### 16,000 Crippled Helped By Easter Seal Society

A record of 16,031 Texas children and adults were helped during 1966 by the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, according to H. T. Wilson of Eastland, who serves as the Easter Seal Representative of Eastland County.

Of the total, 11,046 children and 4,986 adults received treatment and other rehabilitation services financed mainly by contributions made during the Easter Seal Appeal, he reported.

These contributions made possible medical diagnosis, physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs, special education classes, and other services to rehabilitate handicapped children and adults. Wheelchairs, walkers, braces and other special equipment were also provided.

### Ranger School District Files Tax Suits

Tax suits against 13 property owners have been filed in the Eastland County Courthouse by trustees of Ranger Independent School District and regents of Ranger Junior College, according to James R. Clarke, Ranger School Superintendent.

Total taxes due, including penalty and interest, totaled \$2,994.61 Clarke said.

Further tax suits will be filed as soon as the tax lawyers can prepare them Clarke said.

A total of 333 property owners will have suits filed on them soon for a total of \$45, 148.83 plus penalty, interest and court cost unless they are paid prior to the filing of the suit.

Unless these suits are paid off property will be sold to satisfy the tax lien.

Personal property suits against 27 persons have been filed in Justice of the Peace M. D. Underwood's office Clarke said and more will be filed at a later date when suits are prepared.

### Court-Move Hearing By Committee Delayed

A four-week delay has been assured on the committee hearing on proposed legislation that would transfer the 11th Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland to Abilene, Rep. Burke Musgrove reports.

The bill, introduced the first day of the present session, was referred to the House Committee on Judicial Districts, he said, and its chairman, Walter Knapp of Amarillo, has told Musgrove that a hearing isn't expected for perhaps a month. "Of course, it could be called on 48-hour notice," Mr. Musgrove warned in a telephone conversation this week.

The bill was introduced by Rep. Frank Calhoun of Abilene in the absence of Rep. Temple Dixon of Sweetwater, drafter of the bill. Dixon has recently undergone eye surgery. The bill naturally also has the support of Abilene Rep. Grant Jones.

Earlier it had been reported that strongest arguments to be used by the proponents of the bill was geography and the lack of adequate airport facilities at Eastland. The court's location in Eastland puts it in the extreme eastern end of the 11th district.

"We've secured the support of men from El Paso and Texarkana," Musgrove said, "because courts in those two cities are likewise at extreme edges of their respective districts, so it could be assumed that persons in these cities would object to a president of a court being moved because of geographic location."

Secondly, Musgrove says, the airport argument doesn't appear too strong because there isn't a city in the court's district that has regularly scheduled airline service to Abilene now.

One of the main points in favor of retaining the court in Eastland County, it is reported, is that the county has just recently renovated the court's fifth-floor headquarters, adding central air conditioning, heating, additional library space, more office space and other general modernization. Cost to the county is about \$42,000.

Musgrove quoted State Sen. Tom Creighton as saying he would " filibuster such a bill in the Senate."

Other members of the committee who will hear arguments on the court's move are: Lee Duggan of Houston, John Hannah of Lufkin, Bill Healy of Paducah, Jim Nugent of Kerrville, C. L. Ray of Marshall, Ransel Rossow of Snyder, Bob Salter of Gatesville, Lati Santisteban of El Paso and John Wright of Grand Prairie.

I read with much interest your account, "A Town's Tragedy is Told In Old News paper Clipping." The out-lay referred to as "dying on a rough pallet" in a boarding house didn't die. That one was Emmett Dalton, the youngest member of the gang. Emmett was shot 14 times, but made a miraculous recovery under the quick emergency surgery of Dr. W. H. Wells. While Emmett was still under surgery, a member of the mob formed to lynch Emmett came in and demanded Emmett. Dr. Wells said, "No use boys, he's going to die anyway. You wouldn't want to hang a dying man would you?" The mob leader said, "How do you know he's going to die, Doc?" Dr. Wells looked the man square in the eye and said, "Hell, yes, he's going to die." "Did you boys ever hear of one of my patients getting well?" This remark broke the spell, and the mob all started to laugh and withdrew in good humor.

Emmett did recover thoroughly. He was tried, convicted and sent to Lansing Federal Prison for life. Emmett proved to be a model prisoner, and with good behavior and 14 years came free. Emmett Dalton by grace of a governor's pardon, came to Bartlesville, Okla., his old stomping ground in 1967 to marry his old boyhood sweetheart, Julia Johnson. Emmett used to loaf around and spend his idle hours at the old Bartlesville Daily Enterprise, the local Evening paper.

This writer, at that time, was living in Bartlesville, and had a paper route on the Bartlesville Daily Enterprise. Most of us boys with the paper knew of Emmett. In those days to know and speak to a famous or infamous (as you will) outlaw was really something. And in the eyes of us boys, O' Emmett was a real hero to be worshiped. We boys would try to get Emmett to tell us about the Coffeyville robbery, but he would always give us a 'stony stare' and walk away. We finally figured that maybe Emmett didn't want to talk about it.

Emmett Dalton lived on from his prison release and made a useful citizen. Emmett was around Bartlesville for several years, and then went to Calif. He died July 13, '37 at 66 in Hollywood, Calif. He was cremated and came back to Coffeyville, Kansas in an urn, to be buried at the scene of his early crime.

# THE GORDON SPOT

"When is it going to rain?" I hear this question a dozen times a day. I'm beginning to think this drought is like the one a man told me about one time. He said he could remember one drought that was so dry that it never did rain. Another gentleman told me he could predict the next rain. He said it would rain at the end of this dry spell.

With this year's drought stricken pastures, cattlemen may begin noticing signs of vitamin A deficiency in their herds.

Vitamin A deficiency in the early stages is characterized by night blindness. In later stages, cattle become less alert and lose their appetites. Watery eyes, swelling at the

joints, rapid breathing and staggering, are some more symptoms.

Many cattlemen have bulls with their herds now and are breeding for next year's calf crop. Vitamin A deficiency can seriously affect reproduction performance of cattle, according to some research reports.

In recent test at Texas A & M University 35 heifers were injected with vitamin A. In this group only one calf was lost at calving time. Another group of 35 heifers received no vitamin A injections. In this group seven calves were lost at calving time.

The source of Vitamin A is carotene, which comes from green vegetation. In dry years such as this one mother cows may be deprived of green vegetation for several months before the calf is born. This caused two conditions. First, the vitamin A supply of the mother cow may be depleted, thus limiting her reproduction performance. Also a limited supply of Vitamin A in the newly born calf may result. This is made worse by the fact that there will be little vitamin A in the cow's milk since her supply of the vitamin is low.

Doses of synthetic vitamin A either injected or fed in concentrates would help both of these conditions.

Have you noticed bagworms on the trees around your house this winter? Now is a good time to control the bagworms by removing the bags from the trees and destroying them. The adult bagworm is a moth. The females lay approximately 500 eggs inside the bag. The bag contains the eggs remains on the tree until spring.

If the bags are destroyed now, the life cycle is broken. If not, the eggs hatch into tiny worms which begin feeding greedily on the surrounding foliage in the Spring.

Aside from destroying the overwintering stages they can be controlled with several insecticides if applications are made while the larvae are quite small. As soon as the larvae become fairly large, they are extremely hard to kill and heavy infestations will remove the foliage and bark from all parts of a tree or shrub.
