A Day With Rubinfoff Faculty Wins Offers Much Activity Benefit Game Score: 66-50

When you see and hear RUBINOFF AND HIS VIOLIN in concert here March 15, at the RJC auditorium, you will share one day out of the nine months he spends each year touring the nation. These nine months will add up to some 125 cities visited, 250 matinee and evening concerts played with an additional 1,250 free performances at service club luncheons, hospitals, radio broadcasts, and with at least 1,000 of these free appearances before students in school assemblies.

A day with Rubinfoff is a whirlwind of activity—he is up at four and five o'clock in the morning and as a rule travels one or two hundred miles before his breakfast. Weekends are usually spent in cross country train and plane flights. If the schedule permits, he will visit four or five churches on Sunday morning. Red Oak, Iowa, holds the record for the most churches visited in one morning. The Ministerial Association there presented with

a beautiful Bible in recognition of his playing for seven churches.

To start his day Rubinfoff arrives for a hurried greeting with sponsors, perhaps a picture for the local press, and then he is off to an escorted tour of practically the whole city's school enrollment for free school assemblies with only breaks of five or ten minutes between for transportation. Almost without exception he is invited as guest speaker for a service club luncheon, but winds up "fiddling for his lunch". The student matinee follows in the afternoon with an hour or two spent autographing for his young friends after the concert. Next routine is an interview for the local radio station and by then it is time for a change into full dress, dinner, and the big event of the day—the evening concert.

An ironclad rule with Rubinfoff is to be at the auditorium an hour before the audience assemblies for practicing on his beloved Stradivarius. The Maestro is often questioned as to why he has to practice after having played the violin for 50 years. His serious reply is that with all the many appearances he makes, that still does not allow him time to polish and perfect individual notes and passages. Difficult exercises also keep his fingers flying at the effortless speed maintained for hours at a time, even in his automobiles or on the train. Rubinfoff either uses his Strad or his specially built pocket fingerboard to keep up with the rigid practice schedule.

With all this Rubinfoff still finds time for collectors' stillings of antique glass, dictating letters, long distance telephone calls, and enjoying life in general. This famous artist spends his days at a terrific pace, but he wouldn't trade it for any other life. Each morning he looks forward with fresh enthusiasm and boundless energy to the new day to be shared with new friends in new places.

The "roaring Rangers" ripped into the scraggy coyotes from Weatherford Junior College and very quickly established their superiority. The coyotes were not in the game from the middle of the first period on. Weatherford took an early lead, which was quickly erased, and tried to make a game of it by applying a full-court press from the beginning. The Spivey-McMillon-MeToyer press breaking combination immediately nullified the effectiveness of this defensive strategy and turned it into an offensive weapon which helped establish a 31 to 32 halftime lead.

The third period was opened by four of coach Butler's very capable reserves plus one member of the first-five who maintained the lead until the starting group returned to playfully ice the game away with a 96 to 79 victory.

Four members of the Ranger squad scored in the double figure column. Robert Spivey led the scoring with 20 points followed by James McCloud with 18, Ulric Cobb and Joe MeToyer both with 16.

Leading shooter for the losing team was Leon Spille with a whopping 47 points.

The relatively easy victory over Weatherford clinched the north-zone, Texas Junior Athletic Conference title for the Rangers but the season is far from being over. The come-back trail is studded with capable adversaries who would like nothing better than to dump the Rangers for a second time, and possibly from fourth position in the national rankings which they now hold. Standing taller than all the rest in desire to see this accomplished is their closest rival, the Cisco Junior College Wranglers. Ranger can expect to encounter a bunch of fired-up round-ballers when the Wranglers invade the hardwoods here Saturday night. Special emphasis is being given in 1967 by the Easter Seal Society in Texas to locating disabled children and adults who may need rehabilitation services and do not know where they are available. Anyone who could benefit from treatment and services offered by the Easter Seal Society can contact Mr. Wilson at the Eastland National Bank, Eastland, Texas.

The Easter Seal Society was established to assist disabled persons and their families in finding and making effective use of all resources which will be helpful to them in developing their abilities and living more useful lives. The Society helps support 23 treatment facilities where crippled children and adults are treated regardless of their ability to pay. Wheelchairs, walkers and related services are provided to those who cannot provide for themselves.

Mr. Wilson said the Easter Seal Society depends on the annual Easter Seal Appeal to finance this program of rehabilitation in Texas. He urged Eastland County citizens to increase their support of the Easter Seal Society, and its program to help crippled children and adults.

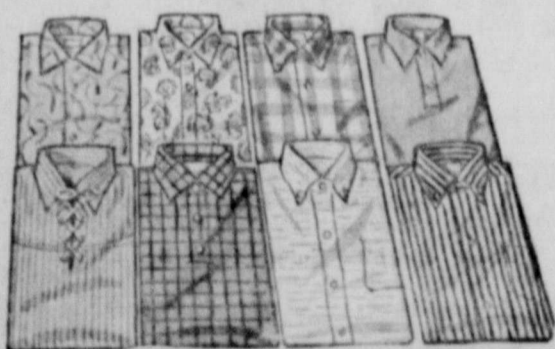

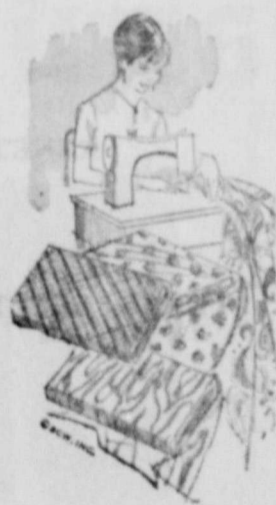

charge was being drawn by attorneys.

The charge was expected to be given to the jury at 1 p.m. Lengthy testimony involving the shooting death of Dr. Albert Riedel on Nov. 7, 1965, continued Tuesday in the civil case of Mrs. Patsy Riedel vs. Ivan J. Allen.

Testifying Tuesday were Mrs. Riedel, widow; Dr. W.T. Watkins of Ranger, attending physician at Ranger General Hospital at the time of Dr. Riedel's death; and several doctors, including Dr. Robert T. Long of Dallas, a psychoanalyst who had treated Mrs. Riedel.

Eastland County Sheriff L. E. Sublett testified that it was altogether possible that overhanging limbs in the area of the shooting could have deflected a bullet. Dr. Watkins testified as to Dr. Riedel's condition and the wound location, saying that the bullet entered the body under the chest area and angled down at about 20 degrees. Later in the day Magness testified that the elevation at which Dr. Riedel stood at the time of the shooting was some 10 inches higher than the ground on which Allen was standing when the gun fired.

Mrs. Riedel is suing for \$770,000 in civil damages. Allen, indicted for the rifle shooting death of Dr. Riedel, was acquitted of the charge in the same court in January, 1966. Monday, he testified that the death of his nephew was an accident, that the gun Allen was holding went off accidentally and that he did not pull the trigger or aim the gun at anyone. The suit is attempting to prove negligence in handling the gun.

Mrs. Riedel testified that both she and Dr. Riedel were under psychoanalysts care at the time of his death. She said that Dr. Riedel's and her relationships with the Allens had always been good.

She also said that at the time of her husband's death, Allen had said the shooting was an accident. She said, in response to an attorney's question, that Allen was "like a father" to her husband. Mr. Riedel said that all the community property had been left in her husband's will to herself as co-executor.

She testified that her husband drank, but not to excess and that she felt he had no drinking problem. Attorney Virgil Seaberry Jr., attorney with Bill B. Hart, for Allen, read depositions from Mrs. Riedel in 1966 in which she admitted family quarrels and accusations by both herself and the doctor as to alleged infidelity.

Allen returned to the stand to testify that on the day Dr. Riedel was shot that he had told Allen that he was "going to divorce Patsy."

Pretty, blonde Mrs. Patsy Riedel testified Tuesday morning that her marriage to the late Dr. Albert Riedel was a "happy marriage."

Mrs. Riedel, who took the stand about 11:30 a. m., outlined her late husband's school and medical training, beginning with their marriage in 1948, and explained they had been childhood sweethearts since kindergarten. Following a tour of duty in the service, the late Dr. Riedel attended the University of Texas, at which time they were assisted financially by Ivan J. Allen, Riedel's uncle.

According to the testimony, Riedel and his wife were employed in Austin until the birth of their first son in 1950, during which time Riedel drew GI assistance. When their second son was born, he was named Allen for "Uncle Ivan," Mrs. Riedel said. Upon receiving his bachelor's and master's degrees from the UofT, the Riedels moved back to Dallas where he attended Southwestern Medical School for four years.

The family lived in El Paso while Dr. Riedel served his internship, and Mrs. Riedel testified they had no assistance from Mr. Allen at that time. His later training included three years residency in psychiatry at Timberlawn Hospital in Dallas and a year of study in adolescent psychology.

The question of the Riedels' marital problems had come up during Monday's testimony but was not allowed to be presented to the jury after the plaintiff's attorney objected and was sustained by Judge Sparks. Jack Frost of Eastland is assisting the plaintiff's attorney.

After Judge Sparks agreed Tuesday to let the testimony concerning the Riedel's marriage be presented, a doctor and close friend of Riedel of Dallas was questioned by deposition about knowledge of the matter. The testimony said that Riedel had indicated to him that he was concerned about his marriage and about his children. The doctor, up on being questioned as to whether Riedel had a drinking problem, said that he did not know if it was a problem but that it was one of his habits.

Spectators in the courtroom showed visible emotion as the four Riedel children — Scott, 16, Allen, 14, Becky, 10, and Alice, 6 entered the room and were seated in a prominent place. They left during a court recess to return to their school classes in Dallas.

The trial against Allen opened Monday with the defendant, taking the stand.

Bob Cousins, attorney for Mrs. Riedel of Dallas, told prospective jurors "this is not a criminal case, but a civil case to prove only negligence in handling the gun."

The plaintiff's attorney said "Allen failed to handle the gun as a prudent, responsible man should have." In asking for the damages, the widow is asking for the amount approximated which her husband would have earned in his probable lifetime of some 30 more years.

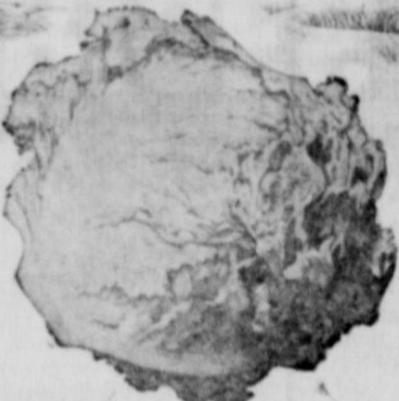
