state should have a chance to fortify its defenses against tuberculosis."

Eastland County is one of 27 counties which will band together to form an area tuberculosis association. Citizens groups in each county will act as its TB control council, and representatives of each county council will form a board to direct the area association. A name, headquarters site and staff will be selected by this board.

Counties included are: Callahan, Cooke, Haskell, Hill, Jack, Johnson, Palo Pinto, Tarrant, Wichita, Wil-

barger, Archer, Baylor, Clay, Eastland, Erath, Foard, Har-

deman, Hood, Knox, Montague, Parker, Schackelford, Somervell, Stephens, Throck-

morton, Wise and Young. Since the turn of the century, Texas has been served by a volunteer tuberculosis association, whose state headquarters are in Austin. About 100 scattered counties have had local tuberculosis associations. In this move toward area tuberculosis associations, it is hoped that local TB services can be brought to each town and city in the state.

The Texas State Depart-

ment of Health, the tax-supp-

ported agency charged with finding, treating, and follow-up on TB patients, is also reorganizing into regional groups of counties. The two organizations — the voluntary association, which is supported by Christmas Seals and which involves use of volunteers and the tax-supported Health Department work with local doctors in each community to form a three-way attack on TB.

Depot Hearing Is Held Tuesday At Court House

Elliott of St. Louis, supervisor of statistics for both T&P and M-K-T railroads, testified to give figures on freight shipments in and out of Cisco. He said the company was operating at a loss in Cisco.

"As it Looks From Here"
WAS UMBERSON CONGRESSMAN HERE?

WASHINGTON, D. C. — EVERYONE knows what SHERMAN said about war. It is, of course, "War is a dirty and unfortunate business wherever it is and whose war is doing it. Those who are loudest in their protests of our bombing in North Viet Nam are using the story of civilians being killed for their most recent emotional appeal."

Recently, four women representing the "United States Peace Movement" were permitted to visit North Viet Nam. On their way back to this country they stopped off in Moscow. A news dispatch quoted one of the women, a Mrs. Grace Newman, as saying, "I feel dirty. I am ashamed of my Government."

At about this same time another news story came out of New Orleans. It had to do with 88 American citizens who had just been airlifted from Cuba. They were the first group of those repatriated to come home after long and tedious negotiations with the Castro Government.

"I am the luckiest girl alive," said a young housewife as she came down the plane's ramp. "Freedom, Freedom!" cried a mother, holding two children in her arms. Another woman was helped off the plane into a wheelchair. "It will be wonderful to start a new life," she said.

THE contrast in these people is striking. One woman who had never known anything but freedom in her own country was permitted to go to Hanoi. She feels dirty and ashamed of us. These citizens from Cuba, having lived under Castro's Communism, are grateful for returning to the United States.

Perhaps the good lady, Mrs. Newman, should be given the opportunity to spend a few years in Cuba under a sort of government which North Viet Nam would impose on the South part of that country.

Another news reporter for the New York Times, Harrison Salisbury, was permitted to go to Hanoi and get back stories which are now admitted in the propaganda line of the North Viet Nam Government. The emphasis, of course, is on the fact that some civilians have been killed by our bombing. The fact remains, however, that fewer civilians are being killed or injured in this war, even on a percentage basis, than any other in ancient or modern history. This is not to justify a war. It does show, however, that these people use this propagand to support their advocacy of peace at any price.

IT would seem that these people should also lament and decry the fact that Viet Cong terrorists have killed thousands on multiplied thousands of South Vietnamese. There is no accurate estimate of just how many.

A Look at the County Government

... from the Auditor's Point of View

County Auditor C. H. (Harri) O'Brien has recently given programs in the county on "County Government in Texas."

The building of the present courthouse, list of county officials and how they are elected or appointed, and the financial condition of the county have been discussed by Mr. O'Brien.

On May 16, 1927, the Commissioner's Court voted to submit to countians that they vote \$300,000 in bonds to build

a new courthouse. At that time, E. S. Pritchard was county judge and commissioners were V. V. Cooper, Precinct 1, who made the motion; W. M. Burns, Precinct 2, who seconded the motion; J. T. Poe, Precinct 3; and Burt Brittain, Precinct 4.

The election was held on July 9, 1927 and carried by 60 votes. Some 2389 votes were cast in 29 election places. Eight boxes were for, 20 against and one box showed a

tie. Final vote was 1220 for; 1160 against. The final cost of the courthouse was \$313,288.28.

O'Brien stated that today the county expenses are about one half million dollars and the county tax levied 80 cents per hundred is the state constitutional maximum, saying that counties which charge more levy special taxes. Eastland County ranks as one of approximately 20 counties in the state having the lowest tax rate.

According to O'Brien, the county's indebtedness at the end of 1966 was \$73,783, which included the courthouse warrants for repairs to the Court of Civil Appeals.

This is itemized: Courthouse warrants, notes, \$42,659; Precinct 1, \$9,000; Precinct 2, \$10,874; Precinct 3, \$1,250; and Precinct 4, \$10,000.

Payments on it in 1967 will amount to \$20,346, with \$2659 paid on Courthouse warrants. Others: Precinct 1, \$5,000; Precinct 2, \$5,437; Precinct 3, \$1,250; and Precinct 4, \$6,000. Also, the interest on this, \$2,928 will be paid in '67.

O'Brien said that the balance on deposit, end of 1966, was \$225,000.

Each precinct elects a Commissioner, constable, and justice of the peace.

Officials elected by the entire county are: district clerk, school superintendent, sheriff, tax assessor - collector, clerk, attorney, surveyor, treasurer and judge.

The county auditor is selected by the District Judge and the Home Demonstration Agent and County Farm Agent are appointed by A&M Extension Service, subject to approval of the county court.

The Court also appoints a health officer and has authority to deal with contracting agencies whenever the need arises.

Federal and state offices in the courthouse are not connected with county government. They serve the people of the county, however, and the central location of offices is of benefit to all.

O'Brien said, "A county government is one of the finest examples of government by separation of powers. No county official is under the supervision of any other county official. Each is responsible only to the voters of the county. No county office is more important than another office. Each office does a specific job to keep the whole county government functioning smoothly."

Seven Counties Had Big Deer Harvest

AUSTIN — Seven Texas counties which reported a fall deer harvest in excess of 10,000 head, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department that set the estimated 1966 take at 271,599. They were Llano, Mason, Medina, Gillespie, San Saba, Kimble and Sutton.

This is approximately 60,000 more than in 1965. The survey by game wardens shows that 208 of the state's 254 counties yielded one deer or more and that the kill exceeded 4,000 deer in 18 counties.

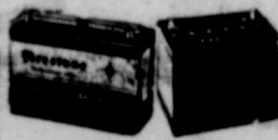

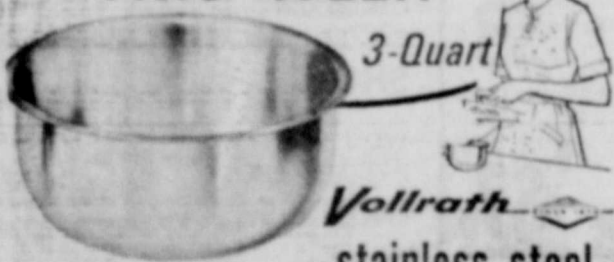

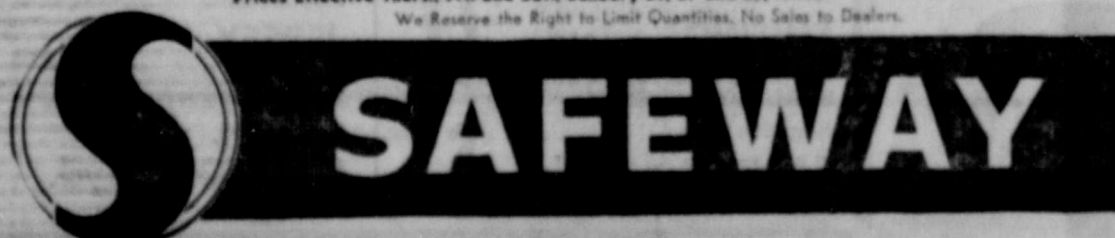
