Bailey, Dill, Foster Win; County Goes For Pullman

Only 4,472 Eastland County voters of a possible 6,000 turned out Saturday to renominate County Judge Scott Bailey and favor Cong. Omar Burleson and local man Saul Pullman in their district races in the first Democratic primary. Bailey polled 2,922 votes to win the Democratic nomination for another term as county judge, easily outdistancing John Hart, who had 1,517 votes. Hart of Eastland led Bailey of Cisco by only four votes in Eastland (485-481) and out-pollled the incumbent (62-46) in absentee voting. Judge Bailey lead handily in all of the other boxes.

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
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Eminent Domain Steps Taken By County Court

County Commissioners met Monday morning, May 9, in the Commissioners Courtroom of the Court House and discussed with Buddy Haun and Jack Kirby, both with the State Highway Department, a matter concerning the needed right of way for widening Highway 183.

The Court passed a resolution to authorize eminent domain proceedings on all parcels of land which are not signed before Sunday, May 15, according to County Judge Scott Bailey.

Commissioners discussed the establishment of a neighborhood road in the Cisco area and the Court passed an order declaring a road across the property of Willis Parker, southeast of Cisco, connecting the property of Dan Wende with the County Road System.

Also discussed was the proposal of a neighborhood road across the property near Carbon of Dick Pruett, connecting J. E. McDaniels farm with the County Road System.

Sheriff Lefty Sublett appeared before the court, requesting that commissioners inspect the county jail, where repairs are badly needed after damaged when some prisoners made an attempted jail break.

The sheriff also stated that the sheriff's department is being over-worked and needs more men, Judge Bailey said.

Cisco, Ranger, Gorman Demos Adopt Connally Support

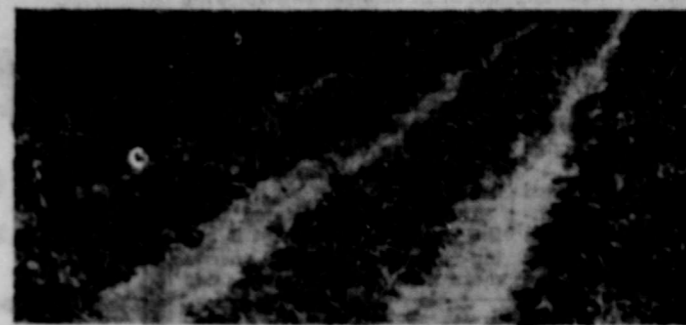

JAIL-BREAK ATTEMPT — What could have become a serious situation apparently was averted by the discovery of this jail-break attempt at Eastland County Jail this week. Photos, taken by Jailer John Shook shows, at left, the debris used and taken from a hole in the upper level of the north wall. Circled is a window weight apparently used as a ramrod, and the boards are those taken from windows. At right is the actual hole closeup — some 12 inches deep into the 16-inch wall. The work was done, Shook reports, during the time he was away from the jail assisting as a field deputy and while his wife was alone at the jail in charge of prisoners. At the time of the attempted breakout there were some ten persons in the jail and the inmates carefully cleaned up the area, putting the broken plaster and bricks on top of the upper "tank" and pasting white paper over the hole, to prevent detection. Mrs. Shook, who spends many hours a week at the jail while Shook is out, said that she repeatedly heard a "tap-tap" but would not go into the tank area alone, although she does have to feed the prisoners through a trap-door daily.
