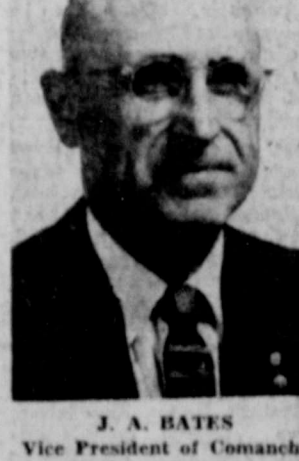
W. H. MARSLENDER Re-Elected As President Of Country Club

is not a recreational movement. The Boy Scout program's major responsibility is to build better men for our communities, our country, and the world. In keeping with this aim, Scouting is open to any boy who has the interest and the desire to join. There are no artificial qualifications on membership, and any boy can become a member by simply paying the nominal membership fee and subscribing to certain fundamental principles.

The Scout movement is thus strictly democratic. It is also strictly a volunteer organization. It receives no financial backing from any level or agency of the government, but derives its entire support from the community. The appeal of Scouting for boys lies in the opportunity it offers for doing things that are adventurous and worthwhile and that gives boys a sense of achievement and a feeling for citizenship and physical fitness.

Yet boys do understand such ideas as fair play, team spirit, sharing a lead, telling the truth and being trusted. By adding to them the other concepts necessary to fill out the stature of a man, Scouting widens a boy's awareness of his responsibilities as an individual and as an important member of society. This is accomplished not by sermonizing but by placing the boy in certain situations where he can see for himself how the proper attitude and application of dynamic forces within himself and his group help to meet goals they themselves have set.

Scouting depends on its leadership to set concrete examples of manly behavior and to develop similar patterns in the boy leaders. Scouting is based on an ideal, yes — but the ideal is attainable, and Scouting's way is one of pursuing it through a program of action rather than ritual.

a lucrative office under the United States, or this State which he is elected or appointed be eligible to the Legislature.

"Neither myself, as mayor, or any member of the Ranger City Commission receives any pay for services rendered. As a matter of fact, no elected city officials in Ranger have received any financial remuneration since Sept. 15, 1957," Newham explained. "In my opinion my position cannot be considered a 'lucrative' office as defined in the constitutional provision."

The Ranger mayor and businessman, 43, was first elected to the city commission in 1959, and has been serving as mayor since 1961.

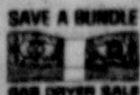
