Mildew thrives in hot, humid weather. High moisture causes the mold spores, which are always present in the air, to settle and grow on shoes, clothing, furniture and books.

The best protection against mildew is its prevention. To remove dampness, the use of air conditioners, dehumidifiers, heat and chemicals is recommended.

Air conditioners are good dehumidifiers because cool air contains less moisture than

warm air. You can also fight off dampness by heating the house for a short time. Then open the doors and windows to let the moist air out. An exhaust fan will help force it

To dry the air in closets and other small areas, keep a small electric light burning. The heat from the lamp will be enough to prevent mildew if the space is not too large. Or you can place a small electric heater in a large closet. Use with extreme care and be sure that the heater is a sufficient distance from anything that will burn.

A much safer way to keep a closet dry is with silica gel or activated alumina. These chemicals will absorb the moisture in the air. Hang them in a cloth bag from the closet rod, or put them on a shelf or floor. The chemicals can be used repeatedly. Simply dry them in a vented oven at 300 degrees F. for several hours.

During his five-year tenure in the Senate, Senator Creighton has headed several senatorial committees and on April 20, 1965, served as Governor for a day as president pro tempore of the Senate, during the absence from the state of Governor John Conally and Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith.

### Cast Of 135 Tell Old Story

Approximately 20,000 spectators went back to 29 A.D. in the Sunday morning hours before dawn as they watched the recreation of the Crucifixion of Jesus Christ in the Kendrick Easter Pageant presented at the J. H. Kendrick chicken farm between Cisco and Eastland.

Beginning at 3:30 a.m. a cast of 135 area people portrayed the life of Christ from birth to the Resurrection in 43 scenes on 12 red and blue lighted stages that extended 325 feet. Phil Kendrick's arrangement of the Biblical story was narrated by Pierre Kendrick and Mrs. Roy Westfall of Cisco. The narration was backgrounded by piano music by Mrs. J. H. Kendrick and organ music by Phil Kendrick.

Those who had come to watch the recreation sat or stood in the amphitheater which was a grass covered field in front of the stage. Blankets or quilts made up apparel for many in the cool night with temperatures in the 40's. Parking of cars at the Kendrick farm started early Saturday afternoon. After the pageant, automobiles emptied the parking area for two hours. Many lined the sides of Highway 80.

The pageant was the second for the Kendrick family. Last year's performance on a stage built over the swimming pool, drew a crowd of approximately 5,000. The present stage was constructed during the past six months.

Phil Kendrick conceived the idea for the first pageant. "After we have a vacation, we will start work on the pageant grounds, as we want to make it the most beautiful pageant in this state," said Mrs. J. H. Kendrick. Those attending this year came from Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and some from California.

Jesus was portrayed by Bill Kendrick. Directing the performance were Phil Kendrick and Mrs. Bill Mitcham of Cisco. Mrs. Mitcham said, "We were delighted with the large attendance." The cast rehearsed twice a week for six or seven weeks. Lighting was handled by Bill Mitcham and Roy Westfall.

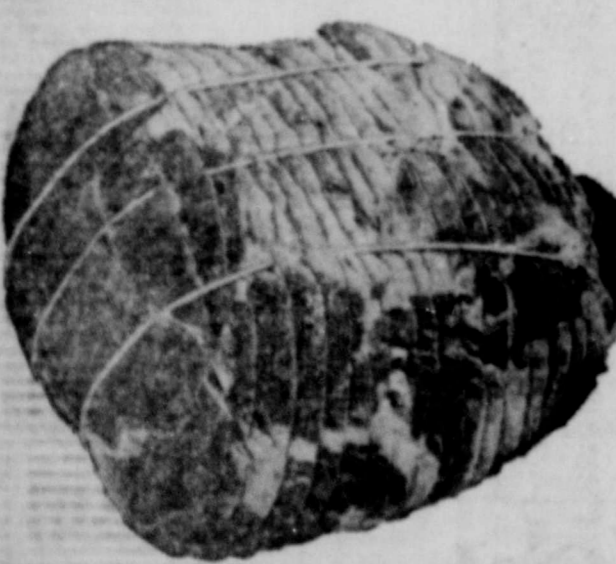
