

County Schools Benefiting From Federal Program

Some \$245,000 in funds have come to the eight high schools of Eastland County during the current school year through federal programs that the county superintendent's office has administered, according to R. B. Golemon in a talk Wednesday at the weekly Cisco Lions Club luncheon.

In addition, the sum of \$45,000 has been approved for the summer. Most of this goes to students in pay for work under the student employment program. Some 160 students earn some \$15 per week in jobs created by the schools for equipment maintenance and improvements, Mr. Golemon said.

The county superintendent's office handles the paper work for all eight of the high schools. In these programs, the government puts up 90 percent of the money and the district the balance. 


