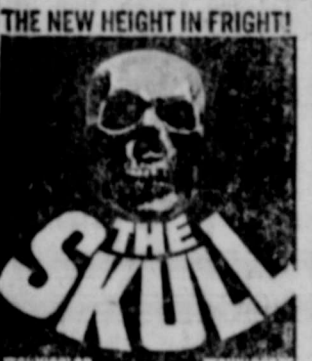

tion to fill such vacancy shall be sufficient."
An earlier article, No. 491, sets out that the governor shall order election by proclamation "of all elections for state and district officers, electors for president, and vice president of the United States, members of congress, members of the legislature, and all offices who are elective every two (2) years. Such notices shall be by proclamation by the governor ordering the election not less than thirty-five (35) days before the election, issued and mailed to the several counties."
In as much as the article spells out the reference to "session" of congress, it appears that this would not be applicable in this case. However, it is assumed if a special session were to be called, such an election could be called — with the added provision that the "35-day" notice stipulated altered to "20" days.
Rep. Gibbens, 29, was in the 1961, 1963, and 1965 legislatures and was a key member of the youthful house team that secured passage of much of Gov. Connally's legislative program.
He was a member of several very important legislative committees and chairman of some.
Connally asked the legislature to set up the liaison post late in the session, saying that state officials too often are uninformed of legislation affecting Texas.
The post went vacant for months as Connally conducted the talent hunt. Many in this district and county have extended messages of congratulations to Rep. Gibbens for having been selected for the important position. His appointment has been labeled a fitting compliment for a capable and talented young man.
Gibbens, a graduate of Texas Tech, was elected to the legislature a year after his graduation. He attended the University of Texas law school between legislative sessions.
In Washington, Gibbens will be responsible for coordinating state-federal programs, informing state officials of federal programs that may be carried out in Texas and providing information to both the legislature and the federal government.
Feb. 7 is deadline for filing as candidates for the representative and other posts for the May 7 Democratic primary.

Motor Boats To Need New State License April 1

AUSTIN—More than 200,000 motor boats subject to the new Texas Water Safety Act must be registered by April 1, State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said today.

The law gives the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department the task of issuing certificates of number for boats operating in Texas waters, just as the division administers issuing of licenses and titles to motor vehicles operating on Texas highways.

Renewal notices for boats now registered in Texas will go out starting January 3, along with a brochure outlining key features of the new act.

"This is a good time for Texas skippers to brush up on the law," Greer said, "to make certain their craft complies with the extensive changes in the new Water Safety Act."

For the first time, state game wardens have full authority to enforce water safety statutes.

All current certificates of number for motorboats operating in Texas waters expire March 31, Greer said.

The new registrations will be valid for a 2-year period instead of the old 3-year registration period.

New fees are: Class A boats (less than 16 feet), \$3; Class 1 boats (at least 16 feet long, but less than 26 feet), \$6; Class 2 boats (at least 26, but less than 40 feet long), \$9, and Class 3 boats (40 feet long and over), \$12.

As an example of the changes in equipment in the new act, Greer noted that under the old regulations a small Class A boat needed only to show a single white light for nighttime operation. Now, such craft cruising on Texas waters after sundown must have red portside and green starboard lights as well as a white light showing from the stern.

The regulations also require horns, bells, fire extinguishers, flame arresters and other equipment, depending on the class and type of boat.

It also requires a boat towing skiers to mount a 4-inch rear view mirror.

Details of the new regulations also are contained in booklets supplied by the Motor Vehicle Division to more than 500 marine dealers in Texas. Copies of the Texas Water Safety Act are available at 10 cents a copy from the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, 40th and Jackson Street, Austin, Texas, 78703.

All fees over the cost of administering the certificate of number program are used by the Highway Department in construction of boat ramps on

Texas lakes and waterways. More than 40 ramps have been constructed so far.

The law authorized political subdivisions, the authorities operating many Texas lakes and waterways and the Texas Highway Department to "zone" Texas water for specific boating and recreational uses, and make local rules and regulations relating to the operation and equipment of boats, provided a copy of any rule or regulation be filed with the Texas Highway Department and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The Texas Highway Department, however, has left such zoning to local authorities, since the Department has no means or facilities for enforcement.

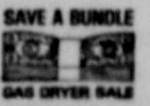

Dun, Bradstreet Lists 362 County Businesses

Mr. A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, reports were mailed to 362 businesses in Eastland County. He said figures were obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1966.

Mr. Hemphill noted that each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three million business concerns — to the corner grocery store, worth a few thousand dollars, as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists these manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit, but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses, such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill added 38 changes made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Eastland County businesses, including 11 names added, 13 names deleted, and 14 changes in the ratings of continuing business. The changes occurring in Eastland County are higher than the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted every five seconds.

When the owner of office of a business enterprise, or his accountant, fills in and mails his financial statement to Dun & Bradstreet, it becomes a part of the credit report on his business and a factor in determining the credit rating of his business. Mailing the statement, rather than waiting for the Dun & Bradstreet reporter's call, means a concern's important suppliers will quickly have the latest facts on which to make credit and sales decisions. When the Dun & Bradstreet reporter receives a business man's financial statement in advance of his periodic call, he can make a more detailed analysis of the financial condition of the business and discuss its operation more intelligently.

Back of each listing of a business in the Reference Book is a Dun & Bradstreet credit report. The report includes the following: a record of how the business is paying its bills; a history of the business (who owns it, who runs it, and how long it has been operating); a description of what the business does and how it does it; a financial section which usually includes the latest financial statement.

While credit reports are primarily used by business men who want to evaluate the credit risk of a business before shipping or selling, insurance underwriters, bankers, and other professionals also use reports.

OLDEN FFA HAS TOOLS TO KEEP UP WITH AG

In the fast moving field of agriculture, keeping up with the latest trends and information is a big problem, according to Gilbert Copeland, the agriculture teacher at Olden.

In the Olden F. F. A. Chapter, latest information and progress reports from the Texas Experiment Stations are received shortly after publication and are passed on to students.

Periodic trips are made to nearby experiment stations and school work is tied in as closely as possible with the work of other recognized authorities in the field of agriculture.

Olden F. F. A. Chapter received a number of copies of most farm magazines which are read and studied by the students. Frequently, students are assigned reports which must be obtained from such publications. In this manner, they are able to keep up to date with the latest happenings in the field of agriculture.

The department also tries to keep up-to-date on all farming trends through professional marketing services such as the Doane's Agricultural Digest. The department's farm library of reference books and bulletins is kept up to date by periodic additions.

Improved farming practices concerning local problems are tried by FFA boys in their home projects. A boy sometimes converts his dad or a neighbor to improve practices after they see him out produce them on various agricultural enterprises, Mr. Copeland said.

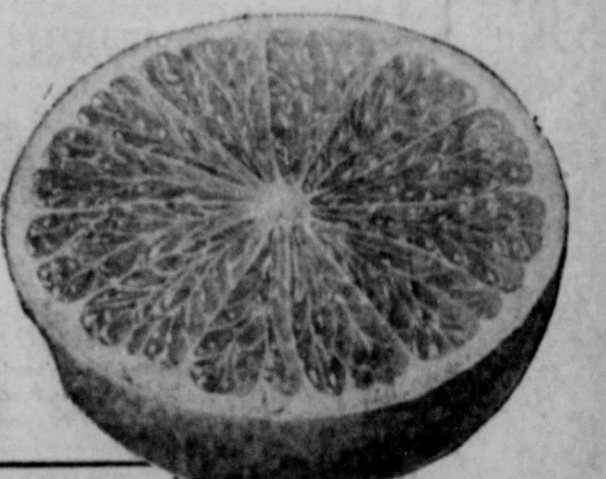
