Entries are now being accepted for the Ranger Rodeo Queen Contest, the winner to be announced during the final performance on Saturday, July 9.

The winner will succeed Miss Donna Seymour, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Seymour who has held the coveted title since July 1965.

Entries will be judged 20 per cent on attire, 30 per cent on personality, and 50 per cent on horsemanship. All women, married or single, who live within a 25-mile radius of Ranger and are between the ages of 14 and 25 are eligible.

An entry fee of \$5.00 must be paid and the contestant must have as a sponsor a business within a 25-mile radius of Ranger.

All contestants will ride in the opening parade on July 7. They will appear in the grand entry of the three performances of the rodeo.

The new queen will receive a beautiful silver belt buckle and will represent Ranger in riding club events, rodeos, and stock shows during the coming year. She will reign until the 1967 Ranger Jaycee Rodeo.

Roscoe C. Hopper, 62, a prominent Ranger, resident for the past 27 years, died in Ranger General Hospital at 11:40 p.m. Wednesday following a short illness.

Funeral services were conducted in First Methodist Church at 3 p.m. Friday with the pastor, Rev. Ray Elliott, officiating. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

Born April 6, 1904 in Bonham, he was a member and steward of First Methodist Church, member and past president of the board of regents, Ranger Junior College, Boy Scout Master, and member of the Hella Shrine Temple in Dallas.

He was a special representative for the S&H Green Stamp Company in Texas and recently received the Sperry-Hutchinson Company's national Outstanding Citizenship Award.

Ranger College Receives Grant

During the regular meeting of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System held on Monday, the board approved funds under Title 6 Part A of Higher Education Act of 1965 for the purchase of equipment and materials.

Ranger Junior College received a grant of \$21,934. To this sum, the college must add \$5,464; in other words, the grant is an 80-20 ratio. Grants to all other schools were on a 50-50 basis, according to President E. W. Mince who attended the meeting.

Equipment to be purchased may include such items as typewriters, calculators, sound projector, record players, tape recorders, slide projector, irphonic listening table, microfilm, microfilm reader and adaptor.

Area Residents Invited To Take Peace Corps Test

Area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 9 A.M. on Saturday, June 11, at the post office in Abilene or Brownwood.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If Test scores indicate a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.)

The Placement Test requires no preparation and is non-competitive — an applicant can neither pass nor fail. The application form, not the Placement Test, is the most important factor in the selection of volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the Test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C. 20525.

The Placement Test takes about an hour and a half.

Social Security Payments Total \$3,400,404 Here

Some 4,499 people in Eastland county received a total of \$3,400,404 in social security benefits in 1965, R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, revealed today, an increase of \$464,968 and 249 people over 1964.

A large part of the increase in payments resulted from changes made by the Social Security Amendments of 1965, Tuley said. Those changes which were in addition to the new program of health insurance for the aged, included a 7 per cent increase in monthly benefits retroactive to January 1965; benefits for widows as early as 60; benefits for full-time students between 18 and 22; benefits for some people over 72 who hadn't worked long enough to get social security before; and the payment of disability insurance benefits to workers who are unable to work because of a disability that lasts 12 months or more.

"In addition," Tuley continued, "a good many older people, upon applying for medicare, found they were eligible for regular social security benefits, too. All in all, the 1965 figures for Eastland County include 2,448 retired workers, 311 disabled workers and their families, and 1,173 wives and children of retired or deceased workers. In addition, 567 widows, widowers, or dependent, aged parents received benefits. The Eastland County beneficiaries retirement benefit for every man, woman, and child amounted to \$72.30 in 1965.

"These figures," Tuley said, "show how wide the protection offered by social security has become. Just about evitment — and now with medicare in Eastland County has in social security the assurance that loss of income because of retirement disability or death will not result in destitution — and now with medicare the aged have the assurance of help with the costs of operations or medical services."

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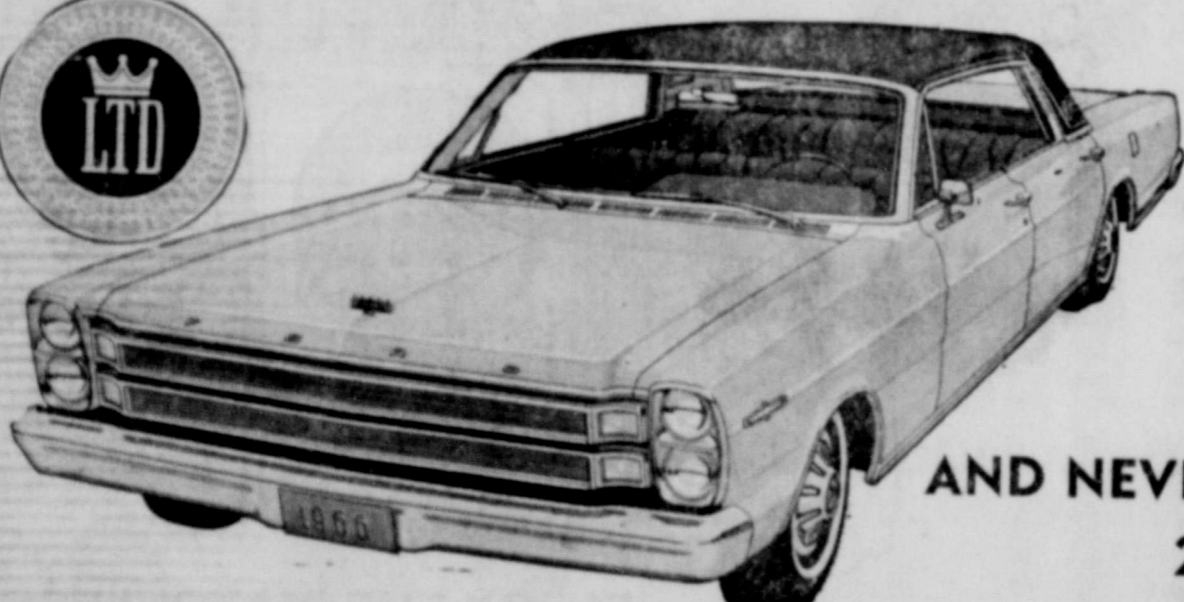

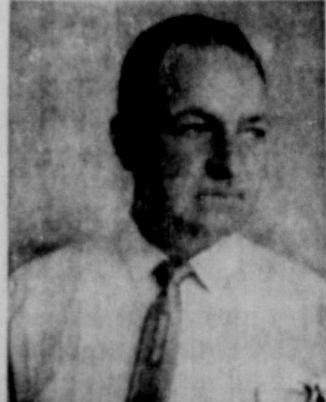
