## POSTAL CUSTOMER'S BILL OF RIGHTS CITED BY OFFICIAL

Acting Postmaster Ross Hodges has called attention of Ranger mailers to the new "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" to help meet President Johnson's government-wide goal of improving the quality of federal services to the public.  
 Directed at post office window services, Postmaster General L. F. O'Brien has ordered the Customer's Bill of Rights implemented by two immediate steps at the local post office.  
 1. Posters will be displayed in the post office lobby and service counters containing 10 points which specify the kind of treatment customers have a right to expect.  
 2. Instructions from Mr. O'Brien call for careful observance of all points in the "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights." The instructions also provide directions for the most efficient management of window services.  
 The posters tell customers they are entitled to:  
 1. A neat, clean counter in which to transact business.  
 2. Service by a well-groomed, neat window employee.  
 3. A friendly greeting that expresses a desire to assist.  
 4. Knowledgeable, well-informed, interested window personnel to help with postal needs.  
 5. Prompt, alert and efficient service.  
 6. Competent and correct information on inquiries.  
 7. An attitude that reflects helpfulness, patience and congeniality.  
 8. The courtesy and tact that would be expected from a friend.  
 9. Polite referral to another window or individual, when necessary, to give the appropriate service.  
 10. A feeling, upon leaving, that the post office is glad to serve and help at all times.  
 Instructions for fulfilling "The Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" are being distributed to all window personnel by Mr. Hodges. In addition to improving relations with customers, the "Customer's Bill of Rights," can expedite handling of transactions at the windows and make the service more efficient.  
 Ranger residents can assist in this effort, by stating their needs clearly, and having money and any necessary filled-out forms ready for transactions.

## NINE PERSONS FINISH COURSE IN GROUND AVIATION at CJC

Nine people completed the non-credit course in ground aviation last semester at Cisco Junior College, according to Lloyd McGrew, manager of the Cisco Flying Service, which is cooperating with the college in making the course available.  
 The course will be offered again this semester from 7-10 p. m. Thursdays. Tuition, including money for student equipment, is \$50. Persons may register for this non-credit college course Monday or Tuesday night beginning at six o'clock, according to CJC registrar, Carroll Scott. Mr. Scott said that the college is attempting to get the course credited by the state. If it is, it will be put under the technical-vocational department.  
 Instructor for the course is Bob Reese.  
 Completing the course and passing the written examination toward a pilot's license last semester were Al Anderson, James Cotton, Roy Hathaway, Mrs. Lloyd McGrew, Rodney Ryan, Bob Wilson, Charles Yardley, all of Cisco, and Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Matthews of Ranger.  
 In addition to the ground course, all but one (Mrs. Matthews) of these students have been taking aerial flight lessons.

Unless a lot of people register to vote Monday and Tuesday, decisions affecting just everybody in this county will be decided by only a few people during 1967.

Tuesday, Jan. 31, is the deadline for registering to vote this year. County Tax Assessor Collector Edgar Altom reports that his office, at the courthouse will give every opportunity for those who want to register.

The courthouse tax office has been remaining open through the noon hours and will continue to do so Monday and Tuesday, as well as staying open until midnight Tuesday, Altom said.

He estimated Friday that approximately 2,000 people in the county had qualified to vote through registration. He guessed that some 1,200 had registered in Eastland; about 300 in Cisco; 250 in Ranger; 200 in Gorman; and had had no report from Rising Star.

Registration is free — but you must register in order to vote, Altom said. He made the following statement relative to voting requirements: "Recent conflicting statements have resulted in misunderstanding about voter registration requirements.

"Section 34 of the Texas Election Code gives us the qualifications requirements for voting," he said.

**The Ranger Chamber of Commerce Office will be open from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. on Tuesday night so that those who haven't registered to vote, may do so.**

"Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of 21 years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in the state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or County in which such person offers to vote and who shall have registered as a voter, if required to do so, shall be deemed a qualified elector," he quotes from the law.

"Any qualified elector who is over sixty (60) years of age on the day of an election at which he offers to vote and who does not reside in a city of ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants may vote at the election without having registered as a voter.

In other words, no person between the age of 21 and 60 will be permitted to vote unless he has registered in accordance with the provisions of this code, he said.

"41-A states that the County Tax Collector-Assessor of each county in this state shall be the registrar of voters in that county."

Registration period began Oct. 1, 1966, and will end Jan. 31, 1967. Those persons registering in this period will be qualified to vote from Feb. 1, 1967 to Feb. 29, 1968, he explained. Applications for registration may be obtained at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco, the City Hall and Jenkins Insurance Agency in Rising Star, Todd's Variety Store in Gorman, and at the Commercial State Bank in Ranger. These may be mailed to Edgar Altom, Tax Assessor - Collector, Box 358, Eastland, and certificates will be written and mailed to applicants at no charge, Altom said.  
 The registration certificate of a person who registers before he becomes a qualified elector (21 years of age) shall have stamped or written thereon the following: Not entitled to vote before (blank) (Date on which he will become a qualified elector to be inserted in the blank).  
 The same notion shall be placed opposite his name on the list of registered voters, Altom explained.

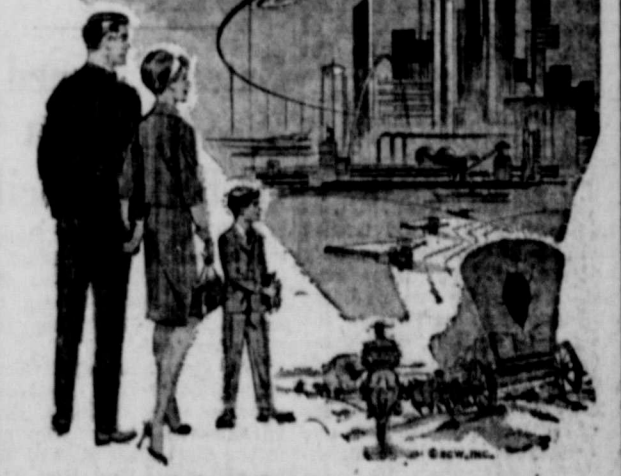

## 'Name-Changing' On Checks Passe, Come Sept. 1, 1967

The old practice of "changing the bank's name on a check" when you don't happen to have one of your bank's check blanks, appears to be on the way out — much as Zip Coding mail is "in." An official of the local bank has announced a policy to be adopted by the Federal Reserve Banks beginning Sept. 1, 1967.  
The official quoted the Federal Reserve notice as follows:  
"Effective Sept. 1, 1967, checks and drafts deposited with Federal Reserve Banks will not be handled through regular bank collection channels if received without the magnetic ink (MICR) transit number. The new electronic processing demands such magnetic ink encoding.  
"To avoid the delays of special handling of your checks, please use only the printed checks which your bank furnishes. (If not convenient to carry your checkbook, keep a few blank checks with you.) Do not use customer's draft forms or "changed" checks.  
"You may be required to pay a service charge for col-

lecting a check which cannot be processed electronically by the Federal Reserve banks."  
Traditionally, people have marked through the name of the bank on a check and written in their own bank's name when they found themselves without a printed check from their own bank. The electronic equipment is not able to comprehend these changes and must depend on the electronically-encoded information of the checks to direct the bank on which the check is drawn.

### A TOWN'S TRAGEDY IS TOLD IN OLD NEWSPAPER CLIPPING

"It Was Terrible" is the headline on a newspaper clipping dated Oct. 7, 1892, from the Coffeyville, Kansas, newspaper. The clipping is among some other prize possessions of Taylor Owens of Cisco.

The framed story belonged to the late T. C. Owens of Anson, an uncle of Mr. Owens. The T. C. Owens family came to Anson, Texas, from Kansas. Mrs. Owens, who operated a clothing store in Dodge City before her marriage, had advertised for sale a bright red shirt, saying she would marry the cowboy who bought it. A cattle driver on a trip to Dodge City, T. C. Owens saw the shirt, bought it, and married the saleslady.

The newspaper clipping that came into the possession of Taylor Owens concerns the graphic description of the famous Dalton brothers' last flight, which was in connection with "The Great Coffeyville Tragedy."

At the time of the writing of the story, "four of the Dalton gang lie dead in cheap coffins in graves yet uncovered, one remains lying on a rough pallet in a frame boarding house, and four of the citizens who rose yesterday to repel the raid of the robbers are stilled in death, while three others lie wounded at their homes."

The writer gives a detailed account of the bank robbery by the Dalton gang which preceded the bloody street fight in which every citizen joined who could find arms. He noted that the attack upon the town, "the thrilling fight, the courage displayed alike by bandits and citizens, of the tragedy which with successfully enacted make up the most wonderful story the border has ever furnished."

The desperadoes, in their black varnished coffins, "look very ghastly and unheroic. There were hundred of morbid ones who came to gaze and stayed long. Some handled the bodies in the coffins, and whenever Great

## County Delegation Hears Tuberculosis Proposals

A group of Eastland County's citizens met Thursday afternoon in the Commission-er's Courtroom to discuss the proposed Tuberculosis Are Association Number 3, which would include twenty-seven counties.

Present were Judge Bailey, County School Superintendent O. L. Stamey, Buel Bryan, administrator of Blackwell Hospital in Gorman; Leon Musgrove, administrator of Eastland Memorial Hospital; H. McDonald, minister of Rising Star; and Mmes. Clyde Benton and Gene Boney of Eastland.

Called by County Judge Scott Bailey, the group heard two field consultants from the Texas Tuberculosis Association office in Austin outline the organization plans

and goals. Mrs. Marie Peik and Miss Fran McDonald explained that although the TTA office is in Austin, the organization is not a state agency.

Mrs. Peik said that in July of 1965, Texas had 84 local Tuberculosis associations serving 93 counties. A year later, due to the area association plan, Texas had 70 local associations serving 124 counties. Goal is for 13 area associations to serve the entire state.

The area office would mail out Christmas Seals, which is the Tuberculosis Association method of fund-raising; provide educational and helpful services to each county in the area; and serve as a meeting ground for the counties and the state office.

Money collected from the Christmas Seals would be used mostly in the area itself; with some 75 per cent of it remaining in the area office. The area board would distribute funds as needed to provide the best possible service.

"There is no policy of this county collected so much therefore it will get so many services," Mrs. Peik stressed. "The money collected is used to provide services where they are needed and need is the only basis of distribution of funds."

Each of the counties in this area will send a representative to the steering committee meeting in Hotel Texas, Fort Worth, Saturday, Feb. 18. This committee will select a name for the area association, a location for the area office, the number of employees which will be needed, the authority and responsibility of each employee, and a definite date for opening the office. Tentative plans call for complete organization by April 1.

Leon Musgrove will be Eastland County's representative on this steering committee.

The Fort Worth meeting will also have programs for other counties who wish to attend.
