Southwest Machine and engineering Co., Ranger's newest industry, has grown so in its two years, that it now is announcing its own subsidiary, according to Owner - Manager G. L. Langford. The spin-off operation is called Lanco and is located in Hurst, employing five full and two part time employees. The parent plant, located at 212 N. Austin St., presently has 34 employees, with an average weekly payroll of some \$4,000.

The Ranger based plant presently has a backlog of contracts in excess of \$250,000 which should keep the machinists busy for a long time to come. Additional contracts are received regularly. Langford reports, with the most recent, a \$45,000 to \$50,000 job, posted only last Friday.

The firm's letterhead lists its offerings: Tool Designing, Tool Making; Production Planners; Production Machinists.

Eddie Taylor, who for the past 15 years has been with Automaton Industries in Abilene, is general s&op superintendent.

Mrs. Johnny Robinson, a Morton Valley native, is bookkeeper, and judging by her busy desk, the "Girl Friday" (The firm recently installed a direct telephone line to Fort Worth to "stay on top" of the contract and negotiation picture.)

Mack Couzer (pronounced Calger) of Brad is personnel supervisor, and Bill Donough and Bill Huddleston are key supervisors.

The building that houses Southwest Machine and Engineering reportedly was originally built for an auto agency, and was last used for a feed store.

A casual visitor is astounded by the activity — Friday a giant "profile" machine was being loaded for shipment to Dallas, and everywhere, there could be seen highly-skilled workers busily turning out important, precision parts.

To the uninitiated, the shop might appear loud and confusing, but to the mechanically-minded, there appears order and craftsmanship.

Employees come from far and near and "There's always a need for experienced help," Mr. Langford said. (Top machinists earn \$3-plus an hour, and others scale down accordingly.)

Most work is done from blueprints, and the machinists turn raw aluminum (at \$1 a pound) into polished aeronautical components, with monstrous grinding machines and template - profile machines which copy a given pattern to perfection. (Workmen were also busy this week adapting a machine to a new need.)

The entire area can be proud of its Southwest Machine and Engineering Co. — which has grown so that it now boasts a subsidiary.

The employees were even looking forward to an Easter holiday Saturday off — it's generally a six-day, and frequently a seven - day operation.

ing made in the small watershed program.

"This progress is possible only because of the teamwork by dedicated local people working through soil and water conservation districts, county commissioners courts and municipalities. Federal and State organizations can and do give considerable help but the real prime movers are the local people." Watershed planning is completed or under way on 86 Texas watersheds involving 13,800,000 acres, 3 per cent of the State's total land area.

"Almost a million acres of productive land subject to flooding will be protected, including urban and built-up areas.

"More than 1,000 floodwater retarding structures and 100 miles of channel improvement have been completed to date. The structures, in addition to reducing floods, provide opportunities for many other types of water management. For example almost 60 square miles of water surface provided by these structures are being used for public and private recreation. Fishing, picnicking, swimming, boating, water skiing, camping and other kinds of family recreation are available because of these structures.

"Many of these 20- to 70-acre lakes are located in sections which formerly had few if any such facilities.

"Towns and cities are making use of the impoundments for storage of present and future supplies of water for municipal and industrial use.

"Construction of these projects often means a real boost to the local economy. More than \$204,000,000 of Federal funds have been authorized to date for these projects.

"More than \$90,000,000 of these funds have been spent to date. Annual expenditures of Federal funds now average about \$11,000,000. Substantial expenditures of local watershed funds boost these figures and higher.

"Folks in all parts of the state realize these projects are a real 'package deal.' They reduce flooding, protect present and future water supplies, provide unequalled recreational opportunities and make real, continuing contributions to the local economy," McAlister says.

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### County Schools Benefiting From Federal Program

Some \$245,000 in funds have come to the eight high schools of Eastland County during the current school year through federal programs that the county superintendent's office has administered, according to R. B. Golemon in a talk Wednesday at the weekly Cisco Lions Club luncheon.

In addition, the sum of \$45,000 has been approved for the summer. Most of this goes to students in pay for work under the student employment program. Some 160 students earn some \$15 per week in jobs, created by the schools for equipment maintenance and improvements, Mr. Golemon said.

The county superintendent's office handles the paper work for all eight of the high schools. In these programs, the government puts up 90 per cent of the money and the district the balance. In addition to the student work program, other projects benefit the school libraries and help with equipment purchases and installation.

This program for the public schools is in addition to benefit received by Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges, Mr. Golemon said.

Mr. Golemon reported that application has been made for participation in a new program — the head start project — that benefits five and six years old children. This program will be available only in Cisco and it is expected that three classes will be set up. In addition to pre-school orientation, the youngsters will receive physical examinations and immunization shots. An announcement concerning this program is expected to be made in the near future, Mr. Golemon added.

Lion Bob Hammett was named chairman of the nominating committee to submit a slate of officers for the new year that will begin July 1.

## ONLY 5 DAYS REMAIN FOR AUTO INSPECTION

The 1966 inspection sticker must be on all vehicles no later than Friday, April 15, according to Carl Boustead, motor vehicle inspection patrolman.

Fee for these stickers is \$1 each and in order to obtain them, the following devices must be in proper working order: headlights must work on both high and low beam, brakes must be in good shape, horn and windshield wipers must work, must have at least one red stop light and one license plate light.

If the automobile is 1948 model or later, it must have a red or amber stop light, two red reflectors on rear and a high beam indicator, Mr. Boustead said.

King Motor Co. and Fullen Motor Co.

In Cisco, inspection stickers may be obtained at Booth's Garage, Rawson Motor Co., Graham Motor, and Charlie Smith Chevrolet; in Ranger, at Mission Garage and Anderson Chevrolet; Gorman, Smith Brothers Chevrolet; Rising Star, Butler Motor Co.

Average cost of inspection, including the minor adjustments and repairs which must be made, plus the sticker is \$2.00 per car, Boustead reported.
