MEMO for MODERNS

Tasty and colorful, Mexican food is a frequent choice whether prepared at home or eaten "out." The foods of Mexico and Texas-Mexico are not identical. Although some recipes date from as early as pre-Spanish times, they have been changed and adapted over the centuries in Mexico and changed even more as they moved north.

Chili, though sometimes a dish no Southwesterner would call Mexican food, is known the length and breadth of the United States. The origin of Texas Chili is disputable, but its popularity unquestioned. Through the years it has stimulated argument, been the subject of articles and books, even prompted poets to sing its praises.

Texas Chili

For Texas chili, fry 1/4 pound beef suet in a deep saucepan or kettle over medium flame. Remove cracklings. Add 1 cup chopped onion and 1 pound coarsely ground beef. Cook until deep yellow, stirring frequently. Add 2 1/2 pounds of coarsely ground beef. Cook until gray. Add 1 tablespoon salt, 1/2 pod dried hot pepper, 1 teaspoon ground cumin (cumin), 1/4 cup chili powder and 3 cups of boiling water. Bring to boil over full flame, reduce flame to simmer and cook 1 1/2 hours until meat is tender and flavors are thoroughly blended. Stir occasionally. If mixture becomes thicker than desired, add boiling water. To serve with beans: 30 minutes before end of cooking time, add desired amount of cooked pinto or canned chili beans. Chili and beans may be served separately so everyone may mix their own. Makes approximately 8 cups.

Enchiladas

Tortillas, the bread of Mexico, are used in many ways. They are the basis of Enchiladas. Heat 2 cups chili in a saucepan over a low flame. Dipping and filling one at a time, dip 12 soft tortillas in the hot chili. Place 2 tablespoons grated American cheese and 2 teaspoons chopped onion in the center of each tortilla. Roll each tortilla and place, seam side down, in a shallow baking dish. Cover with remaining chili. Top with grated cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 15 minutes or until cheese melts.

Frijoles Refritos

Mexico has many ways with beans and Frijoles Refritos (Re-Fried Beans) is one of the best. Mash 2 1/2 cups cooked pinto beans or drained, canned Mexican style beans with potato, masher or wooden spoon. Heat 2 tablespoons bacon drippings in a skillet over medium flame. Add beans to hot fat and cook until fat is absorbed, about 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Makes 4 servings.

Tamale Pie

Tamale Pie is a modern recipe that goes back to the Aztecs, or even beyond. Place four cups of water and 1/2 teaspoon salt in a saucepan and bring to a full rolling boil. Slowly add 2 cups white cornmeal, stirring constantly. Continue cooking 20 minutes, stirring frequently. Heat 3 tablespoons vegetable oil in a deep skillet over medium flame. Add 1 pound coarsely ground beef chuck, 2 chopped medium onions, 1 minced clove garlic and 1 finely chopped green pepper. Cook until the meat is browned. Add 1 can (16 or 17 ounce) tomatoes, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon chili powder. Bring to boil. Line bottom and sides of a well-greased 2-quart casserole with the cornmeal mixture, reserving some for topping. Pour meat mixture into lined casserole. Top with reserved cornmeal mixture, bringing it to the edge. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 1 hour. If desired, top with grated American cheese 10 minutes before removing from oven. Makes 4 servings.

Guacamole

The versatile avocado can be made into equally versatile Guacamole. Guacamole can be served as appetizer, salad, snack or main course. Peel and mash 2 avocados. Peel and dice 1 medium fresh tomato. Add diced tomato to avocado and mix well. Add 1 grated small onion, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon salt and a dash of chili powder to avocado mixture and mix well. Serve over crushed shredded lettuce for a salad. Makes 8 servings. If

RUBINOFF DUE FOR CONCERT

When Rubinoff appears in Ranger in a program of popular concert music, he will play on one of the most precious instruments in the world, the famed Romanoff-Stradivarius Violin insured for \$100,000.

The violin is famous for its silken, lustrous tone, its full range and almost unbelievable depth. Made in 1731 by the master of all violin makers, this particular "Strad" eventually found its way into the hands of the Romanoffs, and still bears the bejeweled crest of that family. During the revolution, it was smuggled out of Russia and eventually was purchased by Mr. Rubinoff.

Sensitive to heat, humidity, altitude and the risks that beset any treasure of such vast value, the Stradivarius is guarded and handled with deference and extreme care at all times. The ancient instrument still retains the original varnish and is the acme of perfection in musical instruments.

An interesting fact is that during certain passages of "Warsaw Concerto" Rubinoff exerts as much as 60 pounds of pressure on the violin. It takes tremendous strength of highly developed muscular action to draw certain tones from one of the world's most delicate instruments.

Rubinoff will appear at RJC Auditorium on March 15.

New Trial To Be Asked In Allen Damage Suit

A motion for a new trial will be filed in the Riedel vs. Allen damage suit case which was held in 91st District Court in Eastland this past week, it has been reported.

After nine hours of deliberation, the jury Thursday awarded Mrs. Patsy Riedel \$260,800 in a civil damage suit against Eastland County Rancher Ivan J. Allen whom she had charged with negligence in the gunshot death of her husband, Dr. Albert Riedel, in November, 1965.

A judgment is expected to be entered in the case early this coming week, at which time a motion, alleging errors and asking a re-trial, will be filed, Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. said Friday.

Seaberry and Bill B. Hart, both of Eastland, were attorneys for Mr. Allen.

If a re-trial is denied by the trial judge (District Judge J. Frank Sparks) then an appeal probably will be filed with the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, Seaberry said.

The jury allotted \$1,300 for Dr. Riedel's funeral expense and \$259,000 was to be divid-

ed among the widow and her four children, ages 6-16, with the youngest child receiving the largest amount. Judge Frank Sparks instructed the jury of four women and eight men to divide the money among the children, based on their ages. The youngest child was to receive the largest payment since he would require support for a longer period of time, Judge Sparks said.

The settlement was \$509,200 less than the \$770,000 Mrs. Riedel sought in the suit.

The trial began Monday and the case went to the jury Wednesday after almost three days of testimony. Jurors deliberated only two hours Wednesday before returning to their homes reconvening Thursday at 9 a. m.

The courtroom was empty except for the plaintiff, the defendant and their attorneys when the verdict was returned at 4:50 p. m. Thursday.

Judge Sparks had charged the jury to base their decision on whether Dr. Riedel's death was avoidable or unavoidable.

Mrs. Riedel is the widow of the Dallas physician who was shot to death Nov. 7, 1965, on an Eastland County ranch owned by the defendant, Allen, who fired the fatal shot, was tried in January of 1966 in connection with the shooting but was acquitted when the jury returned a verdict of "accidental shooting."

The Dallas man was a practicing physician at Timberlawn Hospital in Dallas at the time of his death. He was also a part-owner of the hospital.

Franklin H. Perry of Dallas, Mrs. Riedel's attorney, said he requested \$770,000 settlement was less than the amount Dr. Riedel would have earned during his probable remaining lifetime. Perry estimated that his income would have been near \$1 million dollars had he lived an additional 34 years.

County Civil Defense Board Meets Tuesday

The Eastland County Civil Defense Board has planned a meeting for Tuesday morning, Feb. 21, at 10 a. m. in the county court room on the 3rd floor of the courthouse.

Kenneth Denmark, extension rural civil defense specialist for Texas A&M, will show slides and discuss the responsibilities of various civil defense organizations.

THE GORDON SPOT

I would like to call your attention to several activities planned for this week.

There has been a growing interest in greenhouse tomato production here in Eastland County. Several have told me they plan to build greenhouses this year. Because of the requests for information on greenhouse tomatoes, I have asked Dr. John Larsen, Extension Horticulturist who is considered one of the best authorities on growing tomatoes in greenhouses, to come and meet with all persons interested in greenhouse tomatoes.

We will have this meeting Monday afternoon, Feb. 20. Everyone interested will meet in front of the Eastland Livestock Auction at 1:30 p. m. From there we will go to Gilbert Meredith's greenhouse in Olden. Dr. Larsen will answer any questions you have on growing tomatoes in the greenhouse. We will also look at Gilbert's operation and ask him to tell of some of his experiences.

Tuesday at 10 a. m. the Eastland County Rural Civil Defense Board will meet. We are inviting other defense organizations, representative of county and city governments and everyone else interested in civil defense to the meeting. Kenneth Denmark, Extension Rural Civil Defense Specialist from Texas A&M will be here to discuss responsibilities of various defense organizations. He will also show slides of civil defense work. The meeting will be held in the county court room in the Eastland Courthouse.

We are having an Angora goat selection demonstration at Ike Hickman's place Wednesday. Hickman's place is between Rising Star and Pioneer on Highway 36. Jack Groff, Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist, will do the selection work. Hickman has been using the selection program to improve the quality and production of mohair since 1964. As a result of the selection he has considerably increased the mohair production of his goats.

Everyone interested in seeing the goat selection demonstration are invited to come to Hickman's place by 9 a. m. Wednesday morning.


