## Ross Hodges, Acting Postmaster, Is Member Area Pioneer Family; Pledges Best Efforts for Patrons

"We will expand our best efforts to render the most efficient possible service in the interest of our patrons."

That was the pledge Monday of Ross Hodges, newly-appointed acting Ranger postmaster, who assumed his duties Friday, Dec. 31, after having been officially sworn in the previous day.

Member of one of Eastland County's pioneer families, Hodges has been engaged in ranching in this area since 1961. The Hodges ranch is located three miles east of Ranger. The Hodges clan has been in Eastland County since 1899 — a span of 75 years. The acting postmaster and his twin brother, Dick, are the sons of the late Dr. and Mrs. Bob Hodges. The late Dr. Hodges was a pioneer veterinarian in this area. His son Dick also practiced veterinary medicine until he retired from the profession several years ago to devote his time to the family ranching interests.

Ross Hodges currently is serving as president of the board of the Ranger Independent School District. He is the third generation of the family to serve on the RISD board. He has been active as a supporter of Teen Town and has been an enthusiastic worker in teen-age baseball activities in Ranger. Hodges also is general election judge for the local precinct.

## Harvick's Mother Named Administrator of Estate

Mrs. C. A. Hill, 2115 Fillmore, Wichita Falls, was appointed temporary administrator of the estate of her late son, Melvin E. Harvick, who was fatally shot in Ranger early Sunday morning, Nov. 18.

The order, numbered 6038, was issued Thursday afternoon, Dec. 30, 1965, in Eastland by the County Clerk's office on the written order of County Judge Scott Bailey.

Mrs. Hill was accompanied by her sister Mrs. W. C. Dickinson, 514 Van Buren, Wichita Falls, and the legal counsel, Ray Gene Smith, Wichita Falls attorney. Charged with murder with malice of her husband is Mrs. Shirley Sue Harvick, 30, formerly of Ranger and now of Wichita Falls. She is free under \$10,000 bond pending her trial set for January 24 in 91st District Court. Mrs. Harvick, who pleads self-defense in the slaying, was indicted on the charge during a recent session of the grand jury.

## ECSWD Board Cuts 1966 Tax Levy Rate 25 Percent

The levy on taxes of the Eastland County Water Supply District has been chopped 25 percent effective Jan. 1, 1966. The cut was voted by ECSWD directors during the board's year-end meeting in December, according to Tom Wilson of Eastland, president. The latest reduction, second to be made since the district was formed, lowers the rate from 20 cents to 15 cents per \$100 tax valuation. The tax levy originally was set at 25 cents.

It was reduced to 20 cents effective Jan. 1, 1963 and continued at that rate through 1965. "The Eastland County Water Supply District is in excellent shape," a spokesman said. "All reserve accounts are in excellent condition and funds have been provided to meet commitments on bonds and interest due in February, 1966." Under the regulations of the bonding indenture which governs approval of the Eastland County Water Supply District, a tax roll must be

compiled for Ranger and Eastland every year as long as the bonds remain outstanding. Combined ECSWD tax valuation for the two cities is \$10 million. Current members of the board of directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District include Wilson, president, of Eastland; Glyn Gilliam, vice president, C. B. Pruet, James A. Smith and Floyd L. Bruce of Ranger, and Charles Freyschlag, M. H. Perry and T. M. Fullen of Eastland.

Funeral services for Miss Marjorie Maddocks, 55-year-old prominent Ranger business woman and civic leader, were held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Methodist Church in Ranger.

Rev. Ray Elliott, pastor of the church, officiated during the rites, and interment was in Evergreen Cemetery. Killingsworth Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers at the funeral Wednesday afternoon were James A. Smith, Gaston Dixon, Willard Swaney, F. P. Brasher Jr., Morris Newenham, James Ratliff, Max Ohr and Jesse Weaver.

Miss Maddocks, born July 3, 1910 in Colorado Springs, Colo., came to Ranger in 1919. She attended Ranger Public Schools, graduated from Ranger High School, and also was a graduate of Ranger Junior College.

She had been associated with C. E. Maddocks & Co., insurance and real estate firm, for 35 years and became owner of the agency following the death of her late father in 1941.

Miss Maddocks was a member of First Methodist Church and for several years had served as chairman of the church's music committee. She also was a past member of the board of regents of Ranger Junior College and was a member of the Eastland County chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Miss Maddocks had also served in a number of positions with the Eastland County and Ranger units of the American Cancer Society. At the time of her passing she was serving as chairman of the ACS's memorial program.

bably not ever be brought to trial."

According to statements made to investigating officers the couple, accompanied by Bobby Clark, her 12-year-old son by a previous marriage, and her mother and father, attended a barbecue supper in Ranger earlier Saturday night, then later went to a night club at Strawn.

Following trouble between the couple at the night club, they returned to Ranger about midnight and while enroute home she allegedly had been threatened by her husband.

She stated that when they arrived at Terry Place Apartments she was the first to enter the dwelling, rushed into the bedroom and got the .22-caliber pistol. A few moments later she was in the living room when Harvick entered and grabbed her. The first bullet ripped into his chin. As he continued to struggle with her two more bullets were fired, one into his left, the other into his right chest. Then as Harvick fell to the floor, the last shot struck him in the side.

The shooting occurred about 12:30 midnight. Harvick died 45 minutes later in Ranger General Hospital.

One of the key defense witnesses at the coming trial is expected to be Mrs. Harvick's 12-year-old son, who is expected to corroborate testimony regarding the couple's marital affairs.





# Report Shows County Area Has 30 Junkyards

The junkyards in Eastland County have been counted as a surprise to most to learn part of the Federal Highway Beautification Act, such spots in the county.

That's the word from Harvey L. Lewis, maintenance foreman for the State Highway Department in Eastland. His crews did the counting. The recently enacted Federal Highway Beautification Act prompted the inventory of billboards and junkyards along Texas highways by the Texas Highway Department. The act, as approved by Congress and signed into law by the President, envisions the control of billboards and junkyards and scenic enhance-

ment along the nation's federal-aid highway systems. In Texas, this will cover more than 3,000 miles of Interstate highway system and more than 14,500 miles of the primary system. The Texas inventories were ordered last month by State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer. At that time Greer said information obtained in the inventories will be used in studies that will be made relative to possible state legisla-

tion to implement the provision of the act, including the zoning of industrial and commercial areas along the State highway system. A Highway Department spokesman said May 15, 1966, has been set as a target date for completion of the inventories. The Highway Department field parties will travel over highways in Texas gathering information for the inventories. The number of junkyards in

the state is considerably smaller than that of billboards. On billboards, Highway Department personnel will record such information as size, ownership, subject displayed and location. The signs will be classified as in rural, industrial or commercial areas. Signs directly related to the property on which they are located, such as "for sale" signs will not be surveyed. The first project in Texas'

plan of action under the Federal act was launched earlier this month when the Texas Highway Commission approved plans for the first landscape planting project to be financed in Texas under the act. This project is to be on a section of Interstate Highway 45 adjacent to the downtown business district of Houston. The Federal Act calls for an expanded program of landscaping and scenic enhance-

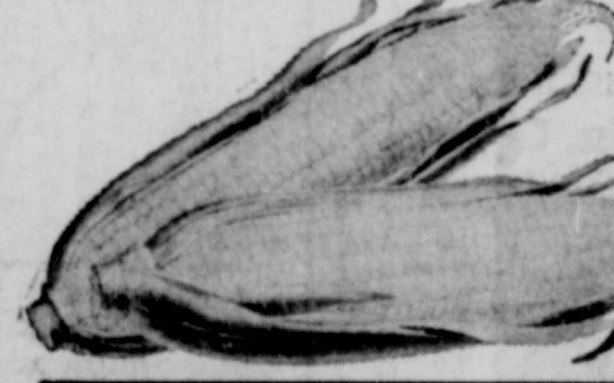
