'Operation Teenager' for Adults Scheduled In County Next Week

"Operation Teenager" will be in Eastland County June 21, 22 and 23, according to County Home Demonstration Agent Beverly Nicholson.

Because of the many favorable comments from the students who heard this program in Eastland last fall, the Family Living Committee, a Subcommittee of the Eastland County Program Building Committee, is sponsoring this program in this county.

The Lions and Rotary clubs will meet together for the program in the following schedule:

June 21 — 12:00 - 1:00 p.m.,

Eastland, White Elephant Restaurant.

June 22 — 12:00 - 1:00 p.m., Cisco, Victor Hotel.

June 23 — 12:00 - 1:00 p.m., Ranger, Paramount Hotel.

Due to limited space, the attendance at the above meetings is being limited to club members and their invited guests.

"Operation Teenager" will be presented on Wednesday night, June 22, at 7:30 p.m. in the sanctuary of the First Methodist Church in Cisco. An invitation to attend this program is open to anyone interested. There is no charge for the program, which lasts

approximately 30 minutes, and the public is urged to attend this most informative program.

"Operation Teenager" resulted from the feeling of four inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections, that serving a sentence doesn't repay a thing. Through their program, their aim is to steer others away from the errors they have made.

"One of the most despairing features of the present crime explosion is the increasing number of young people involved. A country may well pride itself on noble traditions with its roots and foundations in the past. However, it is the future — the youth! — which holds the only ground for hope.

The fact that 40 per cent of the population of the Texas Department of Corrections is between the ages of 17 and 24 is only part of the total tragic situation. If we were to include the populations of Gatesville, Gainesville, and Crockett, which are our state schools for juveniles, the percentage becomes even greater.

Every single boy or girl (or adult, as far as that goes) may possibly go to prison. There is no economic class, educational level, religious denomination, type of work, or personality that is not represented in the prison."

It has been the goal of the Family Living Committee, of which Mrs. Beverly Nicholson and Wanda Watson, assistant county home demonstration agent serve as advisors, to help the youth of our county understand the responsibility of adulthood, marriage and job. Through their program on April 2, THE TEEN SCENE, the committee partly accomplished their goal.

"Operation Teenager" will further carry out this goal. Eastland County is fortunate in having this program returning to the county. Make plans to attend and urge your friends and neighbors to attend, the committee asks.

Telephone Company Declares War On Anonymous Nuisance Callers

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company declared all-out war on anonymous telephone callers.

"When the telephone becomes a source of annoyance or terror to even one customer, it is matter of serious concern to us," said Charles Wilson, manager for the company.

"We are assuming responsibility for combating this problem, and we will use every available, legitimate means to do so."

Wilson said telephone employees are being given special training in how to counsel and aid customers who receive annoying and harassing telephone calls. And in cases involving threats to property or bodily harm, the company's security experts will respond immediately to assist customers and law enforcement agencies.

"Although line identification is by no means the only way, or even the most effective way, of solving most annoyance call complaints, we now have available several techniques for identifying the telephone number from which offending calls are made," Wilson said.

"Experience gained in a number of cities has proved most valuable," he added. "We are confident of our ability to assist customers in coping with this problem."

"Our experience has shown us that certain types of annoying and harassing calls generally follow very definite patterns."

To help discourage annoyance calling, Wilson suggests the following steps:

1. Hang up if the caller doesn't say anything, or at the first obscene word. Also, hang up if the caller doesn't identify himself to your satisfaction. Don't keep talking. This only encourages him to persist.

2. Call the telephone business office if annoyance calls persist, or if you receive a threatening call. The company will cooperate fully in dealing with the problem.

Wilson added that when a number of calls are received, it will be helpful to the company if the victim keeps a log of the dates and times of the calls. He said, too, that the victim should try to listen for unusual voice inflections, background noises or other clues which might help an investigator.

Mighty Wind, Heavy Rain Blast Eastland County Early Monday

Sunday evening and Monday morning, wind and rain blasted Eastland County as they did other portions of North Central Texas.

Early Monday, a mighty wind shoved the Cisco Thompson Pipe Line Co. toolhouse approximately 100 yards west of its location on west Highway 80. The metal building halted atop the Truck Harbor cafe. Winds, which were gauged 49 m.p.h. at Eastland,

also felled several trees or broke limbs in the vicinity. The west part of Cisco was without electricity for approximately two hours after lightning struck a transformer about 5:30 a.m. Monday.

Rain measured 3.30 inches at Cisco and Eastland recorded 3.70; Ranger, 3.00; Moran, 1.00; Putnam, .60; Nimrod, .50; Scranton, 1.00; De Leon, 1.80.

Area Monday morning but apparently caused no damage. Several trees were uprooted in Cisco and the Joe Coates barn had its roof blown away northwest of Cisco.

Although the rain was untimely for those harvesting small grains, peanut farmers welcomed the moisture. Most of them had their fields ready for planting and this will begin as soon as it is dry enough.

ANNOYANCE calling can be effectively controlled by the intelligent coordination and cooperation of victims, telephone people and, when appropriate, law enforcement agencies. Most annoyance call problems can be cleared up without resorting to line identification—although we do have techniques and devices which can be effectively employed under all circumstances and with all types of central office equipment and we won't hesitate to use them when necessary.

Anyone bothered by obscene or annoying harassing telephone calls should heed the following suggestions:

Don't keep talking to the caller. What the caller really wants is an audience. Really give him one.

Hang up immediately if the caller doesn't say anything or if he doesn't identify himself to your satisfaction. And hang up immediately at the first suggestion of obscenity.

If obscene or harassing calls persist, call the telephone company business office. If you're threatened with bodily harm or property damage, call the police. And call the telephone company too. They will give you and the law enforcement authorities all the assistance they can promptly.

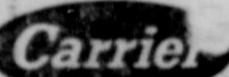

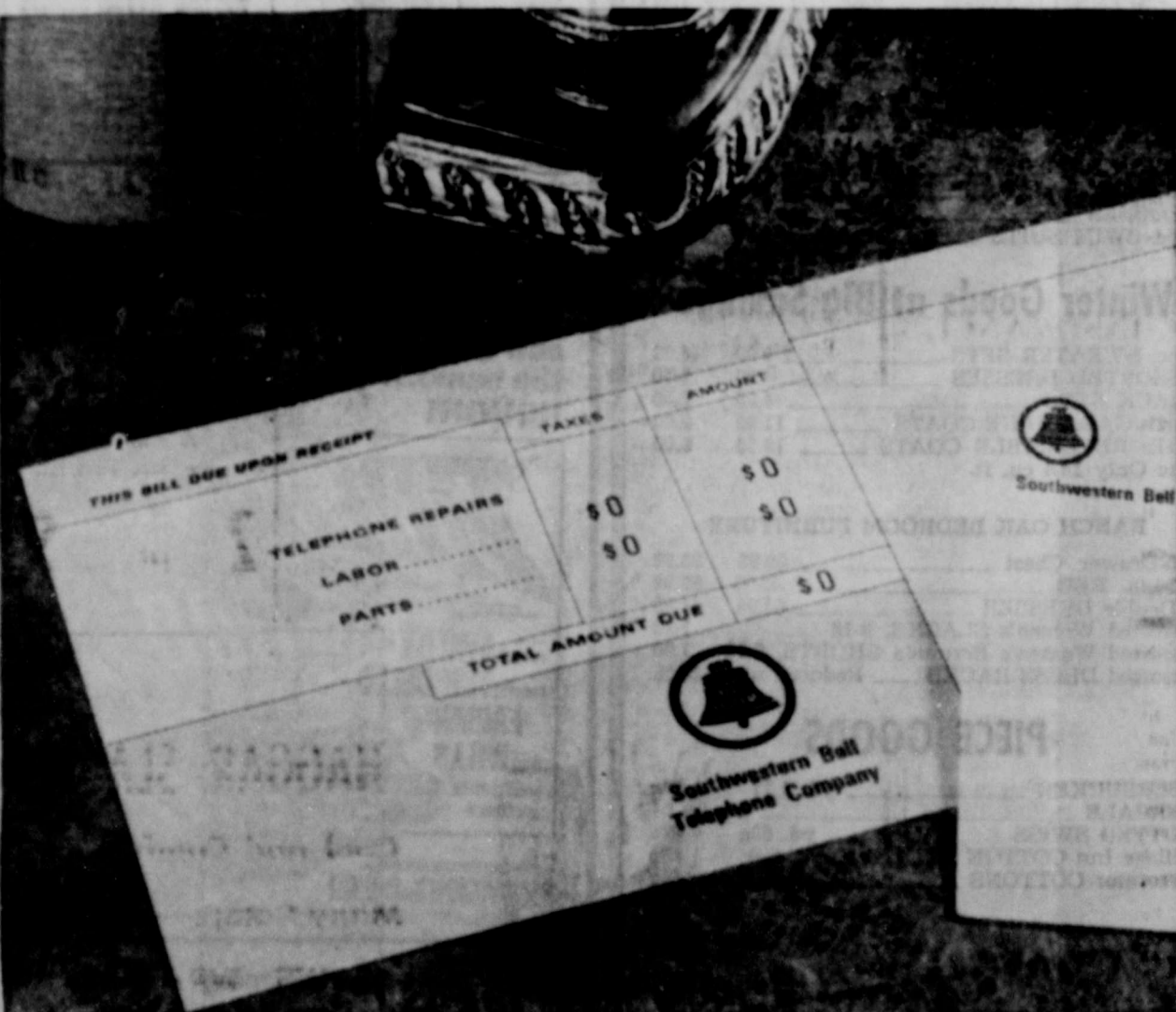

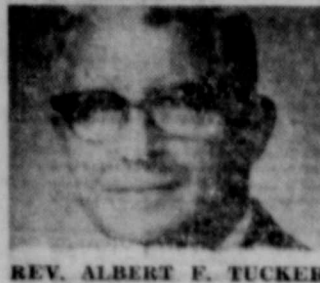

REV. ALBERT F. TUCKER

T.A.N.E. Executive To Be Speaker For Olden Methodists Sunday Night

Rev. Albert F. Tucker, executive director of Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education, Inc., Dallas, will speak at the Olden Methodist Church, beginning at 9 a.m., Sunday, June 19; also, he will speak at Eastland's First Methodist Church at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, June 19, according to Rev. J. Lester Davenport, pastor of both churches.

After serving pastorates in New Mexico and West Texas for 21 years, Rev. Tucker became the first president, and later executive secretary, of the New Mexico Temperance League. In 1952 he was elected the executive head of T.A.N.E.

The speaker holds certificates of special training from the University of Denver, Yale University, and the Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism at Loma Linda, Calif. In 1961 Rev. Tucker studied the alcohol problem in Europe and was a delegate to the World Christian Temperance Foundation which met in Oslo, Norway. Among other places of responsibility, Rev. Tucker is a member of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors of the American Council on Alcohol Problems, which has headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Some phases of T.A.N.E.'s program include: A modern printing division; a Legislative Information Service; Local Option counsel, guidance and materials; annual Seminars and Workshops; as well as scientific, positive visual aids and programs for churches, schools and colleges.

Under Rev. Tucker's leadership, T.A.N.E. has come to be known as one of the best organized temperance state programs in the nation. Parts of its program and many of its materials are used by several groups in other states and some foreign countries.

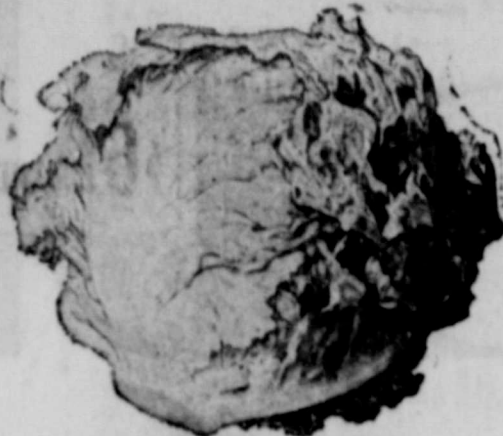
