Passer of Bogus Checks Is Nabbed

Police in Amarillo Wednesday afternoon arrested Frank Raymond Walpole, about 55, after he was charged in Tarrant County with passing a forged check drawn on the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Walpole was taken from Amarillo to Fort Worth by a Tarrant County sheriff's deputy. The man is also wanted on the same charge in Eastland County. He passed a forged Star-Telegram payroll check to a Ranger liquor dealer several days ago. He attempted to pass an identical check to another Ranger liquor store, but the owner was suspicious.

At least a dozen fake Star-Telegram checks, which bank officials say were expertly done, have been passed to Texas merchants.

All the checks were for the same amount, \$97.34, which was machine-printed on the checks.

School Buying Deep Fryers

Two new deep fryers for cooking french fried potatoes, chicken or similar foods have been ordered for the Ranger School lunchrooms, Supt. James R. Clark reports.

The larger of the two pieces of cooking equipment will go in Hodges lunchroom and the other in Young. Both are 220 volt electric fryers.

It is expected that the students will especially like the french fries on the days that hamburgers are served, Clark said.

Student Payroll Totals \$722.17

The bi-weekly payroll for high school students in the National Youth Corp work program totaled \$722.17 for the two-week period ending Christmas, Supt. James R. Clark reports.

Forty students in Ranger High School are enrolled in the work program although the payroll above included only 38 students.

This is an average bi-weekly pay of \$19 per worker, Clark said.

Not only is this money a shot in the local economy but it may help some student stay in school who might otherwise have to drop out to work.

Tarrant County Sheriff Lon Evans was contacted. The charge was filed and Evans issued a warrant to the Amarillo officers.

Walpole slipped out the back door of his home but was tracked to a downtown hotel and arrested. He had \$270 when taken into custody.

Walpole paid \$900 down on a 1966 foreign car 10 days ago and paid off the balance Tuesday, police said.

A statewide pickup was issued to all police departments Tuesday after Walpole's name was connected with the car through the license plate number.

Variety of Welfare Foods Keeps Lunch Prices Down

In December the Ranger Public School lunchroom received from the State Department of Public Welfare, Commodity Distribution Division, Brownwood, 720 pounds of flour, 288 pounds of lard, 96 gallons of peanut butter, 36 gallons of canned prunes, 78 gallons of applesauce, and 224 pounds of country butter. It is only by receiving these commodities that the lunchrooms are able to serve the meals they do for only 30 cents, Supt. James R. Clark states.

Previously this year the lunchrooms have received 40 gallons of apricots, 48 gallons of canned green beans, 200 pounds of white pea beans, 660 pounds frozen beef, 672 pounds of butter, 400 pounds pinto beans,

Also 200 pounds of navy pea beans, 30 gallons of cherries, 300 pounds of frozen cut up chickens, 1000 pounds of corn meal, 400 pounds of cheddar cheese, 576 pounds of lard, 400 pounds dry milk, 5 gallons of peanut butter, 48 gallons split dry green peas, 48 gallons canned peas, 36 gallons canned pineapple, 200 pounds milled rice, 48 gallons canned tomatoes, 23 turkeys, 144 pounds rolled wheat.

In the 16 school days of December, the Hodges School lunchroom served 3,247 student meals, 296 adult meals, and 261 of the student meals were free, Clark reported.

At Young School lunchroom 2,048 student meals were served and 152 adult meals. Of the student meals, 253 were free.

County Court Okes Two Resolutions

At a meeting of Eastland County Commissioners Monday, Dec. 27, two resolutions were passed, according to County Judge Scott Bailey.

The first resolution was to urge and recommend that a split diamond interchange be granted on Interstate Highway 20 at Olden. Appearing in County Court in connection with this resolution were Resident Engineer R. P. Haun and Assistant Engineer Tommy Magness.

Concerning the Cotton Allotment Program, a second resolution was passed, in which

the acreage ceiling for cotton on the Cropland Adjustment Program will be raised from ten per cent to 25 per cent for the 1966 crop year. This increase will not have a decreasing effect on the economy of the county and will have an increasing affect toward the income received from cotton in the county, Judge Bailey said.

Excise Tax On Telephone Bills Down 7 Per Cent

Telephone bills here will be lower in January.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company customers will benefit from the reduced telephone excise tax beginning on January 1.

All bills mailed after the first of the year will reflect the seven per cent excise tax reduction.

A three per cent levy will remain on telephone service. Current bills carry a 10 per cent tax.

The excise tax will be reduced by an additional one per cent a year until it is eliminated in 1969, by terms of legislation passed by Congress during the past session. These one per cent reductions will be made on January 1, 1967, 1968, and 1969.

Customers' bills will reflect the full benefit of the reductions and ultimate elimination as they become effective.

The excise tax is levied directly on users of telephone service and is included as a separate item on monthly telephone bills. The telephone company collects these payments and forwards them to the Federal government.

Tax on long distance service was levied in 1932 to help support the government programs during the depression. Local service tax was levied in 1941 for war preparedness.

Six Injured In Two Wrecks Near Cisco on Highway Thursday Night

Four persons injured in two accidents near Cisco Thursday night were reported in good condition at Graham Hospital Friday morning.

Two others, Dr. Paul I. Cowan, Hardin-Simmons University instructor, and his daughter were treated Thursday night and released.

Those still in the hospital Friday were Donald L. Heatley of Cisco, who received neck injuries but escaped burns when his 1957 Ford was gutted by flames; Ross Honea, 48, also of Cisco, who received bruises and a cut lip; David Taylor, 19, of Big Spring, left knee injury and multiple bruises; and Ron Erickson, 19, of Plano, Ill., head injuries.

The first accident occurred at 7:15 p.m. about three miles east of Cisco on Highway 80. The second occurred at 8:30 at the same location.

The first wreck happened when Mr. Heatley, who was pushing a Cadillac driven by his brother, Lonnie, also of Cisco, stopped in the road just over the crest of a hill, according to Highway Patrolman Jack Thurwhanger of Eastland.

A 1964 Chevrolet, driven by Ross Honea, struck the Ford driven by Mr. Heatley and

knocked it into the Cadillac. Lonnie Heatley escaped injury. The Cisco Fire Department put out the blazing Ford.

In the second accident, Dr. Cowan, seeing the first accident scene, slowed down. Then a Mustang Ford driven by David Taylor struck the rear of Dr. Cowan's station wagon, according to the Highway Patrolman Thurwhanger. The Hardin-Simmons University professor received a head cut, riding with him were his wife, Martha, and five children.

YOUR INCOME TAX Questions and Answers

Q. What is the difference, if any, between an exemption and a dependent?

A. A dependent qualifies as an exemption deduction but there are other reasons besides dependency for which exemption deductions are given. Every person who files a return gets a basic \$600 exemption. Someone 65 and over is entitled \$600 exemption because of age. A blind person is also entitled to an addition-

al \$600 exemption. The \$600 personal exemption allowed for a wife is not a dependency exemption because, for income tax purposes, spouses are not considered dependents.
Q. This Thanksgiving my church is collecting food for needy families. If I give food to this drive will it be deductible?

A. Yes. Gifts of merchandise as well as cash gifts are deductible when made to a qualified organization. The fair market value of the food is the amount that may be listed as a charitable contribution. Generally this is the price you paid for the food.
Q. Do I have to wait until the end of the year to file a return? I'm a full-time stu-

dent and worked only during the summer.
A. Returns cannot be filed until after the close of the taxable year.
Q. My mother becomes eligible for Social Security benefits this month. Will I lose her as a dependent this year if she applies for these benefits? So far this year, I've been her sole support.

A. Since the year is nearly over it is doubtful that any Social Security benefits she might spend for her support would disqualify her as your dependent for this tax year. Assuming that you mother otherwise qualifies as your dependent, the Social Security benefits and any other amount she spends on her support have to be more than the amount you have contributed to her support before you would lose her as a dependent for any year.

Groups Ask for Cotton Allotment Protection

It isn't now and it's been a long time since cotton was King in Eastland County, but with irrigation looming as an important factor of the farming future, the picture might change some day. It is with this thought in mind that public officials, chamber of commerce agricultural committees, bankers and others have been considering cotton allotments and production control aspects as they pertain to cotton.

The county court and five chamber agricultural committees have adopted resolutions asking that the acreage limitation ceiling for cotton be raised from 10 to 25 per cent for the 1966 crop year.

In non-USDA terms, this means that these officials are asking that the Department of Agriculture go ahead and allow county cotton producers to divert to non-crop use now, rather than "stretching out" the "cut-back" over a four-year period, as is provided in the just-enacted Food and Agricultural Bill, which hopes to take 40 million acres out of production during the next four years. This will insure good cotton history protection on this 25 per cent, it is said. By going ahead and asking


