RJC'S BASEBALLERS DROP TWIN BILL TO ODESSA WRANGLERS

The Ranger Junior College Rangers lost a doubleheader at Odessa Saturday afternoon, falling before the Odessa Junior College Wranglers — 10-1 for OJC in the opener, and a closer 5-3 triumph for the hosts in the second 7-inning stint.

In the first game the Wranglers scored 10 runs on 11 hits and erred not once. The Rangers drove in one run on four hits and committed 3 errors. The Odessans scored three runs in the first frame, four in the third, one in the fourth and two in the bottom of the sixth.

O'Neal was the winning pitcher. He was relieved in the fifth by Price after being chipped for four hits and one run by Coach Jack Allen's RJC batters.

Ranger scored its lone tally in the top of the second when Jimmy Skeins, center fielder, singled, was pushed to second on a hit by Phil Morro and then raced home on a single by Don Daniel.

For the Rangers, Van Jennings was the losing chunker and was pulled in the bottom of the third after being touched for eight hits and seven runs. Reliever Cliff Holliday yielded two hits and three runs.

The Rangers had the second game in the sack until a fielding bobbie on a foul ball

let the Odessans' timber rally to win, 5-3.

The Wranglers scored a pair of runs in the bottom of the first inning and held the Rangers scoreless until the top of the fourth when Jimmy Skeins crossed the plate for the initial Ranger tally.

RJC Pitcher Randy Watson added another run in the top of the fifth to tie up the game, and then Skeins again scored in the top of the sixth to punch the Rangers into a 3-2 lead.

Opening the bottom of the sixth, Odessa's Mercer grounded out to short, then Daniel laid out a triple. Snoddy's sacrifice fly put Daniel across to tie up the ball game.

Next man up, Harper, flied foul but an apparent mixup among the Ranger infielders resulted in the ball dropping safely to terra firma without being gloved for an easy out to retire the side. Harper then was walked to first, and was followed to the plate by Parks who homered to score two runs and win the final twinbill duel.

Mercer was the winning hurler, going all the route. For the Rangers, Randy Watson worked 5 2/3 innings until relieved by lefthander Butch. (Continued on page five)

BURGLARS SELECT MEATS AS LOOT AT FOOD MART

A couple of men — identity yet unknown — burglarized the JRB Super Market in Ranger, sometime Saturday night or early Sunday morning.

The break-in, according to Police Chief Bill Ogden, was reported Sunday at 9:30 a.m. by J. H. Boggus, manager of the food store.

The loot consisted entirely of merchandise from the firm's meat department — 6 to 8 pounds of bacon, 10 to 12 pounds of pork chops, about 25 pounds of steaks and roasts, 10 pounds of sausage, assorted lunch meats, etc.

The pair, who gained entry into the store through a roof skylight, ransacked the office, but nothing was reported missing. They made no attempt to break into any of the vending machines inside the store and no cigarettes were taken.

After removing two panes of glass from the skylight, the burglars slid down the tubing attached to an air conditioner. They made their exit, however, through the side door of the store.

Sheriff L. E. (Lefty) Sublett of Eastland came to Ranger Sunday and assisted Chief Ogden in an investigation of the burglary.

Cigaret Spark Blows Up 'Water Well' Gas

Shades of the old Desdemona oil boom days. Four Desdemona men were taken to Blackwell Memorial Hospital in Gorman after learning late Thursday that the days of gas and oil production around here — once one of the wilder, oil boom areas of the nation — are not over.

The four were testing what was supposed to be a 100-foot irrigation water well when accumulated gas exploded, burning all four on the faces and hands.

Rim Pack, one of the four injured men, said he had lighted a cigarette near the well head when the gas ignited.

Also hospitalized were Tommy Carr, L. E. Singleton and Joe Ben Koonce.

Volunteer firemen from Gorman extinguished the blaze after the blast occurred about 6:30 p.m. on the L. E. Singleton farm near Desdemona.

The well pump was badly damaged by the Thursday fire.

Prospects Are Bright For Improvements at Airport Following Austin Hearing

A request for funds to finance improvements to the Ranger municipal airport was "favorably received" in Austin during a hearing last Thursday afternoon.

A delegation of Ranger citizens — headed by Mayor Morris L. Newnam — appeared before the Texas Aeronautics Commission during a hearing held in the Sam Houston State Office Bldg., beginning at 1:45 p.m.

Mayor Newnam made the city's presentation to the commission. He was accompanied by Joe Collins, manager of the Ranger airport facility; R. E. (Dick) Henderson, former president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, and Dr. Ted Nickick, president of Ranger Junior College.

The proposed airport improvements — estimated to require a grant of about \$10,000 — include widening and lengthening the runway and installing lights along the landing strip. The ramp in front of the airport office also would be paved, according to the request earlier submitted by the City of Ranger.

The present paved runway length is 2,135 feet and the strip is 40 feet wide. The city has proposed that the

runway be extended to 3,000 feet and that it be widened to 50 feet.

Collins said Monday that other improvements also are planned, including remodeling the office building and modernizing hangars.

Here is the text of an agreement, signed by Mayor Newnam for the City of Ranger last October, which

was submitted to the Texas Aeronautics Commission:

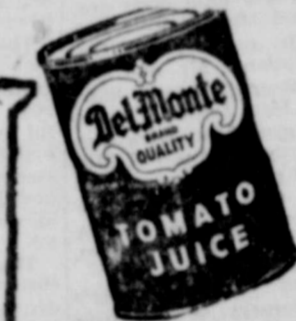

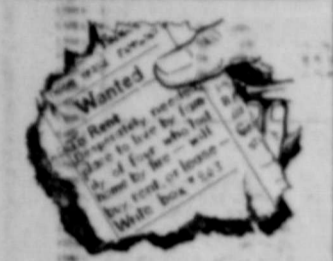

about three or four weeks. The board was also informed that \$2,370.06 worth of new furniture is now in use under Title One with more to come. The board and their wives saw some of the new furniture in the high school and also one of the four rooms in the system now being remodeled completely with new floor covering, lights, furniture and paint.

The trustees also passed resolutions thanking Bill Anderson for the automatic shift and radio in the school car which were donated by his firm free for use in the driver car.

The group also thanked Mayor Morris Newham for getting Featherlite put in the bus driveway at the back of Hodges where formerly it was red mud.

The attendance report given the board showed 603 on the roll February 28 with 156 at Hodges, 150 at Young, 118 in the Junior High and 179 in the high school. Attendance each day was shown at 95 per cent in the high school, 95 per cent in Hodges and 97 at Young.

The board approved the recent selection of textbooks for use next school year. The faculty committee previously had recommended certain readers, geographies, journalism, Spanish and math books to the board for approval.

A report on the current status of the budget was given by Supt. Clark and the report of Tax Collector and Assessor Mrs. Zona Lee Hughes was checked.

Also made a part of the minutes was the agreement of the county board giving Ranger ISD full rights to all property purchased under Title One.

Menus for two weeks were given out and a detailed study of the lunchroom financial report was made. It was voted to purchase eight-foot fluorescent light fixtures for both lunchrooms and to install new ceilings this summer.

The Ranger High School Activity Fund account was studied, and the bank balance of the 17 accounts at the close of February was shown as \$3,258.87.

Clark told the board he would be in Austin Monday to attend a meeting on integration called by the Texas Education Agency.

The board agreed to have a Special Education class next year if the public is interested and enough pupils can be secured. Interested parents are urged to call Supt. Clark and leave their names and other desired information.

Clark also secured approval of the board to work up a new Title One budget to include a girls' physical education teacher next year and possibly more aides and remedial teachers, if needed.

The board studied the Final Application for Funds from the Texas Education Agency and approved the request.

The trustees agreed to meet in a special session Monday night, April 4 at 7:30 in the office of the Superintendent to canvass the results of the trustee election and to reorganize the board at that time by electing officers for the new year.

The financial report of the Athletic Fund was studied and the list of bills now due were presented and then approved for payment.

The board okayed the purchase of three new standard sized typewriters under Title One for immediate use and a new electric typewriter for the office of the Superintendent.

It is customary for the old electric typewriter to be put in the high school typing room for use by students. The class currently has one electric typewriter about 11 years old, Clark said, and he recommended the purchase of at least six more when possible.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

All members were present for the meeting.

It was agreed for the Superintendent and Principal to review Ranger's graduation requirements and make a report to the board later on their recommendations, if any.

Two Hamilton studio type pianos were approved for purchase immediately under Title One.

ect and will notify the Texas Aeronautics Commission within 90 days after grant is made that the grant will be utilized. Otherwise grant is subject to cancellation.

2. The sponsor is ready to proceed with arrangements for the project.

3. The project arrangements for construction, including submission of plans and specifications, will be completed within 6 months after grant is made. Otherwise grant is subject to cancellation.

4. Sponsor has right to decline or request cancellation, if terms of grant agreement cannot be met or if arrangements fail to materialize.

5. The grant is to be used only for the purpose stated in the Application.

6. If, at any time during the useful life of 20 years, the airport is abandoned, or used for other purposes or is sold, the amount of this grant will be refunded to the Texas Aeronautics Commission or its successor agency.

7. No purchase of land or other obligation, based on state participation, will be made prior to official allocation of state grant.

8. Site shall be approved by the Texas Aeronautics Commission before purchase where state is participating in site purchase.

9. Purchase price of land shall be subject to approval of the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

10. No part of property purchased for airport with aid of state funds may be disposed of without approval of the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

11. No part of property purchased for airport with aid of state funds may be utilized for other purposes without approval of the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

12. That should partial payment of state grant be made for purchase of land and then construction is not started within one year, return of the payment may be asked by the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

13. Sponsor agrees that should construction be interrupted and project is not completed, grant payments of the Texas Aeronautics Commission will be refunded after one year of work stoppage.

14. Plans and specifications shall be furnished the Texas Aeronautics Commission by the sponsor before construction and are subject to approval by this commission.

15. All contracts shall be submitted to the Texas Aeronautics Commission before execution and are subject to the approval of the Commission.

16. Rates allowed for equipment, labor and material, furnished by sponsor in lieu of cash, will be established by prior mutual agreement and may be based on the same rates authorized by the State Highway Department for county roads constructed jointly by state and county.

17. The airport will be operated and maintained for the use and benefit of the public and on equal and reasonable basis.

18. No exclusive leases will be made for use of flight area.

19. Copies of existing leases, if any, will be furnished to the Texas Aeronautics Commission, if requested.

20. Copies of new leases and agreements, including military, will be furnished the Texas Aeronautics Commission for review and comment before execution.

21. The State allocation is not a lump sum grant and no payments will be accepted as specified.

22. Partial payments for administrative, engineering and construction costs, also other such costs, will be made as work is accomplished but only after construction work has started.

23. Even if grant has been made and project approved, this Commission will not be responsible for any costs incurred should project not be undertaken, and no grant payments will be made for them.

24. Acceptance of the application does not constitute a commitment on the part of the Texas Aeronautics Commission; neither is it an indication that grant will be made.

25. It is the policy of the Texas Aeronautics Commission not to make grant unless funds are actually on hand for such. Likewise, it is the policy of the Commission not to make grants in

The judgment rendered in 91st District Court in late 1963 in response to a plea filed by citizens in October of that year regarding work on private property by commissioners, says in part:

"... County Commissioners, in their respective official capacities, be and are enjoined from using or permitting to be used any and all road machinery, equipment, and trucks owned by Eastland County and in their possession and control as County Commissioners on private property owned by any person and for the benefit of such person or owner, either in constructing improvements thereon or improving said private property and enjoined from using said county owned machinery in paving, improving, grading, or building streets and/or alleys within the City of Gorman, Texas, other than county or state designated public roads or highways extending into or through the corporate limits of the City of Gorman, Texas."

On Feb. 28, at the previous

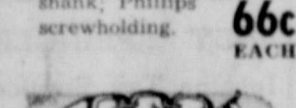

Search for a light plane, lost seen after a refueling stop in Abilene Thursday night, ended with discovery of the wreckage in a pasture on the B. U. Ross Ranch about 4 p. m. Saturday.

The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Max M. Bowers of Morton were found about 75 feet away from the single-engine Piper Comanche.

The Morton couple left Abilene at 7:55 p. m. Thursday, filling a flight plan from Abilene to College Station via Brownwood. They were en route to College Station to pick up their son, Joe, at Allen Military Academy.

Jerry Farrel of the Temple Air Patrol spotted the wreckage. Brown County Sheriff Joe Townsend said the plane crashed into a hill apparently about 8:25 p. m. Thursday.

Townsend theorized that the plane came up a canyon in the pasture and hit the hill about 10 feet from the top. The plane exploded and burned, scattering wreckage for hundreds of feet.

Bowers was thrown from the airplane with his seat still strapped on. The bodies were found about 10 feet apart, 75 feet northwest of the main part of the wreckage.

Bowers was a rancher and experienced pilot who had recently returned from a tour of South America in the same plane. Both he and his wife were pilots and authorities have not been able to determine who was at the controls at the time of the crash.

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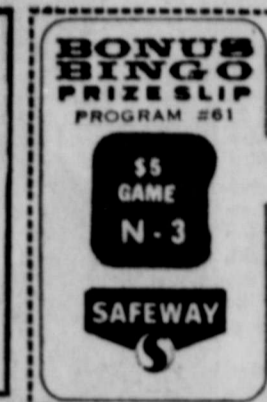
