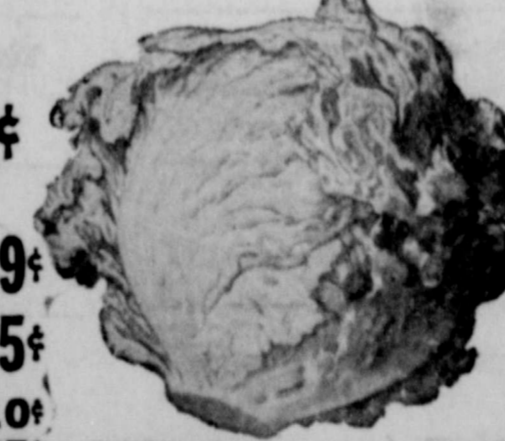

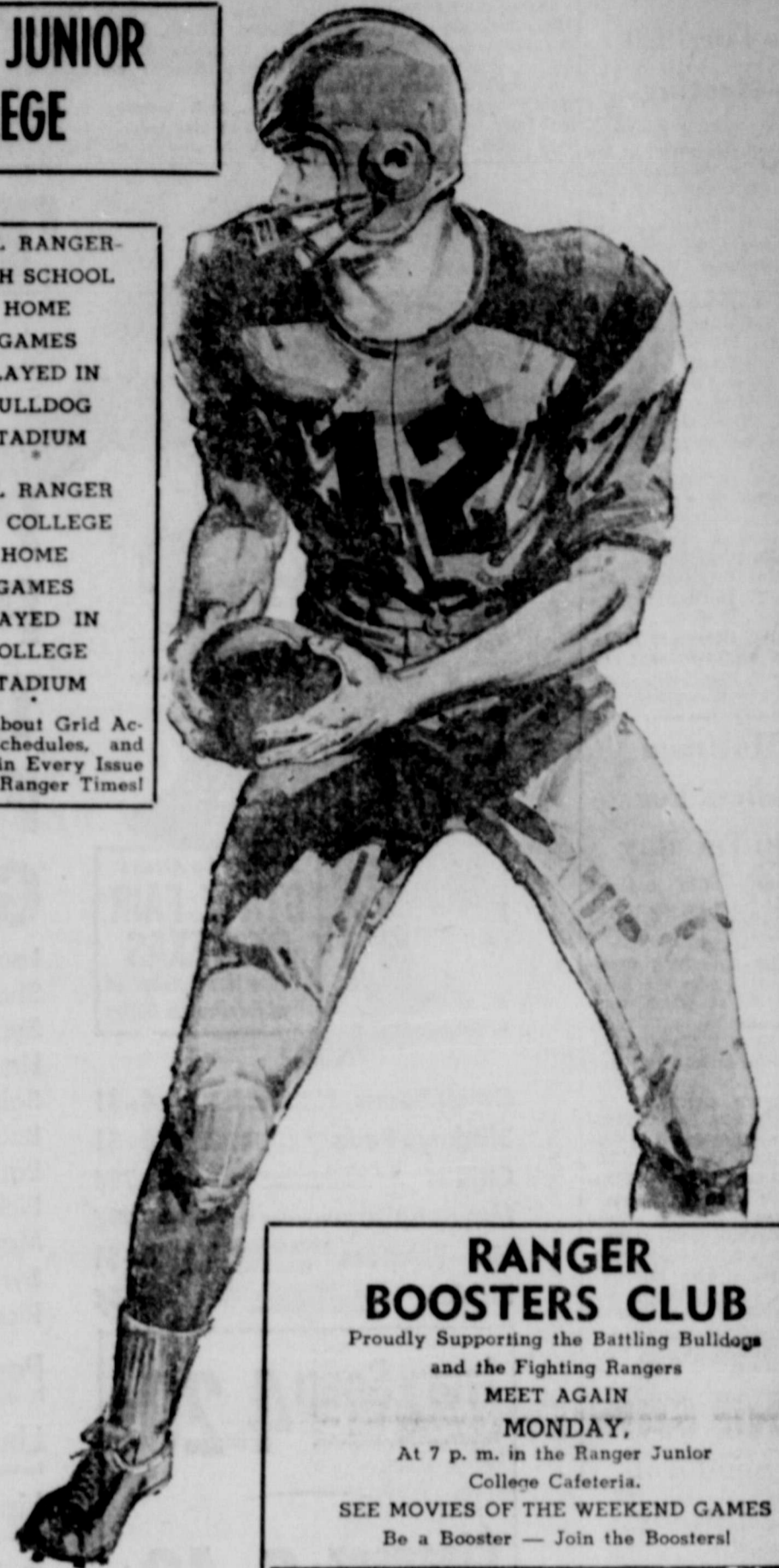

Coach Jim Puryear reported that Pearce had been drafted for the job after three others had gone out with injuries. Pearce was an all-conference halfback last year for Hamlin High is an able punter and is expected to fill the job.

The two regular quarterbacks, Alvin Lewis and George Migyanka, are out with ankle injuries, and the No. 3 man, Tommy Chambers, suffered a broken jaw in practice Tuesday.

Gerald Rosebure, 255-pound tackle, will move to center for Jerry Hecutt, sophomore from Fort Worth, who suffered a head injury last week and who will be out for the season.

The Wranglers were expected to abandon the platoon system in an effort to utilize their strongest men.

Cisco has a 1-4 record for the season.

Saturday night's bowl game will be an official Texas Junior College Athletic Federation contest. Opening kickoff is set for 8 p. m.

With Quarterback Jarrell Kelly on the injured list, Duvall will start Joe Fitzgerald, 183, in that slot. At full will be Johnny Sarabia, 190, Ronnie Steadman, 170, will be at wingback, and Andrew Sanders, 178, at halfback.

In the line it'll probably be Tony Jackson, 240, at center; Ronnie Duckworth, 210, and Richard Dibble, 210 at guards; Ken Stacey, 222, and Juan Guerra, 261, at tackles, and Howard Fisher, 205, and Roger Edge, 165, at the ends.

Mrs. Hemphill Demonstrates Native Plants, Flowers For Garden Club

Ranger Garden Club met in the Community Clubhouse Friday for their October meeting. Mrs. Luther Gohlke, president, called the meeting to order and Mrs. Ruby Springer gave the invitation to the club from the Abilene Garden Club to attend a program on paper mache. This is to be October 12 at the Abilene Garden Center with the demonstration to be given by Mrs. Hogue. Registration fee is 50 cents.

Mrs. Jesse White gave an interesting report on the program in Stephenville Garden Club. The speaker, Hubert Foust, pastor of the Baptist Church in Graham, spoke on driftwood. He makes a hobby of gathering driftwood, preferably around the edges of Possum Kingdom Lake, and treats and finishes the product himself. Mmes. White, R. V. Robinson, L. L. Bruce, and Tony Lewis had attended his lecture.

Mrs. White, chairman for the day, introduced the speaker, Mrs. Zeno Hemphill of Coleman. She is a noted District VIII lecturer on "Wild

Flowers and Native Plants

Mrs. Hemphill exhibited a new flower show handbook to become effective in Jan. and stated that native plant material can now be used in flower shows.

Among the flower arrangements she exhibited to the group were a small tan pottery basket of virgin bower, small poke weed, and the clammy (spider) weed, and a display of two native plants with firethorn berries complimented by dusty miller and native blue stem grasses. A burgandy vase held a triangular design of garden nectarious spider lily with Mexican juniper. Purple beauty berry, eryago (purple thistle), and large blue stem grass made a picturesque arrangement in a bluish purple vase. "These grow abundantly in pastures and may be planted in your yard. It takes purple thistle seed two years to germinate," the speaker stated, concerning the native plants.

Other arrangements included a sculptured compote pottery dish holding draping poke weed berries, wild blue salvin and a copper leaf plant. There was a modernistic design of fir (Rhematinum) limb that had been carved in a gray-green vase that held a centered orange zinnia.

The speaker had made all of the containers holding the arrangements and described all the native bushes and shrubs, telling how to identify them. "These can be preserved by planting on vacant town lots and making alley ways more attractive. This will help them in protected places and everyone can enjoy our own native plants," concluded Mrs. Hemphill.
