Although there are only two races on the ballot for the second primary election Saturday, our obligation to take part in the voting is just as urgent as it would be if the ballot listed a hundred candidates for two dozen offices. Participating in every election, from precinct to president, is one of the more important 'musts' for every good citizen.

This newspaper has often offered suggestions to those who may not have a particular choice in some of the races. In the two races that will be settled in this election, it is our considered opinion that Crawford Martin for attorney general and John Musselman for state representative are the candidates who merit your earnest consideration.

Mr. Martin, a native of Hillsboro, has a distinguished record for public service, both on local and statewide levels. He has been a key leader in state government for 14 years. His service included that of secretary of State for three years. He is imminently qualified by training and experience and background to handle the affairs of this important office.

Although John Musselman is a young man without broad experience, he comes from a family of pioneer Shackelford County ranchers. His experience as manager of the Albany Chamber of Commerce plus his college training and the enthusiasm of his youth (24 years of age) equip him for the state legislative post he seeks. 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FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH HAS GLORIOUS PAST

In the year 1880 the Texas and Pacific Company purchased 160 acres of land which was surveyed in 1881 and became the original townsite of Ranger.

In the same year, an itinerant evangelist conducted a revival in the Merriman community. There was no church with which to unite, so the 20 persons who made professions of faith and were baptized were issued certificates of baptism.

During the summer of 1882, a number of these converts

met in a school house and organized the First Baptist Church of Ranger. The thirteen charter members organized a Sunday school and for three years worshipped in the school house. They had no hymnals, and sat on homemade seats without backs.

In 1885 they moved to the corner of Austin and Walnut where the Texas Electric Company is now located. Here they enjoyed the luxury of hymnals and seats with backs.

Thirty-three years and four moves later, the Walnut St. lot was purchased and, while the worshiping in a tabernacle, a house of worship was built. The corner lot in front and to the east of the building was given to be church by he late Mrs. Nannie Walker. The sanctuary was dedicated in 1920, with the late Dr. George W. Truett bringing the dedicatory message.

For more than four decades, the 80 x 80 foot, three-story brick edifice (with two frame buildings) provided facilities for a resident membership which at one time numbered 750.

In recent years exodus of members deterioration of buildings and an increasing Senior citizen population created a need for a building program. In 1965 the congregation saw the need accepted the challenge and under the leadership of the pastor Avery J. Sullivan erected a spacious ground-level building. Its completion brought to pass the slogan adopted at the beginning of the campaign, "Faith will build that all may worship."

First Baptist Church Dedication Is Sunday

On Sunday morning, June 5, First Baptist Church will dedicate its recently completed house of worship located at the corner of Walnut and Marston Sts., Ranger.

The service, which begins at 10:50 a.m., will be under the direction of the pastor, Avery Sullivan. Worship in Praise, directed by Larry Hunt, will include selections by the choir and a solo by Lee C. Russell. Dr. Edwin Skiles, President of Hardin - Simmons University, Abilene, will bring the dedicatory message.

A basket lunch in Fellowship Hall at the noon hour will afford opportunity to visit with former pastors and members who have been invited to attend.

This joyous occasion is the result of the prayers, plans, and patient toil of many people over a period of many

months; the fruit of the labor of those who were willing to spend and be spent in attainment of a worthy goal.

The beautiful colonial type red brick structure, with its 63 foot spire pointing skyward, contains approximately 7,000 square feet of floor space, divided into a sanctuary seating 340, four adult class rooms, two nurseries, and choir rooms. Completed at an actual cost of \$69,500 (building, equipment and furnishings) its year-round air conditioning, indirect lighting, carpeted floors and cushioned pews, makes it a place of comfort and beauty, a fitting symbol of the presence of God in the midst of His people.

Two Races To Be On Short Ballot

Some 2,500 voters are expected to turn out Saturday, June 4, for the Democratic Primary run-off election in Eastland County.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. in a dozen precincts.

Absentee votes, which ended Tuesday, totaled 26.

The only races (two) appearing on the ballot will be— Attorney General: Crawford Martin of Hill County and Franklin Spears of Bexar County; and State Representative, 63rd District: John Musselman, Jr. of Shackelford County and Burke Musgrove of Stephens County.

In the May 7 Primary, attorney general's race, Martin led the county with 2,706 and his opponents Spears and Calhoun each got 803 votes in this county.

In the representative's race, Musgrove polled 1,156 and Musselman, 778 here.

Countian Writes From Korea Of Orphanage's Urgent Needs

(ED. NOTE: This letter from a county native now on duty in Korea was addressed to the Olden Chamber of Commerce, found its way to the Eastland Chamber Office, and then to our desk. Its appeal is so warm and basic, that we believe all will appreciate its message and urgency.)

Letter To A Congressman

The following is a letter written by W. J. Oxford, Stephenville District Judge, 29th Judicial District, to Congressman Omar Burlison:

Dear Omar:

I am concerned at the trend in government to infringe the traditional right of ownership and control of private property.

The right should be inviolate. It should not be made subject to exceptions, other than the power of eminent domain when exercised for a public purpose, and the power of foreclosure and sale under execution for debts and taxes.

Further exceptions, sanctioned to appease claims of discrimination by reason of race, color, religion, and national origin, though laudable, are, it seems to me, destructive of government by the people.

The government is no longer my servant. It is at last my master, and I have become its servant.

Such legislation, as proposed by H. R. 14765, is the result of carrying legal reasoning out into a wilderness.

It is unwieldy, difficult of standard of rule, impractical of enforcement, and subjects the individual to the mercy of a powerful government that supports the claim of a minority, or some member thereof.

The most strong-willed individual in the nation is helpless against such forces, regardless of honesty or motive.

Not even the Judicial process can afford protection to the individual property owner, for Congress has made this the law of the land.

If State law is in conflict, this legislation says it must yield.

Take for example the homestead law in Texas, a community property state: Now, the wife may avoid her contract to sell, and the contract is unenforceable against a suit for specific performance, if she claims and asserts the homestead character of the property.

Here, it is the right of homestead that the law protects. Under the proposed legislation, such right, if it remains, is qualified to the extent it must be, by the evidence, weighed against the claim that refusal to perform the contract is not founded in right of homestead but is discrimination toward the buyer as denounced and prohibited by this law.

It follows that every legal refusal to perform, now permitted by law, is tainted with the prohibitions of this act.

I fear the power of government — the trend to unleash this power, and believe that to preserve this country, government must be kept in check.

If my reasoning has merit and you find points of concurrence, please oppose this legislation, for the danger from within emerges as clearly as the danger from without.

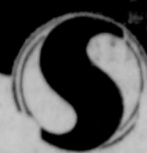

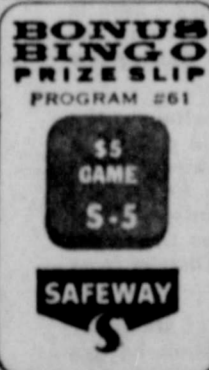

Auto Vacations On Increase For Most Of Nation
COLLEGE STATION — More Americans will vacation by car this year than ever before. Many older citizens will be among these travelers, says Miss Leota Lane, Texas A&M University Extension specialist in family life education.

Research done in connection with the recent national driving test indicates that many drivers need to brush up on their driving skills. Additionally, older citizens, especially, will want to check up on these safe-driving points:

1. With the aid of a road map, plan the route you will take by dividing the distance into even periods of driving. Outline rest stops, scenic points, and overnight lodging to provide variety in each day's travel.
2. Allow plenty of driving time. Schedule arrival in major cities to avoid rush hour traffic.
3. More people travel on weekends than during the week. Plan your long trips during the week, and schedule weekends for visiting.
4. Summer means that more vacationers will be traveling. When possible, plan trips before the close of school in the spring and after the start of school in the fall.
5. To reduce eyestrain, wear sunglasses for daytime driving and keep night driving to a minimum.
6. All stopping, passing and turning distances are more difficult to judge after dark. Plan most of the driving during the daylight hours.

Miss Lane says that research indicates that many medicines can affect the way a driver handles the wheel. Certain drugs such as anti-histamines, cold tablets, and sedatives may dull your reflexes or impair your coordination.

Tranquilizing drugs can cloud your judgment and interfere with your driving skills. Stimulants may cause undue nervousness. Consult your doctor about side effects. Don't drive until you know that the drugs you take won't affect your driving skill.

Advice On 'Nutgrass' Given for 'Sad' Lawns

Nutgrass, or nutsedge, is a troublesome problem in many home lawns, says Assistant County Agent Bill McCutchen. Nutgrass and other weedy grasses which invade lawns, such as dallisgrass, crabgrass, sandburs are not controlled by 2,4-D and other herbicides for broad-leaf plants.

These weedy grasses can be controlled, however, by proper application of methylarsonates. The most common forms are disodium methylarsonate (DSMA) and amine methylarsonate (AMA).

These should be applied as a broadcast treatment to Bermudagrass and bluegrass lawns only. Caution: DSMA or AMA will kill St. Augustine grass if applied broadcast.

To kill weedy grasses in St. Augustine, the DSMA or AMA should be applied as a spot treatment to the weeds only. When the herbicides are broadcast on Bermudagrass, the leaf tips of the grass may turn brown for a few days, but will rapidly recover and not be damaged if the chemical is applied according to directions.

The methylarsonates, DSMA and AMA, will control most weedy grasses, with the exception of nutgrass, in just one application. Since nutgrass has such an extensive root system, it takes several treatments to control nutgrass—even then total eradication is almost impossible.

Observe label precautions when using DSMA and AMA, as they can be dangerous. Do not apply to flowers and



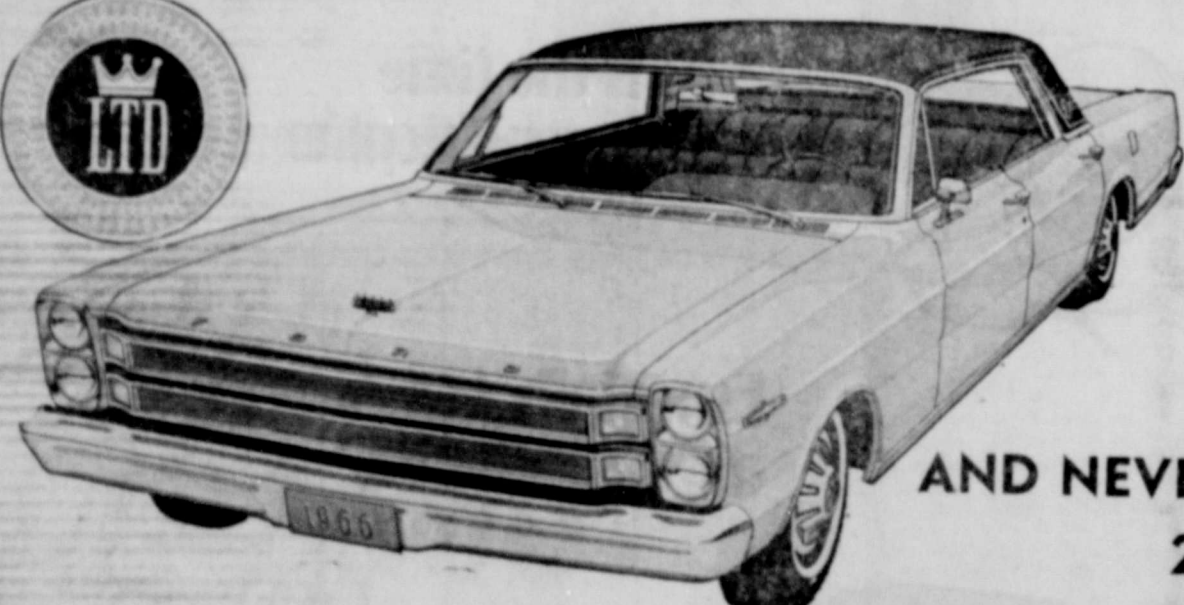

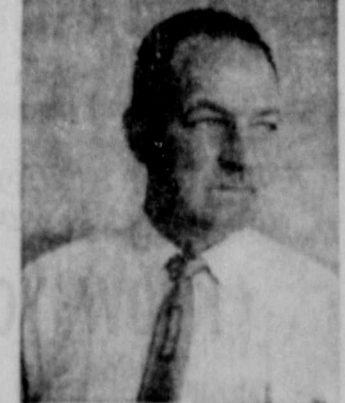
