



A large private organizations are in-volved in the control program in one way or another, and

Here in Eastland County the sseciation has focused their attention to the Predator control of animals, which mainly consist of wolves or coyotes nd bobcats.

By predators, It is meant nimals that prey or live off other animals. The coyote or bobcat is an enemy of the goat and sheep and their probem here is to control the enemy. This control is not a easy it is a continuous job. for the coyote is constantly raising in the cattle counties ectly to the north and west, and is continuously drifting in our direction in order to find his prey, the goat and sheep. Since livestock is one of our best money crops it is a constant job protecting the goat

and sheep. This job calls for co-operation from several organizations in order that a Government trapper can be employed for this work. The Federal and State Government through the Department of Figh and Wildife and the county with indivifual contribution all working logether employ a full time overnment trapper, who in urn works under the direcion of the Fish and Wildlife
