DEADLINE IS NEAR IN RODEO QUEEN EVENT

Deadline for entering the Ranger Rodeo Queen Contest is midnight, July 6, according to Robert Cherry, contest chairman. Winner of the contest will be announced during the final performance on Saturday, July 9. She will be successor to Miss Donna Seymour, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Seymour, who has held the title since July 1965. Entries will be judged 20 per cent on attire; 30 per cent on personality; and 50 per cent on horsemanship. All women within a 25-mile radius of Ranger, who are between the ages of 14 and 25 are eligible. An entry fee of \$3.00 must be paid and the contestant must have a sponsor or business within a 25-mile radius of Ranger. The newly-elected queen will reign until the 1967 Ranger Jaycee Rodeo.

Inmate Becomes Ill, Forces Cancellation Of Programs

One of the four inmates here for the Operation Teenager series of programs became ill Tuesday night, resulting in the return to Huntsville of the four convicts and their sponsor and the cancellation of the scheduled appearances in Cisco Wednesday at noon, at the First Methodist Church in Cisco Wednesday evening and in Ranger Thursday.

County Home Demonstration Agent Beverly Nicholson announced the cancellations just before noon Wednesday. Identity of the ill convict as well as the others was being kept secret. The group made an appearance in Eastland at the White Elephant at noon Tuesday. This week the program is directed to adults through combined meetings of the Rotary and Lions clubs in Eastland, Cisco and Ranger and a public meeting at the First Methodist Church in Cisco Wednesday evening. First appearance was at the White Elephant Restaurant in Eastland Tuesday at noon. Cisco Lions and Rotarians heard the talk Wednesday, at the Village Hotel meeting room, and Ranger Lions and Rotarians will hear it Thursday at the Paramount Hotel meeting room. The four inmates, one of whom was here in the program last year, are doing a combined total of 172 years in the state penitentiary. Accompanied by Mr. C. R. Lovell, assistant director of education for the State Department of Corrections, the four very young-looking men remain anonymous to protect their families, and wear white uniforms, as they individually tell their own story. J. C. PENNEY STORE IN RANGER HAS 39 YEAR SERVICE RECORD

There were no nylon garments, electric blankets and colored bed linens for sale when the J. C. Penney Co. opened its store at 119 Main St., Ranger, in 1927. Customers made the usual tour of inspection and were delighted to find quality merchandise at reasonable prices. Thus, the store established a reputation that has kept it in business through depression, recovery, social security, World War II with attendant inflation and shortage of commodities, a 40-hour work week, and income taxes. On Jan. 1, 1944, Miss Eunice Preslar assumed her duties as saleslady in the store's ladies ready-to-wear department. Perhaps she had not thought that one day she would, from the standpoint of years of service, be the senior employee. Years passed, and with them a gradual decline in population that was responsible for transfer of much local industry, both privately owned and cooperative, to fields more verdant. People moved, changed jobs, or retired, but Penney's stayed, and so did Miss Preslar. Why? She appreciates Ranger's history, loves its people, and has faith

Mitchell, Ph.D. of Brooks AFB, San Antonio. A former teacher in Caddo schools, 12 moved from Caddo in 1935. Lunch, catered by Eubanks of Breckenridge, will be served at noon. Tickets are \$1.25 for adults, \$1.00 for children under 10, and may be secured by writing to Mrs. R. J. Carey, Box 103, Caddo. More than 1,000 persons attended the first Homecoming in 1965. The last reunion, held in 1964 revealed the fact that 246 residents and ex-residents had died during that period. Seventy-six others had died during the past two years, according to Mrs. Carey. J. M. Butler established Caddo's first business, a store, in the 1870's. In 1880 the population was 60; during boom days, 15,000; and the present population of 150, relatives of its pioneers, is served by a post office and combination grocery store-filling station. A book about Caddo, from the pen of a native son, Dr. Rupert Richardson, now of Hardin - Simmons University, Abilene, is due to be released in the future. Many people are planning to spend July 3rd in Caddo.

Mourning Dove Census Is Being Taken In Texas

AUSTIN—The state's most comprehensive mourning dove census is being taken in Texas as this month by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department with the outcome along with other information derived from the recently initiated study expected to aid materially in better management of the popular game bird.

Ninety-one different locations, ranging from the northern high plains through the rolling plains and the prairies, the eastern and western sections, and the Edwards Plateau and Central Basin to the lower Rio Grande Valley are included in the study.

Texas in recent years has had generous dove hunting regulations. The seasons have run from September 1 in the northern zone on into November in the southern zone. Bag limits have generally been ten a day and twenty in possession after the opening day with the most recent being twelve per day and twenty-four in possession.

The extensive hunting of the dove, a Department spokesman said, is the principal reason such intensive effort is expected to obtain definite nesting and population data.

FARMERS GET IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM ASCS

Jesse G. Meredith, office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, has made the following important announcements:

Compliance determinations on peanuts, feed grain, cotton and diverted acres will begin in the near future. The ASCS office will appreciate your cooperation when the reporter calls at your farm to measure your crops.

If you have diverted acreage, be ready to show the reporter the designated area. Please notify this office at your earliest convenience and identify the area if you do not plan to be at your farm.

Producers participating in the 1966 cotton and feed grain programs who plant cotton and feed grain are reminded that the crop must be planted and treated in a workmanlike manner to be eligible for price support payments.

Cotton producers are reminded that this will be a definite factor in the protection of 1966 cotton history.

Eastland County cotton producers voted 128 to 33 in favor of transferring cotton allotments outside the county for 1967, 1968 and 1969. Transfer may be initiated from June 1 to December 31; however, the 1967 allotments and yields will not be available until September or October.

If you have any questions on how to protect your 1966 history you should contact this office immediately.

Producers who have cotton production records for the years 1963 through 1965 should bring them to the office in order that they may be filed for future production data.

Final date to file an application for a new grower wheat allotment for 1967 is July 1, 1966. To be eligible, a producer must have at least two years wheat growing ex-
